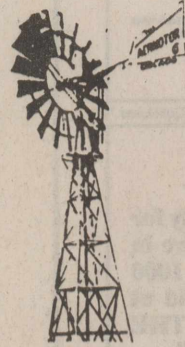
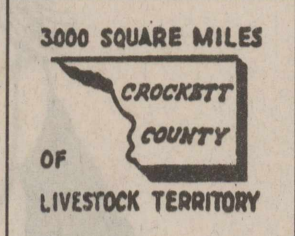

Commissioners Look Toward New Building

County commissioners hope to meet later this month to consider a bond issue to finance a new county building. They examined proposed plans for an 8,000 single-story structure during their meeting Monday.

Architect Jack Meeks of San Angelo had prepared the plans for a

metal building with a stucco and glass exterior which he estimates will cost between \$550,000 and \$600,000. The building would house most of the county offices now contained in the courthouse and annex.

Meek was asked to prepare an estimate for an overall project includ-

ing the new building and renovation of rooms in the courthouse.

Commissioners approved a contract with Gary Traylor and Associates for grant management services for the 1995 Texas Community Development Program Grant, Colonia Fund.

Commissioners Freddie Nicks and Fred Deaton abstained from voting, saying that they did not understand the contract. Commissioners Rudy Martinez, Frank Tambunga and Judge Jeffrey Sutton voted for.

Prior to the vote, Deaton said he felt the county was giving away authority in trade for grants and that "I don't want to be the person to start giving it away".

Nicks and Deaton also abstained from voting to select an engineering firm to perform services on a 1994-95 Texas Community Development grant project. Martinez, Tambunga and Sutton voted to accept the recommendation of Doug Meador to accept the firm of Hibbs & Todd of Abilene for the service.

The court reviewed four applications for the position of swimming pool managers. In separate motions, the court voted to hire Sarah Hignight to manage the North Pool and Felice Gutierrez to manage the South Pool, contingent upon their certification as

Recount Results In Tied Vote

District 1 candidates for election to the school board were declared tied as the result of a recount held Tuesday afternoon. The results of the Saturday election showed incumbent Elliott Barrera with 38 votes to 40 for Jessie Reina-Zuniga. Barrera filed a petition for a recount Monday.

The tie can be broken in one of two ways according to County and District Clerk Debbie Puckett. Another election can be held, or the two candidates can agree to cast lots to determine the winner. An election would be held in 20 to 30 days, she said.

The cast lots terminology comes from the election laws. The two could agree to flip a coin, roll the dice or any other means qualifying as "casting lots".

Other results of the election as determined Saturday put Wade Richardson back in as a trustee with 131 votes to Steve Mobbs' 65 in District 6.

At-large incumbent Dr. Marcus Sims was re-elected with 365 votes to 205 for Walter Spiller.

Option 4 authorizing the board to educate students of other school districts with local tax revenues passed with 369 voting for and 175 voting against.

Commissioners canvassed the votes on Monday. The recount will also be canvassed by the court.

Lion's New Coach Ready To Go

Former Haskell coach and teacher Walter Hargrove is the new head coach and athletic director at Ozona. The 42-year-old Hargrove was hired at a school board meeting last week and accepted the job on Thursday. He wasted little time in arriving in Ozona as he started to work on Monday.

Hargrove said he was anxious to get back to coaching and that Ozona made it easy for him. "I think it's a great situation," said the McMurry

University graduate. "We'll try to continue the tradition they've had here in the past. I know it's been good."

Originally from Rotan and raised on a cotton farm, Hargrove was the head football coach at Haskell High School for four years. He compiled a four year record of 13-24-3, and in his last two years his team was 10-8-2.

His biggest win was in 1993 against Hamlin who advanced to the third round of the playoffs. "The district we competed in was just so tough," he said. "Our kids compete very well. We won some games we shouldn't

have, probably. We didn't win enough ballgames, you know how that goes. I felt real good about what we had done there.

He has coached 18 years including this year. Hargrove started as an assistant for five years at Haskell before receiving the head coaching position. He has coached as an assistant at Sweetwater, starting in 1975, Canadian, Snyder, Lubbock Coronado, Hamlin and Haskell.

