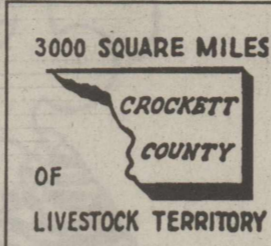

## TEA Scores Ozona Schools Accredited-Acceptable

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, Sept. 13, approved nominations to serve on the district's programs and facilities committee for this school year. During the meeting each board member submitted a list of five individuals from four main groups (parents, business people, community leaders, and retired individuals) who will be asked to serve on the new committee.

The programs and facilities committee will be given the responsibility to look at all of the district's programs and facilities and to develop a report to be presented to the school board in April or May of 1995 of non-binding recommendations on what the district needs to do between 1994-2000 to prepare for the 21st Century. The committee will examine the district's accountability data, tour all school facilities, seek input from students as well as all parents in the district, and help in the revision of the local site-based decision making plan.

Joining the approximately 35 community members will be student representatives from the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh grades, two teachers from each campus, and two board members. Superintendent Larry Taylor and Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton will serve as committee facilitators.

Larry Williams and Martha Mayfield appeared before the school board to request that mineral rights on approximately 9.5 acres of land located at Ozona Primary School be put up for lease bids. Following trustee discussion concerning the request, the board voted to approve the taking of lease bids for the mineral rights subject to discussion with an attorney regarding the lease forms and terms. Supt. Taylor, Wade Richardson and David Bean were granted the authority on behalf of the school district to consult with the attorney on the lease forms, terms, and procedures. The attorney fees will be paid by the leasee.

The board members also approved a resolution presented by Williams endorsing an effort to form a community-wide foundation. The foundation, with a board from all aspects of the community, would solicit money via grants, donations, etc. in the name of the community. These funds would be put into the foundation, and the board would decide where the money would be spent. A resolution in support of

prayer in schools presented by the Ozona Ministerial Alliance was also approved.

The trustees approved the assistant superintendent, high school principal, middle school principal, intermediate school principal and primary school principal as their designees to hear student discipline matters in reference to suspension, placement in an alternative education program, or expulsion. "By using designees we can hold a hearing more timely without having to have called board meetings just to handle discipline cases," Supt. Taylor explained. "The parents or legal guardians may appeal the hearing officer's decision to the school board. By approving the above designees, an administrator from one campus will be a hearing officer for any one of the other campuses."

The school board also approved an appraisal calendar for Supt. Taylor as well as the board's own self-appraisal. Trustees will evaluate Mr. Taylor's performance during the November regular meeting and their own performance during the December regular meeting. The date of the October regular meeting was approved to be held on Oct. 11 at 7 p.m.

During the superintendent's reports section of the meeting, Supt. Taylor reported that the school district had received an "accredited" rating from the Texas Education Agency, and all four school campuses had received an "accredited-acceptable" rating from T.E.A. Ozona High School was recognized for the high percentage of its students taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and/or the American College Test (ACT).

A comparison of Ozona and Texas results on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) that was given during the 1993-94 school year was also studied by the board. In TAAS reading, student mastery results were (state results are in parenthesis): 3rd grade, 75% (77%); 4th grade, 55% (75%); 5th grade, 63% (77%); sixth grade, 69% (73%); 7th grade 77% (75%); 8th grade, 82% (76%); and 10th grade, 77% (76%).

In TAAS math, mastery scores were: 3rd grade, 63% (62%); 4th grade, 54% (59%); 5th grade, 38% (62%); 6th grade, 52% (60%); 7th grade, 72% (59%); 8th grade, 64% (57%); and 10th grade, 54% (57%).

In TAAS writing, results were: 4th grade, 86% (85%); 8th grade, 87% (69%) and 10th grade, 86% (81%).

