Town Meeting Thursday To Present Medical System Operation Proposals

Hospital board members and commissioners will meet in joint session Thursday, Jan. 18, to summarize the three proposals for operation of a health clinic in Ozona. The meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the district courtroom in the courthouse.

Proposals have been received from Shannon Health Systems and Angelo Community/Columbia, both of San Angelo. Figures have also been compiled by hospital administrator Virginia Box for operation by a clinic by the county. Ms. Monroe earned her bachelor's degree in 1986 from Angelo State University.







Poor Nutrition And The Elderly--A National Problem

Why are the elderly at risk for poor nutrition in our country? Often, health enough of the right kinds of foods--or problems resulting from aging may cause some older adults to be unable feed themselves. With these barriers, tions, consider consulting a registered it's no surprise that these elders may become undernourished and unable to maintain their normal weight.

While most of us have no problem in gaining weight, many elderly fail to eat a sufficient amount and variety of food every day to make sure they're getting all the right nutrients and enough calories for their bodies to function properly. They may find themselves taking a number of medications and vitamin supplements. Other elders may consume too many empty calories and have problems with weight gain.

Older adults--just like the rest of us--need sound nutritional advice and a balanced diet supplying enough

these nutrients can be a problem. Elderly adults need to select foods of higher nutrient density per calorie-nutrients for the number of calories at 392-5165. consumed. A variety of healthful food choices from the USDA Food Guide Pyramid is the easiest way to achieve

To avoid gaining too much weight--but still consume enough calories and nutrients for good health, the elderly should reduce their intake of dietary fats and refined carbohydrates, while increasing the amount of lowfat milk and other calcium-containing foods, plus breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables.






