Bill Mason has filed as an independent candidate for county attorney in the November general election.

Mason's petition was filed with Judge Jeffrey Sutton on May 9.

To file as an independent, the candidate must present a petition with a number of names equal to 10 percent of those voting in the last gubernatorial election. Those signing may not have voted in the primary or primary run-off for the general election in which the candidate wishes to run.

An independent candidate can not file for a place on the ballot until after the primary runoff.

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales continued to wage war on the tobacco industry last week when he suggested Texas sell more than \$500 million in tobacco stocks it holds in its pension and endowment funds.

Texas should not be in business with those who seek to do our children harm. Our state should repudiate its financial involvement in these unconscionable efforts to profiteer at the expense of our children's lives," Morales told the Dallas Morning News.

But Jack Maroney, an attorney for Philip Morris Inc., a defendant in the lawsuit, characterized Morales' plea to dump tobacco stocks as "another attack on business."

In late March, Morales filed suit against the tobacco industry on federal racketeering charges.

Last week, Morales wrote letters requesting the sell-off to the Teachers Retirement System, the Employees Retirement System, the Permanent University Fund and the Permanent School Fund, the Morning News reported.

Morales spokesman Ron Dusek said the attorney general was obligated to tell the state funds that "tobacco stock will plummet" as a result of litigation against the industry, and that his letters were made public because his advice could affect the stock market.

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The largest investor in tobacco stocks of the four funds is the Teacher Retirement System, which holds \$413 million.

Also last week, State Board of Education chairman Jack Christy of Houston said the 14-member panel would meet this week and discuss Morales' request to sell tobacco stock in the Permanent School Fund, which the board oversees,

the Houston Chronicle reported. Christy told the Chronicle he believes it is morally wrong for the state to invest education dollars in tobacco stocks. "On one hand we're telling the kids (smoking) is evil, and on the other hand we're taking the tobacco industry's

Ray Sullivan, a spokesman for Gov. George W. Bush, said the governor would leave the decision of whether to divest tobacco stocks with the boards that govern the four

Bomer Orders Billing Change

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer ordered Allstate and Farmers insurance companies to change the way they have calculated auto and homeowners insurance premi-

Last week, Bomer ordered the two companies to stop rounding bills to the nearest dollar a practice that has resulted in allegations of overcharging.

Policyholders of Allstate and Farmers have a lawsuit pending in a South Texas state court alleging the companies have overcharged customers more than \$100 million over the last decade.

Spokesmen for Allstate and Farmers said the companies would comply with Bomer's order.

Bomer has acknowledged that the insurance companies were misinformed by state regulators about how to calculate premiums. In other news, Bomer adopted

a fraud-prevention policy that requires new insurance agents to be fingerprinted and submit to criminal background checks.

Bomer said that every year

consumers are defrauded by a few agents who would not have been issued a license if they had disclosed their criminal records to the Texas Department of Insurance.

The policy will go into effect this summer.

Morales Gets Party Help

Victor Morales, the Democratic nominee for the seat now occupied by Republican U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, said last week he would accept help from party headquarters in Washington, D.C., but he would not take orders from a campaign coordinator.

"The bottom line is that I will still be my own man. No one is going to tell me what to do," Morales told the Austin American-Statesman.

Greg Weiner, an aide to U.S. Sen. Bob Kerry, D-Neb., and Morales' new campaign coordinator, said Morales' desire to remain the decision-maker is not a problem. "Victor has got a winning


Other Capital Highlights

 Austin had the biggest increase in violent crime in the nation from 1994 to 1995 among the 73 cities with a population of at least 200,000, according to the FBI and U.S. census. Violent crimes reported during the period, including murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, increased from 3,249 to 4,050, or 24.65 percent.

Austin could become the first major city in the United States to require all bicyclists to wear protective helmets under a proposed mandatory helmet law. Thirteen states and many counties and cities have bike helmet laws, but most of those laws only require children to wear helmets, according to the Bicycle Federation of America.









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

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

Stories about Ozona abound at the museum through the treasures kept there, but also in our history book. That book is used every day as visitors learn about the struggles and successes of building a town around a tree and a water well in this semi-arid land. Most of those early settlers had long hours in the hot sun before they had a permanent roof to sleep under. Many lived in tents for awhile. Pioneer legacy is sometimes romanticized in movies and novels, but the living descendents can remember hearing how it really was around here a hundred

We haven't forgotten those brave and solid folks who gave up their lifestyle elsewhere to settle this area and build this beautiful town for us to enjoy. Even though they had a frugal existence I'd believe they were happy as they worked, for it is work that gives us a sense of belonging to this world. Without a feeling of accomplishment what is life? From what I've heard, the early Ozona people didn't even know what "being bored" meant.

In remembrance of these pioneers, the Crockett County Heritage Sculpture Organization was formed, with members who represent a cross section of the area residents. This group of folks has invited Judy Black,

"Ozona, Biggest Little Town in who is a native of Crockett County, to express her talent for bronze scupting by creating a very special monument for our town square. The sculpture organization members chose the image of a lady beside a man holding a little boy. It will be worked in life-and-a-quarter size and will be mounted on a base. 





Exciting Summer Programs Offered To Texas Teens

Teens in Texas have tremendous opportunities for learning about state government, the environment and wildlife in three unique programs sponsored by Texas 4-H. This summer, teenagers will have the chance to visit the Big Bend of Texas or the Gulf Coast to learn about wildlife management and the environment, or to actually pass legislation on the floor of Texas' State Capitol Building.

Texas 4-H Congress in Austin, slated for July 14-17, is open to 15-19 year olds. A prestigious event held biannually, Congress is the learning opportunity of a lifetime for a 4-H member interested in government. The youth actually hold legislative sessions and pass bills during their time in Austin, serving as county "delegates" to the 4-H House and Senate.

Adventures in the Big Bend are a significant part of the Trans-Pecos 4-H Wildlife Camp slated for July 8-10 in Alpine at Sul Ross State University. Ages for the camp are 13 and up. Topics include conservation eth-


ics, species diversity, habitat management, census techniques and prey/ predator interactions.



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

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

District 6 4-H Horse Show Scheduled For June 18-19

The 1996 District 6 4-H Horse Show is set for June 18-19 in Fort Stockton. Classes will include timed events such as barrel racing, poles, stakes and roping. Judged events are showmanship, mare and gelding classes, western horsemanship, western riding and western pleasure. A new addition to the open show will be mule showmanship, mule western pleasure and mulemanship. The mule classes are on a trial basis. Participants that earn enough points in the qualifying show, which is judged events, poles, barrels and stakes, will qualify to participate at the State 4-H Horse Show in July in Abilene.

Participants in the open show event, which includes roping, team penning, jumping, reining, working cow horse and cutting, do not have to earn points to participate at the State Horse Show Open Division. Fees include a \$10.00 administrative fee plus entry for events. Entry fees range from \$5-\$30 depending on the event.
