## Outstanding 4-H'ers Saluted At Banquet

Crockett County 4-H saluted 4-H members, parents and leaders at this year's festive salute to 4-H, "Hang Your Dreams on a Star." The 1994 Awards Banquet was held Monday evening at the Crockett County Civic Center.

Jolynn Vannoy, daughter of Dr. Gary and Nancy Vannoy, was recognized for her many accomplishments with the county's top honors, the Mother Davidson Trophy and the Dan Bean Memorial Scholarship.

The Dan Bean Scholarship is presented annually by the Bean family to the 4-H member with the most outstanding agricultural projects. The Mother Davidson trophy has been presented annually since 1951 to the outstanding 4-H member in the county each year. The Dan Bean Scholarship was presented this year by David Bean; the Mother Davidson trophy was presented by Wade Richardson.

Vannoy, who served on the Texas 4-H Council this past year and is currently County Council President and Secretary of the District 4-H Council, won first place at state competition in 1994 with her Home Economics Achievement record book. She has advanced twice to the state 4-H Fashion Show, winning second in the Cotton category in 1993. She has had high placing lambs and angora goats at major, area and county shows, and has also won the District and County food shows numerous times.

A member of the 1994 wool judging team which advanced to state competition, she has also presented method demonstrations and been active in recreation, public speaking and other activities.

This year, three Gold Star recipients were awarded the highest recognition given statewide in 4-H. They were Justin Moran, Casey Upham and Tara Wilkins. The awards were presented by George Bunger, 1956 Gold Star and Mother Davidson award recipient.

Moran, the son of Joe and Tina Moran, currently serves as District Delegate-At-Large to the State 4-H Council. His main projects have been in shooting sports and the Field and Stream program, where he has served for several years as a teen leader, sharing his knowledge with a number of younger 4-H members. Justin has also participated in foods and clothing and attended the Texas 4-H Ambassador Workshop, as well as numerous Hunter Safety Education courses. He has just returned from being honored at the State Fair of Texas Youth Honor Banquet for state officers in 4-H, FFA and FHA.

Upham, the son of Randy and Elizabeth Upham, is District VI Parliamentarian and serves as First Vice President of the Crockett County 4-H Council. He has been active with beef cattle, sheep and meat goat projects, and has also participated in the foods and nutrition project. Casey's beef record book won fifth place at state this past year, and he was a member

of the 1994 state-qualifying wool judging team, as well as a past state-winning Range Judging team. He has attended Texas 4-H Congress and numerous leadership workshops at the

district level. Wilkins, the daughter of Steve and Belinda Wilkins, has been active with sheep and beef cattle as well as the foods project. She exhibited the

### Soil And Water Conservation District Election Set

An election for directors in Zones 1 and 2 on the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 11, at the S.C.S. office located at 401 First Street, announced Earl Acton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 5:30 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he or she represents, be 18 years of age and must be actively engaged in farming and ranching. He or she must also live

in the county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 1 of the district includes lands in Crockett County north of U.S. Hwy. 290 and west of Hwy. 163. Zone 2 includes all lands in Crockett County east of State Hwy. 163 and north of U.S. Hwy. 290.

Current members of the board of directors of the Crockett SWCD are: Earl Acton, chairman, Zone 4; Larry Williams, vice-chairman, Zone 1; Pleas Childress III, secretary, Zone 2; Paul Perner III, member, Zone 5; and Steve Wilkins, member, Zone 3.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

Jason, son of John and Sara Hignight, will attend National 4-H Congress this year due to his Rabbit record book. His impressive record in that project includes being named Texas Junior Dwarf Hotot Producer of the Year, winning at area, state and national shows, and maintaining a business with 250 rabbits. His other projects include Shooting Sports, Range Judging, Clothing and Foods. He has presented method demonstrations at the local, district and state level, and has attended State Youth Camp and State Wildlife Camp.

Nancy, daughter of Jimmy and Debbie Arrott, started off 1994 with the Reserve Champion Lamb at the Houston Livestock Show. She was also recognized at Texas 4-H Roundup as one of nine "Beating the Odds" re-

cipients from across the state. Nancy has excelled in her sheep projects and has also done well in foods--advancing to district--and in photography, as she placed seventh at the State Photography show several years ago.

The other major awards presented to Senior-level 4-H members (ages 14-19) included Amy Laughlin and Tara Wilkins for Senior Achievement, Casey Upham for Senior Citizenship, Justin Moran and Jolynn Vannoy for Senior Leadership.

