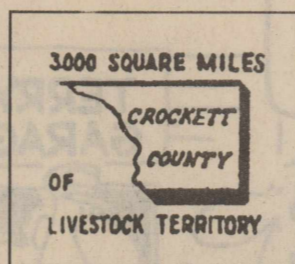

Town Meeting Thursday To Present Medical System Operation Proposals

Hospital board members and commissioners will meet in joint session Thursday, Jan. 18, to summarize the three proposals for operation of a health clinic in Ozona. The meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the district courtroom in the courthouse.

Proposals have been received from Shannon Health Systems and Angelo Community/Columbia, both of San Angelo. Figures have also been compiled by hospital administrator Virginia Box for operation by a clinic by the county. The following information is provided to assist citizens in preparing questions for the Thursday night meeting.

SHANNON HEALTH SYSTEMS

Facility Type:
Physicians' clinic with after hours emergency clinic operating under rural health clinic regulations

Degree of Operation:
Shannon to provide doctors, pay their salaries and those of clinic staff; equip and furnish eight exam rooms, two offices, waiting area.

Staffing:
Provide two doctors and a physician's assistant. Doctors paid on a per visit basis and for weekends rather than on percentage. If needed, Shannon will recruit doctors to be approved by board. Board has right to approve physician's assistant.

Support Personnel:
6 R.N.s, 3 L.V.N.s, 2 lab, 4 clerical (24-hour nursing staff); pay scale remains same.

Billing:
Shannon responsible for accounts receivable

Equipment:
Lab equipment upkeep responsibility of Shannon. Shannon to provide own phone system. Would help with equipment if new equipment needed.

Renovation:
All clinic facilities to be inside hospital. County to provide remodeling. Lab and x-ray rooms to remain where they are.

Overnight Care:
None. If Crockett County sets up skilled nursing facility, people can come there for observation.

County Responsibilities:
Pay for remodeling. (Included in first year's management fee paid to Shannon); pay for cost of building insurance, maintenance, housekeeping and utilities.

Management Fee Paid to Shannon by Crockett County:
1st Year: \$475,000 (includes renovation costs estimated at \$125,000 to \$150,000)
2nd Year: \$350,000
Years 3-5: \$325,000 per year

ANGELO COMMUNITY/COLUMBIA

Facility Type:
Emergency/urgent care with 23-hour observation capabilities under ACH license pending approval of their attorneys

Degree of Operation:
Community to provide billing and collection services related to emergency/urgent care, lab and x-ray services; continue to provide emergency medical service education for EMS personnel

Staffing:
Two doctors who will remain under contract to Crockett County. (Will be paid by county in addition to management fee.) Provide physician backup and recruitment.

Support Personnel:
14 1/2 persons (necessary nurses, technical staff and clerical) with night coverage probably by EMS personnel. R. N. on call every shift. Salaries competitive with this market.

Billing:
Community provides billing and collection services with revenues and charges to be turned over to Crockett County.

Equipment:
Not responsible for providing or repairing.

Renovation:
Clinic offices remain where they are. County to pay for requested renovations.

Overnight Care:
Possible 23-hour observation. 2 beds.

County Responsibilities:
Pay for remodeling. (Included in first year's management fee paid to Community.) Building expenses, including utilities and maintenance.

Management Fee Paid to Community by Crockett County:
1st Year: \$350,000 (includes renovation costs estimated at \$100,000.)
Years 2-5: \$240,000 per year paid as \$20,000 per month.

Additional:
Would like to establish on-site specialty consultations. (Orthopedics, rheumatology, cardiology, urology) Also sports medicine clinics, health fairs, wellness program, 55 PLUS program

The paving and renovation of the old show barn, along with the convention center, certainly improved the facilities and provided an excellent dust-free facility in which to have a livestock show according to many who were there. This year seven FFA members exhibited market swine in the show and did a very respectable job.

