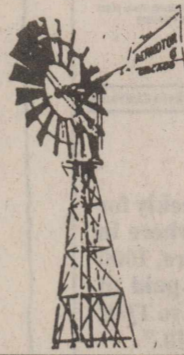
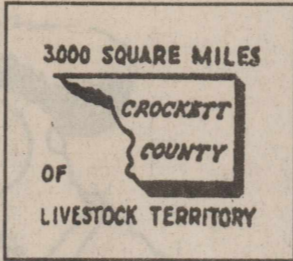

## Bond Election Passes

All four propositions of a \$910,000 bond election passed Saturday, paving the way for a new courthouse annex, providing funding for construction and improvement at the public library, money for construction and equipping of a county services building and renovation and improvement to the courthouse.

Sixteen percent of the county's 2577 registered voters turned out for the election.

Proposition 1, which provides \$695,000 for constructing, improving

and equipping a courthouse annex, received 200 votes for and 182 against, an 18 vote difference.

Proposition 2 passed by an even narrower margin, with 196 for and 185 against, providing \$80,000 for constructing, equipping and improving a building to be used for a public library.

Proposition 3, providing \$80,000 for constructing, equipping and improving a county services building, which will include facilities for senior citizens, received 216 votes for and

178 against, a difference of 38 votes.

Proposition 4, which provides \$55,000 for renovating and improving the existing courthouse was approved by 84 votes with 235 voting for and 151 against.

Sale of bonds cannot begin until 30 days after the election. The money should be here two to three weeks after bonds are sold according to Judge Jeffrey Sutton. The funds can only be spent for the specified uses and must be expended within three years.

## Accident Kills Two Ozonans

Santos and Enrique Longoria, ages 60 and 61, were killed in an accident at Ozona's downtown intersection Saturday morning about 5 a.m. when their pickup was struck by a car driven by Jesse Daniel Caldera.

The Longorias' 1988 Chevrolet S-10 was hit in the driver's side as they traveled north on Hwy. 163 and carried 110 feet east along 11th Street (Loop 466) according to DPS Trooper Ben English who investigated the accident.

Caldera, age 20, was eastbound at a high rate of speed in a 1983 Oldsmobile 98 Regency, English said. His vehicle traveled 100 feet past the point of impact. Caldera, who was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital, walked from the accident scene to the sheriff's office to summon help.

Caldera was arrested at his home without incident at 3:15 p.m. Tuesday on two counts of intoxicated manslaughter, a second degree felony. This is a new charge established by the legislature, according to Trooper English.

English, Trooper Roger Dixon and Constable Raymond Borrego made the arrest.

"We waited until we saw exactly what kind of evidence we had on this, took statements from citizens and collected physical evidence before making the arrest," English said. He expressed appreciation for the assistance in the investigation from other Troopers, the Sheriff's Department, EMS, fire department and citizens who came forward with statements.

## Escapee Has Brief Freedom

Jesse Borrego Rodriguez made a dash for freedom Monday afternoon, but was caught some two minutes after fleeing from Crockett County Jail.

Rodriguez crawled under a wire mesh enclosure while using the telephone in the jail and ran out the front door. Onlookers said he attempted to take a car belonging to Freddy Funeral Home, then stripped out of his orange jail coveralls, and, wearing only briefs and socks, jumped over the fence between the back of the school's FFA Building and the funeral home.

Chief Deputy Alton Davis, who was already in pursuit, caught up with the escapee when he was trying to

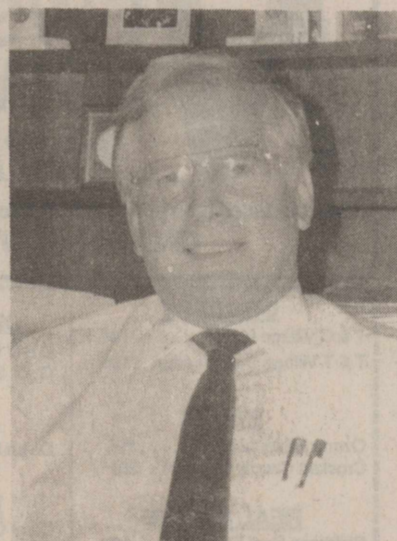

"I'm really happy to be here and everyone is real nice," said Sorrells. "I wanted to come back to a smaller West Texas community."