## Emergency Feed Program Sign-up Underway

Producers who have suffered at least a 40% loss in pasture grazing and are feeding livestock may make an application for the Emergency Feed Program. The feed period will start the day the producer signs up and end 90 days after that. For more information,

## Boys Win Odessa Cross Country Meet

The Ozona High School boys' cross country team brought home the championship trophy from the Ector County Independent School District's cross country meet held in Odessa Sept. 10. The team was led by sophomore Charles Villarreal's first place finish.

"Charles' winning the three mile race and the team's effort for each one to finish in the top 20 were the reasons the team won the championship," said Coach Pete Maldonado. "The top five boys did an outstanding job by finishing in the top 20."

Seniors Bryan Valdez, René Tambunga, junior Johnny Porras, sophomores Pete Castaneda and Cody Porras are returning lettermen from a team that placed third at regionals last year and 10th at the state meet. The boys' team's goal is to make it back to the state cross country meet for the 1994 season.

Ozona boys won the Odessa meet by beating Plains who was the state champion in Class A last year. The team score was the same for the top five runners, but Ozona won due to their sixth team member placing higher than Plains' sixth team runner.

Results were: Ozona 39, Plains 39, McCamey 93, Central JV 99, Andrews JV 99, Stanton 150 and Brownfield 167.

Individual placings for Ozona were: 1 Charles Villarreal, 5 Cody Porras, 13 Pete Castaneda 17 Bryan Valdez, 19 Johnny Porras, 21 René Tambunga, 25 Gabriel Tambunga, 32 Steven Perez, 67 Blas Villa, 70 Paul Perner, 77 John Baker and 78 Julio Martinez. There were 90 runners in this division.

Ozona girls placed sixth in the meet with 198 points. Stanton A was first with 55 followed by Sundown 69, Lakeview 87, Garden City A 88 and Plains 150.

Division II girls' two-mile results for Ozona were: 29 Heather Hall, 31 Amy Laughlin, 40 Mel Lozano, 47 Felicia Ramirez, 51 Patti Dominguez, 54 Maria Trujillo, 55 Dana Bishop, 105 Adriana Lozano, 112 Michelle Marshall, 118 Sandy Perez, 1199

Dharti Patel and 122 Ami DeHoyos. There were 128 entries.

Cross country is the fall sport for the track and field athlete and is mainly concentrated for distance runners. The boys run 3.1 miles or 5 kilometers. The girls run a distance of two miles or 3200 meters. The team is made up of seven runners and the top five places count towards the final score. The team with the lesser score wins the meet.

"Ozona has had a great tradition of distance runners and will continue to add to the list of great athletes," said Maldonado. "This group of boys will try to best the effort of the 1989 team, the one that finished third at the state meet."

The Ozona teams participated in the San Angelo cross country meet Sept. 17. Their schedule includes Irion County on Sept. 24 and Big Spring Oct. 1. They will host their own meet on Oct. 8. The schedule continues with Water Valley Oct. 15 and district later in the month in San Angelo. Nov. 5 is the regional date in Lubbock and the state meet in Georgetown is Nov. 11-12.

The junior high cross country schedule includes Irion County Sept. 24, Ozona Oct. 8, Water Valley Oct. 15 and district in Iraan Oct. 29.

Interested individuals in the community who like to train with the high school boys' or girls' teams are welcomed to the morning runs of 50 minutes beginning at 6 a.m. at the field house. Afternoon workouts are at 2:30 p.m.

## Lions Pluck Eagles In Homecoming Romp 56-20

Homecoming is so sweet—especially when you win the game. The Ozona Lions were extremely happy after their 56-20 victory over the District 7-1A Sanderson Eagles in last Friday's homecoming game in Lion Stadium. With Ozona's first victory for the season, their record stands at 1-1-1.

Head Coach Don Payne said, "Overall, I was real proud of our kids. I thought we put together a good four quarters this time. The kids played together real well."

Offensively, the Lions had a total of 397 yards, of which 272 were rushing yardage. However, the team had more difficulty with their passing game, coming up with five completions for 125 yards.

