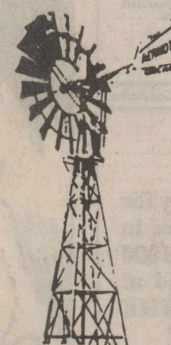
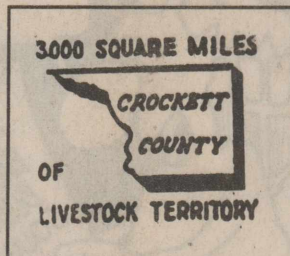

"Never let your fear of tomorrow be your excuse for not pursuing your dreams. An impressive number of local scholarships were given to the class during the ceremony. Principal John Curry presented the Crockett County Arts and Crafts Guild scholarship to Doug Meador, who also received the Greater Texas Productions scholarship and a First Baptist Youth scholarship, presented by Leandro Gonzales. Gonzales also presented First Baptist Youth scholarships to Clay Westmoreland and Justin Moran.

The Crockett County Fair Association scholarships were presented by Pleas Childress Sr. to JoLynn Vannoy and Justin Moran. Vannoy also received the Dan Bean Memorial 4-H

Scholarship presented by David Bean. Marolyn Bean represented the Ozona Woman's Forum in recognizing Vannoy as Best Citizen. This award was started in 1953 and recipients' names are placed on a plaque which hangs in the high school.

Excited fans from both Ozona and Coahoma crammed into the small, sunbaked stands of the Lake View Chiefs Field last Thursday for a bi-district baseball game.

The Ozona Lions Baseball team jumped out to an early lead, came back in the last inning but fell short in the scorebook as Coahoma beat Ozona 10-6 in a Class 2A bi-district playoff game.

The Bulldogs (18-15-1) advance to the area round of the Class 2A playoffs against Stamford. Winning the game for the Bulldogs was ace pitcher Brandon McGuire who increased his season record to 11-1.

The Lions ended their season with a record of 13-5. Lions baseball Coach David Delgado said, "As for the year, we did better than expected. Hope-

fully, this year will set the standard for years to come. I have enjoyed this season, and I would like to thank the kids for their hard work, especially the seniors, who will be missed next year."

Coahoma went to bat first as Lion senior pitcher Chris Sanchez started pitching hard. Sanchez struck out two players and a third player was put out on second.

Ozona's Jesse Garza got the game rolling with a walk. Chris Sanchez pounded a two-run homer to dead center to give Ozona an early 2-0 lead. Coahoma came back in the second inning after Sanchez walked three batters and the next batter hit a sacrifice fly to score a teammate.

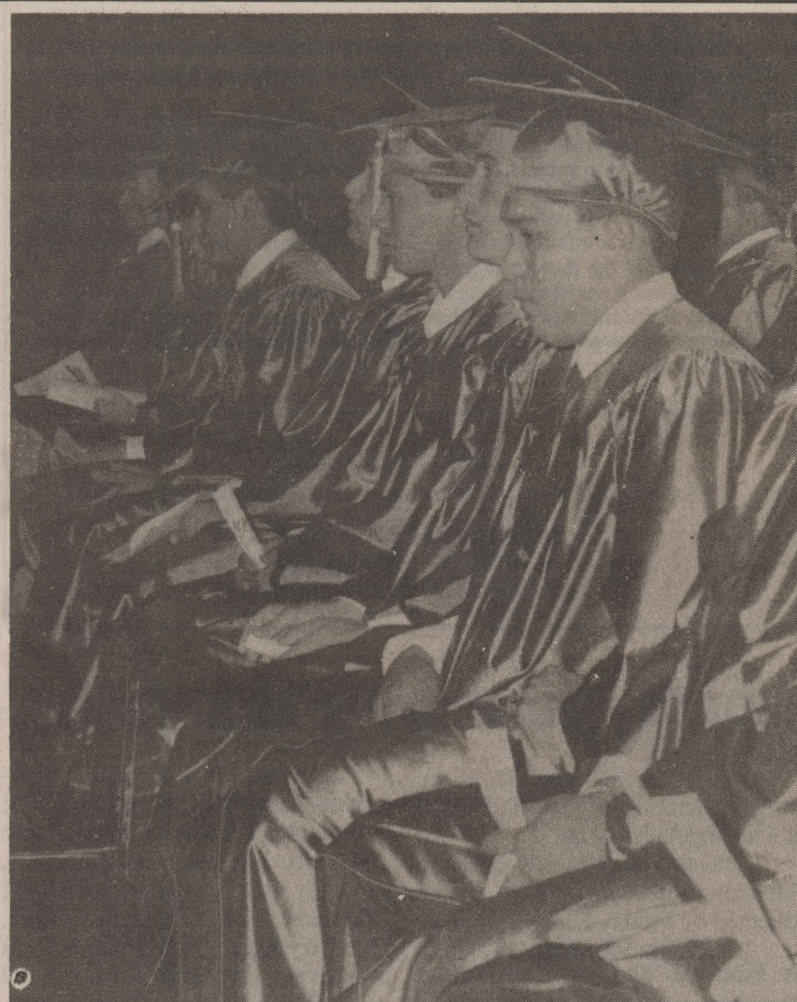
Caps and T-shirts are being sold. Cost is \$10 for caps and \$12 for T-shirts; they are available at various businesses in town.