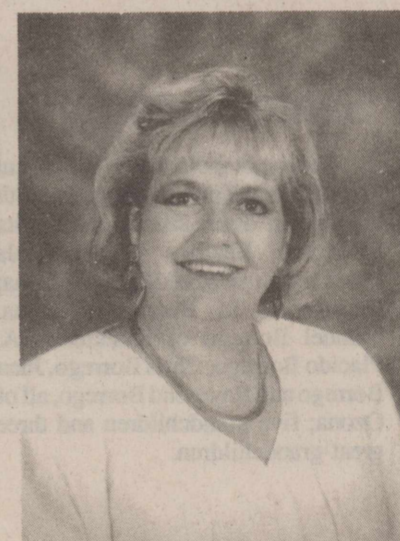

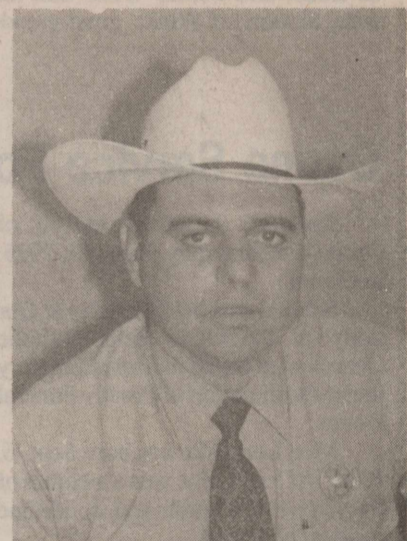

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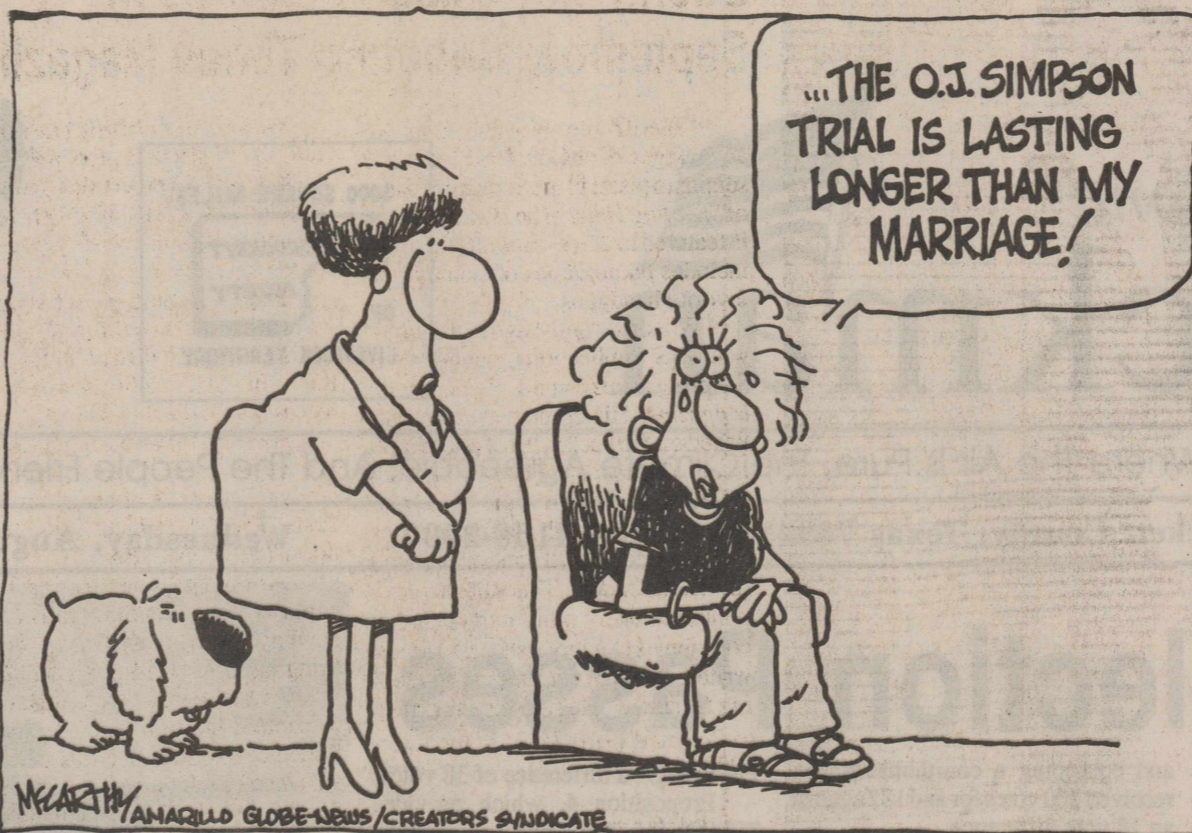