Hargrove, who was given a one-year contract, said he anticipates trying out several types of offenses for the Lions. "We'll do some wishbone stuff and some I-formation stuff and some one back," he said.

In working with young athletes, Hargrove said, "I've always been firm, fair and flexible in dealing with the kids. If you are consistent with those three things, then everything should be all right."

Hargrove is the son of Betty Hargrove of Rotan and the late Bernice Hargrove. He graduated from Rotan High School in 1971 and attended Cisco Junior College and graduated from McMurry College in 1975 with a B.S. degree in education. He is currently working on a mid-management degree which he started this year from Sul Ross University.

He and his wife, Deana, have three girls, Kaysi, 7, Haley, 2, and Kaylee, six months old. A teacher and former coach, Deana is originally from Abilene and graduated from Wylie High School. She coached a girls' state track team in Albany in 1990-91.

Mrs. Hargrove received a bachelor of science degree from McMurry in 1986 in education. She is certified to teach all levels of physical education. She has been teaching secondary English and elementary P.E.

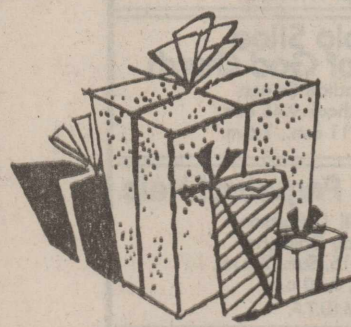

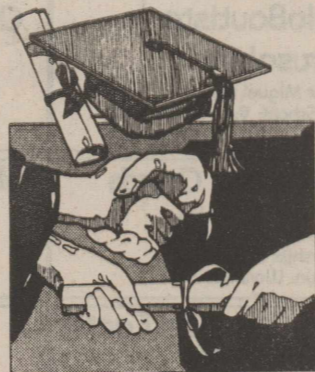

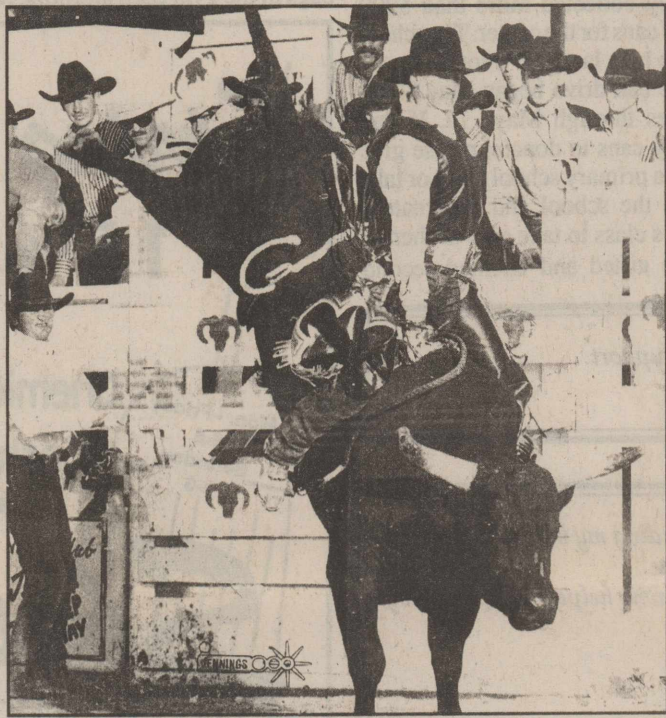
Saturday night's dance at the park slab to the music of Mirage of Uvalde

Drought Damage Loans Available

In response to a request from Gov. George Bush, the Consolidated Farm Service Agency has designated Pecos and Collingsworth Counties as disaster areas and has identified 12 contiguous disaster counties.

The governor's request came on the heels of damages and losses caused by drought which occurred in Pecos County from April 15, 1992, to Sept. 19, 1994, and in Collingsworth County between May 1 and Sept. 30, 1994.

The contiguous counties in the Pecos designation are: Brewster,

Crane, Crockett, Jeff Davis, Reeves, Terrell and Ward. The contiguous counties in the Collingsworth designation are: Childress, Donley, Gray, Hall and Wheeler.