Anthony Sanchez scored two touchdowns and ran almost at will through the Eagles' line with 122 yards and 12 carries. Quarterback Chris Sanchez also scored two touchdowns threw two touchdown passes and had 85 yards on eight carries.

"Offensively, I thought our line-men did an outstanding job. That was one area we were really looking to improve in. Our running game looked good—Anthony ran the ball hard," said the coach. Payne noted the addition of ten junior varsity players who played in the game. He said, "I was proud of our young kids we moved up this week. They got to play a lot."

Junior varsity players moving up to play in the Sanderson game included Jon Sanchez, Pete Castaneda, Jason Stuart, Shayne Fuentes, Stephen Montes, Manuel Mendoza, Albert Flores, Lando Pena-Alfaro, Cody Porras, and Sam Fuentes.

Neither Ozona nor Sanderson were able to move the ball in the opening minutes of the game. On their second possession, Ozona received the ball on their own 28-yard line. After three running plays with 7:35 left in the first quarter, quarterback Chris Sanchez threw a 62-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Jesse Garza. Garza, holding the ball for the point-after kick, ran the ball across the goal line for a two-point conversion.

The Lions' defense next forced an Eagle fumble on their own 23-yard line. Twenty-seven seconds later on the next play, Chris Sanchez scrambled for a 23-yard touchdown run. Kicker Bryan Mendez kicked the extra point for a Lion lead of 15-0.

It took just over two minutes for the Lions to score again. The Lion defense once again held the Eagles and Ozona started the drive on their own 41-yard line. Anthony Sanchez had a 17-yard run, then after an incomplete pass and an Eagle penalty he scored on a 32-yard run. Mendez kicked the extra point and the Lions led at the end of the first quarter 22-0.

With 10:47 in the second period the Eagles got on the scoreboard. A 30-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Wes Billings to running back Calvin Hutto put the Eagles in the game. A run for the two-point conversion was stopped by the Lions as they continued their lead 22-6.

