

Grant Applications Could Bring Good Things To Ozona

The possibility of receiving opment project." \$695,799 in grant money for water and sewer system improvements has Doug Meador excited.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Frank Tambunga was in San Angelo last week to present applications to the Concho Valley Council of Governments for two grants which would enable the water district to complete a project now underway with \$198,869 in previously approved grant funds.

The new proposals, which were written by Mike Duran of Gary R. Traylor & Associates Inc., include a request to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for \$199,999 and a request for a Colonias grant for \$495,800.

The Texas Community Development Program grant, if received, would pay for a booster pump station south of I-10 and a water storage standpipe above Heraclio Street and additional six inch water line. These improvements would result in improved water pressure throughout the target

"One grant will help; two will be great," said Meador.

A grant for sewer improvements was approved for Ozona last year by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs in the amount of \$198,869. The water district's matching portion is \$29,831.

Survey work began last week for improvements related to this grant. The project is designed to remove sewer lines from yards and under houses. The lines will be rerouted under streets and alleys.

'We hope to bid this out in June or July," said Meador of the two-year project. Construction should start soon

The Colonias grant requested last week would finish the sewer line projwater line to replace two inch line.

These improvements would bring more water pressure and better service to residents and lower the district's pumping costs, Meador said. There are 428 residents who would benefit from these improvements.

The Colonia grant fund is administered by the Texas Community Development Program from specific funds and according to Mike Duran. "It is unique in that it does not compete with others in the community devel-



Family Caregiving For Alzheimer's Patients

COLLEGE STATION -- Some simple activities can help both Alzheimer's patients and their family caregivers better cope with this progressive disease, says gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren.

Once a person is diagnosed as having Alzheimer's disease, family members may assume that caring for the patient's personal needs is all they can do, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

This is particularly true of families with little access to continuing professional advice or family support groups, she remarks.

A family caregiver spends many hours each day assisting the patient with eating, dressing and personal care. But there are still many hours of the day that remain unoccupied.

Warren maintains that doing a variety of activities will provide the patient with a greater sense of usefulness and decrease the agitation and restlessness that is so characteristic of

Activities that encourage selfexpression include making paper collages, molding play dough, painting, drawing or taking museum trips. Simplified versions of "concentration"-type games, trivia games and jigsaw puzzles may also be appropriate activities for some patients.





Friday night the "Biggest Little Team in the World" proved it takes more than one man to win a football game, with a decisive 20-7 victory over the Eldorado Eagles.

Land Bank Salutes **Property Rights Week**

In recognition of the importance of private property rights in Texas, the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora commemorates all landowners during this year's annual Landowner's Rights Week as designated by the Texas Legislature.

The association is one of many organizations observing the week of Oct. 16-22 as Landowner's Rights Week. In accordance with the state resolution passed during the last legislative session, and in light of recent events across the state on property rights, the association salutes the farmers a ranchers who provide the food, shelter and fiber of this nation.

"As agricultural lenders, our objective is to improve the income and well being of American farmers and ranchers," said association president Jack B. Smith Jr. "We support the rights of property owners to be able to produce and make a living on their land. Laws such as the Endangered Species Act and Clean Water Act are lowering land values, impacting tax bases and creating compulsory land use situations which are not in the best interest of our stockholders or the rural communities in which they live.

"These detrimental laws and regulations in turn affect financial institutions' ability to serve the credit needs of agriculture," he added. "If these issues are not addressed properly and fairly, the very fabric and economy of this community and nation will suf-

The Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora is part of the Tenth Farm Credit District serving more than 52,000 member/borrowers in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas with total loans outstanding of \$3.6 billion. District borrowers have pledged nearly 20 million acres of private property as collateral. Locally, the association has 173 member/borrowers in four counties, with approximately 437,929 acres pledged as collateral.

"Property rights and the protection of those rights are paramount to our members/stockholders, board of directors and management," he added.

Recent events in TexaS and across the nation have focused the debate over the impact of government regulations and their effects on the use of private property.