## Workshops

I will be attending a library workshop hosted by the Big Country Library System in Abilene on Aug 17. *Using CD-ROM Software for Reference Services* will be presented by Margaret I. Nichols, who is a consultant, author, and retired professor from the University of North Texas. Mrs. Nichols will be teaching the pros and cons of utilizing CD-ROM sources to support public library reference services, and will be presenting the technology and terminology associated with CD-ROMs and other electronic resources.

On Sep 26 & 27, I will be going to San Antonio to visit the brand new San Antonio Public Library and to attend session 4 of the Small Library Management Training Program. The SLMT Program is presented by the Texas State Library

Continuing Education Division and is an ongoing 3 year series of training programs designed to provide public librarians college level library science training. Session 4 will be presented by Christine Peterson, State Library Automation Consultant and will include automation vendors demonstrating their software and Q&A periods so that all participants will be able to try each system.

Both of these workshops are very timely, since our library is working with the Big Country Library System to form the BCLS Library Network, and to access the Internet. I am looking forward to bringing back lots of information that I can use to provide better reference service for Crockett County and to make the Library Network project a success.

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## Sheriff Jim Wilson Featured In September Shooting Times Magazine

Sheriff Jim Wilson touts the advantages of a Colt 1911 .45 ACP semiauto pistol in the September issue of *Shooting Times*. The lawman/writer is featured in a five-page article which includes photographs of some of his favorite handguns.

Wilson recently signed a contract with PJS Publications, publishers of *Shooting Times* and *Handgunning Magazine*. His column will be published on the back page of every other issue of *Shooting Times*. Fittingly called "Gun Smoke", the September column is filled with old Ranger tales.

The sheriff will continue to write for *Handloader*. This magazine is published every other month, and he contributes to every issue. He has also written for *Guns & Ammo* and *Hunting Horizons*. He sold his first article to *Petersen's Handguns* in the fall of 1990.

Promoting Crockett County hunting through his magazine articles is one of Wilson's goals. "We have as good a hunting situation here as about anywhere in the state. One of the things I can do is let folks know," Wilson said. He sees the results of this promotion when people who have leased here as a result of his articles or those of Gary Sitton come by the sheriff's office.

An annual celebrity hunt organized by Wilson is planned for the week before DeerFest this year, and he plans to ask attending gun writers and industry representatives to stay on for the event.

Sheriff Wilson says he was always interested in writing; he majored in history and English at Texas Christian University with an eye toward teaching at the college level.

He had always been interested in law enforcement, too, and decided to get law enforcement out of his blood first. This hasn't happened yet, and doesn't seem likely to.

A lifelong interest in western and southwestern history, music and cowboy poetry stems from his upbringing in Austin and San Antonio.

Wilson began work in law enforcement in 1968 with the Denton Police Department. He was a lieutenant when he left there to become chief deputy at the Denton County Sheriff's Department in 1976. He came to Ozona in 1985 as chief deputy and was elected sheriff in 1988, taking office in 1989.

