

Early Voting Begins In Constitutional **Amendment Election**

Oct. 18 through Nov. 3 is the early voting period for a Nov. 7 special election to consider 14 proposed amendments to the Texas constitution. The state's constitution, which dates to 1876, has often been criticized as too detailed and confusing. It has already been amended 353 times.

Summaries of the 14 proposed amendments follow. Descriptions may differ from the actual ballot wording.

Prop. 1 - To allow the Texas Higher Education Board to issue up to \$300 million in bonds to finance more student loans.

Prop. 2 - To authorize lawmakers to exempt Masonic lodges and some other state charitable organizations from property taxes.

Prop. 3 - To allow use of existing bond authority of the Texas farm and ranch finance program to include assistance for expansion, development and diversification of production, processing, marketing and export of Texas agricultural products.

Prop. 4 - To allow Texas homeowners to refinance their homes to pay off an Internal Revenue Service lien, or in the case of divorce to buy out the other spouse's equity in the

Prop. 5 - To permit the Texas Land Board to issue another \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance low interest home loans for Texas veterans.

Prop. 6 - To extend the over-65 senior citizen homestead property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of an elderly person.

Prop. 7 - To eliminate \$250 million in general obligation bonds set aside for the now-defunct superconducting super collider project.

Prop. 8 - To allow residents of Mills, Reagan and Roberts counties to abolish the office of constable.

Prop. 9 - To allow investment of money from the Texas Growth Fund in a business without the business's disclosure of investments in South Africa or Namibia.

Prop. 10 - To abolish the state treasurer's office and merge it into the comptroller's office.

Prop. 11 - To permit open-space land used for wildlife management to be treated like agricultural land in

Sales Up In County

A report of sales issued Sept. 25 by the State Comptroller's Office for the first quarter of 1995 shows Crockett County with a 19.8% increase for all industries. Gross sales of \$12,066,208 were reported by 133 outlets compared to 125 outlets reporting \$10,075,876 in the same period of 1994.

Retail sales posted a 15.2 percent increase with 80 outlets reporting gross 1995 first quarter sales of \$6,313,418. During the same period of 1994, 79 outlets reported \$5,481,015 in sales.

Surrounding counties and their statistics are: Crane, 65 outlets, \$5,252,258, down 5.9% from 68 outlets and \$5,580,652; Reagan, 52 outlets, \$6,340,055, up 11.9% from 58 outlets and \$5,663,895; Sutton, 73 outlets and \$5,800,563, up 17.1% from 78 outlets and \$4,955,320; Terrell, 21 outlets, \$944,294 up 1.6% from 30 lets, \$3,077,710, up 18.7% from 77 500 outlets and \$62,356,133, up 1.6% from 516 outlets and \$61,374,176.

Perishable Food

Our daily labor is tied up in making ends meet. We rise early and hit the sack late. Look at what Jesus Christ says, "Do not work for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give to you" (John 6:27). Don't be ridiculous, Jesus. We must work. How do you expect us to live if we don't work?

When Jesus speaks of food which perishes, He uses the same word He mentions in John 3:16. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life." The emphasis is the same.

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
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Despite Flaws, Braves Beat Lions 42-14 By Neal Ulmer

The Carlisles were seated for a quiet patio dinner at a Taos restaurant when they heard screams coming from behind them. A few feet away was a man in his early 40s weaving and stumbling beside cars parked in a narrow lot near their table.

At first they believed he was drunk, then the man fell against a car. The couple saw a gaping stab wound in the man's chest, another man holding a knife and a screaming woman.

Dr. Carlisle ran to the man, only to find that he was dead already. The assailant grabbed the woman, pulling her hair back with his left hand and holding a knife to her throat with his right hand.

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

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was established in 1950 to identify and prioritize resource concerns within the county and to serve as a medium for local ranchers in coordinating assistance from federal, state and local agencies. Agencies providing assistance include the Natural Resources Conservation Service (formerly known as Soil Conservation Service), Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Farm Service Agency (formerly Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service), Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and University of Texas Lands.

A Memoramdum of Understanding between the USDA-NRCS and the District allows the NRCS to furnish technical assistance to ranchers, farmers and other interested individuals in order that conservation plans can be developed to meet the needs and capabilities of the land and the objectives of the landowner.

The District is governed by a five member board of locally elected directors. These directors serve as a voice for landowners and operators within the District. Directors for the past year include Earl Acton, Chairman; Larry Williams, Vice-Chairman; Pleas Childress III, Secretary; Paul Perner III, member, and Steve Wilkins, member.

Improper grazing management, brush infestation, conserving soil, water, plants and related resources and improving wildlife management on rangeland as secondary land use are the primary concerns outlined in a long range program and plan.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District realizes these concerns need to be addressed and steps taken to solve these problems in order to protect our resource base.







Gene Perry receives plaque from John Earl Smith, Region II Director of the Texas Association of Soil & Water Conservation Districts.



The Crockett District nominated Gene Perry as this past year's Outstanding Rancher land he was selected as the Outstanding Resident Conservation Rancher for Region II of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts at the annual awards banquet held in San Angelo in May of this year. Region II comprises 51 counties ranging from Blanco County to El Paso County and from Andrews County to Maverick County.

