



> taken whitetail deer, mule deer, turkey, javelina, feral hogs, Ibex, goats and Corsican sheep. He has hunted all over Texas, New Mexico, Colroado and Alabama. This year he has planned a trip to Colorado to hunt black bear.

> He likes to shoot at animals within 100 yards, but he prefers within 50 yards, Wilson said.

> Wilson has hunted with John Taffin who writes for the American Hand Gunner, in the Kerrville area. Both hunt with handguns and have hunted big game animals together.

> Another person Wilson has hunted with is Gary Sitton. Sitton, a freelance writer from Tucson, AZ, writes hunting articles for Guns and Ammo and Petersen's Hunting Magazine. In Wilson's opinion, "Sitton is one of the best gun and hunting writers in the field today."

> Considering Crockett County is one of the prime hunting counties in Texas, Wilson sees the trophy hunting program as very interesting to him. Hunting has increased the income to ranching, and Wilson is excited about this because "it brings outside money into Crockett County and that's the main reason I am involved. 

NOTICE TO STUDENTS AND PARENTS REGARDING THE USE OF VIDEO RECORDERS ON CROCKETT COUNTY

SCHOOL BUSES

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District has installed video recording equipment on all school buses to monitor school transportation, and will be videotaping bus routes at random. Each bus may be equipped with a video monitor box, in which a video recording device my be installed. Students will not be notified when a recording device has been installed on their bus.

Tapes shall be reviewed on a routine basis by the principal, and evidence of student misconduct will be documented. Students found to be in violation of the District's bus conduct rules, as contained in the student handbook, shall be notified, and disciplinary action will be inititated.

Videotapes shall be treated as protected student records under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. The following guidelines shall apply:

1. Tapes shall remain in the cutody of the transportation

2. Parents or students who wish to view a videotape in response to disciplinary action taken against a student may request such access under the procedures set out in district policy.

3. Persons unrelated to a disciplinary incident shall not be permitted to view bus videotapes.





drug prevention, alcohol prevention, and violence prevention tool ever is a mother or father who knows what they are doing, why they are doing it, and does it confidently.

However, many parents are unsure of themselves. Nothing in their background prepared them to raise children in the America of the '90's. Consequently, they look to the schools, and the police to "raise" their children...and when that doesn't work, they get frustrated with the "system" and say that "it" doesn't work. Of course "it" doesn't work. The schools and the police were not designed to "raise the community's children."

Recognizing that only families raise children well, many community based programs have either acquired or developed "parent training programs" to help parents deal with the challenges.

This led to the next problem. The parents either could not or would not attend. The net result was frustration and discouragement. The original goal was good...Let's get to the parent ... the breakdown occurred in implementation. Please don't give up on the goal...achieving it is the key to your long term success.

Texans' War on Drugs offers a solution to the problem, it is called a Parent to Parent Workshop. It is unique in that it was designed from the outset around an implementation model, video-based parent training program that can be delivered by "ordinary

The greatest crime prevention, people" as opposed to dynamic speakers or training experts. It is the ultimate in peer-driven prevention. It is available in three cultural versions: Hispanic American, African-American and Anglo. It was done this way for a reason. It is not that dynamic speakers or training experts are bad ... there are just not enough of them to reach an entire community over an extended period of time. We have to rely on "ordinary people" to make the difference.

> One example of how the program has been used is in Sonora. The high school oounselor used the Parent to Parent program of incoming freshmen; parents whose children had received MIPs; and bank and city personnel employees. Rocksprings used the program as an in-service and more than 50 school personnel went through the workshop, Residents in Coleman, Sterling City, Comstock, Cherokee, Mason, and Crane have been trained and presented Parent to Parent in their communities.







IN DEFENSE OF PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS

Last week I re-introduced the Endangered Species Moratorium Amendments, legislation designed to protect the rights of private property owners throughout the country. As you may remember, my felllow Texan, Rep. Chet Edwards and I introduced this bill in the last Congress

For far too long, private property owners have been threatened by Endangered Species Act legislation that gives the federal bureaucrats a heavyhanded say over our land rights. My bipartisan effort, introduced along with nearly 40 co-sponsors from across the country has a good chance of passing in the new Congress, where more members than ever are lending a sympathetic ear to the plight of hard working, tax-paying private property owners.

The ESA, although well-intentioned in its origins, has been abused by extremists inside and outside the Beltway. It was designed to protect endangered species. However, instead of balancing the wish to protect endangered species with human needs. what we have instead is infringement be halted.

government interpreted this as a threat to the ESA and fined him thousands of dollars. This same act, whose intention it was to protect, is instead being used against citizens in favor of beetles, worms, mice and birds.

My legislation on the other hand, seeks to protect the farmers, the ranchers or the home-owners who have worked all their lives to take care of their property and maintain their lifestyles. In the cloud of rhetoric surrounding ESA legislation, what has been forgotten is the rights of hard working families and individuals who have strived all their lives to provide for and protect their families and their land - land that may have been in their families for generations, long before the federal government started legislating property rights.

