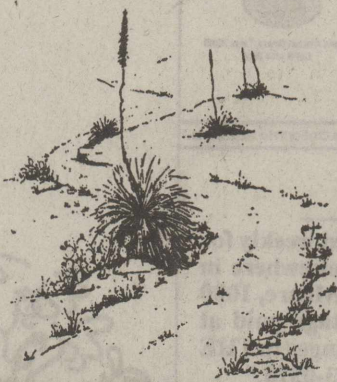

member of the Catholic Church.

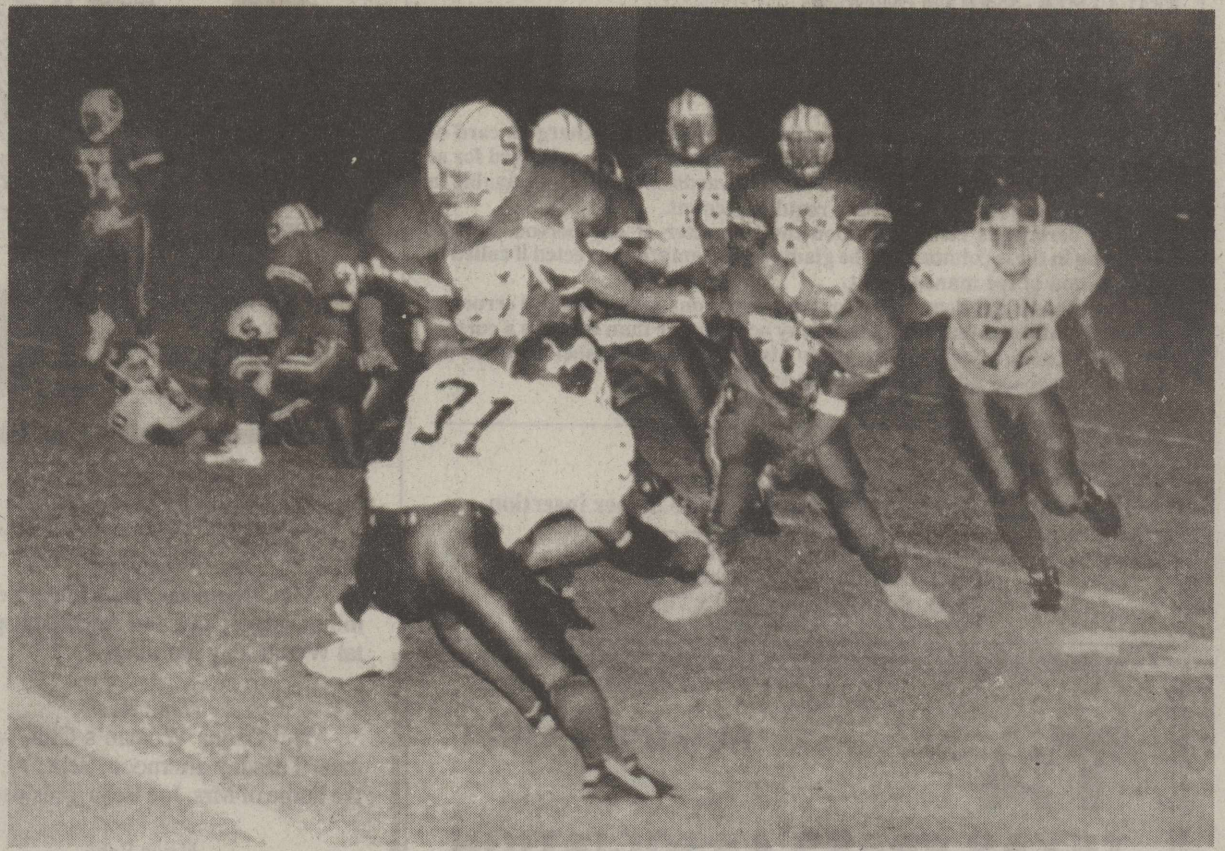

Lions Come Up Short In 26-22 Heartbreaker

A strange chain of events and turnovers led to a 26-22 Ozona Lion loss to the Sonora Broncos in last Friday's game in Sonora. Ozona fans overflowed the visitors' side and watched in awe as the game seasawed back and forth.