Major Junior-level awards included Helena Williams and Wesley Bean, who received the Junior Achievement award. This is the highest junior award possible. Other major junior awards included Ryan Bean and Camelia Williams for Junior Citizenship, and Lauren Wilkins for Junior Leadership.

### Weather Conditions Bring Grass Fires

Lightning caused six grass fires north and east of Ozona Sept. 27. Rain put out some and firemen from Ozona, Eldorado, Big Lake, Barnhart and Sonora worked together to put out the others.

"The problem was, no one called and said they had a grass fire," said Steve Kenley, fire marshal. "We just got smoke calls." This delayed dispatching of trucks to the area.

Firemen had not been back at the station long before receiving a report of a fire between Mitchell Blacktop and Pandale Road. Fire Chief Bob Falkner began a search for the fire, and two trucks were sent to the area. The fire was in an inaccessible area and eventually burned itself out.

But meanwhile, a call came in reporting a fire on the Acton Ranch south of town. One of the two trucks went to that location where ranch sprayers were being used with good results.

Two other trucks were broken down in town.

Firemen ended their runs at 2:30 Wednesday morning, but were called out to rekindles north of town Wednesday and Thursday.

During all this, Ozona firemen were preparing to host the Hill Country Firemen's Fall Convention Saturday. "We painted the bumper on one truck at least three times last week," said Kenley.

"I'm glad to be here," said White-

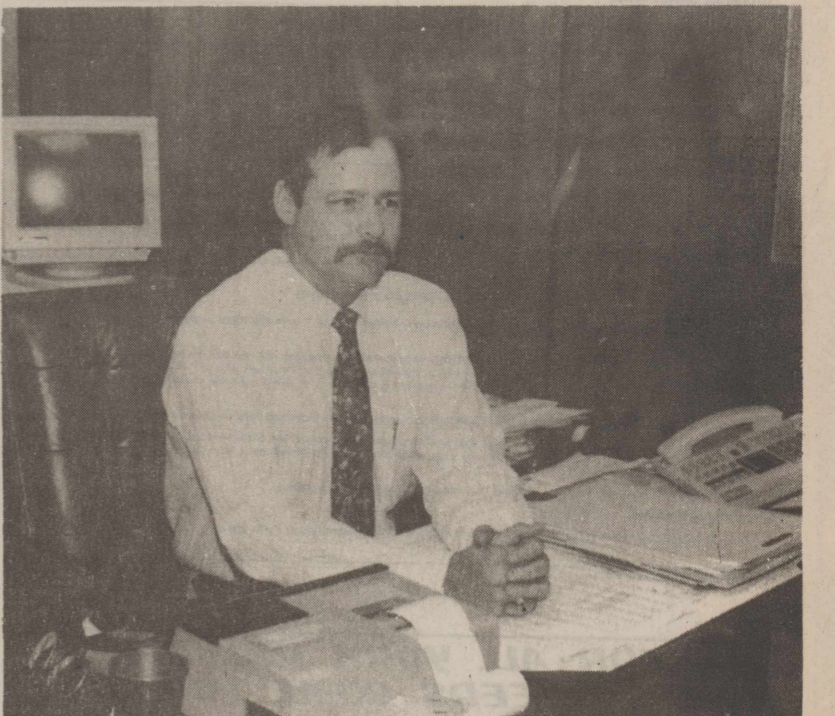
sides who is finding the community to be a friendly and helpful place.

