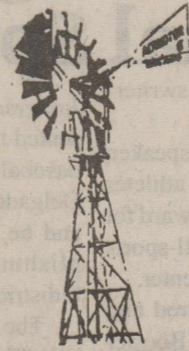
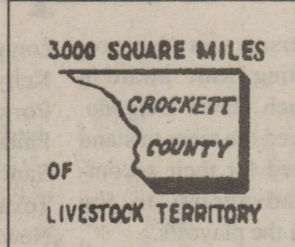

Cloud Seeding Association Receives \$70,269 Grant

The Texas Water Development Board has awarded a \$70,269 grant to the West Texas Weather Modification Association. The grant will be funded through the board's research and planning fund.

The association is comprised of six ground-water conservation districts representing Crockett, Glasscock, Irion, Reagan, Schleicher and Sterling counties.

Approval was given to the association for its unsolicited water research application to evaluate cloud seeding using hygroscopic materials rather than the silver iodide materials currently used in weather modification. Initial studies indicate that rainfall is enhanced in West Texas by cloud seeding, however, there is not sufficient data for a statistically sig-

nificant conclusion. Preliminary evidence indicates that the hygroscopic materials are more effective in augmenting rainfall in South Africa, a climate similar to the conditions that exist in West Texas. The proposed study using hygroscopic materials will probably not result in conclusive evidence of the effectiveness of weather modification according to the Texas Water Development Board, but it may assist in developing more effective weather modification procedures for Texas using these materials.

The association will initiate its evaluation program this summer, pending permit approvals. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission is also contributing \$16,500 in materials to be used in the proposed research.

Lions Whip The Wall Hawks 9-7 For The Bi-district Crown

The Ozona Lions maintained a lead and held off a comeback try to defeat the Wall Hawks 9-7 in the Class 2A bidistrict game held last Saturday afternoon in Sonora. Two weeks ago, the Lions clinched their first-ever District 5-2A championship winning three-of-four round robin games. This past Saturday's win over the Hawks gave the Lions (9-13) their first playoff victory.

"We did what we had to do to win," said Lion baseball coach David Delgado. "We had good balance once again, it was a complete team effort."

It appeared to be a great afternoon for the Lions as they jumped to an early 2-0 lead in the first inning. About 75 to 100 Ozona fans cheered and watched the Lions win their first playoff victory.

Two singles started off the first in-

ning as Jon Sanchez got the first one and Andy Gann got the second one. Pete Castaneda walked to load the bases and Jamie Ramos walked to bring in Sanchez for the first run. A sacrifice fly by Ramon Longoria brought in Gann for the second Ozona run.

The Lions heated it up in the fourth inning, when Brian Badillo reached base on a fielder's choice, then Anthony Ortiz hit a single and John Ortiz walked to load the bases. Sanchez singled driving in two runs, then both Lance Jamerson and Castaneda walked after being hit by the pitcher, scoring John Ortiz. Jamie Ramos also walked scoring Sanchez to extend the Lions' lead with four runs to 6-0.

Ramon Longoria got on base with a single to start the fifth inning and Efran Ramirez came in as a courtesy

Bond Election Called For July

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session last Wednesday, May 15, unanimously approved an order of a bond election

to be held on July 16 for building improvements in the district.

Proposition #1 of the bond election will be for \$3,600,000.00 and will include demolishing the existing Ozona Middle School and constructing a new middle school, addition and modifications to the existing middle school gym, remodeling intermediate school classroom storage areas, installation of new liquid marker boards throughout the district, remodeling the three science labs at Ozona High School, renovations to the existing high school stage, and cosmetic repairs and touch-up to high school campus facilities.

Proposition #2 will be for \$1,390,000.00 and will include construction of a competition gymnasium across the street from the high school auditorium, construction of an expansion to the boys' field house at the school stadium to accommodate both boys' and girls' weight training programs, and cosmetic improvements and the addition of a whirlpool to the girls' field house.

The improvements will be financed through the issuance of bonds for a 7-year period. Proposition #1 will increase the district's current tax rate by an average of 10 cents for the 7-year period, and Proposition #2 will be four cents for a total increase of 14 cents. There will also be a recapture (3.5 cents) required by the Texas Supreme Court ruling in the Edgewood III Case for a total increase of approximately 17.5 cents for the seven years.

Proposition #1 and Proposition #2 will appear separately on the ballot and voters will have the opportunity to vote on each proposition.

During the meeting the members went into executive session at 7:38 p.m. to discuss a report on the environmental issues of property the district is interested in purchasing. After the regular meeting was resumed at 8:20 p.m., the trustees voted to rescind a contract between the school district and Mr. John Michael and Mrs. Louise Perner Ledoux for the purchase of

Commissioners Order Bond Election

County commissioners passed an order for a school bond election at their meeting May 16. The election will be July 16.

Commissioners have the ultimate responsibility of ordering a school election in Ozona because this is a common school district, not an independent school district.