Resolution Asks For Changes In Endangered Species Act

Rep. Bob Turner has recently been informed that Gov. George W. Bush signed House Concurrent Resolution 65 regarding the Federal Endangered Species Act that is due for reauthorization. HCR 65 is a directive from the Texas Legislature to the United States Congress asking the Congress for a more balanced, common sense approach to habitat and species protection that does not jeopardize this nation's economic and social well-being or endanger the constitutional rights of property owners.

Specifically, this resolution strongly urges the Congress to renew the Federal Endangered Species Act with the following changes - the addition of language to favor private property rights, a stronger role for the states, and consideration of social and economic issues in all stages of the process under the Act. Copies of this

resolution will be forwarded by the Texas Secretary of State to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate of the United States Congress and to all members of the Texas delegation of the Congress with the request that it be officially entered in the Congressional Record as a formal request to the Congress of the United States of America.

"I am extremely pleased that HCR 65 has been so overwhelmingly supported in the Texas Legislature by members of both political parties and by the Governor," said Turner. "By their votes, the supporters of this resolution have shown that they believe that the current Endangered Species Act is long overdue for revision, and that the new legislation must recognize the proper roles of the states and the constitutionally-guaranteed rights of private landowners."

TAAS Tests Available To Public

Now that the state's Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAS) testing program has been completed for the 1994-95 school year, Commissioner of Education Mike Moses has approved the release for public inspection of the actual examination questions on the March 1995 exit level tests, the March 1995 Grades 4 and 8 writing tests, and the May 1995 Grades 3 through 8 mathematics and reading tests.

According to Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton, who is TMS coordinator for the school district, the released tests were received last Thursday and are now available for viewing by anyone who would like to see the tests. "The district is extending a special invitation to everyone who would like to see any or all of the tests by setting up a display of them in the central administration building board room. This display will remain in the board room through Friday, June 2. Each campus principal also has copies of the test for their specific grade levels for public viewing," Cotton said.

Cotton also explained that there are only minor differences in the form of the tests given students and what has been released publicly. Instead of being released as separate testing booklets, such as one each for math,

reading, and writing for a particular grade level, the released versions for each grade are contained in one book per grade level. Also, TAAS field test items, which are necessary for building future forms of the tests, are not included, but Cotton emphasized that all of the test questions that determine a student's mastery or nonmastery of TAAS this year are included in the books.

He also said that the public release of the 1995 actual examination questions by Commissioner Moses may be only on a "one-time basis" and that it will be up to the legislature to decide whether it wants to pay for releasing future versions of the exam. The Texas Education Agency estimates that it will cost about \$6 million each year to completely reformulate the TAAS testing series if the exams are publicly released each year.

"Regardless of whether or not this disclosure is on a one-time basis or on an annual basis, the school district supports the decision by Commissioner Moses and is celebrating the revealing of the tests to the general public by inviting everyone to see all of these tests which are located in the central administration board room. Come on by, sit down for some coffee or soft drink, and view these tests at your leisure," Cotton said.

1995 Ends Teaching Career For Mrs. Spiller

Margaret Spiller retires this year after 29 years in the public school system, with 27 of those years in Ozona. Her devotion to children and education was recognized last week at an awards banquet. A pin commemorating the 29 years, the traditional school plaque and a plaque from the campuses were presented to the deserving educator.

"To honor your career in teaching, for dedicating your life to the art and science of teaching, for practicing your profession with compassion and dignity, and for holding the well-being of your students as your primary concern always," said the all-school plaque, fitting words for one who devoted her life to children.

Margaret Spiller began her teaching career in Reagan County where she was business teacher and annual sponsor for two years. Since coming to Ozona she has taught in all schools, primary for 16 years, intermediate for five years and the remainder in high school. She has also been yearbook sponsor since moving to high school.

The Odessa native attended Odessa College for two years then completed her bachelor's degree with two years at Sul Ross in Alpine. She and Walter Spiller, who is also retired from the Ozona schools, married in Carlsbad, NM. They have one son, Mel, of San Antonio.

