

Postmaster At **Old Hurley Visits** After 40 Years

A real pioneer of the Muleshoe country, who has been away 40 years without returning, was an amazed visitor here last week.

John F. Metsker, who for 51/2 years was storekeeper and postmaster at Old Hurley, a town that exists only in the memory of the oldtimers, couldn't find words to tell about his astonishment at the growth of the city and community. He could hardly find where he used to live. He left here in 1914.

The Mteskers spent a couple of by Mrs. Metsker and their daughter, Alyce. They live in Lawrence, Kans., where they operate an old folks rest home.

He was the first postmaster in the county. Mr. Metsker was also deputy tax collector when the county was attached to Castro County; and he remembers paying the princely sum of 38c for his county taxes on a quarter section of land. Hugh Freeman, our present tax accesser and collector, hardly would be satisfied these days with this payment on most any quarter you pick out.

Mr. Metsker came here in 1908, on the same train in the same immigrant car with the late Josh Blocher. They came from around Lawrence. In the box car they had all their household goods, proved a quarter section just west of Old Hurley. He and Mr. Blocher maintained a sporadic correspondence until Mr. Blocher's death.

Distress Loans On Wheat During Harvest Sought

WACO, June 1 - J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, said this week he hoped the U.S. Department of Agriculture approves distress loans on wheat stored on the ground before the harvest rush on available elevator space be-

Unless such loans are approved, wheat producers will have to find government approved storage for their grain to be eligible for government loans under price support regulations. With large Commodity Credit Corporation stocks already in Lee Pool storage, the problem is expected to be acute when the 1954 wheat

and grain sorghum harvests be

Hammond has been negotiating with USDA officials in Wash ington since March, trying to get approval of emergency loans for grain stored on the ground. He said he has urged them to announce approval before the harvest rush begins to avert "dis-

It was just five years ago, 1949, that Hammond originated the idea of storing wheat on the ground. At that time, he led a one-man crusade to get his ideas approved.

Elevator operators claimed that storage space for government loans for the 1949 crop was not available. After the harvest rush began, some farmers were forced to sell at prices far below the government loan price.

Hammond appealed directly to President Truman, and the following day the government announced its approval of loans for wheat stored in the open. Elevators immediately opened their bins to farmers, and very little if any, wheat was actually piled on the ground.

The government approved emergency loans for on the ground storage last year, but not until after the harvest had begun. Wheat prices shot upward immediately after the announcement