His wife Janet also has a background in law enforcement, having been on the Flower Mound Police Department and Denton County Sheriff's Department. She is currently an Eligibility Specialist II with the Texas Department of Human Services.

## Social Security: 60 Years And Still Going Strong

Aug. 14 marked the 60th anniversary of the signing of the Social Security Act - legislation that now touches the lives of nearly every U.S. citizen. More than 90 percent of all workers are in jobs covered by Social Security, and one in every six Americans receives a monthly Social Security benefit.

When he signed the Social Security Act on Aug. 14, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt said, "We can never insure one hundred percent of the population against one hundred percent of the hazards and vicissitudes of life, but we have tried to frame a law which will give some measure of protection to the average citizen and to his family..."

His words have held true. Since then, the Social Security program has grown to include survivors and disability benefits. About 43 million people receive monthly benefits, with over 61 percent of the money going to 26.4 million retired people. Twenty-nine percent of the money is paid to 12.4 million children, spouses, wid-

ows and widowers who receive benefits because a worker in their family has become disabled or died. And, over nine percent is paid to four million disabled workers.

But as important as it is, Social Security was never intended to be the sole provider of a person's financial security. Instead, Social Security is intended as a partial replacement of wages lost because of retirement, disability or death.

It's easy to get an estimate of the Social Security retirement, survivors and disability benefits you (and your family) may be eligible for now in the future. Visit any Social Security office or call this toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, to ask for a Form SSA-7004 (Request for Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement). The toll-free number responds to requests around the clock, including weekends and holidays. You'll get your statement within four to six weeks after you complete and return the request form to Social Security.

## Hospital To Add Home Health Care Services

Virginia Box, hospital and care center administrator, told commissioners Monday that a survey team at the facility last week had cleared the pathway to enlarge the care center. Board members are working on a plan to expand the care center from its current 46 beds to a 58 bed facility. The enlargement will be achieved by moving the double doors separating the facilities further into the hospital side.

Enlarging the care center and adding home health care through the hospital are two ways the board and Mrs. Box hope to increase revenues. Both plans are contingent upon being recertified for Medicare, and this is in the works according to Mrs. Box.

At their Aug. 10 meeting, directors heard presentations for AT&T and GTE for telephone systems. They also listened to proposals for hematology and centrifuge machines for the lab.

The board voted to advertise for bids for a hematology machine to include a lease/purchase option, and authorized purchase of a new centrifuge machine from InfoLab. The centrifuge will cost approximately \$1,300 and replaces a machine which is about 20 years old. The hematology machine being used now was purchased in 1988. Purchases of \$15,000 or more must be put out on bids.

No action was taken regarding the telephone system.

Authorization was given by the board to advertise for an ambulance.

Estimated cost is \$70,000. Commissioners had previously suggested that the needed ambulance be purchased this year.

The board discussed the possibility of using the same workman's comp carrier as the county. No action was taken.

Further discussion resulted in a motion to adopt the county policy re-

garding substance abuse and consequences if tested positive. The board also discussed policy regarding criminal history checks on employees and the annual review and evaluation of employees.

The board met in executive session to discuss employees. No action was taken after returning to open session.