David Browne stepped in for the injured Chris Sanchez at quarterback and quickly got into the groove by scrambling and passing throughout the night, particularly to wide receiver Jesse Garza, who was Browne's prime target for the evening.

Browne connected with Garza in the first quarter on passes of 12, 10, 14 and 17 yards. The last reception resulted in a touchdown with 4:21 left in that quarter. A fumble on a try for the extra-point kick turned into a two-point conversion when holder Jesse Garza picked the ball up and ran around left end. The Lions led with the score Ozona 8, Sonora 0.

Running back Matthew Ortiz picked up a total of 71 yards in the first half of play, garnering 54 yards in six plays. This included one jaunt of 34 yards to add Ozona's second touchdown of the game. Fellow teammate and senior Anthony Sanchez carried only three times and substituted for Chris Sanchez in the secondary.

Ozona gained their next score on a 15-yard pass from Browne to Garza in the early moments of the second period. The extra point was kicked by Bryan Mendez to make the score Ozona 15, Sonora 0.

Ozona's defense held the Broncos for a third time, forcing them to punt. The Lions' troubles began toward the end of the second quarter, when the ball was hiked over punter Joe Esparza's head. Esparza was unable to kick, but managed to retrieve the ball and take it five yards upfield to the 28-yard line.

Sonora took over the ball, and four plays later reached the end zone on Davis Hale's 21-yard pass from Jason Morely. A two-point conversion try failed, and the Broncos cut the lead to Ozona 15, Sonora 6.

Julio Martinez returned the ensuing kickoff to his own 42-yard line before being stopped. Through the running of Browne and Ortiz, the ball was brought down to the Sonora 45-yard line. A Browne pass was intercepted by Sonora's Levi Pool and returned to the Ozona 25-yard line.

With a Sonora penalty and a 25-yard run the Broncos were forced by Ozona's defense to attempt a 25-yard field goal. The try failed, and the Lions took over the ball, to continue their lead at halftime 15-6.

With a sore ankle, Chris Sanchez entered the game in the defensive secondary to help with added coverage. Sanchez ended a Sonora scoring drive when he intercepted a Morley pass on the Lion 20-yard line.

Two plays later Garza fumbled a pass reception, and the Broncos re-

covered on the 22-yard line. Taking advantage of the turnover, the Broncos scored seven plays later on a hard plunge at the beginning of the fourth quarter to begin dominating the game. A kick for the extra point was good, and Sonora extended their lead to 13 points, thus Ozona led by two points - 15-13.

Receiving good field position on the Broncos' 47-yard line, Lion David Browne tried a quick pitch left which was intercepted by Sonora's Gabriel Perez and returned 46 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was good, and Sonora took the lead for the first time with a score of 20-15.

Ozona fought back with a drive starting on their own 29-yard line. Passes of 6, 29, and a 36 yard touchdown to Garza made it 21-20, and the extra point by Mendez gave the Lions a two point lead with the score 22-20.

The Ozona defense stopped the next Bronco drive and gave the ball back to their offensive team. The Lions received the ball on Sonora's 45-yard line. Two plays later Browne's pass was intercepted on the 19-yard line. On the next play Sonora fumbled, Ozona recovered, then Ozona fumbled

Lower Taxes Fund Bigger Budget

Commissioners approved a 1995 budget of \$6,766,716 at their meeting Sept. 12. The budget, up from \$6,481,256 for 1994, is to be funded by a tax rate of .683 per \$100 valuation, down from the .73868 tax rate which funded 1994.

The school tax rate, which is to be voted on Sept. 20, will be \$1.230 per \$100 valuation compared to \$1.21 for current funding.

Emerald Underground Water District's tax rate will decrease from .020 per \$100 valuation to .016.

Total tax rates for the three entities for 1995 budgets are \$1,929 compared to \$1,968 for 1994 a decrease of .03968 overall.