The designation allows family ranchers in both primary and contiguous counties to qualify for CFSA low-interest emergency loans for damages and losses caused by the drought. CFSA county offices can provide affected ranchers with further information and assist them in completing applications for assistance. CFSA is the former ASCS.

lifeguards.

Martinez abstained from voting, saying he was related to one of the applicants.

A Red Cross certification class will be held here the weekends of May 19-21 and May 26-28. A classified ad announcing the hiring of lifeguards in this issue of The Stockman gives further details.

Pools are to be opened May 29 under the operation of a manager who is a certified lifeguard and closed following Labor Day weekend.

Commissioners voted to execute a resolution opposing term limits for elected officials. This resolution was to be faxed to Austin.

School trustee election results were canvassed by the court and approved. However, a petition for a recount in the trustee race between Elliott Barrera and Jessie Reina-Zuniga was filed and was to be held Tuesday afternoon. The count on Saturday showed 40 for Reina-Zuniga and 38 for incumbent Barrera.

The court voted to accept the low bid of \$104,599 for an elevator for the courthouse. This bid was submitted by Mid-Tex of Midland. The only other bid was for \$123,000.

Installation of the elevator is a requirement by the Americans With Disabilities Act.

The court also voted to appoint Dan Griffith to the child welfare board. He replaces Freddy Fierro who has resigned.

Monthly reports were heard from John Stokes, auditor; Garland Young, civic and youth center director; Eddie Moore, road and parks department superintendent; Zoe Green, hospital/care center interim director; Louise Ledoux, librarian; and Janet McDaniel for Helping Hands.

Young told the court that his board of director voted to give two scholarships this year since none were given last year.

During his report, Moore asked approval to purchase a used 20-yard dump truck. Approval was given as the funds are available in his equipment budget for 1995.

Moore was asked by Commissioner Tambunga about his hiring policy. Tambunga said he has received complaints that the department is hiring only older people.

In response, Moore said he first makes sure the applicant is qualified for the job, has a valid Texas driver's license and good driving record. He said he has been hiring for experience lately as he had mostly younger people in the department.

Mrs. Green told the court 14 resumes have been received for the position of care center administrator. Five interviews have been scheduled, but one applicant was a no show.

Mrs. Green also told the court that a complaint of discrimination based on sex and race has been filed naming her and the county in connection with the hiring of a book-keeper for the care center. Responses to the complaint are underway.

This year's book sale is the best ever according to librarian Louise Ledoux.

A summer fundraiser for the library will be a cowboy poetry and singing program in July which is being put together by Sheriff Jim Wilson.

The Helping Hands report showed that 1076 meals were served in April. No commodities were received for distribution.

