


# **TEA Scores Ozona Schools** Accreditated-Acceptable

Tuesday, Sept. 13, approved nominations to serve on the district's programs and facilities committee for this school year. During the meeting each board member submitted a list of five individuals from four main groups (parents, business people, community leaders, and retired individuals) who will be asked to serve on the new

The programs and facilities committee will be given the responsibility to look at all of the district's programs and facilities and to develop a report to be presented to the school board in April or May of 1995 of non-binding recommendations on what the district needs to do between 1994-2000 to prepare for the 21st Century. The committee will examine the district's accountability data, tour all school facilities, seek input from students as well as all parents in the district, and help in the revision of the local sitebased decision making plan.

Joining the approximately 35 community members will be student representatives from the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh grades, two teachers from each campus, and two board members. Superintendent Larry Taylor and Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton will serve as committee facilitators.

board voted to approve the taking of lease bids for the mineral rights subject to discussion with an attorney regarding the lease forms and terms. Supt. Taylor, Wade Richardson and David Bean were granted the authority on behalf of the school district to consult with the attorney on the lease forms, terms, and procedures. The attorney fees will be paid by the leasee.

The board members also approved a resolution presented by Williams endorsing an effort to form a community-wide foundation. The foundation, with a board from all aspects of the community, would solicit money via grants, donations, etc. in the name of the community. These funds would be put into the foundation, and the board be spent. A resolution in support of

The trustees approved the assistant superintendent, high school principal, middle school principal, intermediate school principal and primary school principal as their designees to hear student discipline matters in reference to suspension, placement in an alternative education program, or expulsion. "By using designees we can hold a hearing more timely without having to have called board meetings just to handle discipline cases," Supt. Taylor explained. "The parents or legal guardians may appeal the hearing officer's decision to the school board. By approving the above designees, an administrator from one campus will be a hearing officer for any one of the other campuses."

The school board also approved an appraisal calendar for Supt. Taylor as well as the board's own self-appraisal. Trustees will evaluate Mr. Taylor's performance during the November regular meeting and their own performance during the December regular meeting. The date of the October regular meeting was approved to be held on Oct. 11 at 7 p.m.

### Lions Pluck Eagles In Homecoming Romp 56-20

Homecoming is so sweet--especially when you win the game. The Ozona Lions were extremely happy after their 56-20 victory over the District 7-1A Sanderson Eagles in last Friday's homecoming game in Lion Stadium. With Ozona's first victory for the season, their record stands at 1-1-

Head Coach Don Payne said, "Overall, I was real proud of our kids. I thought we put together a good four quarters this time. The kids played together real well. '

Offensively, the Lions had a total of 397 yards, of which 272 were rushing yardage. However, the team had more difficulty with their passing game, coming up with five completions for 125 yards.

Anthony Sanchez scored two touchdowns and ran almost at will through the Eagles' line with 122 yards and 12 carries. Quarterback Chris Sanchez also scored two touchdowns threw two touchdown passes and had 85 yards on eight carries

"Offensively, I thought our linemen did an outstanding job. That was one area we were really looking to improve in. Our running game looked good--Anthony ran the ball hard," said the coach. Payne noted the addition of ten junior varsity players who played in the game. He said, "I was proud of our young kids we moved up this week. They got to play a lot."

Junior varsity players moving up to play in the Sanderson game included Jon Sanchez, Pete Castaneda, Jason Stuart, Shayne Fuentes, Stephen Montes, Manuel Mendoza, Albert Flores, Lando Pena-Alfaro, Cody Porras, and Sam Fuentes.

Neither Ozona nor Sanderson were able to move the ball in the opening minutes of the game. On their second possession, Ozona received the ball on their own 28-yard line. After three running plays with 7:35 left in the first quarter, quarterback Chris Sanchez threw a 62-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Jesse Garza. Garza, holding the ball for the pointafter kick, ran the ball across the goal line for a two-point conversion.

The Lions' defense next forced an Eagle fumble on their own 23-yard line. Twenty-seven seconds later on the next play, Chris Sanchez scrambled for a 23-yard touchdown run. Kicker Bryan Mendez kicked the extra point for a Lion .lead of 15-0.

It took just over two minutes for the Lions to score again. The Lion defense once again held the Eagles and Ozona started the drive on their own 41-yard line. Anthony Sanchez had a 17-yard run, then after an incomplete pass and an Eagle penalty he scored on a 32-yard run. Mendez kicked the extra point and the Lions led at the end of the first quarter 22-0.

With 10:47 in the second period the Eagles got on the scoreboard. A 30-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Wes Billings to running back Calvin Hutto put the Eagles in the game. A run for the two-point converson was stopped by the Lions as they continued their lead 22-6.




### Williams Participates In Silver-Haired Legislature

The 116 members of the Fifth Texas Silver-Haired Legislature met in general session in Austin on Sept. 12 through Sept. 16 in the newly constructed Capitol Annex of the State Capitol. Resolutions were submitted, debated and given priority for presentation to the 74th State Legislature for their consideration when it convenes next year.

The TSHL is made up of members elected from 28 areas for two year terms by registered voters who are 60 years old or older.

TSHL members adopted 36 resolutions. Of these, 15 were given spe-


Jeff was an active parent during these "child rearing" years. He served as a leader with his kids in activities such as Cub Scouts, Little League and 4-H.