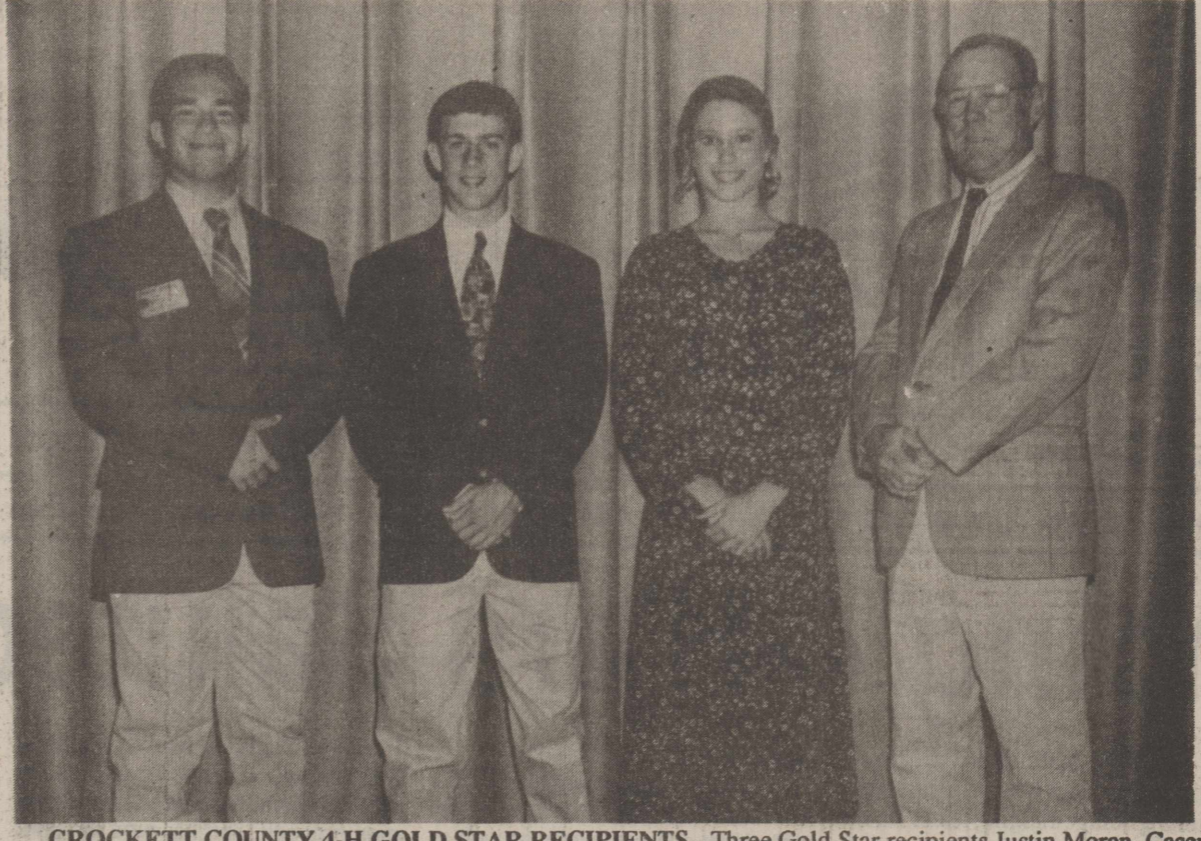

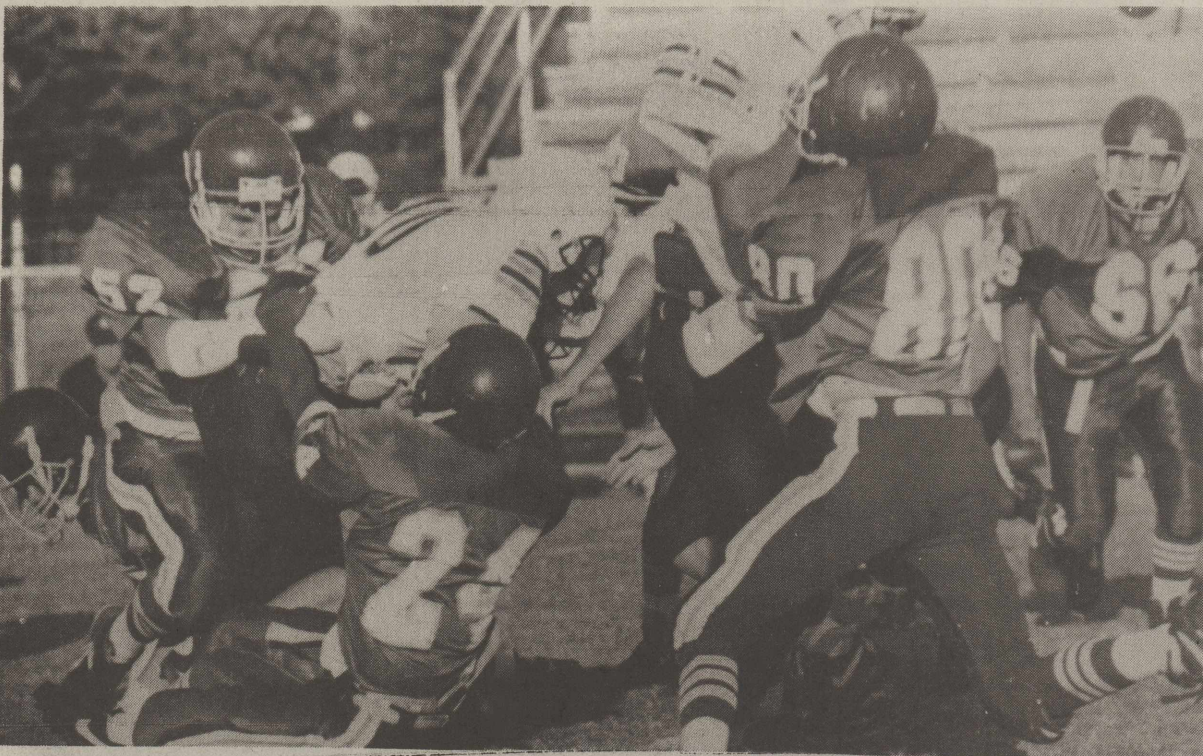

# JV Lions Maul Eagles 37-16

Turnovers played an immense part in the 37-16 domination by the Ozona JV Lions over the Junction Eagles in the Sept. 29 game in Lion Stadium. With the win, the Lions improve their record to 2-2.

"It was a tremendous victory for the boys," said Coach Tommy Wilson. "It was more output (offensively) than in all three games combined."

Eight total fumbles and one pass interception befuddled both of the teams. Ozona and Junction traded fumbles in the first quarter with neither capitalizing on the other's misfortune.

In the second quarter, Ozona tried to capitalize on Junction's second fumble. Lalo Guadarrama recovered the Eagle fumble on their 8-yard line. The Lions reached the 6-yard line after gaining and losing some yardage. A 23-yard field goal attempt by kicker Ramon Longoria went wide to the right with 2:12 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second period both teams traded possession of the ball, and not until the Lions' second possession were they able to score. The Lions started their drive on the Eagles' 46-yard line. Good runs by Shayne Fuentes with one 18-yarder set up his 2-yard plunge for the score with 2:26 left in the first half. The extra point made by Longoria gave the Lions a 7-0 lead.

Junction retaliated quickly by a "flea flicker" or "hook and lateral" 36-yard touchdown play. A pass play for the two-point conversion was good, and Junction took an 8-7 lead.

The third quarter was very similar to the first with several fumbles made by each team. Ozona recovered a Junction fumble on their 11-yard line. On the next play, Gary Dominguez took the ball in for an 11-yard touchdown. Coach Keith Hall called for a fake extra point kick with Brian Badillo running in for the two-point conversion. This made the score Ozona 15, Junction 8 with 3:03 left in the third period.

Junction got back into the thick of it several plays later, scoring on a 48-yard run. A pass for the two-point conversion was good, and the Eagles took a 16-15 lead with 1:06 in the third period.