Both teams exchanged possession of the ball before the Lions had an

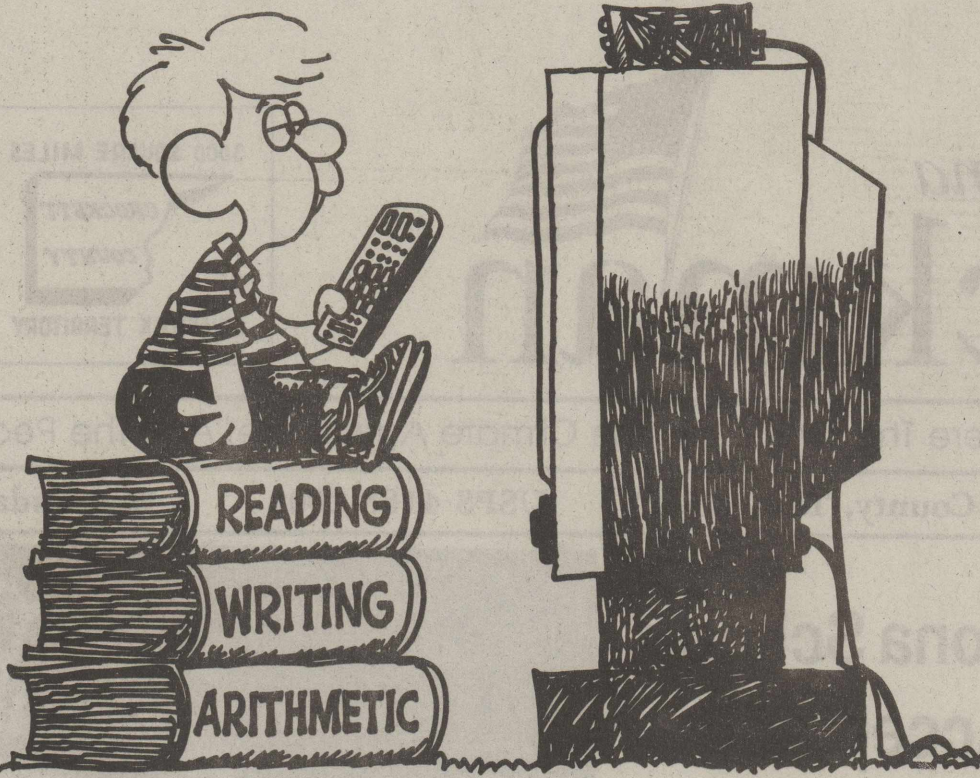

### Petition Works To Make Streets Safe

Americans are dying because convicted, violent criminals are serving a fraction of their sentences.

Government statistics show that although violent offenders received an average sentence of seven years and 11 months imprisonment, they actually served an average of only two years and 11 months in prison - only 37% of their adjudicated sentence.

The result: despite rising arrest rates, 3.2 million convicted felons are out on parole or probation, rather than in prison serving their sentence. Statistics show that within three years of being released, 60% of violent offenders were rearrested. At this moment, for every violent criminal in prison, there are six on parole or probation, free to roam the streets. Statistics from the Bureau of Justice National Corrections Reporting Program, 1988, show that the median sentence for murder was 15 years with a median time of 5.5 years served. Median statistics for rape were eight years sentenced and three years served; robbery, six years sentenced, 2.25 years served; and assault, four years sentenced and 1.25 years served.

### Stocking Rate Key To Good Leases

Leased rangeland grazing is important to many Texas producers and landowners. Important aspects of a written lease that is fair to both parties and provides long-term maintenance and improvement of land resources will be discussed by Dr. Robert E. Whitson from Texas A&M University. According to Dr. Whitson, the most important component is an economic incentive for a tenant to adjust stocking rates up or down on forage conditions. Both parties should agree on the procedures to increase or decrease the annual stocking rates. Dr. Whitson and other speakers, including a rancher panel, will address this topic and others related to manag-

### 4-H Shooting Sports Begin

### Banned Books Week

Winner of the 1991 Pulitzer Prize for fiction, *A Thousand Acres*, was banned at the Lynden, Washington, high school because "It has no literary value". The award-winning author Jane Smiley is in good company. In 1993-94, she joins authors such as Katherine Paterson, Mark Twain, Toni Morrison and Laura Ingalls Wilder, whose works were banned or challenged in the last year. Paterson's book, *Bridge To Terabithia*, which won the Newbery award and is on the Accelerated Reader List, was challenged for its alleged profane language. *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* has also been banned for language offensive to African-Americans, as was Morrison's *Song of Solomon*. *Little House of the Prairie* was banned in Sturgis, SD, due to statements considered derogatory to Native Americans. Even the seemingly harmless and popular children's book, *Where's Waldo?* was banned in East Hampton, NY, because part of a tiny drawing looks like a woman lying on the beach wearing a bikini bottom but no top.

Books like these, challenged or banned on similar grounds during the past year, will be displayed at the Crockett County Public Library during Banned Books Week - Celebrat-

ing the Freedom to Read Sept. 24-Oct. 1, 1994. Most of these books are well-known but are considered dangerous or objectionable by individuals or groups who would deny others access to them.

CCPL is participating in Banned Books Week which is sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Booksellers' Association, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores. It is endorsed by the Center for the Book of the Library of Congress. The sponsoring organizations believe that most would-be book banners act with what they consider to be the highest motives - protecting themselves, their families and communities from perceived injustices and evils and preserving the values and ideals they would have the entire society embrace. The result, however, is always and ever the denial of another's right to read. CCPL believes that Americans support our basic right to read guaranteed in the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

CCPL encourages everyone to come view our display. Check out a "Banned Book" and you'll be surprised what some people do not want you to read.