Her retirement will allow them to do what they want to do, Mrs. Spiller says. They may travel some, but she has definite plans to do all the hobbies she hasn't gotten to do in years such as crochet, paint, embroidery, quilt - everything except knit.

"I've had a blessing that most teachers don't," said the new retiree. "I started them out and got to see how

they finished. "It's been a fine career. Many kids have passed my way."

TPWD To Discuss Devil's River Natural Area

The future of Devil's River State Natural Area in Val Verde County will be discussed at 7 p.m. May 25 at the La Quinta Inn, 2005 Ave. F in Del Rio. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department planners want public input on how the state natural area should be developed.

Acquired by TPWD in 1988, the 19,988-acre state natural area contains about one mile of picturesque Devil's River frontage where a series of springs produce a flow of more than 12,000 gallons per minute. As a result, the water is crystal clear and offers excellent fishing for bass and catfish. These springs on the state natural area produce a substantial amount of the entire river's flow.

Devil's River was nominated as a National Wild River in 1968 because it is free of impoundments, generally inaccessible, primitive and unpolluted.

Major issues for TPWD include resource protection, utilization of existing facilities and possible new visitor facilities such as restrooms and picnic areas. The site has an old camping area with water and electrical hookups that was once operated as a private business. TPWD is considering renovating and reopening this

camping ground and a cabin on the river which could be rented to canoers, anglers and others.

Devil's River SNA has a reputation as one of the most outstanding state natural areas in Texas. Endangered species such as the black-capped vireo are found there. The area contains 210 known archaeological sites, including Native American rock art drawings that are in some cases thousands of years old.

Access to Devil's River SNA is currently restricted to holders of the Texas Conservation Passport, a \$25 annual pass that provides free entry to state parks, guided tours and other benefits. A bunkhouse at the site sleeps 10 people for \$75 per night and transportation to the river is available. Reservations are required and can be made by calling site manager Bill Armstrong at 210-392-2133.

At the meeting, TPWD master planning staff and resources management specialists will present the proposed land-use plan for the area. The public may comment at the hearing or send written comments to Don Koenig, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744.

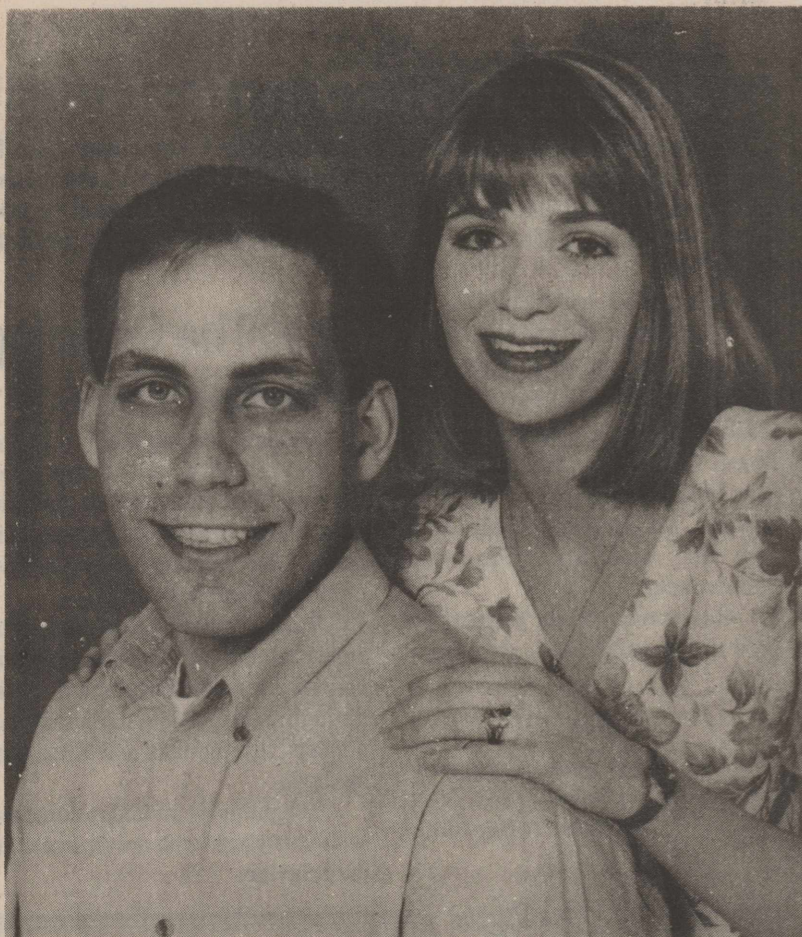

It usually takes four to six weeks to get the new card. And remember, there's no charge for the replacement card.

