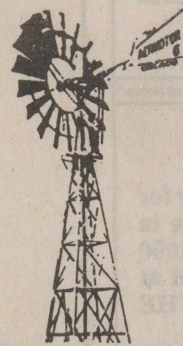
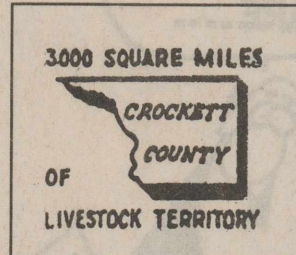

Lions Triumphant, Beat Eagles 35-14

The Ozona Lions' football team went out with a bang, beating the Van Horn Eagles 35-14 in last Friday's District 5-2A game. The win and last game of the season gave the Lions their first district win with four losses. The Lions ended their season with an overall record of 2-8. The Eagles ended their season with a 1-9 overall, and district record of 1-4.

Head Coach Walter Hargrove said, "It was a big win for the kids. They've worked hard all year, and we've had some adversity and some crazy things happened to them. It was nice for them to have a big win at the end of the year."

The Lions' offensive attack was led by sophomore running back Justin Brownne. He led his team with 130 yards rushing on 12 carries and scored two touchdowns.

The Eagles received the opening kickoff and wasted little time in driving from their own 24-yard line to the Lions' 30-yard line. Evidently, the Lions made up their minds to play good defense and stopped the Eagles. Making some good defensive plays were: Adam Carroll, Gary Domin-

guez, Luis Hernandez, Patrick Sanchez, and Robert Kelly.

The Lions started on their own 30-yard line and were also able to move the ball. Running back Brownne picked up 13 yards along with Pete Castaneda's 16 yards. Darin Jackson ran for some short yardage also before the Lions' offensive drive fizzled at the Eagles' 30-yard line.

Ozona defensive back David Brownne intercepted a pass from Eagle quarterback Bobby De La O and returned it to the Lion 36 yard line. After the Lions tried three offensive plays, they were forced to punt.

As an Eagle player received the punt, Carroll hit him, knocking the ball loose. Lando Pena-Alfaro recovered it on the Eagle 18-yard line. An yard line.

Four plays later, Justin Brownne scored on a one-yard run with 11:24 remaining in the second period. An extra point try by Bryan Mendez was blocked but the Lions took a 6-0 lead.

The Eagles moved the ball quickly after starting on their own 28-yard line. Again, the Lion defense came through and stopped the Eagles on the Lion 7-yard line.

The Lions started moving the ball with runs of 1-yard by Justin Brownne, 13-yard run by Jackson, and a 45-yard pass from David Brownne to Ray Fierro. Fierro reached the 12-yard line before being pulled down. Castaneda ran 11 yards to the Eagle one-yard line. Jackson scored on a one-yard run with 2:58 left in the second quarter. He also scored the two-point conversion to give the Lions a 14-0 lead.

Fighting back, the Eagles started on their own 24-yard line and moved the ball with passes of 22, 12, and 16 yards to the Lion 7-yard line. The Eagles scored in two plays with the score occurring on a 2-yard run by running back Luis Salais with 56 seconds remaining in the first half. The point after by Orlando Ramirez was no good, and the Eagles were on the scoreboard 14-6.

"Offensively, we had 400 yards. We ran the ball well and executed the offense at a quick pace which we've been working on the last few weeks. We played fast," said Coach Hargrove. Both teams attempted to move the ball in the early part of the third quarter but good defense stopped both teams.

The Lions started their second possession in better field position from their own 46 yard line. Castaneda ran for 7 yards and on the next play Justin Brownne broke loose for a 47-yard touchdown pass with 4:47 left in the third period. On the PAT, the Lions faked a kick, and Castaneda threw a pass to Jon Sanchez which fell incomplete. With the score, the Lions expanded their lead 20-6.

On the Eagles next possession, the Eagles lost their second fumble and the Lions recovered on the Eagles' 25-yard line. Four plays later, Darin Jackson scored on a 5-yard run with

Board Looks At Operating Options

Commissioners examined floor plans for a new annex building Monday, and expressed approval of what they saw. A change in location for the treasurer's office will not change the configuration of the rooms. The property located partially behind the courthouse and annex is to be surveyed. Plans are to lower the hill to as near the courthouse and annex level as possible before building.

