#### **Lions Shutout** Eagles 28-0

The Ozona Lions scored four touchdowns to win their first game of the season 28-0 over the Sanderson Eagles in last Friday's game in Sanderson. With their first win, the Lions' season record is 1-2.

Lion Coach Walter Hargrove said, "We played real well offensively and defensively--it was a good game for us. We wanted to control the ball in the game and we did! The offensive and defensive plan worked well. Our linemen did a good job of blocking. We did some better things."

"Sanderson played a good game, with a lot of intensity, and they never did quit. Our boys just executed well," Hargrove added. "I thought they were just trying to run the ball and control the ball, but we stopped them."

The Lions, led by quarterback Pete Castaneda and running backs Darin Jackson, Justin Browne, Ray Fierro, Shayne Fuentes, and Brian Badillo, scored three of the four touchdowns

on 48 carries for 220 rushing yards. "I think the kids are understanding our offense and defense better. Pete did a good job with the offense. The running backs did a good job--we used a lot of different ones," said Hargrove.

The Lions took the ball on the opening kickoff and marched 86 yards to the Eagle 14-yard line. On the next play, strong end Casey Upham received a 14-yard pass running a fade route for the touchdown. The touchdown came with 5:31 left in the first quarter. Bryan Mendez kicked the PAT to give the Lions a 7-0 lead.

Ozona's second score came on a 2yard run around the right side on an off-tackle play by Shayne Fuentes with only 49 seconds left in the first half. The PAT by Mendez was good, increasing the Lion score to 14-0.

Good defense by the Lions kept the Eagles out of the end zone during the game. Mendez, splitting time playing defensive tackle and linebacker, led the Lions in tackling with 11 tackles. Patrick Sanchez had seven tackles followed by Albert Flores and Robert Kelly with six each, Darin Jackson five, Brian Badillo three, four players had two each, and eight players had one tackle each.

'Defensively, we tackled better, did a better job on reads and responsibilities, and played basic defense," said Hargrove. Indeed, the Lions did play good defense allowing the Eagles only 60 total yards in 29 carries and only two first downs.

In the third quarter, the Lions' offense came back with a touchdown with 9:55 left. The score came on a

No Outcry In The Streets

What of men who blow up a building containing a daycare center and a mother who drowns her babies? The Bible talks about ancient kings who engaged in such eveil. "Ahaz was 20 years old when he became king, and he reigned 16 years in Jerusalem; and he did not do what was right in the sight of the Lord God, as his father David had done. But he walked in the way of the kings of Israel, and even made his son pass through the fire, according to the abominations of the nations whom the Lord had driven out from before the sons of Israel" (2 Kings 16:2-3).

Here is the mournful cry regard-

ing the country where such things occur. "Alas, sinful nation, people weighed down with iniquity, offspring of evildoers, sons who act corruptly! They have abandoned the Lord, they have despised the Holy One of Israel, they have turned away from Him" (Isaiah 1:4).

Is there a correlation between our lack of service to God and the eruption of evil in our land? The Bible suggests there is. The opposite also seems to be true. **Basin Detox Program Available For Area Residents** 



#### **Deer Season Prospects Good For Bowhunters**

For some 75,000 Texas bowhunters who'll take part in this year's archery-only deer season, the chance to "draw down" on that first whitetail of the season will ultimately outweigh any discomfort that might be associated with the sport. The archery-only season for white-tailed deer runs Sept. 30-Oct. 31 in all counties with a general white-tailed deer season, and in Grayson.

And, even for the 85 percent or so who will come away without having harvested a whitetail, the opportunity to have hunted still makes it worthwhile. Typically, the success rate for Texas bowhunters is about 15 percent, which accounts for between 15,000 to 20,000 deer killed statewide, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

But, as any bowhunter will confirm, the harvest is not the compelling factor behind bowhunting. "The harvest is always going to be low, just because of the high skill level required to get a shot at a deer," said Butch Young, TPWD whitetail deer program leader. "Bowhunting has never been a real factor in possible overharvest of deer. The end result is not the kill, although venison is nice to have, but to be closer to nature and to understand our place in the natural world.

"Bowhunting is a great opportunity to get out in the woods and improve your hunting skills," Young said. "It's a great way to introduce young people to hunting. They'll have an opportunity during bow season to get out in the woods when there's not a lot of hunters running around and the deer aren't spooked easily and see more deer and learn more about their habits."

And, according to Young, the habit of some hunters may need to change in order to get close to deer this season. Due to decent amounts of rainfall throughout the Edwards Plateau and in East Texas earlier in the year, deer may not be as susceptible to food plots and feeders, especially during bow season.

Young also noted the additional rainfall in the Hill Country and some parts of South Texas has resulted in higher fawn production. "Bowhunters should be aware of the need to harvest more antierless deer in these areas with high fawn production."

Though providing supplemental food sources for deer has become routine for many hunters in Texas, there are some concerns which should be considered. #### **Potatoes Potent Against Disease-Causing Agents**

COLLEGE STATION - When it comes to disarming disease-causing agents in the body, potatoes pack a punch more powerful than many other vegetables.

New research has found that while vegetables such as bell peppers, onions and carrots remain valuable dietary sources of disease-preventing antioxidants, potatoes rank near the top of that category.

"We were surprised to find that potatoes are second only to broccoli in terms of antioxidant activity," said Dr. Creighton Miller, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station potato breeder based at Texas A&M University. He said people should not only put potatoes on every plate, but should eat them skins and all.

Discovery of the potato's high antioxidant activity is reported in the current issue of the Journal of Food

When the action gets hot and screaming and yelling comes from fans who don't understand new rules or rule changes. In fact, rules for sports are re-evaluated each year for various

Rules are mainly added to clarify a situation, allow the game to be played at an even pace, and to keep the game more competitive.

This year, 14 major rule changes were made by the NCAA Foot all rules committee. Another equipment-related rule is, "Officials should inform players when fewer than four snaps are secured on chin straps without charging a timeout, unless the player ignores the warning." There are also three other new rules involving jerseys and gloves, but they won't affect the fans in the stands.

One old rule fans are probably familiar with but where the terminology has changed is called "illegal participation." Simply, this is having 12 men on the field. It is a 5-yard penalty if the player is making an effort to leave the field. A 15-yard penalty is assessed when 12 men line up for a play and actually participate.

There are two additional clarifications that fans need to be informed about. One, there is no such rule in the book about "the ground cannot cause a fumble." If anything but the runner's hands or feet touch the ground, then the ball is dead. Therefore, you don't have a fumble. 

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

#### **Texas Monthly Oil And Gas Statistics**

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,047 original drilling permits in August compared to 1,121 in August, 1994. The August total included 770 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 45 to re-enter existing well bores, and 232 for re-completions.

So far in 1995, there have been 7,589 drilling permits issued, a 3.5 percent increase from the 7,325 granted during the same period of

Permits issued in August included 443 oil, 206 gas, 333 oil and gas, 48 injection and 16 other permits.

#### JUNE CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION

Texas preliminary June crude oil production averaged 1,384,737 million barrels daily, down from the 1,439,733 million barrels daily average of June, 1994.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for June 1995 is 41,542,170 barrels, a decrease from the 43,191,987 barrels during the June 1994 reporting period. Crockett County produced 267, 204 barrels during June.

#### JUNE NATURAL GAS **PRODUCTION**

Texas oil and gas wells produced 458,213,102 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for June, up slightly from the June 1994 preliminary gas production total of 457,352,017 Mcf.

Texas gas production in June came from 168, 412 oil, and 48,340 gas wells.

Crockett County was ranked seventh in the state with production of 10,149,756 Mcf for the period.