Gene and Betty Perry have two separate ranching operations in Crockett County. Both ranches consist of a total of 8,759 acres. He is a past director of the Crockett SWCD. He had served the ranchers of the district for 14 years.

Perry's main goal in his operation is to make it profitable and to sustain and improve the range resources on the ranches. Proper grazing management is the key to the success of the ranches. Extensive crossfencing (64,956 feet), livestock pipelines (25,000 feet), five water storage facilities, 12 troughs and two wells are some of the conservation practices he has completed to initiate his

He has implemented a three pasture, one herd grazing system on his west ranch and a 13 pasture short duration grazing system on the east ranch. These systems in combination with flexible stocking have enabled him to improve range condition and trend. Vegetative cover has doubled on the ranch since the implementation of these systems. Proper grazing use is a must in his operation. Even during the harshest years, Perry has been able to obtain proper grazing use on both ranches.

To intensify and expedite range improvement and increase moisture conservation, a selective brush control program was implemented. Cedar and mesquite have been treedozed or grubbed on 6,000 acres of ranches. Mesquite and pricklypear have been aerially treated with herbicides on 7,500 acres. Follow-up treatment is carried out on all acreage treated.

The Perrys have developed a unique wildlife management program on the ranches. A large percentage of the deer harvested on the ranch are taken by various organizations and groups. Hunts for the West Texas Boys' Ranch, High Sky Girls' Home, 4-H Field and Stream, hearing impaired and father/son are held annually. A hunter safety camp is also held to familiarize individuals on safety procedures involved in hunting.

There are various other events hosted annually on the ranch. The sixth grade conservation field day is held on the ranch to educate youth on the conservation of natural resources. He also hosts the Crockett County Classic Sheep Dog Trial with national and international participation, as well as other tours and functions.

To accommodate some of these functions, the Perrys have constructed a bunk house,

kitchen and classroom area for stayovers and education of youth.

Perry has participated in various organizations including: Crockett County School Board, Crockett County Water Board, Crockett County Appraisal Board, served as director for the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers, Mohair Council of America, Texas Game Warden Association, Texas Hereford Association, National Cattle Raisers' Association and the Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association.

CONSERVATION TOUR

The Gene Perry Ranch was the location of the annual Hill Country Association of the Soil and Water Conservation District's spring tour. More than 90 individuals representing 20 districts attended the tour. The Perry Ranch was chosen because of some of the outstanding conservation work which has been applied over the years.

range condition and production and increase carrying capacity. Mr. Perry has installed a 13 pasture - one herd system which has allowed him to almost double his carrying capacity over the last 10 years. More than 12 miles of electric fencing was needed to initiate the system. A unique rock bracing system has been used on most of the new fences.

Brush management practices, including treedozing and aerial spraying, were also observed. More than 7,500 acres of aerial spraying for the control of mesquite and pricklypear has been applied over the years. Six thousand acres of treedozing mesquite and cedar has been accomplished on both deeded and lease land that Perry operates. An overview of the wildlife operation was also presented to the interested group.

After a catered barbecue lunch, Ivan Weir, trainer for Weir-Perry Kennels, put on an excellent border collie demonstration. Various age groups of dogs were used to demonstrate the different stages of development and training each group required.

The Crockett SWCD hosted this year's tour and would like to thank Gene and Betty Perry for their hospitality and congratulate them on their conservation efforts.





CONSERVATION EDUCATION

The Crockett SWCD annually sponsors a sixth grade conservation field day. This year's event took place April 26 on the Gene Perry Ranch.

The purpose of the field day was to increase the awareness of natural resources and educate the children to the need for proper management to sustain and improve these resources. Topics consisting of soils, water, range and wildlife were presented by professionals with the Natural Resources Conservation Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Ivan Weir entertained the group with a sheep dog demonstration. They showed how these dogs are used to assist ranchers in their everyday ranching operations. The dogs, which are from Weir-Perry Kennels and trained by Mr. Weir, put on a show that all enjoyed.

Following this presentation, the children were treated to a hamburger lunch provided by the Crockett SWCD and cooked by John L. Henderson and volunteers Keith Olive and Laurie Hale.

Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent, gave the students a presentation on sheep and goat production in Crockett County and described some of the various uses of wool and mohair.


A trip to Wool Growers Central Storage capped off the day. Children learned all about processing of wool and mohair, starting from the initial shearing in the field to the finished clothing project.

JOHNSON DRAW WATERSHED

The possibility of flooding in Ozona similar to that disastrous day of June 28, 1954, has been greatly reduced by the construction of seven floodwater retarding structures on Johnson Draw watershed and two miles of channel improvement through the town of Ozona. Through the initiative and cooperative action of local people and ranchers, the Crockett SWCD, the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the National Resources Conservation Service, the construction of these structures was completed by 1959.

These structures are designed to detain runoff from 78% of the watershed above Ozona. Presently, all structures and the channel are in good condtion due to the maintenance made by the sponsors.

Conservation of livestock water storage facilities, pipelines and troughs are high priority conservation practices applied within the District.