Architect Jack Meeks told the court it will take two to three months to prepare the information to go out for bids on various aspects of the building.

Court members agreed that they are not interested in entertaining a proposal to use the present middle school building as an annex. The distance from the courthouse would necessitate moving all offices and courtroom to this building. Judge Jeffrey Sutton said he had been approached about the possibility of this building being available.

A request to repair the Boy Scout Hut, which is county owned, was approved without a vote. Problems mentioned included bare wires hanging from the ceiling, a heater which doesn't work, a donated unit which needs installation and a leaking roof.

No action was taken of an agenda item regarding leasing county property south of the DPS office to Head Start. Ozona's Head Start, which is under the Tom Green Community

Council, needs a location suitable for placement of two portable buildings for classes.

Complaints of noise at the convention center were discussed. The convention center committee is to review rules regarding use of the building.

The court accepted the annual audit report for 1994. The report was presented by auditor John Stokes. During his monthly financial report, Stokes said the county ended October with about one million dollars. The year started with \$1.1 million.

As part of her monthly report, Janet McDaniel of Helping Hands told the court that 1346 meals were served during October. This amounted to 69 people per day.

U. S. Flag Presented To Ozona VFW Post

Luis Saenz, regional director of Sen. Phil Gramm's office in San Antonio, and Phil Ricks, a top aide to Rep. Henry Bonilla, were in Ozona Friday to present an American flag to VFW Post 6109. The ceremony at the home of A. O. Fields was in conjunction Veterans Day, which is observed on Nov. 11.

The date honors all U. S. veterans and commemorates the Nov. 11, 1918, armistice which ended World War I.

Mrs. McDaniel had with her plans for the proposed Senior Citizens' Building. It is to be a 60'x110' building which will include a 50'x60' multipurpose room.

Commissioners voted to accept the civic and youth center board's recommendation to appoint Ismael Villarreal to replace Judy Pridemore, who has resigned. Director Garland Young brought this before the court in his report.

Young reminded the court that money had been budgeted to replace cabinet tops at the center this year and that this needs to be done before year's end.

The Crockett County Hospital/Care Center board of directors listened to a presentation by Dr. Marcus Sims for re-organization and operation of the emergency room, lab and clinic when they met Nov. 10. The plan which Sims described provided for continued operation by the county. All resident rooms would become long term care, a skilled nursing division would be added to the care center, the hospital and lab would become a 24-hour clinic.

Staffing for the lab would have one on duty from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and one from 4 p.m. until midnight and one on call from mid-night to 8 a.m. The person on call would be paid only if called in.

Sims said this could work on a three week rotation of 38, 38 and 36 hours, retaining each of the lab people now employed.

Clinic operation would include the two doctors and an LVN from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. six days per week. They would also handle emergencies. Details for after hours and Sunday staffing would have to be worked out.

Both Dr. Sims and Dr. Owensby said they believe there should be more than one alternative to consider when making major changes in the set up and operation at the hospital.

"When the hospital had patients it was closer to being in the black," Sims said. "What killed rural hospitals is the expensive technology and staffing regulations. We can fill all those beds if we close the hospital and convert to care center rooms," Sims said.

"There's no question the hospital is going to close; it hasn't been operating efficiently," the doctor stated.

There were 30 patients in the hospital last year.

Members of the staff expressed concern and resentment at the meeting that they were not notified of the possibility of a change in the status of the hospital. They were assured that no concrete plans are in place and that alternatives to the current situation are being explored.

Board president Eddie Moore said the decision to have only a clinic and emergency room was made at a joint meeting of commissioners and board members during the summer. Proposed changes should not involve the ambulance service.

In other business before the board it was reported that Dr. Sims has signed as medical director of record for the care center. He has also agreed to serve as medical director for the EMS and a home health service if there are no concerns of conflict of interest.

