# Earthquake Stories Plentiful In Ozona



Are you concerned that other people may be able to get this information? Don't be -- it's all confidential and protected by law. Unless you specifically permit it, Social Security cannot give information about you to anyone without your permis-


If you receive a letter from Social house to see if they could still twirl the Security and have questions about the information in the letter, call us; we are here to help you with those questions. But the call we receive must be from you. If you ask someone else to take the call on your behalf, the Social Security representative is prohibited by law from discussing your personal business with that person unless you authorize it.


When Social Security began keeping records, we decided to use a numerical identifier, your Social Security number. The number assigned to each person is different. This allows us to keep information about you separate from any other information. The public was told that information kept by Social Security would be regarded as confidential.

Although we can't prevent others from asking for your number, you should know that giving it to them does not give them access to your Social Security records. The privacy of your records is guaranteed unless the law requires us to give it to another government agency or the information is needed to conduct Social Security or other government health or welfare programs.

If a business asks you for your Social Security number, you can refuse to give it to them. However, they may not let you take the purchase or give you the service you are requesting without the number. Be careful with your Social Security number and keep it confidential whenever possible.

Self-discipline is that little inner voice that pushes you to do those things that don't give you an immediate reward, but have their payoff in the future. Because reward comes in the future it is sometimes difficult to maintain the self-discipline necessary to persevere.

The reverse of self-discipline is procrastination. That time between when we become aware of a needed action and the time that we take the a killer of success.





McWilliams was a child of the depression years. His late father, Earl McWilliams, was sheriff of Runnels County from 1925 until 1931 when he became a Texas Ranger. His parents had been married at Talpa and operated a ranch near there until the Depression caused livestock and wool prices to drop to record lows.

The McWilliams family lived in Ozona from the summer of 1941 until about 1945, he recalls. He joined the Marines at the age of 17 and served with the First Marine Division in the Pacific battles of World War II. During World War II, five of his family were in the military, serving in the U. S. Marines, Army, Navy, W.A.C.s and Air Force. A younger brother, Bill, later joined the Marines.

After his discharge in 1946, Mac. who was called Garrett during his days in Ozona, returned to Texas Tech University where he obtained BS degrees in petroleum engineering and geology and a master of science degree in hydrology.

For the next more than 40 years, he worked as a geologist, geophysicist and exploration manager with oil companies in Africa, Europe, the North Sea, Arctic Ocean and in the United States. In 1986, he retired from Tenneco Oil Company and began his writing career. He studied novel writing at the University of Iowa in 1991 and 1992, and for the next three years did research and wrote Never Too Old To Cry. 



The disease is highly contagious among mourning doves, so when they feed together, healthy birds pick up seeds that the sick birds tried to swallow and become infected. Outbreaks of trichomoniasis occur wherever birds are concentrated at a source of food or 2818.