During a report by Gerry Phillips, administrator of the hospital and care center, commissioners learned that there have been no workman's comp losses shown by the insurer as of June 30, 1994. Phillips was commended by the court for this outstanding record.

A change in the financing plan for county employees was discussed, but no action taken. The county's retirement plan, which is under the Texas County and District Retirement System, is not adequate for long-term according to a valuation by a consulting firm. The county has three options for change to the current financing arrangement.

The benefit formula can be changed. Keep the formula the same and increase the county's share of retirement funding from 8% to 9.2%,

or decrease the formula and have the county contribute 8.1% to the retirement plan. Employees contribute 7% to the retirement plan.

Commissioners had a two to two tie vote on approving the third option, which would reduce benefits by 15% on earnings after 1994. They will make a decision on plan changes after obtaining additional information.

As part of the retirement discussion, commissioners agreed to leave the vesting period for retirement at 12 years.

Larry Williams, John Williams and Martha Mayfield of Williams Enterprises appeared before the court to request that mineral rights under various lots and streets belonging to the county be put up for bid. Williams Enterprises addressed school trustees on the same subject earlier and was to be on the board's agenda Tuesday night. Commissioners tabled action on the request until their next meeting.

The court did approve a resolution presented by Larry Williams endorsing an effort to form a community-wide foundation. The foundation, with a board from all aspects of the community, would solicit money (grants, donations, etc.) in the name of the community. These funds would be put into the foundation, and the board would decide where the money would be spent.

Participation in a Rural Counties Insurance Control Project being proposed by Reagan County Judge Mike

Elkins, and Kathleen Miller, a loss control specialist from San Angelo could save the county as much as \$60,000 a year and provide more insurance, commissioners learned. They voted to become participants in this self-funded insurance pool.

The annual financial audit performed by an outside firm for the 1993 year was examined and approved, commissioners voted to hire Janet McDaniel as senior citizen coordinator and accepted a bid from Tom Allen for a sheriff's department car previously advertised.

Commissioners voted to go out for bids for stripping, sanding and refinishing wood on walls inside the courtroom and for painting of walls in the courtroom. They also approved sheriff and constable fees for 1995 to remain the same and okayed advertising for a parttime driver for the Thunderbird rural transportation van.

A resolution from the Ministerial Alliance supporting prayer in schools was approved and signed by the court members.

Monthly reports were heard from Garland Young for the civic and youth center, Bob Falkner for the fire department, Eddie Moore for the parks and road departments, Janet Hill McDaniel for Helping Hands and Louise Ledoux for the library.

Tommy Gibbs of Iraan met with the court to request reopening of a

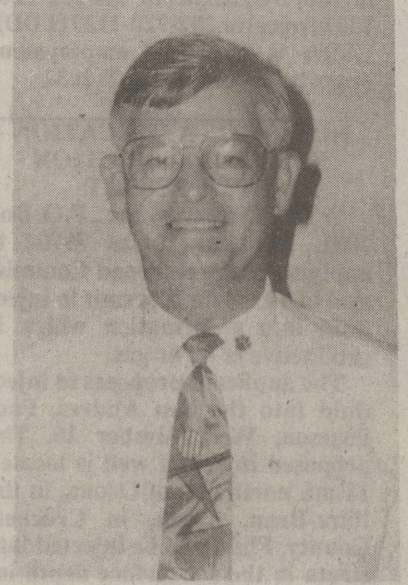

Workman's Comp Record Improves

At the hospital board meeting Sept. 6, members reviewed a financial report which showed cash deposits up for August. Figures also reflected the cost effectiveness of recent staff reductions. Workman's comp costs may further decrease at the end of a probationary period which ends in October. The hospital and care center have had no losses reported by the insurer as of June 30, an outstanding record for any facility, said administrator Gerry Phillips.

Enlargement of the care center by moving the double doors between the center and the hospital is still in the licensing stage. The next step in the project will be to go to the architects.

Phillips said Fred Baker has volunteered for the position of ombudsman for the care center. This unpaid position is that of a liaison between the facility and the state agency. The program is designed to help residents.