Only one bid had been received for a long distance carrier, so a decision was made to table action until other bids are received.

All air conditioners except two have been installed. Architect Jack Meeks is getting clearance from the Texas hospital codes for installing one in the x-ray lab.

After discussion of the fire alarms and sprinkler system for the care center, it was decided to move the fire wall, alarms and sprinklers to the partition immediately south of the hospital nurses' station.

EMS coordinator Doug Meador took board members on a tour of the new ambulance. Some additional equipment is needed before it is put in

use. A deer guard was authorized for this ambulance and two others. The old ambulance will be put up for bids.

During a report by Mrs. Virginia Box, administrator, the board was told that three fulltime and one parttime nurse aides have been hired. She also said a new medical cart is needed at a cost of around \$700. No action was taken on the cart.

Resignation of David Morgan, the maintenance manager, was accepted, and advertising has begun to fill this position. A director of housekeeping is also needed as a result of this resignation. Mrs. Box will assume the housekeeper's supervisor duties until the first of the year.

Veterans' Children Urged To Apply For Scholarships

U. S. Rep. Henry Bonilla (R-Texas-23) is encouraging college-bound high school seniors who are descendants of U.S. wartime veterans to apply for Samsung American Legion scholarships.

In conjunction with the recent dedication of the new Korean War Memorial, the Samsung Group presented the American Legion with a \$5 million endowment establishing a scholarship program for descendants of American war veterans.

While the Samsung American Legion Scholarship Program is still in the initial phase, the program will establish a series of scholarships for undergraduate study at colleges and universities across the United States. The initial scholarships will be awarded in September 1996 and will be administered by the American Legion.

The scholarship program was established in recognition of the sacrifice and commitment of the United States servicemen and women who served during the Korean War.

"The creation of an educational endowment is a great way to thank America's veterans," Bonilla said.

Students who are descendants of wartime veterans are eligible to apply. Additional selection criteria include the student's academic record, community involvement, extracurricular school activities, and financial need. Scholarship recipients will be notified during the fall semester of their senior year in high school, allowing them to decide where they wish to pursue their undergraduate degrees.

Tri-Unity: One God, Three Persons

The Christian faith rests on the truth of the Trinity, one God in three persons. The Bible says, "The Lord is our God, the Lord is one" (Deuteronomy 6:4). At the same time, the Bible tells us God exists in three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Beyond doubt, the Father is God, His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, is also God. Jesus said, "He who has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). Finally, the Holy Spirit is God. As some early Christians discovered, if you "lie to the Holy Spirit, you have not lied to men, but to God" (Acts 5:3-4). Each of these persons is God.

They are equal in power and glory. Yet they are one. Jesus said it, "I and the Father are one" (John 10:30). Amazingly enough, if you take a course in logic, you find the teaching of the Trinity is not a formal contradiction. The Bible does not say God is one person and three persons at the same time. Nor does the Bible say God is one substance or essence and three different substances at the same time. These are obvious contradictions. God, however, is one essence or being. He is also three persons. This may boggle our minds, but it is not a logical contradiction. Check it out.

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Museum Notes From Mary

The Crockett County Museum is located in the building to the south of the courthouse, the present annex, on the southeast side of our lovely town Square. It hasn't always been related to the courthouse. It was built as a Methodist Church, and what a grand church it must have been. Rocks quarried in Crockett County and chiseled to perfect building sizes were stacked in proper order around a well-constructed frame. The main sanctuary entrance was on the south side with the stairways ascending from the east and west. Those stairways remain today and probably serve as much traffic every weekday as they did on Sundays years ago.

The building served the Methodists well for 16 years, being completed in 1926 and dedicated in September 1930. Then a terrible fire gutted the building the night of March 8, 1942, ending this chapter of Methodist history.

Since it was during World War II, they decided against reconstructing and finally sold the property to the county in December of 1945. Plans for the renovation were begun immediately, and soon the hospital was a reality. They had x-ray and lab equipment, and the elevator was installed to move patients to the top floor. Many of our Crockett County residents were born in this building.