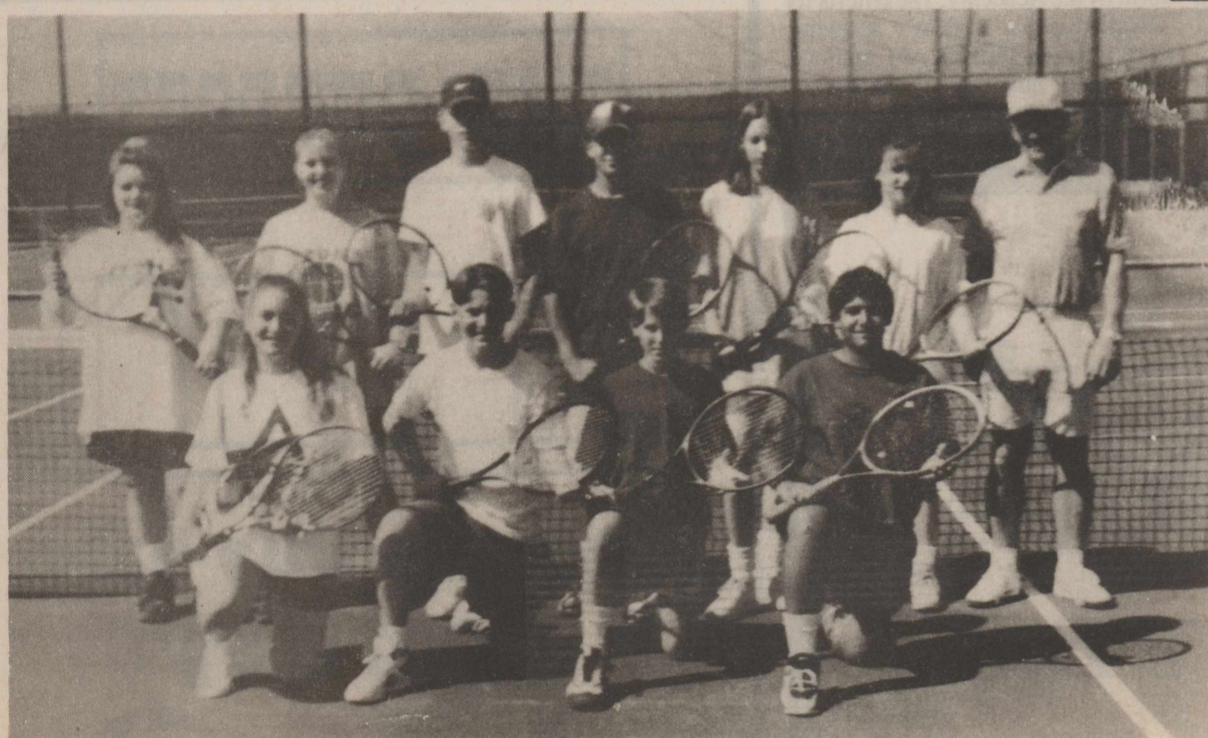

Dear Scottie and Linda:

Once again, the people of Ozona have been treated like stepchildren. Without regard to the wishes of the community, Classic Cable, the cable company that provides TV for Ozona, Sonora and Eldorado deleted KERA and WFAA from our local cable providers. (Circle Bar Television had absolutely nothing to do with the deletion.)

I had just made a contribution to KERA (PBS, Dallas) when it was deleted so I called Steve Smith, President of Classic Cable Co, whose office is in Austin, to protest its removal. He told me that it was his decision and if I didn't like it that was tough and I'd just have to learn to live with it; he then laughed quite heartily, told me that the Denver PBS station was just like the rest, that they were all the same and hung up the phone.

My next meeting with Steve Smith was at an Eldorado City Council meeting. The impression I had formed during my previous conversation was confirmed -- this guy doesn't care about anything or anybody. (You should have been there -- his presentation to the council members gave new meaning to the word, "doubletalk".)

Classic Cable, a Delaware Corp., is the operating company for WT Acquisitions, Inc, also a Delaware Corporation, both of which are doing business in Texas as foreign corporations. The incorporators are Alexander Green, a Justice of the Peace in South Houston and J. Merritt Belisle, allegedly an attorney located in Austin though I can find no indication that he has been admitted to the Texas Bar. The officers of WT Acquisitions and presumably of Classic Cable are Alexander Green, CEO, J. Merritt Belisle, Chairman of the Board, Steve Smith, President, Bryan Noteboom, Sec. Treas. and Cary Ferchill, Asst. Sec. Treas. (Cary is an attorney admitted to the Texas Bar.) It is my understanding that WT or Classic Cable borrowed money from the Texas Teacher Retirement System and I'm attempting to confirm this at the present time; Mr. John Carl, Director of Equities of the Teacher Retirement System is forwarding me a copy of their investment portfolio which should arrive today or tomorrow.

I think that if enough protest is made to the officers of the two corporations, the Teacher Retirement System (if they in fact did loan money to Classic or WT), The FCC and anyone else that you can think of, we may be able to convince them that they have made a grave error.

ATTENTION -- CIRCLE BAR CATV SUBSCRIBERS

As many of you already are aware; WFAA-Dallas cable channel 9 is no longer available on the Circle Bar CATV dial or Classic Cable dials in Christoval, Eldorado, or Sonora. Classic Cable management decided, without notification to Circle Bar CATV, to discontinue carriage of WFAA in lieu of KTXS-Sweetwater/Abilene. The WFAA signal was delivered from Dallas by multiple microwave relay sites via numerous other cable companies' equipment. The last company in the link prior to Circle Bar CATV is Classic Cable.