In a portion of his report based on recent staff requests, Phillips said the pager system for the emergency room is in but has not yet been installed. The narcotic drug box for the ER will be discussed at the pharmacy and therapeutic meeting on Sept. 14. He said that doctors are not in favor of expanding current orders on file at this time. He also reported that the Health Net video location in the nurses' station is working out better by being more accessible to the staff.

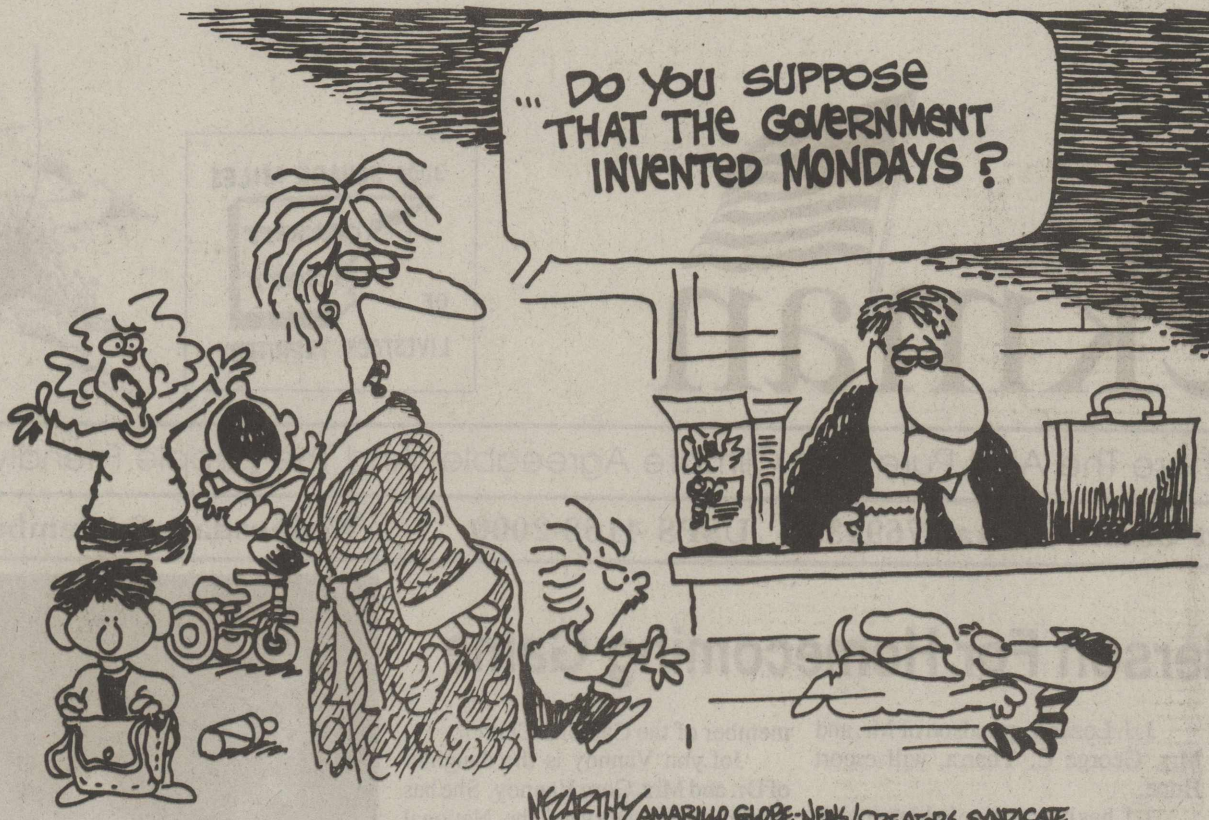

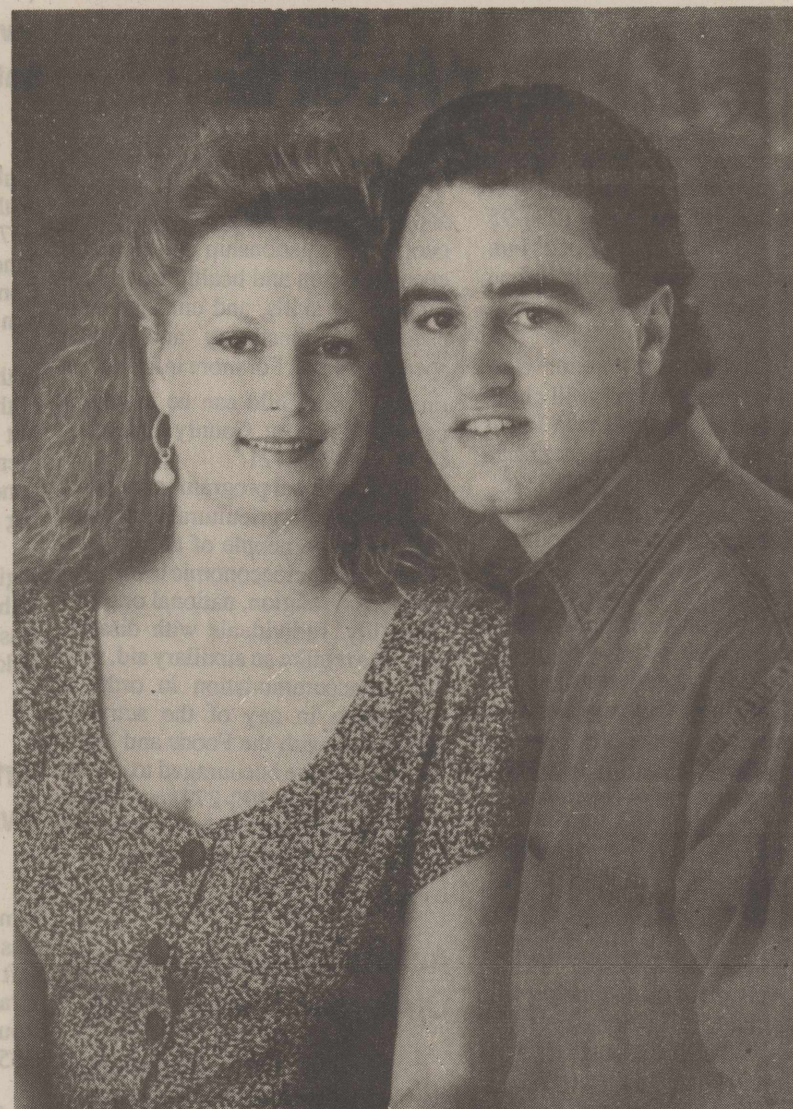

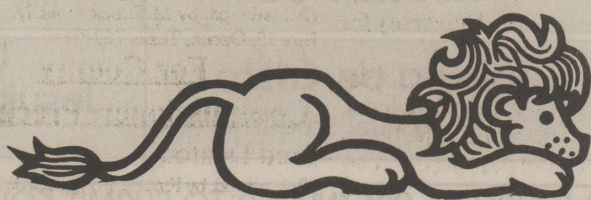

4-H Foods Project Kicks Off Saturday

Experiments with foods, fitness and lots more are in store for 4-H members and parents at the 1994-95 project kickoff workshop "Foods Fun '94" on Saturday, Sept. 17, at the Ozona United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

Activities start at 9 a.m. with registration, and members will check their fitness levels as they arrive. Foods for lunch are included in the \$2.50 registration fee.

During the day, members will learn some basics related to foods and nutrition, and parents can find out what the foods and nutrition project is all about, and how to help their child.

Members are asked to bring one can of food for donation to Helping Hands, and they will also assist in setting up and decorating for the Teacher Appreciation Dinner which will be held at the church on Sunday as part of their community service activities for the project. The workshop will conclude at approximately 1 p.m., following the completion of setup for the dinner.

Following the workshop, a series of lessons is planned, beginning with a "Pampered Chef" demonstration of Sept. 19, "What's the Beef" on Sept. 26, "Fitness First" on Oct. 10 and "Menu Planning/Preparing for the Food Show" Oct. 17 and 24. Members must complete a minimum of six lessons to participate in the food show, or complete a self-determined project approved by the County Extension Agent.