In 1955, the hospital board and the commissioners' court concluded that the hospital either needed an extension added to house more storage space and private rooms, or the county should

build a whole new building. As the hospital was located on the highway (old 290), they decided a new building in a quiet location would eliminate several problems.

The new one-story Crockett County Hospital was opened in September of 1956. The old, vacated building came to life again as the courthouse annex, with the museum occupying three rooms on the ground level.

Oh, this dear old building has a "lot of history".

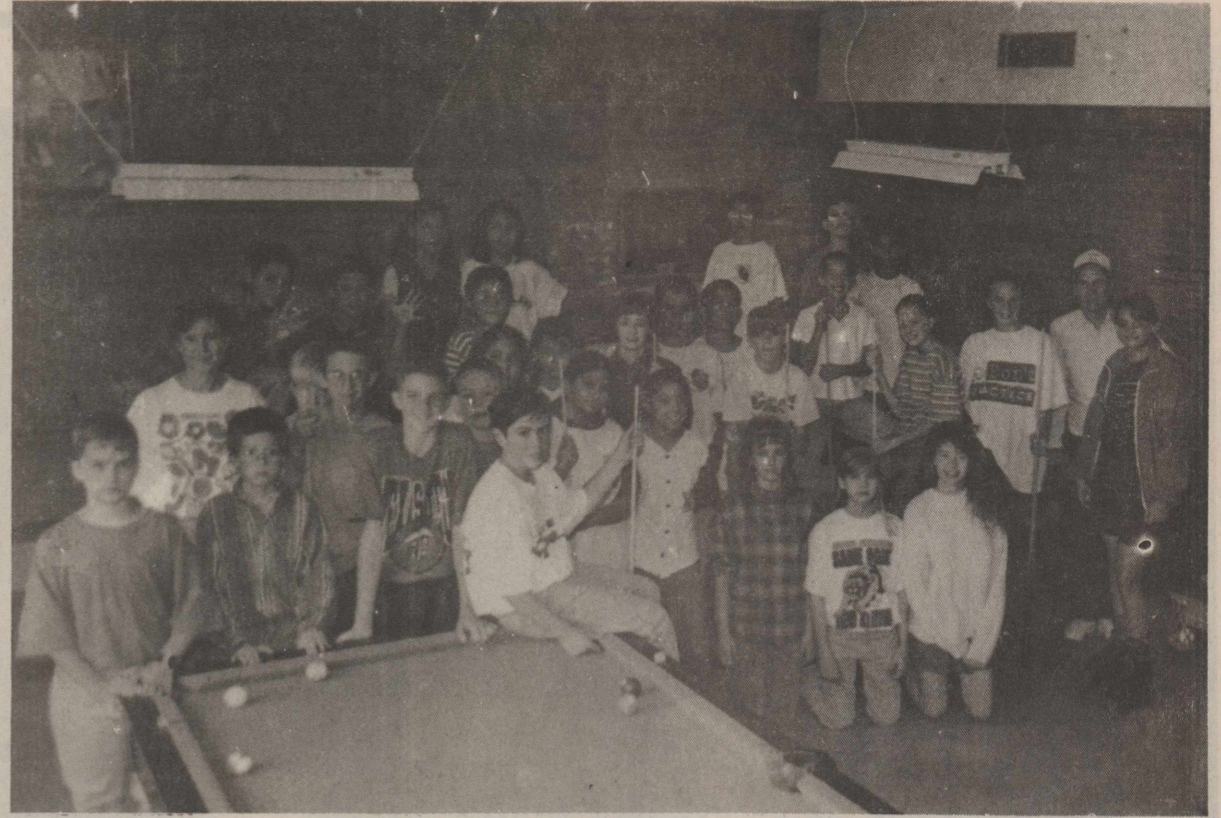

Paget's Disease Can Be Painful

HOUSTON - The virus that causes measles may cause Paget's disease, a painful, deforming disorder that hits later in life.

But Paget's disease may produce few symptoms until painful bone deformities begin to develop, said Dr. Lawrence Mallette, an endocrinologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Normal bones are constantly broken down by cells and then built back up so they remain strong," he said. "With Paget's, a virus may invade the bone cells. When it flares up, the cells that break down and regenerate bones become too aggressive."

