Editorial

The most disturbing thing about Monday's early morning meeting of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board isn't that a meeting had to be held, but rather that it had the appearance of being the "frosting on the cake."

Granted, the hospital district's last regular meeting was one of the ugliest we've ever seen, but we did notice a bright moment or two within it. What we're talking about was new board member Ann McElroy's questions to MAHD's chief executive officer, Jim Bone, and to others speaking before the board.

It was obvious that McElroy has yet to succumb to the temptation to which many public board members succumb, that of getting answers to questions prior to the actual meeting. Often, such answers come from an administrative officer under the board, and sometimes ages 2 to 11 is every from other board members.

And while there isn't anything wrong with either method of fact finding — unless the board members have a quorum present when this public business is being discussed — it creates at least the perception that business isn't actually being conducted within public view.

It was obvious at Monday's meeting that the discussion of whether the way the hospital district's business practices should be reviewed by an outside entity had been thoroughly discussed prior to the meeting. Hence, the reference to cake frosting. All of the board's "baking" appeared to have taken place prior to the meeting, and the only business conducted in public view was pure decoration.

This was even more evident when you consider that one board member asked another if he had decided how to word his motion prior to the start of the meeting.

The only item on Monday's agenda read, "Consider requesting Covenant Health System Regional Services to conduct an operations evaluation of Muleshoe Area Hospital District." The motion, second and vote were only a few seconds longer than the motion, second and vote to adjourn the meeting which immediately followed.

We agree with the hospital board that an independent Narnia Chronicles by C. S. evaluation of the hospital and its operation would benefit the district. But, as were many in attendance Monday, we question how independent a study conducted by an entity as closely tied to MAHD and its administration as is Covenant can be.

Many years ago, Mark Twain wrote about Tom Sawyer standing by as a group of boys whitewashed a fence for him. At Muleshoe Monday, it appeared that literature, if not history, is about to repeat itself.



God Allow Suffering?

How can a good and powerful God allow suffering?

That has always been a good and powerful question, and one asked most often and most poignantly in the midst of shock, pain, and perplexity.

The question is a very good question, one which defies easy and glib answers. The answer of the Christian faith is not easy, and it is given through tears.

If God is absolutely good and powerful and loving, nothing less, how can he allow suffering?



Perhaps the deepest answer is itself an even more difficult question: "How can even a good, powerful, and loving God not allow suffering?"

When God created humanity in his own image, he gave us the amazing gift which gives life and love meaning but which of necessity also opens us up to pain. He gave us free will. God gave us the capacity to choose good or to choose evil. Puppets dangling from a divine string would never make the wrong move or dance the wrong dance, but would their dancing have any meaning or joy at all? And if the terrible choice for hate and evil and despair were no option at all, would choosing for love and goodness and hope hold any real meaning or joy at all?

In a free universe, our choices are invested with deep meaning. Would the love of your spouse so warm your heart if she had no real choice but to give it? Would the hugs of your three-year-old daughter so light up your life if there were no possibility that she might choose to turn away? Would our love of the God of all joy and light mean anything if he had not given us the freedom to choose to spurn him and follow evil and the Prince of Darkness instead?

It's one thing to ask those questions when life seems good. It's quite another to ask them when the whole fabric of your universe seems to have been ripped into shreds and pain and evil and wickedness seem to be masters of the day. Most of us have seen those times. But thank God himself we have also seen the awesome power of goodness, fierce love, and nobility even in the midst of the deepest pain.

How we wish there was another way, but God himself could not create a universe where we could see the beauty of the one without the terrible possibility of the other. Christianity asserts that ours is a God, so good, so powerful, so loving, that through his own unfathomable pain, he gave his Son to save us from evil so that one eternal day pain and suffering will be forever banished

"Weeping may tarry for the night," writes the Psalmist, "but joy comes in the morning.

Dear God, when we or those we love are walking through a long and exceedingly dark and difficult night, grant us the faith, the strength, and the vision only you can give as we look up for the light of the morning.

Services were held for Raleigh Mason of Muleshoe on Wednesday, Aug. 3, 2005, at 2 p.m., in the First Baptist Church in Muleshoe with Curtis Shelburne officiating. Burial followed in Muleshoe Memorial Park Cemetery of Muleshoe. Raleigh Mason was



born in Junction, Texas, on RALEIGH MASON

Feb. 12, 1922, to Maggie and Bill Mason. He died in his home in Muleshoe, Texas, on July 31,2005.

A lifetime Texan, farmer and rancher, Mr. Mason's love of the land reflected his love of his fellow man. Just as he tilled and tended the soil to produce its riches, he quietly nurtured family and friends into full bloom.

Mr. Mason graduated from Divide High School in Nolan, Texas, where he met and fell in love with Lauranette Hawkins and began the love story that became his life.

During World War II, he served in the U.S. Army Air Corps with the 340th Bomb Group, 486 Bomb Squadron, as a turret gunner on a B25 aircraft. His plane was shot down on a mission to bomb enemy gun positions at Roverto, Italy, on April 4, 1945, and he was reported missing in action.

He was held in a prison of war camp and was liberated after six weeks and then returned to the home of his parents, Bill and Maggie Mason in Snyder, Texas, to marry Lauranette. They made their home in Muleshoe where he worked his entire life as a farmer and rancher.

He leaves a legacy of patience, sweetness, gentleness, kindness and love to those who survive him: His wife Lauranette Mason of Muleshoe; his two daughters - Beckye Conklin, married to Norris Conklin of Muleshoe, and Sheryl Sullivan of Waxahachie, Texas; his grandchildren, who knew him as Piedad -Kelly Conklin and her husband Mark Heidel of Eu Claire, Wis., Mason Conklin of Norman, Okla., Jason Sullivan of Dallas, Texas, and Yacob Mustafa, currently serving in the United States Army in Afghanistan; his brothers and sisters - Raymond and Masie Mason of Arlington, Texas, Clarence and Sondra Mason of Lubbock, Velma McCully of San Angelo, Della and Frank Herring of Abilene; many nieces and nephews and a host of friends.

Mr. Mason was preceded in death by his parents, Bill and Maggie Mason, and his brother, Bill.