Livestock numbers and exhibitor numbers were down slightly this year; however, the quality of livestock was excellent according to Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent. Tara Wilkins exhibited the cham-

pion finewool cross lamb and the reserve champion finewool lamb. She received \$1,000 and a buckle from Ozona National Bank for her champion lamb and a buckle from Jimmy and Debbie Arrott for her reserve champion lamb.

The champion finewool lamb was exhibited by Lauren Wilkins who received \$1,000 from Crockett County National Bank and a buckle from Ozona Wool and Mohair. Lauren also received the coveted Regina Everett Memorial buckle for points accumulated in 1995 major livestock shows.

Exhibiting the reserve champion finewool cross market lamb was Amy Laughlin. She received \$750 from Union Pacific Resources and a buckle from Judge and Mrs. Jeffrey Sutton.

Amy also won champion senior showman and received a buckle from Crockett County National Bank.

Borrego Seeks Re-election As County Constable

Poor Nutrition And The Elderly--A National Problem

Why are the elderly at risk for poor nutrition in our country? Often, health problems resulting from aging may cause some older adults to be unable to shop for groceries, cook or even feed themselves. With these barriers, it's no surprise that these elders may become undernourished and unable to maintain their normal weight.

While most of us have no problem in gaining weight, many elderly fail to eat a sufficient amount and variety of food every day to make sure they're getting all the right nutrients and enough calories for their bodies to function properly. They may find themselves taking a number of medications and vitamin supplements. Other elders may consume too many empty calories and have problems with weight gain.

Older adults--just like the rest of us--need sound nutritional advice and a balanced diet supplying enough calories to meet reduced energy needs. A recent national screening of the elderly found that intake of vitamins B6, B12, and D, folacin, zinc, magnesium and calcium were often inadequate. The need for the B-vitamins and calcium may actually increase with age.

Getting enough foods that contain these nutrients can be a problem. Elderly adults need to select foods of higher nutrient density per calorie--that is, the foods should be high in nutrients for the number of calories consumed. A variety of healthful food choices from the USDA Food Guide Pyramid is the easiest way to achieve this goal.

To avoid gaining too much weight--but still consume enough calories and nutrients for good health, the elderly should reduce their intake of dietary fats and refined carbohydrates, while increasing the amount of lowfat milk and other calcium-containing foods, plus breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables.

Also, it's important for older adults to drink enough liquids (six to eight cups daily) because they have less saline and digestive fluids as they age.

Certainly, if a doctor prescribes a particular vitamin or mineral supplement, an older adult who can't consume adequate levels of food to get the right nutrients could benefit. However, self-prescribing supplements in large doses can be harmful. Taking very large (megadoses) of vitamins and minerals can cause harmful reactions over time, and getting too much of one substance can interfere with

your body's ability to use another properly.

If you are having trouble eating enough of the right kinds of foods--or if someone you know may not be getting enough nourishment because of aging or other health complications, consider consulting a registered dietician. Our large area hospitals each have dietitians on staff, and you can usually make an appointment to visit with them and analyze your diet. You can always ask your doctor to help you link up with a dietician.

Museum Notes From Mary

The campaign for Crockett County Sheriff is in full swing now with signs in various yards all over town. There are some really good men competing this year, and it looks like a close race. Of course, we all like to predict who the winner will be just to see if we'd been anywhere close to right when it's all said and done. We've visited with some of the candidates and explored some of their ideas with them. We're impressed by the positive attitude and level-headed thinking of these fellows.

There have been numerous sheriff's elections in Crockett County and many have worn the badge - 15 men and a woman named Mrs. W. S. Willis, who was appointed when her husband died while in office. She served the shortest term from August 27, 1941, until January 1942 when Frank James took office. Billy Mills set the record with 32 years.

John C. Perry was the very first local sheriff, serving from 1891 to 1894. He was a rancher in Crockett County until he decided it was getting too crowded around here and moved to South America - Argentina, I believe. There was free land for grazing cattle. Great encouragement for settling there.