Farmers, ranchers, landowners and others have complained that strict federal environmental rules are stripping them of the use and value of their land. "While we certainly support maintaining a healthy environment, we are greatly concerned that government regulations intended to protect the environment are in effect reducing the productive capacity of land decreasing the value of the property, which in turn, reduces the value of the financial assets collateralized by the

"When control over someone's property is transferred by regulation or law to the government, then the ability of the property to produce value and wealth is also transferred to the government," Mr. Smith said.

"Protecting and preserving private property rights is a major concern of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora. It not only ensures the production of food, shelter and fiber, but the environmental health and financial wealth of our state and nation," Mr. Smith added.

It has been demonstrated that at least 45 days from weaning to marketing is required to optimize the health benefits of the program and to enhance candidates of their choice by Oct. 31 wishing to nominate a rancher for the significant calf weight gain.

Value Added Calf-45 is a program designed to be a "value added" management system that ranchers can use to preconditon calves prior to marketing. By increasing the calf's resistance to respiratory diseases prior to weaning and boosting that resistance at weaning while the calves are still on the ranch where exposure to pathogens is generally minimal, they are better prepared to enter the marketing system and other phases of beef production. This system is designed to reduce sickness, lower death losses and enhance beef production effi-

1. Vaccinate against the Clostridial organisms (Blackleg, etc.) when the calves are worked at approximately 2-4 months of age. Use products labeled for subcutaneous administration to reduce injection site tissue lesions. Use a minimum of a 4-way vaccine (Blackleg, Malignant Edema, Black Disease and Clostridium sordelli). Other clostridials can be a problem in certain areas, so consult with your veterinarian for specific recommendations. However, vaccinating against more pathogenic agents than necessary places additional demands on the calf's immune system.

Make sure calves have free choice access to a good quality mineral from birth through weaning. Trace minerals, especially copper, zinc and selenium, can greatly affect the immune

Note: Vaccinations 21-30 days pre-weaning will provide optimum levels of resistance against the challenge of pathogens at weaning and is the definite method of preference. However, if it is not possible to gather the calves at that time, follow one of the two alternatives listed below:

Option A. Vaccinate against IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV and Pasteurella haemolytica at weaning. Booster the IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV with a modified live vaccine 14 days later.

Option B. Vaccinate against IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV when the calves are worked at 2-4 months of age with a vaccine with label approval for use in calves nursing cows. Booster the IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV with a modified Live vaccine and vaccinate against Pasteurella haemolytica at weaning.

The ASC County Committee election will be conducted from Nov. 25 to Dec. 5 by mail ballot.

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, she said. Crockett County ranchers have the opportunity to nominate people they feel would best serve the ranch community.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm votes in the ASC community and must be received in the county ASCS office by the Oct. 31

Ranchers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many

Ranchers are asked to nominate candidates as they choose. Anyone the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

> Ranchers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC committee. "The election of concerned ranchers to positions on ASC committees is essential in the administration of ranch programs," Mrs. Hale said.

She further explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all ranchers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap or national origin.

Value Added Management System Pre-conditions Calves SPA Training For Those In Agriculture

SPA, or the Standardized Performance Analysis System, is a total financial management system for ranchers and others who are associated with ranch finances. The SPA system was developed by various university personnel working in cooperation with the National Cattlemen's Association, The American Sheep Industry Association, and affiliated producers. One of its primary goals has been to provide the beef, and now also the sheep industry, with a means of standardized communication among the many financial players in the production picture. This includes producers themselves, their lenders, accountants, and other financial consultants. SPA possesses some very real advantages over the reports generated from tax accounting which historically, so many ranchers have used to make many of their financial and production management decisions. Generally speaking, tax reports are for tax purposes. When they are used to gauge long-term financial health, make production/management decisions, or even to obtain credit, this may be to everyone's disadvantage. 



Texas into an alliance of ostrich producers, focusing on displays, advertising, conducting marketing seminars and providing speakers while setting short and long-term goals for the asso-

According to Childress, there are already three slaughter facilities in Texas, in the central and eastern part of the state. The birds with the least desirable breeding characteristics are used for slaughter, with a 12-14 month old bird producing approximately 100 pounds of meat, 14 square feet of leather and feathers.

Products made from ostriches include arts and crafts from the egg shells, toe nails utilized as an abrasive in the jewelry industry and the offal and bones used in livestock feed. The feathers are used for dusters and in fashion. Leather is used in boots, handbags, jackets, wallets and many other articles.