At the May 16 meeting, commissioners also voted to hire Leticia Payne as relief Thunderbird bus driver and to rent the north pool for an end of school party for Ozona Middle School.

Run-off Election Challenged

Robert F. (Bob) Rodriguez filed suit Wednesday, May 15, contesting the Democratic Primary run-off election and asking for a new special run-off election. Rodriguez lost the April 9 run-off in the sheriff's race to Shane Fenton 902 to 975.

The suit is styled Robert F. Rodriguez vs. Shane Fenton.

In his petition filed in the office of Debbi Puckett, county and district clerk, Rodriguez alleges that the run-off result is not official because the election was not canvassed by the Crockett County Democratic Party Executive Committee consisting of party chairman A. O. Fields and the four Democratic chairpersons, Juanita Delgado, Donna Sanders, Bobbie Fatout and Concha Zapata.

The petition states that because "the recount has yet to be canvassed by the proper authority," Fenton has yet to be certified as the Democratic nominee for sheriff in the November General Election.

Alleged irregularities, violations of the Texas Election Code and other discrepancies occurring during the election should cause the run-off to be declared void and a new election called, claims the petition.

Fenton is accused of improper and unusual behavior by campaigning at the post office "in apparent violation of federal rules, regulations, etc. prohibiting campaigning in federal buildings...thereby, potentially convincing at least a couple of hundred

undecided voters and/or voters who did not intend to vote, to actually vote for Contestee" (Fenton).

The petition requests that if the election is not declared void and a new one ordered, that the ballots be recounted, retabulated and a correct return made. A further request is that, if evidence warrants, Rodriguez be "declared entitled to the office of Sheriff of Crockett County".

Rodriguez is represented by Gonzalo P. Rios of San Angelo.

The primary run-off between Rodriguez and Fenton was recounted on April 16 at Rodriguez' request with little change according to results released at that time. In the run-off, Rodriguez received 902 which changed to 900 after the recount. Fenton received 975 in the run-off and 976 after the recount. Figures in Rodriguez' suit claim that there are four unaccounted ballots.

A state inspector appointed by the Secretary of State was present for the primary and the run-off election at Rodriguez' request.

In her report, the inspector for the run-off said, "No major irregularities were observed. The election workers were experienced and aware of their responsibilities and duties. Election officers were efficient and conducted themselves in a professional and courteous manner."

The case has been assigned to Judge James Onion of Kerrville. As of Monday, no hearing dates had been set.

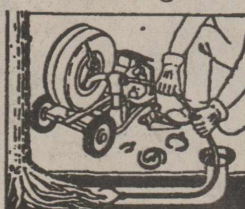

Lion Fighting Hearts Recognized At Annual Sports Banquet

Good food, an enjoyable speaker, and recognition of the fine athletes from Ozona High were the reward for those attending the annual all-sports banquet May 9 in the civic center.

A delicious meal prepared and served by the Ozona Athletic Booster Club got the parents, coaches, athletes, and others in a receptive mood for the evening's speaker and the awards.

President of the booster club, Jeffrey Stuart, welcomed everyone on behalf of the booster club and the school. Athletic director Walter Hargrove introduced his coaching staff and explained to the crowd that approximately 200 youth were involved in high school and junior high school sports in the 1995-96 school year. He said, "The staff does a tremendous job with your kids."

Coach Hargrove introduced the guest speaker, Coach Rudy Maskew, an offensive back coach for Texas Tech University. He gave an inspiring speech, noting that putting out effort as an individual will help the team. He said, "As you improve as an individual, you improve as a team." He was also reminded of a saying on a sign in Lubbock which relates to teamwork, taking care of one's own business, and not being critical of others' performance. "You were put here to play the game, not to keep score."

Referring to the team achievements listed for each sport in the printed program, Coach Maskew said, "I've spoken at a few of these things (banquets), but what you've done this year is truly amazing."

Highlights of the evening were the presentations of the "OHS Outstanding Athlete" Award and the "Fighting Heart" Awards. Receiving the girls' outstanding athlete award was sophomore Amber Tarr. The boys' outstanding award went to senior Lance Jamerson. Tarr competed in basketball, track and tennis, while Jamerson competed in football, basketball, and baseball. Coach Dickie Faught presented the award to Tarr and Coach Hargrove presented the award to

Jamerson. Jamerson was also presented the "Fighting Heart" award in baseball by Coach David Delgado. Delgado also asked the team to stand and be recognized for their accomplishment in advancing to the bidistrict level in the playoffs.

The Class 2A Girls State Basketball Champion Ozona Lady Lions were presented the girls' basketball "Fighting Heart" award as a team for the second year in a row. The award was presented by coach Dickie Faught, who said, "It was just too hard to try to pick one individual from the team, because these girls are truly a team in all they do."

A proclamation by the 1996 Texas Legislature sponsored by State Representative Bob Turner was also read by Becky Childress, who presented the proclamation to the Lady Lions. The boys' basketball award was presented for the second year in a row to senior Ray Fierro by Coach Ronnie Casey, who noted Fierro is the most outstanding point guard he has ever coached.