In the next series of plays, the Lions started a drive on their own 25-yard line. Quarterback Pete Castaneda ran for 25 yards, and running backs

Brian Badillo and Gary Dominguez picked up some other yardage. Nine seconds after the fourth period started, wide receiver Jon Sanchez caught a 43-yard touchdown pass. Pete Castaneda ran in the ball for the two-point conversion, and the Lions regained the lead 23-16.

Luck started going the Lions' way, and they began taking command when Shayne Fuentes intercepted an Eagle pass and returned it to the Eagle 19-yard line. Running plays by Castaneda, Fuentes, and Dominguez were capped by a 6-yard touchdown pass to Jon Sanchez.

A first attempt to score on the two-point conversion failed, and the Lions were given a second chance to score due to an Eagle penalty. Castaneda ran the ball in for the two-point conversion, and the Lions took command with a 31-16 score.

On the next series of plays by the Eagles, the Lion defense held, and the Eagles gave up the ball on their own 23-yard line. Dominguez ran for a two-yard gain, and Brian Badillo ran

### Cubs Shoot Down The Junction Eagles 14-12

The Ozona Junior High Cubs won both games over the Junction Junior High Eagles in their Sept. 29 games in Junction. The Ozona Eighth Grade won 14-12 and improved their record to 2-1. The Ozona Seventh Grade won 18-0, increasing their record to 3-1.

Thanks to Coach Lee Gonzales, there are now some statistics on the junior high games. The Eighth Grade Cubs garnered 287 total yards in their narrow win of 14-12 over the Junction Eagles. Both defenses went to work in the third quarter with neither team scoring. Unfortunately for the Cubs, Jason Alvarez was injured at the beginning of the third period. The Cubs were forced from a "wishbone" offense (three backs) in the first half to a two-back offense in the second half. This proved to be nearly fatal for the Cubs as they were shut down in the second half.