### Williams Participates In Silver-Haired Legislature

The 116 members of the Fifth Texas Silver-Haired Legislature met in general session in Austin on Sept. 12 through Sept. 16 in the newly constructed Capitol Annex of the State Capitol. Resolutions were submitted, debated and given priority for presentation to the 74th State Legislature for their consideration when it convenes next year.

The TSHL is made up of members elected from 28 areas for two year terms by registered voters who are 60 years old or older.

The assembled members heard addresses by the Attorney General Dan Morales; Scotty Bailey, County Judge, Eastland County; the Honorable Laton Black, Chairman, House Administration; State Senator Jane Nelson; Health and Human Services Commissioner Dick Ladd; the Honorable Robert Junell, Chairman Appropriations Committee, House of Representatives; State Representative Mike Moncreif and the Honorable Tom Uher, Speaker Pro Tempore.

TSHL members adopted 36 resolutions. Of these, 15 were given spe-

cial consideration. Those receiving highest priority were:

1. To preserve the present Texas Homestead act.
  2. To expand options for independent living.
  3. To support "Zero Tolerance" discipline policy in schools.
  4. Increase State funding for Texas Department on Aging.
  5. Increase penalties for fraud against the elderly.

## Youngsters Learn About Mexican Independence

The United States celebrates its Independence Day on July 4. Mexico has two "Independence Days". Sept. 16 is a special holiday because it marks a vital decision by the Mexican people to be free from the European nations. May 5, Cinco de Mayo, signifies the day that the tiny Mexican army defeated the French at the battle of Puebla. Even though Sept. 16 is considered Mexican Independence Day, both holidays are of great importance to the Mexican people.

After the explorers of Europe discovered North America, the Indians of Mexico were treated as slaves and their once rich cities and towns devastated. Enormous shipments of Mexico's gold and silver were taken across the Atlantic Ocean. The country of Spain claimed that Mexico belonged to them.

During the late 18th century, Spain attempted to establish their own rulers in Mexico. The Spaniards called their new colony "New Spain".

Finally, on Sept. 16, 1810, an Indian priest named Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla spoke out against the Spanish

government. He demanded that the Mexican Indians be given their rights and the freedom to govern themselves.

It was not until May 5, 1962, that the small Mexican army defeated the French army at the village of Puebla and began establishing the soon to be Mexican government.

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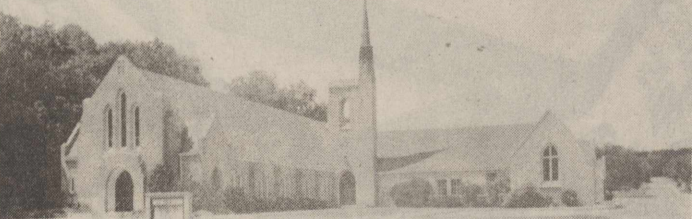

other chance to score. Starting on the Eagle 47-yard line Anthony Sanchez ran for 7 yards, then scored on a 39-yard run. The extra point was good and the Lions increased their lead to 29-6.

Sanderson missed a scoring opportunity when a 20-yard pass play was called back on a penalty. On a fourth-and-fourteen play Travis Davidson sacked the Eagle quarterback for a 9-yard loss. This increased the Lions' momentum to an even higher level, as they started their next drive on their own 35-yard line.

Following several running plays by Anthony and Chris Sanchez, a 25-yard pass from Chris Sanchez to brother Jon Sanchez increased the Lion lead with nine seconds left in the first half. A two-point conversion run by Jesse Garza was good and the Lions went into the locker room at half-time with the score Ozona 37, Sanderson 6.

The Lions had a bit of bad luck after receiving the ball on the 30-yard line at the kickoff. Chris Sanchez quickly picked up 26 yards, but on the next play Efrain Gallegos of the Eagles intercepted a Sanchez pass and returned it to the Ozona 12-yard line. Ozona received two penalties which placed the ball on the 3 yard line, and Sanderson's Orion Patterson plunged in from the three to score. A try for the two-point conversion failed and the score stood Ozona 37, Sanderson 12 with 11:16 in the third quarter.