We must seek solutions which preserve truly endangered species while respecting the rights of property owners. The narrow-sighted bureaucrats inside the Washington Beltway need to learn to balance these goals and stop current abuses of the ESA. If after infringement upon our rights as they would simply work with propprivate property owners and this must erty owners, instead of against them, they might find the goals of the ESA easier to reach. Lt. Governor Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney announced that public access to the Texas Legislature will soon enter a new era as plans are finalized to link legislative information systems to the Internet.

Bullock said he was elated. "I have long been a staunch advocate of open government and the public's right to know," Bullock said. "I am delighted that we now have the technology to bring the work of the Legislature to the fingertips of the

Texans it serves." Laney called the Internet link a major step in opening the legislative process to the public.

"It will help Texans further understand and participate in their government," Laney said. "Now, anyone can have the same access to our data bases as the members of the Legislature Carolina last year.

Legislative information that will be available on the Internet and updated daily includes:

* The full text, legislative history, authors and co-authors of every bill and resolution filed in the current sities, colleges and libraries. session.

* Daily House and Senate Calen-

* Names and capitol and district office addresses and phone numbers for House and Senate members.

* House and Senate committee memberships and day-to-day committee schedules.

* U.S. Census Bureau information on Texas House and Senate districts. 1994 general election analysis.

* Information on how a bill becomes law.

* Full text of the Texas Constitution.

* General information about the Capitol, including tours, visitor parking and the Capitol Restoration Proj-

The U.S. Department of Defense created the Internet to link major academic, government and industrial computer sites in the United States to promote information sharing.

Although the Internet now links an estimated 46,000 computer networks in 90 countries and serves 20 million Internet users, Texas joins only a handful of states that have linked legislative information to the system. Hawaii was first in 1991, followed by California, Utah, Minnesota and North

A personal computer, modem and connection are needed to access the Texas Legislative System on the Internet. Connections are provided by private companies for a fee. Access also is available through some univer-

Texas Senate Week In Review

The Texas Legislature convened at 12:00 noon on Tuesday, January 10, with both Houses meeting in the newly restored State Capitol. The Senate had met during the 73rd Legislative Session in a temporary chamber three blocks away due to the Capitol restoration. The first order of business was the swearing-in ceremony of the 31 newly elected senators by Chief Justice Tom Phillips of the Texas Supreme Court. New members of the Senate are David Cain of Dallas, Mario Gallegos of Houston, Michael Galloway of The Woodlands, Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls and Drew Nixon of Carthage.

Austin State Senator Gonzalo Barrientos was elected president pro tempore of the Senate for the 74th regular session. Visibly moved by the Honor, Senator Barrientos recalled the words of his father upon his election to the Senate. "He told me, 'My son, I'm glad you were elected Senator...that's good. Just one thing -

Also on Tuesday, Senator Carlos Senator Truan is the first Hispanic to hold the high honor. Truan has served in the Texas Senate since 1977, and spent eight years in the Texas House prior to his election to the Senate.

The Texas Senate convened Wednesday, January 11, at 11:00 a.m. Members drew lots to determine who would have 2-year and 4-year terms. Each decade after the federal census, Senate, House and Congressional districts are redrawn to reflect population migration. The original Senate redistricting plan was challenged in the court system, and a federal courtordered plan was used for the 1992

election. Since that time, districts established in a special session in January, 1992 were upheld in federal court and all 31 district elections were held again in 1994. Senators drawing 4year terms are: Armbrister, Bivins, Brown, Ellis, Gallegos, Galloway, Haywood, Leedom, Madla, Monford, Patterson, Ratliff, Sibley, Truan, Turner and West. Members receiving 2-year terms are: Barrientos, Cain, Harris, Henderson, Lucio, Luna, Moncrief, Nelson, Nixon, Rosson, Shapiro, Sims, Wentworth, Whitmire and Zaffirini.

Senator John Whitmire of Houston filed emergency legislation on Wednesday to address problems with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's mandatory vehicle testing program. Complaints include location of the facilities and cost of compliance. The emergency legislation suspends the program for 90 days from the date of passage. Whitmire supports a 2-year suspension of the program. The legislation, Senate Bill 19, was referred to the Senate Natural Resources Committee on Wednesday. Texas Monthly Oil And Gas Report

DECEMBER PERMITS TO DRILL

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,083 drilling permits in December compared to 1,230 in December 1993. The December total included 635 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 34 to re-enter existing well bores, 60 to deepen existing holes, 111 to plugback existing holes, and 91 for other wells. December amended drilling permits totaled 152.

Total drilling permits issued in 1994 year-to-date is 12,733, a three percent decrease from the 13,027 issued during the same period of 1993.


Permits issued in December included 363 oil, 285 gas, 402 oil and gas, 25 injection, four disposal and four other permits.

DECEMBER OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS

In December operators reported 296 gas, 341 oil, and 46 service completions, compared to 314 gas, 454 oil and 31 service completions during the same period of last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1994 year-to-date is 7,893, a six percent decrease from the 8,386 recorded in 1993.