The Eagles took advantage of Alvarez leaving the game and started a passing attack. They scored their first touchdown in the third period on a halfback pass for 40 yards. Mitchell Martinez defended the pass play but could not get his hands on the ball to knock it down. A pass for the two-point conversion failed, and the Cubs still led 14-6.

The situation was very similar in the fourth quarter when the Eagle quarterback threw a deep 40-yard pass to his wide receiver for a touchdown. A run for the two-point conversion was stopped by Ortiz and Galindo. The game ended many minutes later with Ozona winning 14-12.

The Eagles came back and tried again, but, "David Gutierrez arose to the occasion and did a 'gut check' (do or die-pressure) by making a key tackle - sacking the quarterback and causing a fumble," Coach Lee Gonzales said.

The Cubs and their defense had a good game with the exception of the fourth quarter. A total of 27 solo tackles were made with 41 assists. David Gutierrez led the Cubs with seven solo tackles and eight assists. He was followed by: Matt Galindo, 5 and 6; Robert Kelly, 3 and 7; Chad Myers, 3 and 6, one fumble recovery; Ricky Dominguez, 2 and 4; Mitchell Martinez, 2 and 4; Luis Hernandez, 2 and 3; Anthony Ortiz, 2 and 3; and Will Roane with one solo tackle.

The Ozona Seventh Grade Cubs shut out the Junction Eagles 18-0 on three touchdowns in last Thursday's game in Junction. The Cub's offense garnered a total of 287 yards - all rushing.

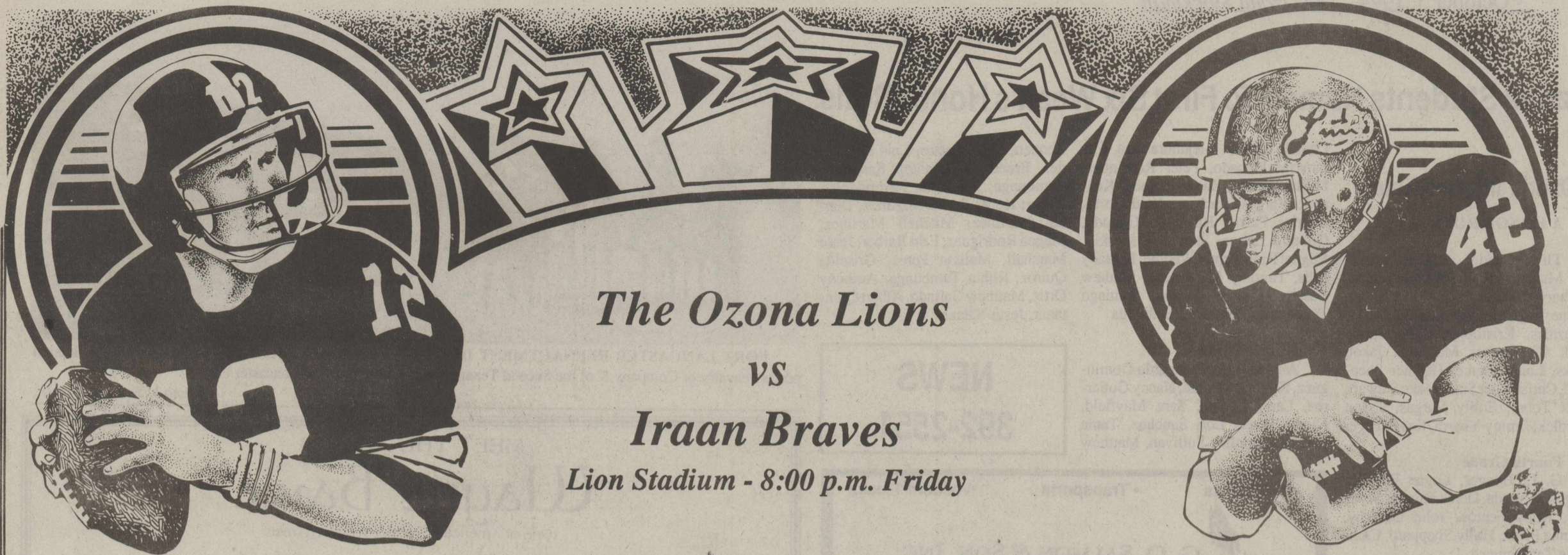

## Lions Pluck The Junction Eagles 33 Feathers to 7

Fans may have been a little worried at first, but the Ozona Lions built up steam and pummeled the Junction Eagles 33-7 in last Friday's game in the Junction Eagle Stadium.