A group field trip to the Southern Living Cooking School in San Angelo is slated for Saturday, Oct. 22. There is a \$4 admission charge, and any who wants their tickets ordered in advance should turn in their money as soon as possible.

Parents, grandparents and other adults are welcome at all meetings, and urged to attend with their children. Children who receive support in their project and attend all the lessons generally get more out of the project.

The annual Crockett County 4-H Food Show will be held Saturday, Oct. 29, in the morning; contestants in seven categories and three age divisions will have the opportunity to advance to District competition in Fort Stockton on Dec. 3. Senior contestants will then have the chance to advance to State competition at Texas 4-H Roundup in June. The food show is an optional part of the 4-H Foods and Nutrition project.

Every 4-H member who has signed up for the foods project by completing and turning in an enrollment form has been sent an information letter about the meetings and requirements for the project. "Please read your letter - in bright pink - when you receive it, and call us if you have any questions," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent - Home Economics, who is in charge of the project, adding, "The list of meetings should be checked for the ones you plan to attend, signed, and returned by Thursday, Sept. 15, or you may turn it in at the workshop on Saturday."

"If you are not yet signed up for foods or have not re-enrolled, the deadline to do so is Saturday, Sept. 17, at the workshop. You can also call our

office to re-enroll," the agent noted.

The purposes of the 4-H Foods and Nutrition project are to teach young people the relationship between science, nutrition and health, teach life-time living skills, and enhance self-esteem, responsibility and public speaking skills. 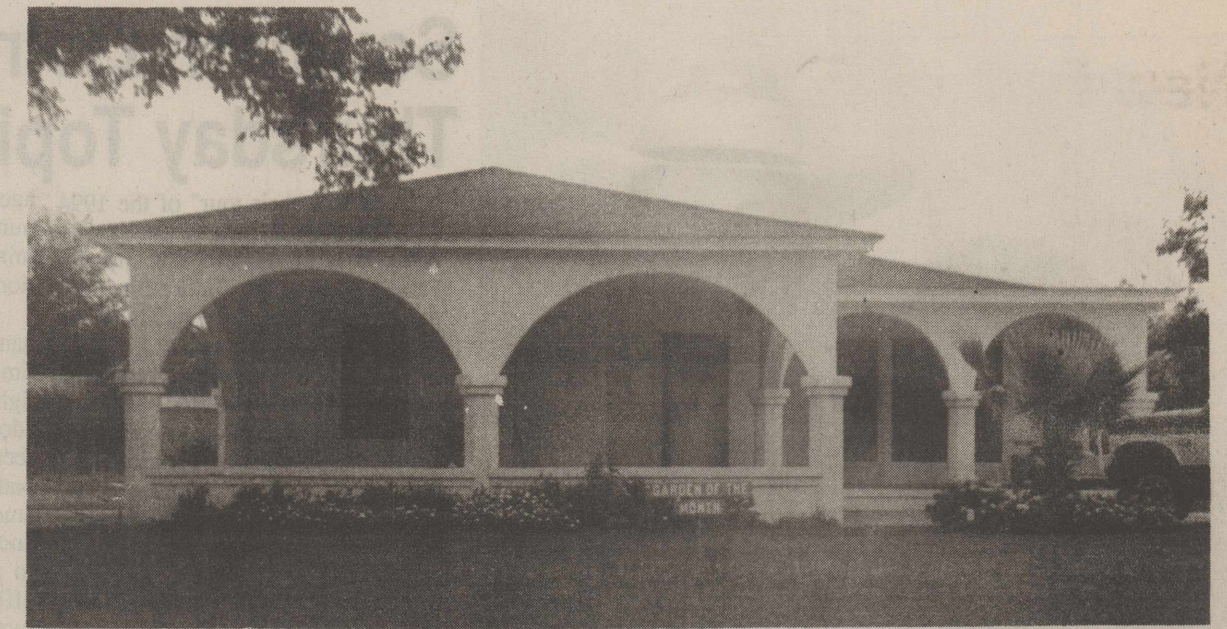