The Ozona Kicker (the newspaper at that time) received a letter from Mrs. Perry telling how, after settling down to life there, they heard of some folks in the next valley who'd come from Texas. They set out to visit them. Imagine they planned on talking about things they had in common - ranching, Texas, moving so far from home - you know, neighborly things. On the way they stopped to inquire explicit directions. Good thing they did. They learned their distant neighbors were

none other than Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, whom Mr. Perry at one time had rather strongly invited to leave Ozona. They were considered outlaws in Texas for years, you know. Well, the Perrys turned around and headed for home. He remembered the first confrontation and didn't care for another. He also figured they wouldn't be welcome there, either. Sometimes it's just best to leave well enough alone.

There are many stories about life in and around the jail house, and since the sheriff's election is on our minds anyway, I'll bring some of these stories out and shake the dust off. We may just see a few changes in the sheriff's since it all began 105 years ago - when this was truly the wild west.

Librarian Joins State Training Program

Last fall, Crockett County librarian Louise Ledoux joined 125 of her colleagues from around the state taking part in the Texas State Library's Small Library Management Training Program. The program is designed to provide and enhance basic management skills of library directors in smaller communities who have not had formal library school coursework. Five core courses are offered over a two and a half year period, including administration and planning, collection development, reference services, cataloging and automation, and advanced management issues. Participants attend a two-day workshop each spring and fall until they have completed the entire program, and receive up to 14 hours of State-approved continuing education credit for each session they attend. Ms. Ledoux has attended all four sessions offered so far, and will be one of the first program graduates next spring. These training sessions are intensive, stimulating and exhaustive ac-

ording to Belinda Boon, continuing education consultant for library development of the Texas State Library. Participants are encouraged to apply the theories and practices learned to their own unique situations, and to network with other librarians in their region. "Ms. Ledoux's active involvement in the State Library training program represents a substantial commitment of time, energy and personal expense in an effort to improve her skills as an information professional," said Ms. Boon. "This commitment leads directly to a better served and more informed local citizenry."

"Congratulations are in order to the city of Ozona for having such a dedicated professional managing the library. Take the time this week to stop by and commend Ms. Ledoux on her efforts. Your encouragement and support will help her reach her education and training goals, and result in better library services for the entire community."

"I was proud of the kids because they didn't quit and played hard all night long," said Coach Casey. "I though we played well in spurts, and it was a big win for us."