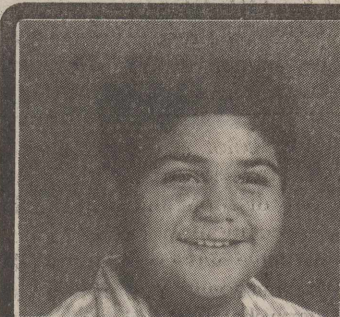

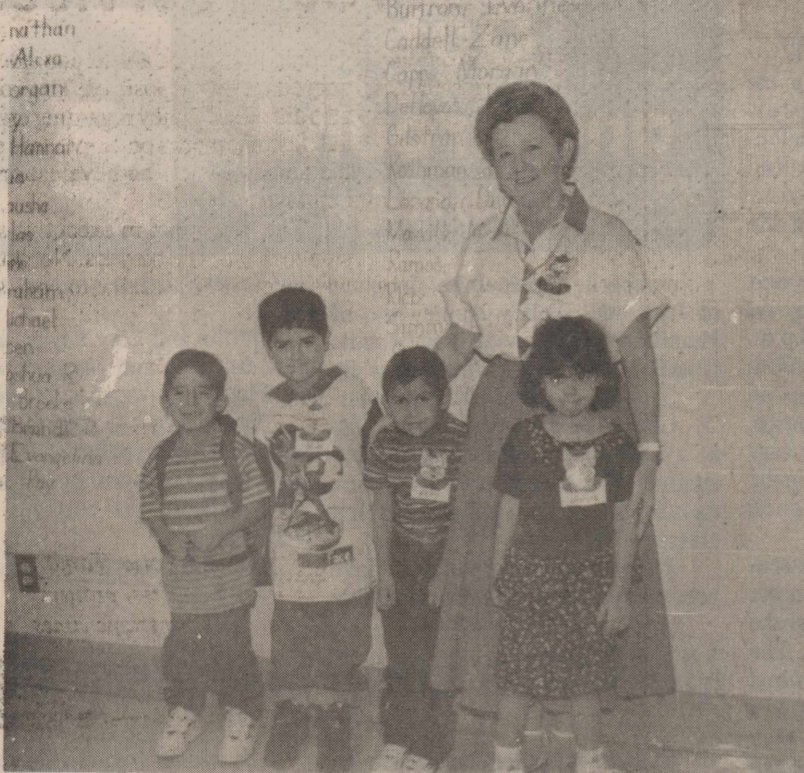

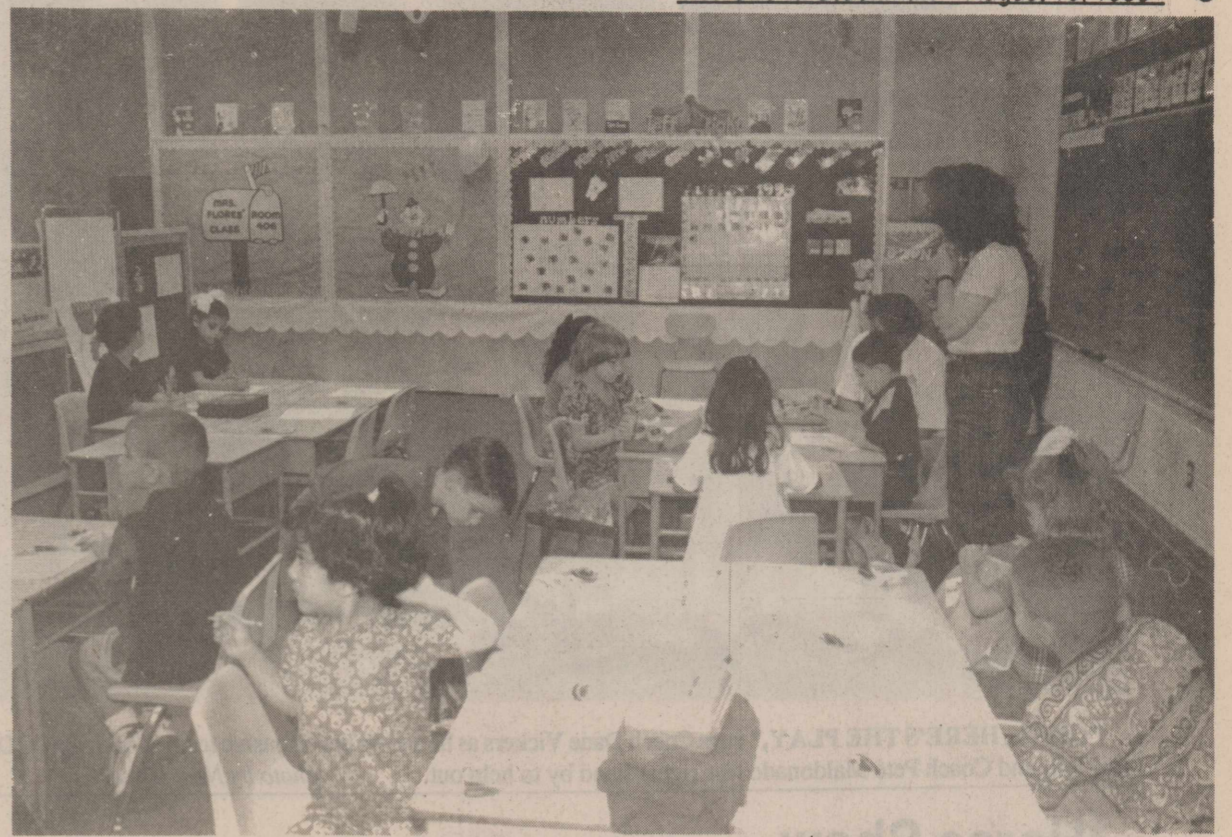

## McMullan Loop Captures Goal

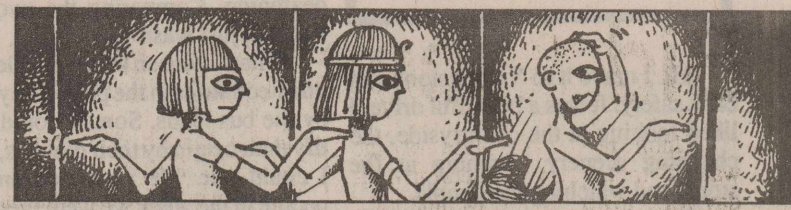
Shawn McMullan, an Iraan roper with Crockett County roots, achieved a childhood dream recently when he won the Calgary Stampede.

If this roller blader had stumbled, skidded, or struck a building or car, (even just a parked car), the mechanism of injury (speed with no helmet) could have been fatal.

## Bid Accepted For Development Work

Upon recommendation of the water district, commissioners on Monday voted to accept the low bidder for sewer and water line construction under the 1993 Texas Community Development Block Grant. They also voted to authorize a change order contingent upon approval of the state.

Bids for the project came in from \$70,000 to \$100,000 above the grants, and the project will have to be partially completed under the already approved grant and another grant applied for. Robert's Construction of San Angelo was awarded the bid.

Base bid from Robert's was \$262,206.37. After the change order, the amount will be \$201,076.29.

Dave Todd of Hibbs & Todd engineering firm of Abilene was present along with Dee Keilers and Doug Meador of the water district to present information on the bids and necessary changes.

Commissioners voted to approve a contract with Hibbs & Todd to provide engineering services for the 1995 Regular Texas Community Development program and for the 1995 Colonia fund Texas Community Development Program.

Mike Duran of Traylor and Associates was approved as labor standards officer to oversee the labor portion of the contract and will be responsible for all labor law compliance.

Judge Jeffrey Sutton told the court he and District Judge Brock Jones and representatives from Sutton County had been in Austin last week to request approval for the counties to withdraw from the eight county Permian Basin Community Supervision and Corrections Department.

Sutton received notification Monday afternoon that this had been approved. A probation department will be formed to serve the two counties.

A contract for the child support enforcement program, a funding mechanism from the Federal to state to local level was approved, and the court also approved participation in the family nutrition program through in-kind contribution. County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer was there to explain that equipment already in use in her office and the office space itself would qualify as the in-kind contribution. Grant money from the project would possibly add materials to the office, she said. Ozona's allocation from the state Extension Service would allow employment of a part-time nutrition worker.

A request for a donation of \$1,200 to the Texans War on Drugs program

made by Marilyn Golightly of San Angelo was denied.

During a report by librarian Louise Ledoux, the court reviewed a letter requested last month by Mrs. Ledoux expressing interest in the Big Country Library System's dedicated Internet access program. County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos is to draft a letter of interest to be submitted by Sept. 10.