"I was proud of our kids coming out in the second half and taking the game away," said Head Coach Don Payne. "When we took the ball down and scored, we took the ballgame away from Junction."

The Lions made a total of five touchdowns with four coming from the offense and the other from a fumble recovery. Ozona played well offensively, gaining 207 yards rushing and 160 yards passing.

Turnovers continue to plague the Lions as well as penalties with a total of five turnovers and 83 yards in penalties. Three fumbles were lost, and there were two pass interceptions.

"Offensively, we've got to stop turning the ball over, ourselves. We can't survive in the district race with

that many turnovers. Every time we did something good, we got a turnover; we've got to take care of those. We've got to work on mental preparation," said Payne.

The Lions' defense started out with a bang, stopping the Eagles on their first drive and holding the Eagle offense to a total of 121 yards.

The Lions' first score came from a scooped up Eagle fumble by J. J. Lozano and returned 38 yards for a touchdown. An extra point attempt failed, and the Lions led 6-0 in the first quarter.

Junction answered the challenge by taking the ball from their own 18-yard line, taking 16 plays and approximately six minutes to reach the end zone. Junction's Aaron Bierschwale scored on a 22-yard run, and the extra point was good to take a first quarter 7-6 lead.

On Ozona's second fumble in the second period, Junction tried to capitalize on the Ozona mistake by attempting a 37-yard field goal try. The try was not successful, and the Lions

Lion quarterback Chris Sanchez kept the ball on the next play and ran for a 20-yard touchdown. A fake kick shuttle-pass was no good on the extra-points attempt. The Lions took the lead at 12-7 with 8:38 in the third quarter and never looked back.

An Eagle fumble on the kickoff and the Lion recovery set up the next Lion score. The Lions' recovered the ball on the Eagle 19-yard line. A 7-yard run by Anthony Sanchez and a 9-yard pass to David Browne helped set up the one-yard touchdown plunge by

Anthony Sanchez. A two-point conversion pass to tight end Travis Davidson was good, making the score Ozona 20, Junction 7 with 6:25 left in the third period.

The Lions' defense continued to play a great game, holding the Eagle offense to only 32 yards in the second half. Coach Payne commented,

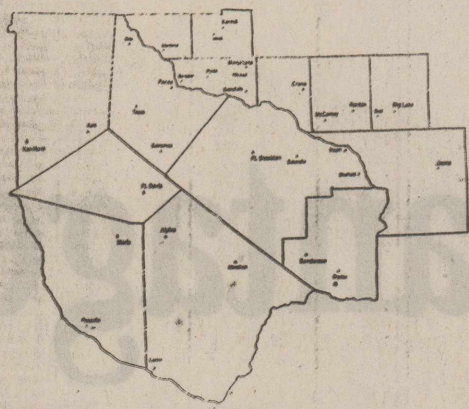

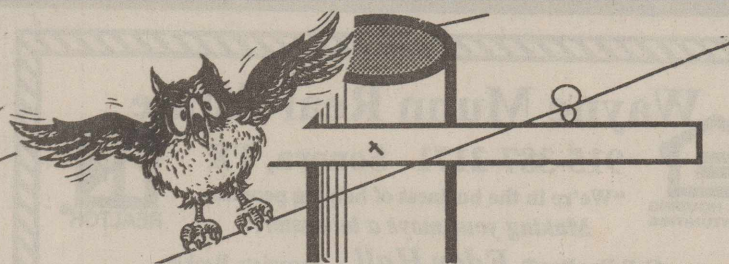

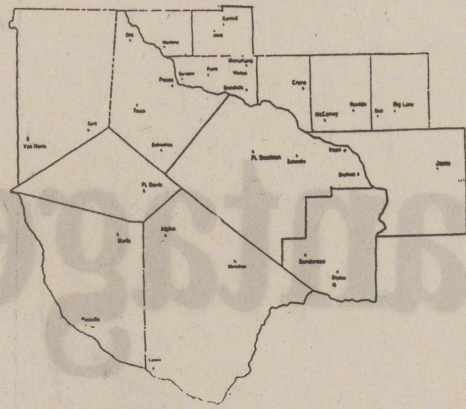