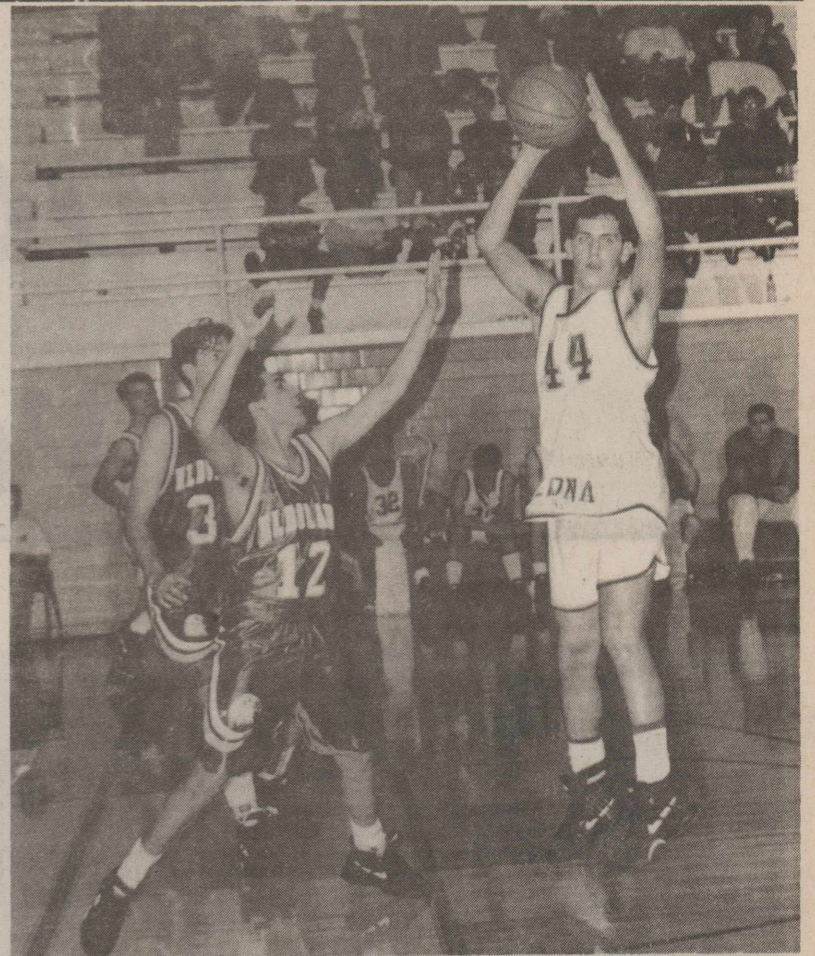

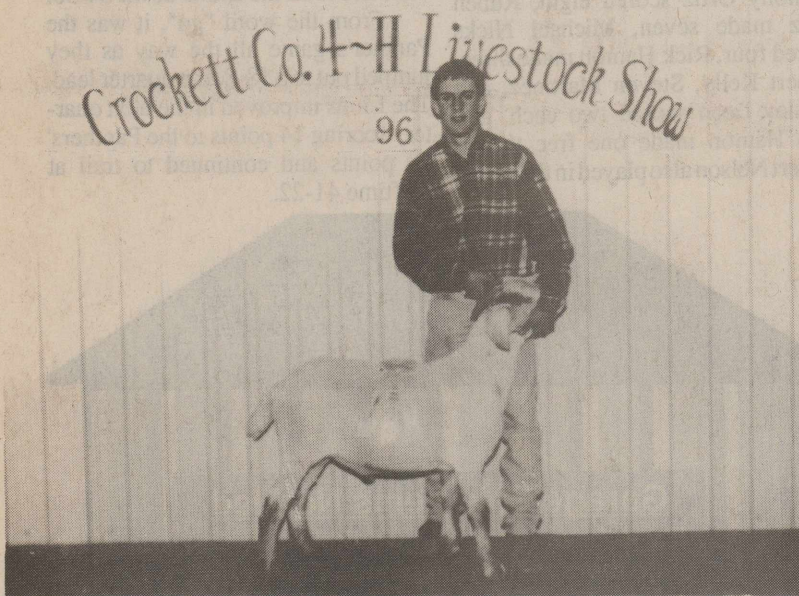

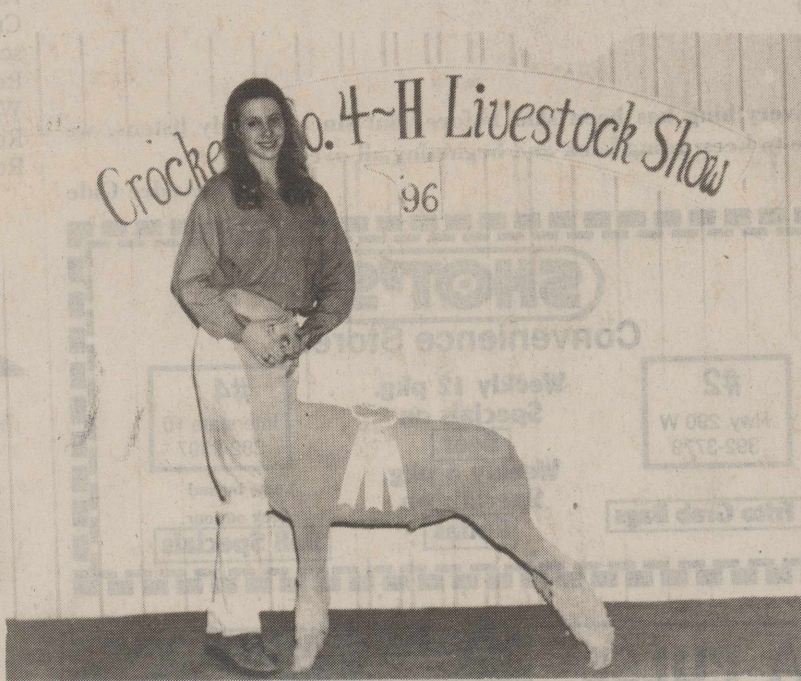

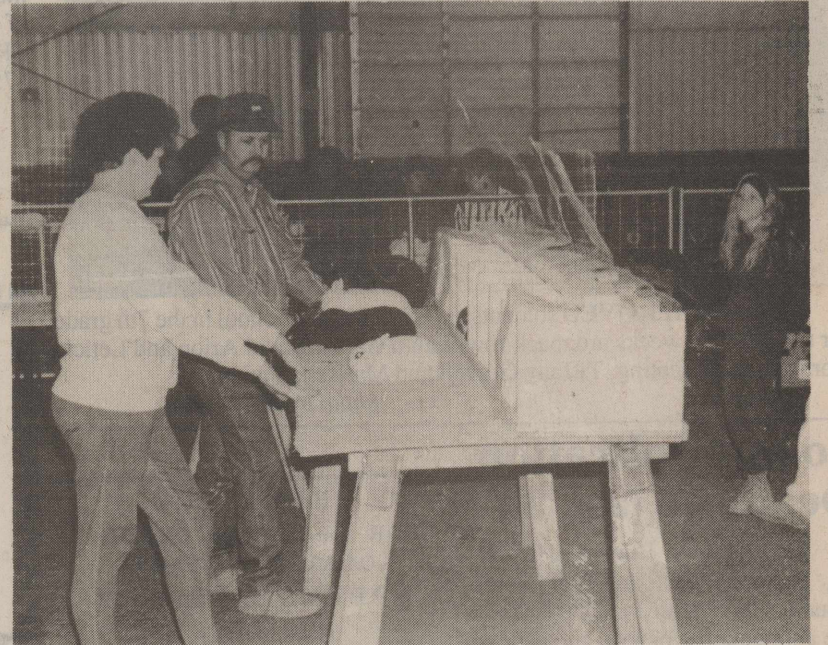

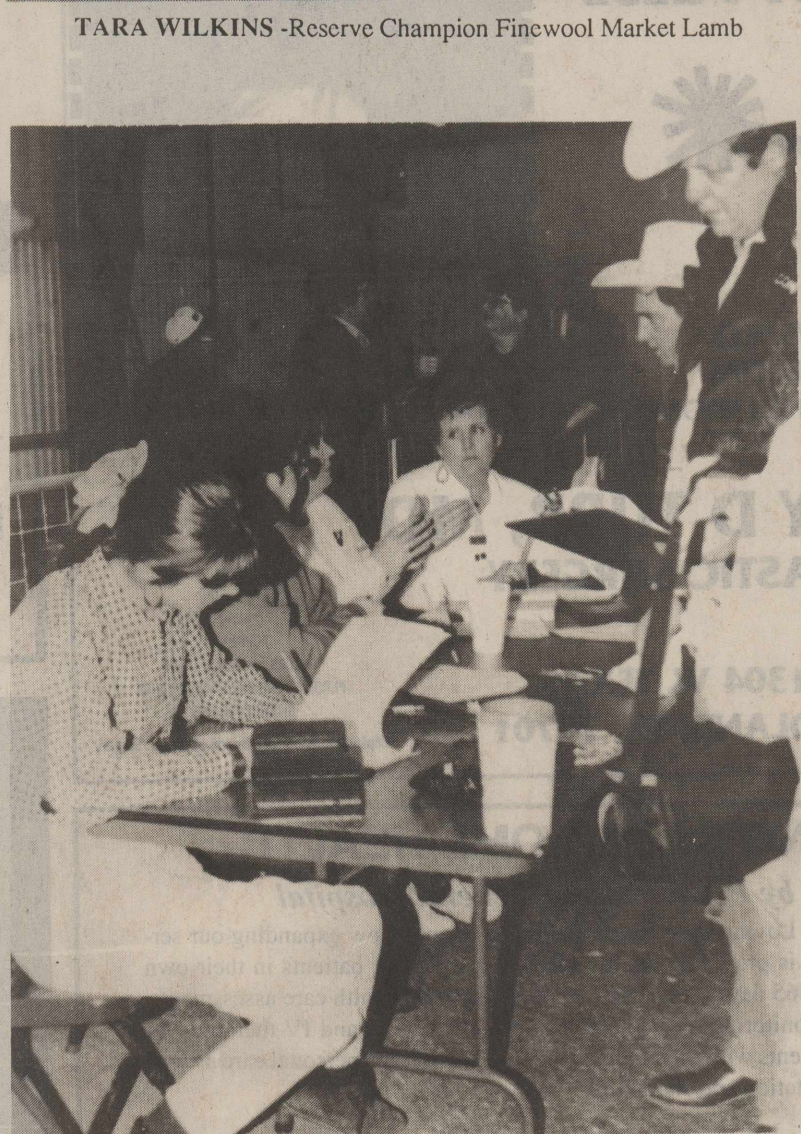

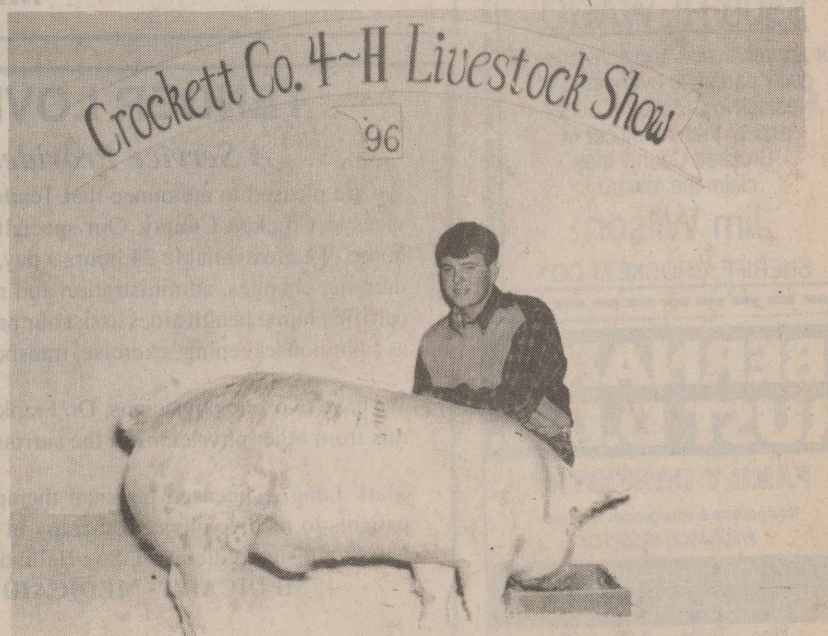

