TAAS Tests Available To Public

ment of Academic Skills (TMS) testing program has been completed for the 1994-95 school year, Commissioner of Education Mike Moses has approved the release for public inspection of the actual examination questions on the March 1995 exit level tests, the March 1995 Grades 4 and 8 writing tests, and the May 1995 Grades 3 through 8 mathematics and reading tests.

"The district is extending a special invitation to everyone who would like to see any or all of the tests by setting up a display of them in the central administration building board room. 

Acquired by TPWD in 1988, the 19,988-acre state natural area contains about one mile of picturesque Devil's River frontage where a series of springs produce a flow of more than 12,000 gallons per minute. As a result, the water is crystal clear and offers excellent fishing for bass and catfish. These springs on the state natural area produce a substantial amount of the entire river's flow.

Devil's River was nominated as a National Wild River in 1968 because it is free of impoundments, generally inaccessible, primitive and unpolluted.

Major issues for TPWD include resource protection, utilization of existing facilities and possible new visitor facilities such as restrooms and picnic areas. Access to Devil's River SNA is currently restricted to holders of the Texas Conservation Passport, a \$25 annual pass that provides free entry to state parks, guided tours and other benefits. A bunkhouse at the site sleeps 10 people for \$75 per night and transportation to the river is available. Reservations are required and can be made by calling site manager Bill Armstrong at 210-392-2133.

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





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Absolute Right And Wrong?

We live in a day of moral relativism. We don't believe in absolutes. We define what's good in terms of what works. If it's good for me, it's good. But such a position is just plain foolish. The very concept of goodness begs for definition. If there is good, there is also bad. But in comparison to what? There must be an absolute standard somewhere. How so? Even our insistence there are no absolutes is absolute

According to the Bible, the Ten Commandments are good. They are absolutely good. "The Law is holy, and the commandment is holy and righteous and good" (Romans 7:12). First of all, we know these absolutes

are real from personal experience. When we violate them, we feel guilt.

Even people who reject the Ten Commandments and have nothing to do with them "show the work of the Law written in their hearts, their conscience bearing witness, and their thoughts alternately accusing or else defending them" (Romans 2:15). When our consciences hurt, we know we are wrong. When we do what is right, we feel good.

Second, the existence of conscience and the sense of guilt are universal. True, not all people feel guilt for the same things. But, guilt exists when we do wrong. We cannot avoid this. It's how we are made. It's also evidence the Ten Commandments are absolutely good.