TCA (Marcus Cable) in San Angelo microwaves the Dallas signal from Lawn, Texas through several sites to San Angelo where it was relayed further south by Classic Cable. The San Angelo cable system is presently required by FCC rules to "black out" the Dallas signal to their subscribers during times of program duplication in order to protect the KTXS signal. These blackouts extend to approximately 95% of the day. Due to these blackouts, it is unclear whether the San Angelo cable system will continue to carry WFAA on a long-term basis.

The continued carriage of the WFAA signal, would require the additional construction of two financially prohibitive microwave relay sites between Miles and Ozona. It is not economically feasible for Circle Bar CATV to solely build and operate these sites for delivery of only one channel to one cable system. In light of these facts, Circle Bar CATV will no longer be able to provide WFAA to our subscribers.

On a more positive note, plans are in progress to add six channels to our basic dial to provide more diversified programming for our subscribers. These changes will occur pending receipt and installation of the necessary equipment. Those channels to be added are: HSE-(Home Sports Entertainment), HEADLINE NEWS, VH-1 (Video Hits 1), NICKELODEON, and LIFETIME. The DISNEY CHANNEL will become part of the basic service. SHOWTIME will also become available as an optional pay service for more movie selections. We feel that these new additions will provide something everyone will like.

Recycling Coming To Crockett County

Ozona residents should be able to recycle some materials in about two months according to Judge Jeffrey Sutton. At a called court meeting on May 2, commissioners voted to rent a collection site for recycling from Lankford Oil Company south of Wool Growers. Concho Valley Council of Governments will help fund the fencing of the site.

The location will include a receptacle for used oil which will be open during the day only. Bins will be available on a 24-hour basis to accept cans, cardboard and newspaper. Other items may be added later, Sutton said.

The court voted to reaffirm their affirmative action plan as adopted in 1993. This will be sent as part of a requirement for a Texas Community Development Program grant.

Rules and contracts for swimming pool management developed by the swimming pool board were reviewed and approved by the court. These rules require that pool man-

agers be certified as lifeguards.

Alice Espino was appointed by the court to serve on this board which is headed by Ronald Shaw.

In other appointments, Sostenes De Hoyos and Terry Dickerson were approved by the court to serve on the hospital/care center board. They replace Elma Buckner and Matt Gutierrez who recently resigned.

A contract to purchase the Tambunga property east of the courthouse and annex was approved. This purchase was scheduled to be completed on May 9.

Right-of-way fencing on County Road 208 was approved by the court. Four miles of road on Joe Bean will be fenced in anticipation of turning the road over to the state.

Commissioners approved keeping one Sheriff's Department vehicle which was scheduled for replacement instead of using it as a trade-in. This vehicle will be used for transporting prisoners to medical appointments, to pick up prisoners from other counties, to transport inmates to prisons and for work details and such.

Each year the best of the patrol vehicles that is to be replaced will replace this vehicle.

Commissioners also approved advertising for sale a 200'x60' area on the southernmost half of AA Street next to 14th Street behind Comfort Inn. A minimum bid of \$5,000 will be required.

The measure was at the request of motel owner J. R. Bhakta who wishes to purchase the property.

Lions Win Second In District Baseball

Fast balls and feathers flew as the Lions played both the Eldorado Eagles and the Van Horn Eagles in the District 5-2A baseball tournament held in Van Horn last Friday and Saturday. The Lions bounced back in their second game against Van Horn to take second place and advance to the bi-district contest.

"We had a good showing for the weekend," said Coach David Delgado. "We made some mistakes that put us behind, and we were not able to come back."

The Lions started the district tournament by facing Van Horn early Friday. They got the game going when Jessie Garza reached base on a single. He scored when Chris Sanchez hit a sacrifice fly, giving the Lions a 1-0 lead.

Ozونا came back in the second inning as Clay Westmoreland and Tony Valencia both hit singles. Two errors by Van Horn caused the Lions to score three runs. Jessie Garza hit a single and Chris Sanchez doubled to score two more runs to give the Lions a 6-0 lead at the end of two innings.