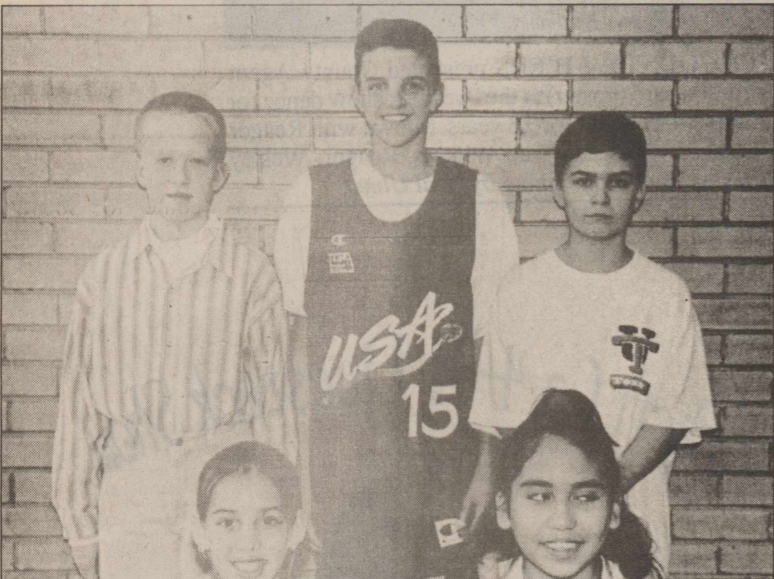

Loan Application Deadline Jan. 24

Businesses in Brewster, Crockett, Pecos, Terrell and Val Verde Counties have until Jan. 24, 1996, to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from