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Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne stopped by the office last week with additional information related to the 70 mph speed limit. Hearne commented that through the repeal of the federal 55 mph speed limit, the speeds reverted to the previous 70 mph by day and 65 mph night limits for passenger cars in Texas. Texas lawmakers did not then act on limit settings as stated in the Dec. 27 Stockman.

He also pointed out that a letter sent out Dec. 7 by the Texas Department of Public Safety to municipal and justice of the peace courts states that the President's repeal of the National Maximum Speed Limit "causes the expiration of Commission authority to set temporary speed limits of 55 miles per hour and 65 miles per hour on Texas Highways."

The letter continues to say "The Texas Department of Transportation will be required by state law to post 70 miles per hour day/65 miles per hour night speed limits for passenger cars on all rural roadways unless engineering and traffic investigations show that the speed limit should be lowered."

"This (a deviation from the 70/65 mph setting) can't be done until the (Texas) Legislature meets," said Hearne. "That's statute; that's what I deal in. Everything else is nice, it's pleasant, but if the governor didn't



Consumers Use "Red Flags" To Avoid Bad Info

If your New Year's resolution includes something related to diet and health, you need to be aware of a list recently issued by the Food and Nutrition Science Alliance. It's a rundown of 10 "Red Flags" of "junk science".

According to the chairman of FANSA, "Consumers can use these tips to evaluate reports on nutrition and health issues before jumping to premature conclusions." She noted any combination of these signs should send up a "red flag" of suspicion about the accuracy of the information.

Remember - just because it's in print or you heard it on tv or the radio doesn't mean it's accurate.

Here are FANSA's 10 Red Flags of Junk Science:

1. Recommendations that promise a quick fix 2. Dire warnings of danger from a



Competition finally became tougher for the 18-0 Ozona Lady Lions as they lost for the first time this year in a semifinal game with the 5A 10thranked Lubbock Monterey Lady Plainsmen last Saturday morning (Dec. 30) during the 37th Annual ABC Caprock Tournament in Lubbock.

Ozona had already defeated Amarillo Caprock, Gruver and Canyon Randall to reach the semifinals in the tournament. Monterey, with a season record of 16-2, rolled past Ralls last Thursday 70-28, defeated Shallowater 57-31 on Thursday evening, and beat the 4A Frenship Tigers, the No. 8 team in that classification, to reach the semifinals.

The Lady Lions' loss to Monterey 42-32 in overtime last Saturday morning put them in the third place game with the state's top Class 1A team, the Nazareth Lady Swifts, on Saturday afternoon at Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum. 