The result can be brittle, bowed or deformed bones. The virus can be active for years before a patient notices symptoms.

A written report submitted by Ozona Fire Department showed five vehicle fires during October along with one call each for grass, oilfield and structure fires. McCamey handled two alarms in Crockett County.

The department put in 35.44 man hours, 8.29 truck hours and used 450 gallons of water during the month. Totals year to date are 930.45 man hours, 101.22 truck hours and 32,330 gallons of water used.

Union Pacific Resources has donated 100 gallons of AFFF foam, a foam inductor, a 350 gallon per minute nozzle and a fog nozzle to the Ozona Fire Department. They had earlier given the department a specialized set of bunker gear.

Librarian Louise Ledoux updated the court on the job training computer and software provided by Concho Valley Council of Governments. She also said the Big Country Library System is going town by town with computer systems because there are four different telephone systems within the region.

New library board officers are Cathy Carson, president; Camille Jones, vice-president; and secretary, Jessie Zuniga.

Later in the afternoon, Mrs. Ledoux and David West presented a proposal for a computer system for the library which would include two

computers and a printer. In the overall proposal was also a computer system for the county attorney's office. Remaining certificate of obligation money, \$6,642, will be used to purchase the two systems with only one computer for the library.

Roads and parks supervisor Eddie Moore told the court that paving in the county was finished last month. His workers will be back into preparing caliche roads surfaces. Some areas, such as Pct. 4, had road damage from recent rain, Moore said. His employees are also involved in work on the office areas at the 4-H Barn.

Moore told the court all the fuel system quotes are not in. County pumps are out of regulation and an inspection resulted in a notice to correct and remove within 90 days. The county has two 8,000 gallon fuel tanks.

Hospital administrator Virginia Box and Moore talked with the court about alternative methods of operating Ozona's medical facility. Shannon Medical Center took paperwork and is looking at Ozona statistics now. The board expects to hear something in December.

Mrs. Box said the facility could keep one or two beds for overnight

3:13 left in the third quarter. Justin Browne scored the PAT on a run, and the Lions enlarged their lead to 28-6. Van Horn retaliated three plays later climaxed by a 59-yard touchdown scamper by Isidro Venegas with 2:14 left in the third. The conversion run by Donald Ramirez was good to pull the Eagles within 14 points at 28-14.

The Lion last touchdown drive started from their own 32-yard line late in the third quarter. Running backs Jackson, Browne and Castaneda each ran several plays, getting the ball to the Eagle 47-yard line. Then quarterback David Browne hit teammate Casey Upham, alone near the sideline, for the Lions' final touchdown with 10:44 left in the fourth quarter. Governor's Exhibition At Alpine Museum

Eighth Grade Cubs Squeak By Colts

The eighth grade Cubs scored a touchdown in the last quarter to beat the Sonora Colts 22-16 last Thursday in Sonora. The seventh grade was overwhelmed by a larger Colt team and was defeated 40-6 in an earlier game.

The eighth grade ends their season with a record of 4-4, and the seventh grade ends their season with a 2-7 record.

Eighth grade Coach Rodney Johnson said, "Well, the first time we played them, they beat us 8-6. This time, we believed in ourselves more."

Coach David Delgado added, "The eighth graders played the best game all year and it was a good way to close out the season."

The Cubs made a great defensive stand on the Colts' first possession. Then an Ozona fumble gave the Colts their second possession and an opportunity to score. Sonora recovered the ball on the Cub 8-yard line. Three plays later, the Colts scored a touchdown on a two-yard run by Edgar Gonzales with 1:14 left in the first period. A run for the two-point conversion was successful to give the Colts an early 8-0 lead.

On the Colts' next possession, Mario Barrera made a good tackle for a 10-yard loss on a Colt running back on a fourth-and-twenty-two play. The Cubs then took over on their own 45-yard line.