For those of you with a taste for ostrich, it's available in several threeand four-star restaurants in the state, including Dallas' prestigious Mansion on Turtle Creek, the Beau Nash at the Room at the Fairmont, Cacharel in Arlington and Hudson on the Bend in Austin. It's also found in Fort Worth and Houston, so be on the lookout when you travel to the big city.

The meat, which is low in fat and cholesterol and is very similar in taste and appearance to beef, costs approximately \$4-\$5 per pound live weight and \$6.50 per pound carcass weight at this time.

Childress has been in the ostrich business since Fall 1993, when he, wife Jodie, sons Ira and Clay, and their wives Heatherly and Shelly formed "Childress Ostrich".

"We were primarily looking at the economics of the business," says

Their operation has 10 pairs of birds. Five pairs of the birds - 18-20 months old - are the Zimbabwe and Namibian Bluenecks and two of the five mature pairs are a cross of the blue and red neck Namibian Blue variety. Ira and Heatherly Childress own one pair of the crosses.

The Childress birds all came from eggs laid in Zimbabwe, Africa, and hatched in Florida. There is a short period of quarantine that must also be observed.

The domestic ostrich is commonly known as "African Blacks". These are a hybrid produced from cross-mating North African, Syrian and South African ostriches in the latter part of the last century, primarily to improve feather quality.

Actually, all ostriches belong to a igle species, "Struthio camelus" Many people may have difficulty telling ostriches from emus, which are also raised in Texas. Emus, however, are smaller and have thinner hides, and their meat is not as desirable.

How can you tell a quality ostrich when you see one? Actually, there are several things a breeder can look for, including straight legs, the amount of meat, bone, size of the legs - talk about drumsticks! - and the size of the breast.

Breeding capacity is also a prime consideration at this stage. Ostriches reach full maturity at 24 months and lay approximately 20 eggs per year. Hens lay eggs from march to August every other day. As they get older, a pair can lay up to 100 eggs per year.

The three-to-five pound eggs are removed from the hens after they are laid - with an incubation period of 42 to 43 days. The chicks are about 10 inches in height, weigh about two pounds, and grow approximately 10 inches per month for the first six months of life.

Ostriches are currently being raised in almost every state in the U.S. and much of Canada and Mexico. The Childresses toured 40 different ostrich operations in Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana and Mississippi before deciding how to build their own facilities. "A pair of birds needs a space approximately 50 feet by 250 feet," he said.

Care and feeding are important to the success of any animal production operation, and ostriches are no different. Childress says the first 30 to 60 days are the most critical in an ostrich's life due to several dangerous diseases, including chick syndrome which attacks their immune system and scours. A conservative estimate of the survival rate is around 50%, but many breeders do better than that.

Self-waterers are used, and the birds are fed once daily with four-and one-half pounds of special ostrich pellets per bird. They are also observed at that time to keep health and other problems to a minimum. The rancher noted that several veterinarians who specialize in care of the big birds are located in Midland, Uvalde, Sweetwater and Hamlin.

He noted that the birds are easily stressed or "spooked", which can cause injury. While ostriches can run quite fast, they can neither jump nor fly due to their heavy weight and insignificant wings. Either smooth wire or chain link can be used for fencing, and

shelter, while important for chick health, is basically only needed for adults to keep food dry during bad

Childress is looking forward to the Houston Livestock Show's first ostrich show in 1995. There will be a junior show, thanks to the directors of the state association, who arranged to donate several pairs of birds to FFA members in the state. The organization is actively working to build youth participation in their industry.

Childress sees a growing demand for ostrich products and for the breeding birds themselves in the coming years. "In 10 years breeders will be in only one phase of the industry," says Childress. More than likely, breeders will get into the meat, feather and leather end of the business, since prices for pairs will decline as numbers in-

In early spring the Childress family is expecting more than 100 eggs from their flock. Immediate plans are underway to build an incubation and hatching building.

Due to the low humidity in this Crescent Court Hotel, the Pyramid area, "West Texas has the perfect climate for raising ostrich eggs - the eggs should be kept at 21% humidity," said Childress. Other climatically-favorable areas are Southern California and