Mrs. Ledoux said the program will be paid for by individuals, Friends of the Library and through grants, not with county funds.

In addition to cost of three computers and a server, each participating library is expected to have a one time cost of \$20,321 and an additional ongoing monthly cost of \$758. These figures were presented by Terry McCall, Comanche County attorney, at a meeting held in Sonora July 18.

Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne met with the court to establish a date to start training a replacement clerk for his office. Commissioners Freddie Nicks and Fred Deaton and Judge Sutton voted to hire a trainee effective Dec. 1. Commissioners Rudy Martinez and Frank Tambunga voted against, stating that they believed this employee should work up to the clerk's salary rather than being paid at the clerk's level immediately upon completion of two months' training.

Continuation of collection of the \$5 road and bridge fee with vehicle registration was approved by the court. Institution of collection of a school crossing guard fee with vehicle registration was not approved. Commissioner Tambunga abstained, citing lack of information. More information is to be obtained regarding the school crossing guard fee.

Exchange of materials (water and caliche) for work on private roads was discussed during a report by Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent. This resulted from an offer by a rancher offering to trade water for road work to his house.

County Attorney De Hoyos was asked to look at the state constitution,

statutes and the county's policy regarding trading services for materials and to report at next month's meeting.

No action was taken on an agenda item to consider contracting parks and grounds maintenance. Judge Sutton provided specifications used by the state highway department for review by the court.

Garland Young, civic and youth center director, told the court he believes roof trouble at the center is not from a structural problem. Estimates are to be obtained on roofing.

Young said the county was saved \$3,600 plus providing four teenagers with meaningful work experience this summer through the Council of Governments work program. The youths stripped and waxed all the floors, washed all the dishes and silverware, cleaned all tables and chairs and kept the lawn at the center.

At their meeting on Aug. 2, the center's board of directors voted to purchase a new large screen TV as there are no parts available to have the old television repaired.

The Meals on Wheels program served 1188 meals during June according to Janet McDaniel. There were 68 clients on the program at the end of June.

The fire department's report for June included two dumpster fires, two tree fires, two vehicle fires, one grass fire and three alarms cancelled.

Commissioners began a practice at this meeting of no longer having the

minutes of the previous meeting read aloud for the public to hear. Instead, they are receiving a copy of the minutes to review before the meeting. Corrections were submitted to the clerk before the meeting. These were to be added, and the minutes "as written" of the July meeting would be voted on for approval in September.

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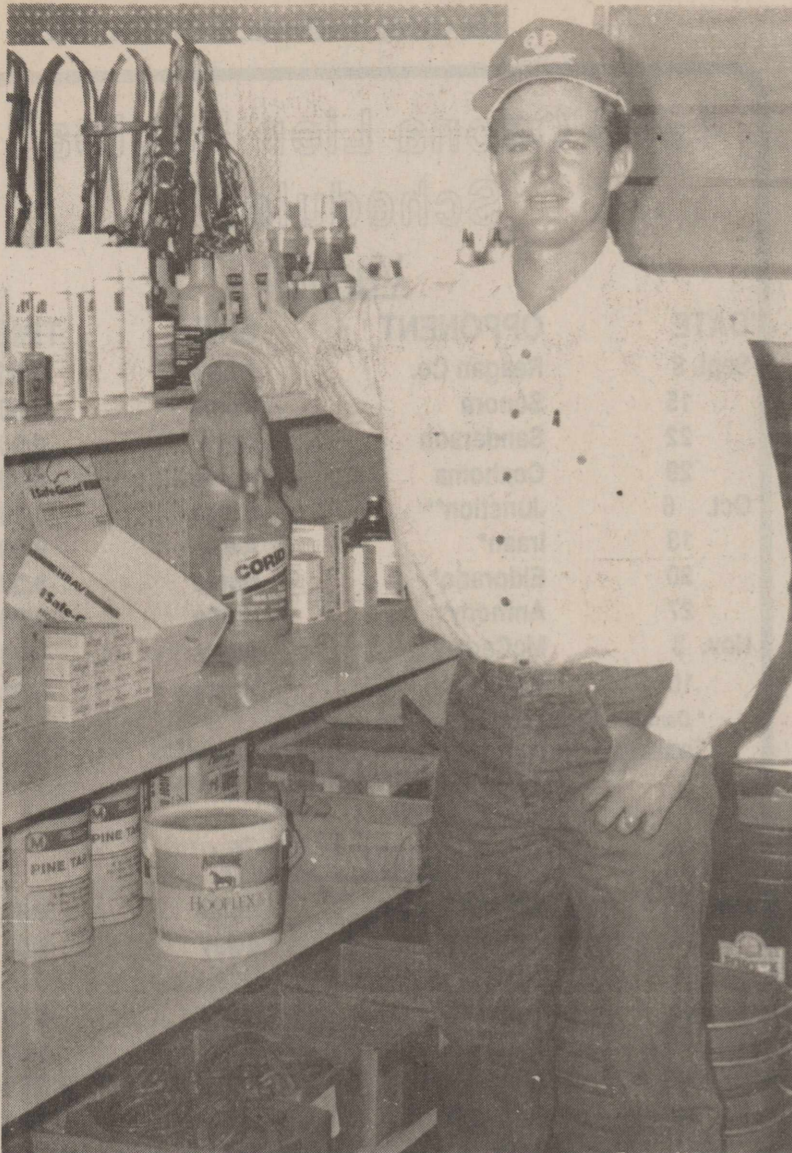