In regard to the Lions making mistakes Payne said, "We're trying to get our timing down. In a few weeks, we will hopefully have our wrinkles ironed out."

In the next set of plays the Lions could not move the ball and were forced to punt. The Lions forced a fumble and recovered the ball on the Eagles' 33-yard line. Anthony Sanchez picked up 8 yards and Chris Sanchez scrambled for a 25-yard touchdown run. Mendez kicked the extra point and the Lions led 44-12.

A pass interception by Anthony Sanchez put the ball on the Eagle 46-yard line, and David Browne entered the game as quarterback. Several run-

ning plays by Sanchez and Browne took the ball to the Eagle 30-yard line. A 29-yard pass from Browne to Jon Sanchez put the ball on the Eagle 1-yard line, and Browne took it in for the score. A pass for the two-point conversion failed and the Lions led 50-12 with 4:24 left in the third quarter.

Coach Payne started substituting junior varsity players in the third quarter on both offense and defense. In the fourth quarter Shayne Fuentes picked up some yardage but a Browne pass was intercepted on the Lion 41-yard line. The Eagles' Patterson ran for a 41-yard touchdown and with a two-point pass conversion the score was Ozona 50, Sanderson 20.

Good running by Fuentes and Browne and a 5-yard pass from Pete Castaneda to Cody Porras helped take the ball from the Eagle 42-yard line to the 9-yard line. Fuentes scored from the nine and a kick for the extra point was blocked, giving the Lions their last score of the game at 56-20.

The Lions' defense did their job by holding the Eagles to 10 first downs, 197 total yards, forcing three fumbles and recovering two of those. Payne commented, "Defensively, we also had a good game. It was a great team effort and everybody did a solid job."

Looking ahead to the Coahoma Bulldogs Payne said, "They've got some talent and they'll be 'high as a kite' with a 3-0 record and wanting to go 4-0." According to Payne, Coahoma's main threat is quarterback Brandon McGuire, who can throw the ball well and is good on the option. Coahoma will be running a wishbone offense and the option will have to be stopped for the Lions to succeed.

Coach Payne would like to thank the fans for their great attendance all three weeks and hopes to see them again in Coahoma. The game will be played on Friday, Sept. 23 at 8 p.m. The Ozona Junior Varsity will be playing on Thursday, Sept. 22 starting at 6 p.m. in Lion Stadium.