Peter Rodriguez ran for seven yards and two plays later he caught a 51-yard pass to the Colt 9-yard line. A one-

yard loss and an Ozona penalty placed the ball on the Colt 16 yard line. On the second play from the 16, quarterback Ross Crawford threw a 16-yard touchdown pass to Rodriguez with 28 seconds left in the first half. He also scored the two-point conversion to put the Cubs on the board and tie the game at 8-8.

In the second half, the Cubs moved the ball up field until a Cub player fumbled the ball on their own 21-yard line. Ozona in turn, played good defense with a good stop by Ty Porter and Kenny Vargas on a fourth-and-six play for no gain by the Colts.

The Cubs were not able to move the ball and had to punt it from their own 1-yard line. The punt was blocked and covered by Andy Sanchez of Sonora for a touchdown. The score occurred at the end of the third quarter with the conversion run good by Gonzales to give the Cubs a 16-8 lead.

Matt Castaneda returned the kick-off back to the Cub 46-yard line, then picked up 12 and six yards on two carries to the Colt 36-yard line. Moments later Ross Crawford ran 14 yards to the Colt 27-yard line, and Castaneda broke loose for a 27-yard touchdown with 5:30 left in the fourth quarter. Rodriguez was stopped short of the goal line on the two-point conversion try but the Cubs were within two points at 14-16.

The Cubs again played good defense, stopping them on their own 25-yard line and forcing them to punt. A bad snap on the punt was recovered on the Colts' one-yard line. Crawford scored on a one-yard dive with 3:03

left in the last period. Castaneda scored on the conversion to give the Cubs a 22-16 lead and victory.

"We still made a lot of mistakes but overcame those and pulled it out at the end," said Coach Johnson. "I would like to thank Coach Hargrove and all the coaching staff for their encouragement. I would like to thank the fans for all their support and following all the out of town games."

Delgado added his thoughts to the Cubs' season as he said, "I appreciate all the hard work the kids put into this football season. I would like to wish them good luck in high school next year. I would really like the guys to stick together through their senior year and achieve their full potential."

In an earlier game, the seventh grade Cubs lost to the Sonora Colts 40-6. The Cubs played a very good game considering they were outsized.

Coach Rick Bachman said, "I feel like Sonora is the best team we've played all year and best team talent wise--a great team. I was real proud of the boys for not giving up--they never quit. We played our hardest the whole game."

The Cubs were stopped cold on their first drive and forced to punt. Sonora received the ball on the Cub 29-yard line.

The Colts scored in two plays on a 7-yard touchdown run by Tom Jacoby with 3:43 left in the first period. A kick for the PAT was no good, but the Colts took a 6-0 lead.

On the next Cub possession, a Cub fumbled the ball and a Colt recovered it on the Cub 19-yard line. Again, the Colts took two plays to score, scoring on a 9-yard run by Jacoby with 2:25 left in the first period. The Colts faked an extra point, Jacoby ran the ball in for the conversion and they increased their score 14-0.

The Colts scored again on a 43-yard touchdown by Simon Murillo in the first period with 40 seconds re-

maining. A kick for the PAT failed but the Colts expanded their score 20-0.

The Cubs received the ball but were unable to move it. The Colts returned the punt for a 70-yard touchdown but it was negated due to Colt penalty. They scored again on a 64-yard touchdown, but it was brought back due to a Colt penalty.

The Colts did score a couple of plays later on a 25-yard run by Crispin Lira with 3:32 left in the second period. A run for the conversion was stopped by Dustin Faught, but they extended their score 26-0.

In the third quarter, Murillo scored on a 17-yard run with 2:57 left. The PAT by Jacoby failed but the Colts continued to lead 32-0.

Leon Garcia put a spark in the Cubs' team with an exciting 53-yard run with 5:07 left in the last quarter. Garcia ran for the conversion but failed with the Cubs on the board 32-6.

The Colts' last touchdown occurred with just 36 seconds left in the final period. Alex Rodriguez scored on a two-and-a-half yard run and the conversion run by Jacob Perceval was good to give the Colts a 40-6 victory.

Commenting on the season, Coach Bachman said, "I felt like we had a real good season. We had a great year and the kids improved from week to week."