In the third, Westmoreland hit a double and scored on a single by Joe Esparza. Van Horn got busy in the bottom of the third with three runs on three walks and two hits to make the score Ozona 7, Van Horn 3.

Garza began the fourth inning with a walk, then stole second base. Andres De La Garza hit a double, scoring Garza to increase the Lions lead to 8-0 after four innings of play.

Van Horn came back in the fifth to score on an error and a base hit. They increased their score in the sixth by scoring three runs on two walks, an error and one hit to make the score Ozona 8, Van Horn 7.

Ozونا became somewhat concerned and came back in the seventh as Tony Valencia first reached base on an error. Valencia scored after base hits by Esparza and Pete Castaneda. Lance Jamerson loaded the bases after receiving a walk. De La Garza hit a single, bringing in three runs. Jon Sanchez and Justin Browne both walked to again load the bases. Valencia hit a long single to clean the bases, giving Ozona a 15-7 victory over Van Horn.

Chris Sanchez pitched six innings and struck out 13 batters. Jessie Garza pitched one inning to get the save.

Hot hitters for Ozona include Garza with two hits in four at bats, one walk, and three runs; Andres De La Garza had 3 of 5, and Clay Westmoreland hit 2 of 4.

"We had some good pitching by Chris with 13 strikeouts. We got off to an early start which helped us win the game," said Coach Delgado.

In the second game on Friday with Eldorado, Ozona picked up the first two runs when Pete Castaneda hit a single, scoring Lance Jamerson and Chris Sanchez.

Eldorado bounced back in the second with four runs, with three of those on Ozona errors. A sacrifice hit by Eldorado's Ricky Gutierrez scored one run to make the score Ozona 2, Eldorado 4 after two innings played.

Ozونا picked up one other run in the fifth inning when Lance Jamerson scored on a base hit by Castaneda.

Eldorado came back in the sixth inning and scored four runs on two walks, two singles and a double to make the final score Ozona 3, Eldorado 8.

Lance Jamerson was the hot hitter of the day with one of two at bats, two walks, and scored two runs. Pete Castaneda was the losing pitcher, going

five and one-third innings with four strikeouts. He batted two for four in the game.

"Those runs were unearned - they got them on our errors. They had a good pitcher that shut us down," said Coach Delgado.

On Saturday morning at 10 a.m., Ozona faced Eldorado again and continued to have problems with them. Ozona scored two runs in the third inning but couldn't get anything else going and fell to Eldorado 14-2.

In the third, Lance Jamerson reached base after getting hit by a pitch, and Jessie Garza walked. A double by Chris Sanchez brought in Jamerson and Garza for Ozona's only runs.

Eldorado's Pena reached base on an error. Gutierrez hit a double, bringing in Pena. Single by Neal and Snelson brought in two more runs giving Eldorado a 3-2 lead after three innings.

Eldorado got red hot in the fourth when 16 batters reached the plate. They had 8 hits, 4 walks and an error by Ozona to score 11 runs and end the game with an Eldorado 14-2 win. Ozona used three pitchers with Andres De La Garza, Garza and Castaneda. De La Garza got the loss.

"They (Eldorado) came out red hot, and they played superb! We were not able to get anything going either offensively or defensively," said Delgado.

The Lions had their last chance to come back and get second place with a win over Van Horn. They started play at 2 p.m. with Van Horn going to bat first.

Van Horn put three runs on the scoreboard from three singles and an Ozona error to get the game rolling.

Ozونا fought back in the first inning, when Jamerson, Garza and Chris Sanchez all walked - loading the bases. An error by Van Horn scored Jamerson. A fielder's choice by Pete Castaneda scored Garza. Ramon Longoria reached base on a walk, and Jon Sanchez hit a single, scoring three more runs and giving Ozona a 5-3 lead.

Good fortune came to the Lions again in the second inning as Jamerson and Garza both walked. They both stole bases, reaching second and third, respectively. A single hit by Andres De La Garza scored both base runners, giving Ozona a 7-3 lead.

In the fourth inning, Van Horn came back with three singles and a walk to score two runs, making the score 7-5 Ozona. They also added a run in the sixth when an Eagle reached base on an error and scored on a teammate's fielder's choice.