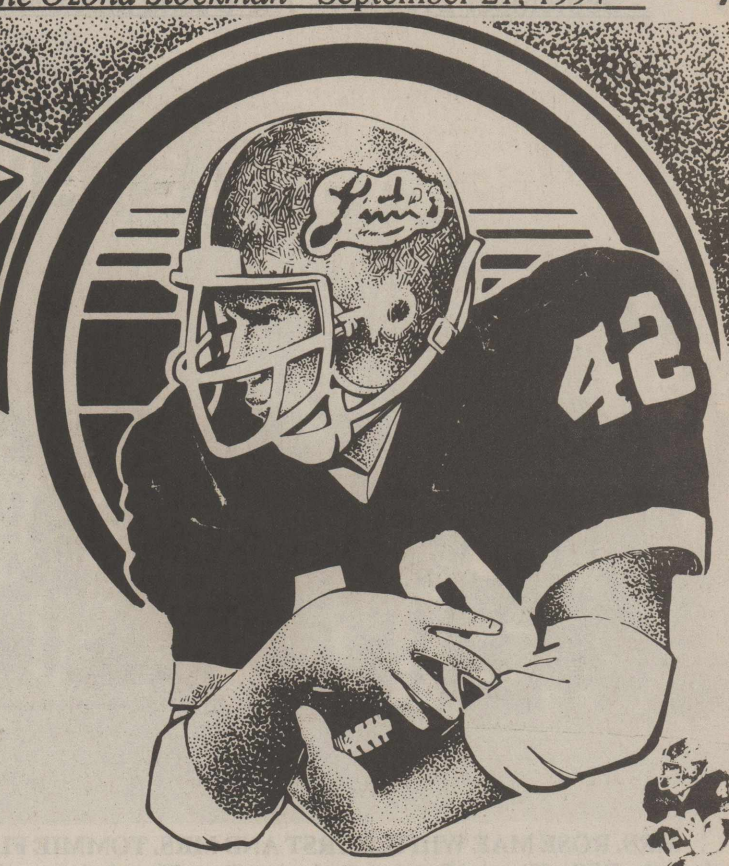
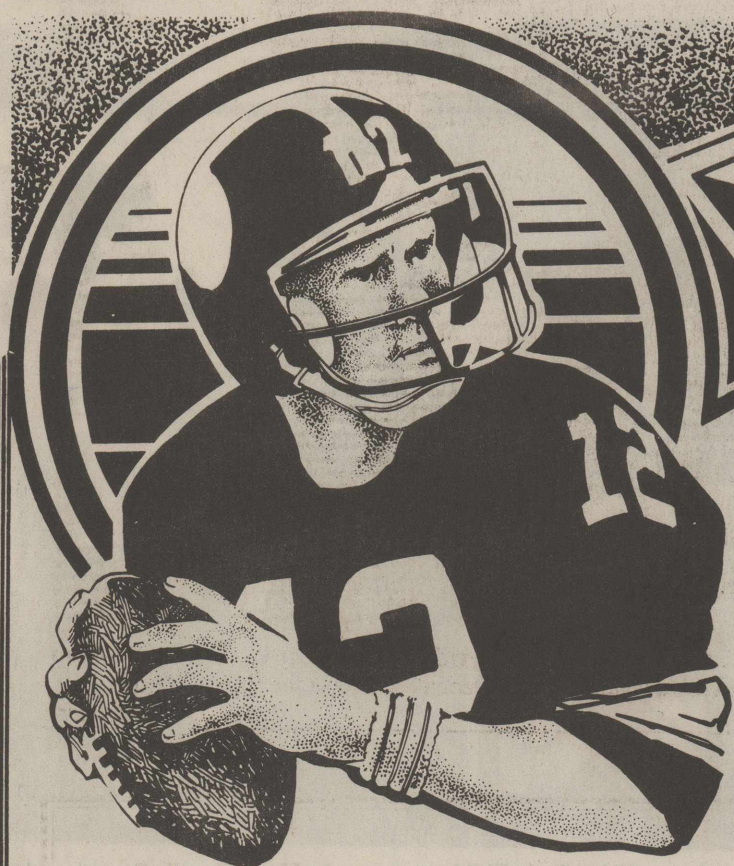