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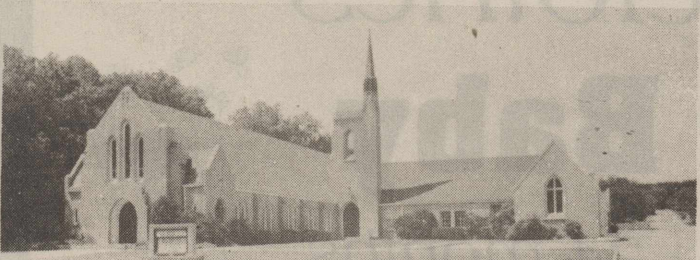

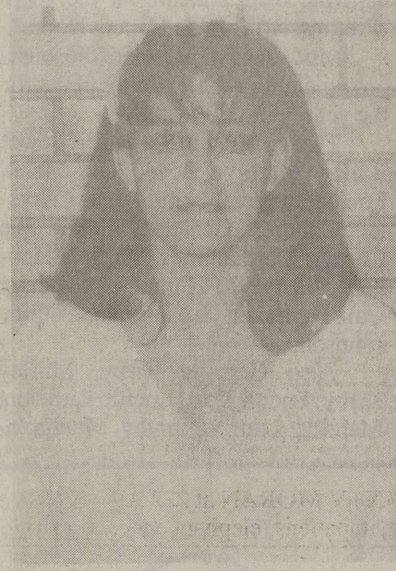
Carolyn Taylor

road in the western part of the county. Commissioners decided more information was needed before any action could be taken.

The flower bed at the South Pool was the topic brought before the court by Chris Borrego. Borrego had previously offered his services and that of a landscaper without charge to develop the area with low maintenance donated plants. \$2,500.00 was spent by the county for plants which are now overcrowding the plot. Borrego presented a petition from citizens asking that something be done about the appearance of the area and again offered his service at no charge. He was asked to get together with Eddie Moore and Commissioner Rudy Martinez to resolve the situation.

The court approved resolutions authorizing the submission of Texas Community Development Program

and Colonia applications to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs as requested by Doug Meador and Dee Keilers. After Keilers told the court he did not expect the water district to favor a proposed agreement to dispose of used oil filters in Big Lake, the court took no action on this agenda item.

Action on a letter from Roy Harrell regarding easement for an area adjacent to the former landfill was tabled until the next meeting.

No action was taken on clarifying rules and regulations for buying and selling of cemetery plots. Judge A. O. Fields appointed Ronald Shaw and Burl Myers to look into removal of asbestos from the courthouse annex. Commissioners agreed that angle parking would relieve some of the parking problems at the courthouse.

Ozona Community Center Needs Donations

The Ozona Community Center has comprised a pre-Christmas wish list of equipment, clothing, and volunteer help that would help it better serve the community.

Donations are needed because the fees charged and collected by the center for its day care service cover only the insurance and staff salaries and utilities. "This is a non-profit organization," explained community center director Kay Baker. "The major source of our funding, the United Methodist Church, has been 'greatly reduced this year'. The center is 'not government funded in any way'."

Items needed by the center include: clothing sizes 2-8 (shorts, T-shirts and underwear - boys and girls); riding toys for playground - tricycles, Big Wheels, etc.; treehouse, swings, basketball goals and poles, poles for volleyball and tether ball, tumble mats for toddler class, playhouse, baby swings for small playground, media equipment, dish rags and towels, storage building approximately 8.5 feet by 9.8 feet, computer monitor (VGA brand), two drawer locking filing cabinet, lawn mower, sandbox, toddler toys for ages 18 months to three years, and a truck load of gravel for playground equipment.

Volunteers are also needed to

serve as playground supervisors and fund raisers. "We also need an electrician to check the electrical fuse boxes at the center. This is not a major problem, but the building was erected in 1939, and things are getting old," said Mrs. Baker. The evaporative coolers need to be cleaned and fixed, and a sprinkler system needs to be installed. Jana Lilly Wilson, a community center board member, donated the sprinkler system. Other Ozona citizens have donated two hot water heaters and a dishwasher. "We would not have these items otherwise."