drought which occurred Aug. 19, 1994, and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply. Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the drought reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the weather are not eligible.

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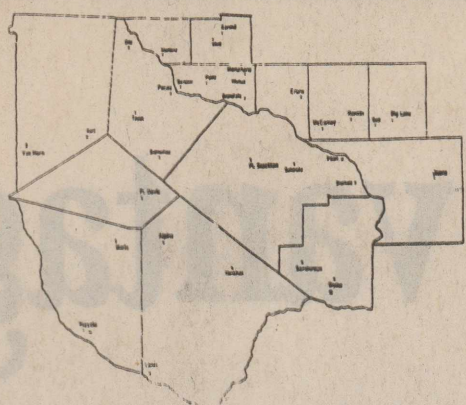

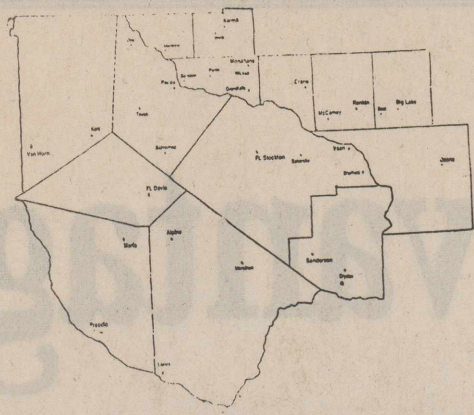

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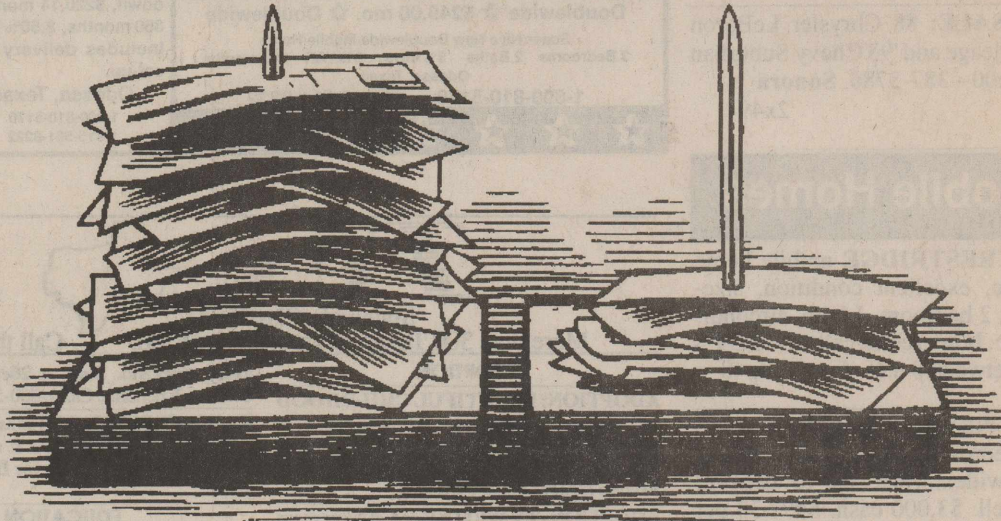