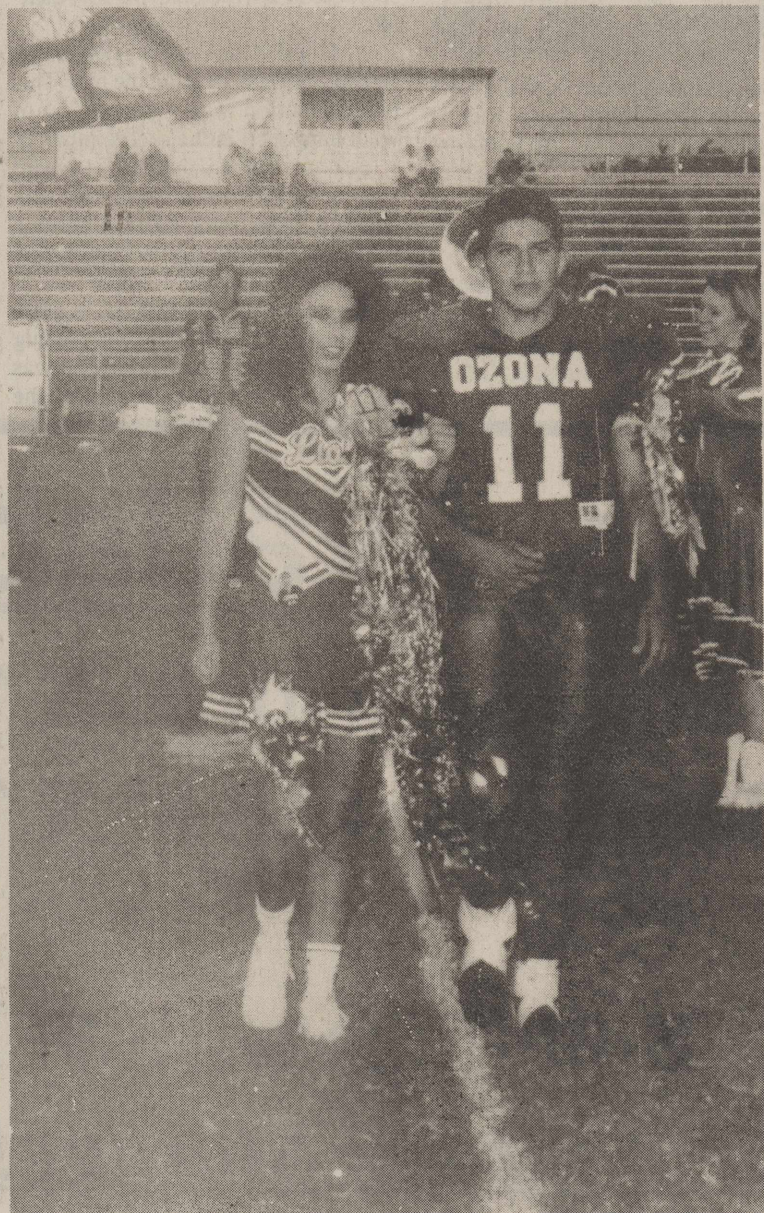

A fighting Ozona JV team played at a higher level but fell to the Sonora JV 24-14 in the Sept. 8 game in Lion Stadium. Penalties and fumbles plagued both teams but each fought back despite those handicaps.

Sonora, receiving the ball on the 36-yard line, scored two plays later on a 62-yard touchdown run. An attempted running play for the extra points failed.

Ozona had a difficult time in moving the ball so, with the Lions facing a fourth-and-six Pete Castaneda was forced to punt. The center hiked the

ball over Castaneda's head but he retrieved the ball and made it to the 23-yard line. Sonora took the ball over and scored on an 8-yard run two plays later. Again the extra point attempt failed and the Broncos increased their lead to 18.

The two teams again could not move the ball but late in the third period the Lions started with good field position on the 50-yard line. Shayne Fuentes and Pete Castaneda teamed up to get the ball into scoring position. Castaneda scored from 10-yards out with just eight seconds left in the third quarter. The team set up for an extra point kick but elected to fake and Brian Badillo ran in for the two-point conversion. Ozona increased their score but Sonora still led 18-14.

Ozona was not able to hold the Broncos and they got in one last touchdown with 1:52 left in the game. Sonora's score came on a 46-yard run. The extra point try was no good and despite Ozona's desperate try to score, the ball game ended with Sonora winning 24-14.

Coach Keith Hall said, "Overall, we played fairly well and never gave up. That would have been a good win for us if we would have won! We need to win those types of games."

Several players having a good offensive game include Pete Castaneda, Gary Dominquez, and Brian Badillo.

Defensively, the linemen will need come through as a group to have a solid defensive line. Doing a good job on defense were Albert Flores, Jon Sanchez, and Pete Castaneda. Raymond Longoria had a good game kicking the ball.

Their next game will be Thursday, Sept. 22, against Coahoma in Ozona starting at 6 p.m.