Any persons wishing to donate his time to repair or install equipment should contact Neal Ulmer, chairman of the grounds committee, at 392-5443 or call the center at 392-2710.

The staffing of the center, save for the position of cook, has been completed. Those working at the center include Del Vinton, Vickie Cornett, who teaches the 18-30 month-olds, and teachers' aide Belia Garza.

The community center also accepts memorials. "Individuals need to either bring the memorial to the center or mail it to P. O. Box 41, Ozona, TX 76943. They need to specify who the gift is in memory of, and how they want their donation used," Mrs. Baker said.

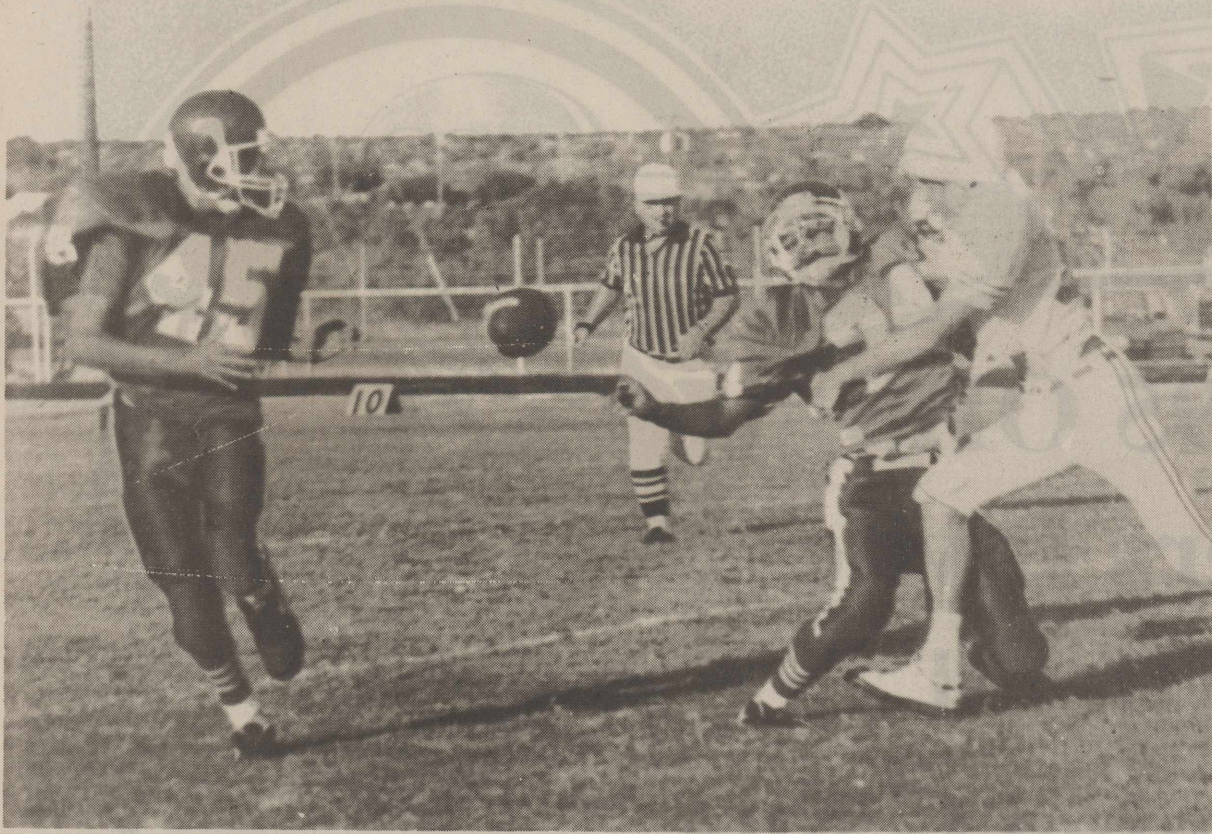