## Bobwhite Brigade Seeking Applications

Texas has the finest quail hunting found anywhere, and one group is working to see that it stays that way, forever.

The Bobwhite Brigade, a quail "camp" for high school youths, has trained more than 100 ambassadors for quail conservation since its inception in 1993.

Dr. Dale Rollins, San Angelo-based wildlife specialist and Bobwhite Brigade coordinator, says that the innovative quail corps is looking for "a few good men and women" for its 4th Battalion. The 4th Battalion will muster at the Krooked River Lodge north of Abilene during June 23-27, 1996.

"We take 30 cadets from throughout Texas and put them through their paces at this quail version of 'boot camp'. The kids leave well-versed in quail management, conservation and leadership skills," he says.

Cadets learn about bobwhites from the inside out and learn to develop a bird's eye view of habitat management. The hands-on curriculum involves using radio telemetry, diet analyses and habitat evaluations.

Graduates of the rigorous training agree to conduct at least three educational programs on quail conservation in their local communities. Many have conducted more than 20 presentations, including civic groups, news articles and television appearances.

Texas youth who are currently high school freshmen through juniors are encouraged to apply for the 1996 camp. Cost for the 5-day camp is \$125 per cadet. 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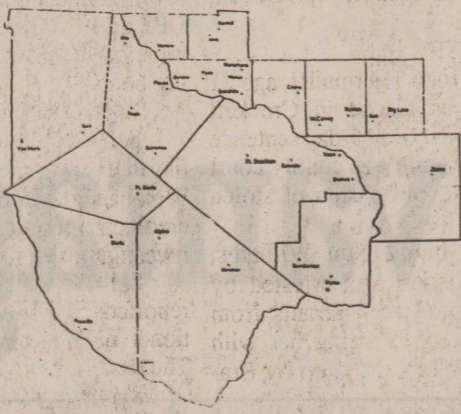

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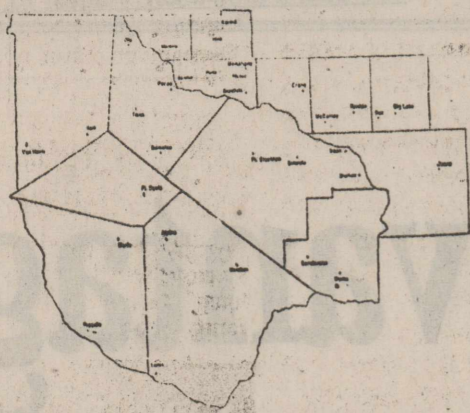