Ozونا bounced back in the bottom of the sixth, when Chris Sanchez reached base on an error. Castaneda hit a double, scoring Sanchez. Jon Sanchez next hit a single and brought in Castaneda for a run and a 9-6 Ozona win.

Pete Castaneda pitched four and two-thirds innings, had two strikeouts and was the winning pitcher. Chris Sanchez relieved Castaneda, pitching one and one-third inning to get the save and had three strikeouts. He also

scored two runs.

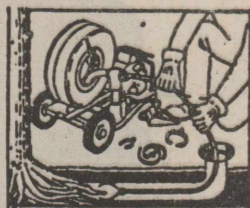

You Can't Score In The Game Of Life If You Don't Have A Goal To Shoot At

Is there any sport that you know of that does not have some means for a team or an individual to make a score? What would happen if two football teams came onto the field and discovered that there was not a goal line on the field? What about two basketball teams coming out to warm up and finding that someone had removed the goals? These games can not be played without goals. If it is necessary to have goals in order to play a simple game, might it not also be necessary and extremely important to have goals in our everyday lives?

We have been talking about success. We have said so far that in order to be successful we have to have two things. The first is self-discipline. The second is a plan. This plan is formed during the process of goal setting.

Mark Twain said, "Inherently, each one of us has the substance within to achieve whatever our goals and dreams define. What is missing from each of us is the training, education, knowledge and insight to utilize what we already have."

In order for goals to be effective they must be written down. Goals not written down are nothing but wishes. There is an old saying, "If wishes were horses then beggars would ride". Goals not written down can make beggars out of us all.

What kind of goals should you have? How do you decide what your goals should be? Well, what kind of life do you want to have? Do you want to be a "no limit" type of person, or do you want to go through life playing it safe? Your goals should reflect the type of life that you want to live. You have to decide.

As I read books and listen to tapes, by and about successful people, I run across many accounts of written goals. Their goals cover anything that you can imagine. That is what is so neat about goals. They are your dreams. They are not anyone else's. They are the roadmap that you lay out for your life. Your goals are another place that you utilize natural laws. "Ask and you will receive."

You need to have many types of goals, your goals should reflect planning for occupational, financial, educational, health, spiritual, leisure time and other areas of your life. These are

in no way all inclusive. But, you get the idea of what I mean. There is no limit. Whatever you think that you want to do in your lifetime should be reflected in a written goal.

I recommend that if you are married you include your spouse in the goal setting exercise. A part of your overall goal plan should contain some family goals. If you have children that are old enough to share ideas they should also be included. When you set off on your journey you want to have all of the support that you can get. If your family helps in forming the goals, then they will also have a stake in seeing that the goals are achieved.

I also recommend that everyone who is going to participate in the goal writing exercise get off by themselves in whatever type setting they usually use when they want to write or create something. They need to have plenty of writing materials so that they will not have to stop writing to get more. It is very important not to be interrupted. Once you start writing you should not stop until you have completely run out of ideas. It is very important to remember that there are no dumb ideas when you are creating goals. You use ideas to build on. One thought triggers another.

When you begin writing, do not try to write goals. Just jot down everything that comes to mind about anything that you can dream about that you want out of life. This is truly your dream list. Don't stop to think about it.

Just write it down. This is the same type technique that large corporations use to problem solve. After you have completely exhausted every aspect of an idea you have finished this part of your goal writing. Collect the writings from all of those that participated in this part of the planning. We will go into what to do with these ideas next time.

It is never too early or too late to begin setting goals. As I drive around West Texas, I make it a practice to carry motivational tapes with me in the car and play them on those long boring trips between towns. On my way to Odessa last weekend for the Area 18 Special Olympics Games I was listening to a tape program by Mark Victor Hansan. He had a story about a six-year-old boy who had a goal with nine steps. This goal has enabled him to correspond with presidents and world leaders, appear on a nationally televised talk show and

make \$2500. Another was about a man 108 years old. After the man turned 100 he made more money than he ever had in his life. He had even structured a real estate sale that would generate \$4000 a month for the next 30 years. You can create goals anytime. You can accomplish them at any age.