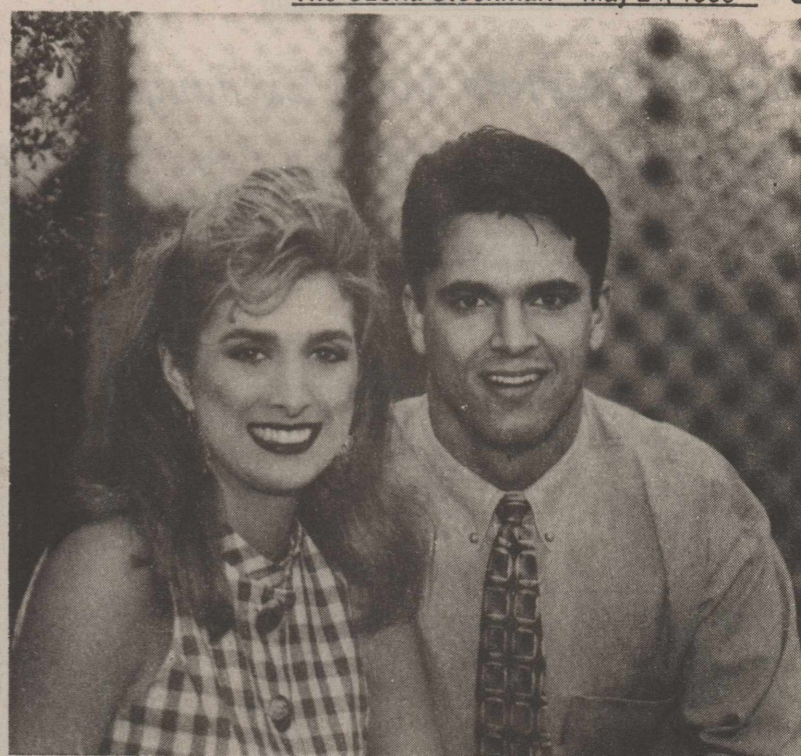

Absolute Right And Wrong?

We live in a day of moral relativism. We don't believe in absolutes. We define what's good in terms of what works. If it's good for me, it's good. But such a position is just plain foolish. The very concept of goodness begs for definition. If there is good, there is also bad. But in comparison to what? There must be an absolute standard somewhere. How so? Even our insistence there are no absolutes is absolute.

According to the Bible, the Ten Commandments are good. They are absolutely good. "The Law is holy, and the commandment is holy and righteous and good" (Romans 7:12). First of all, we know these absolutes

are real from personal experience. When we violate them, we feel guilt. Even people who reject the Ten Commandments and have nothing to do with them "show the work of the Law written in their hearts, their conscience bearing witness, and their thoughts alternately accusing or else defending them" (Romans 2:15). When our consciences hurt, we know we are wrong. When we do what is right, we feel good.

Second, the existence of conscience and the sense of guilt are universal. True, not all people feel guilt for the same things. But, guilt exists when we do wrong. We cannot avoid this. It's how we are made. It's also evidence the Ten Commandments are absolutely good.

All too often, severe weather causes power outages. Wind, fallen tree limbs, and lightning can damage lines or equipment causing these outages. Whenever an outage occurs, WTU works nonstop to restore your service as quickly as possible. We know the inconvenience outages cause — and we appreciate your patience and cooperation. Here are some steps you can take to weather an outage safely — and with as little inconvenience — as possible.

- ### IN A POWER OUTAGE:
- CHECK IT OUT.**
When your power goes out, check all fuses and breakers. If they're O.K., check with your neighbors. If power is out around you, CALL WTU. You'll find our number in your local phone book, or on your WTU bill!
 - KEEP WTU PHONE LINES OPEN.**
From the moment you call WTU, help is on the way — so a second call isn't necessary. Please leave our lines open for other callers.
 - REPORT FALLEN UTILITY LINES.**
If you see a fallen power line, don't even go near it! And, keep others away, too! Call WTU, the police, or the fire department immediately.
 - UNPLUG APPLIANCES.**
It's a good idea to turn off your air conditioner and unplug televisions, major appliances, and computers during storms. If you experience an outage, you may want to leave them unplugged until power is restored. Don't open your refrigerator or freezer unless absolutely necessary.
 - BE CAREFUL WITH GENERATORS.**
If you have access to a portable generator, please do not plug it directly into your circuit breaker box. It's unsafe — especially for repair crews. Plug appliances and lamps directly into the generator.
 - PLEASE BE PATIENT.**
You may see a WTU truck in your neighborhood leaving before your power comes back on. This is not unusual. We send people out to assess the extent and cause of an outage. The source of your outage might be several blocks away.
 - CHECK ON YOUR NEIGHBORS.**