The boys' tennis award was presented to Marty Martinez by Coach Ronnie Casey. Donika Martinez received the girls' award in tennis.

This team was

Coach Maldonado presented the girls' cross country award to Amy Laughlin and the boys' award to Johnny Porras.

For the first time, a powerlifting award was presented by Coach Rod Schneider. The first recipient of the award for this relatively new program was Matthew Galindo.

Head football coach Walter Hargrove presented the football award to senior David Browne. Browne was injured early in the season with a knee injury and came back to lead the Lions later in the season.

Coach Hargrove introduced the 1995-96 coaching staff. Ray and Leticia Schalek became the owners of T&T Village Supermarket, Inc. April 1, purchasing the business from Oscar Tumlinson.

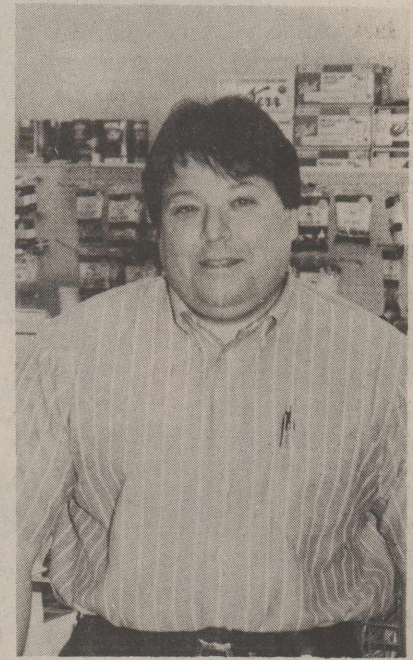
Schalek, who was employed for 15 years by M'System Food Stores, worked with Tumlinson at M'System 10 of those years.

Ulcers Can Occur In Children

Like adults, children can get ulcers.

"Children can get ulcers from infection with the bacterium *Helicobacter pylori*, from reactions to certain drugs or from stress due to serious injury, infection or disease," said Dr. Mark Gilger, a pediatric gastroenterologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Because children aren't good at pointing to the location of pain, Gilger recommends that parents look for symptoms:

*Abdominal pain that has occurred at least three times in three months.

*Awakening at night due to abdominal pain.

*Recurrent vomiting or vomiting with blood.

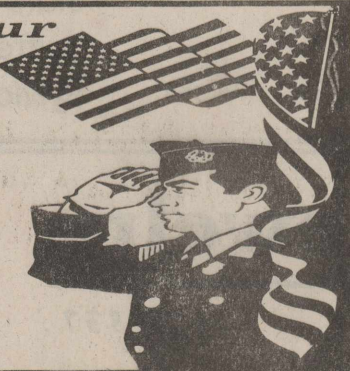

Museum Notes From Mary

Rain seems to be on everyone's mind lately, and most of us have been known to plead for rain from our Creator. On bended knee in church and at home we implore Him to bless our dry land with welcome moisture to produce life on our pastures so the life in our pastures may thrive. We can irrigate our lawns to a lush green, but fields are a different matter, and it's a struggle within a rancher, especially in the spring, whether to continue feeding or sell off the stock. I've never been a rancher, so I can only suppose their inner feelings. They know the land and the uncertainty of the weather.

In reading our history book, published in 1976, I found the page that was taken from Allan R. Bosworth's book titled *Ozona Country*. I've long admired his writing style and his way with words. Today we'll see what he had to say about this rugged land we call Crockett County, which he dearly loved.

"The Creator was in a mood both expansive and capricious. He decreed room here on a magnificent scale, with horizons running into tomorrow and skies unfathomably deep and blue. He fashioned a country of infinite distance, lovely to look at in season. But then He gave it more of weather than climate, and whether in divine wisdom or a moment of whimsy, He failed to provide dependable rain.

"Ozona country is a land of thirst. When rain comes, it sometimes comes with an incredible violence, and flash floods have helped shape the topography; gently here, abruptly broken there. But the long periods of thirst, more than anything else, fashioned the landscape, the economy, the growth, and even the physical forms of plant and animal life. Many creatures - including early man and some men not so early - were unable to endure thirst. They either moved on, or perished."

Allie knew this country well, having come in a covered wagon in 1907 at the tender age of 5, he learned the ways of life in this dry land. He served his country as a captain in the United States Navy, traveled far and eventually became a newspaperman in California, but he always carried Ozona, his home town, deep in his

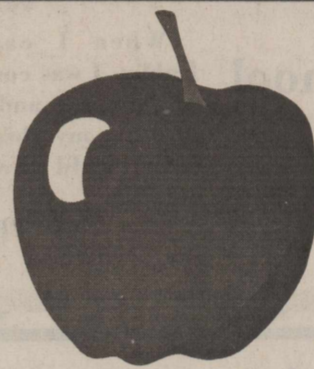

of those voting in the last gubernatorial election. Those signing could not have voted in the primary or primary run-off for the 1996 general election.

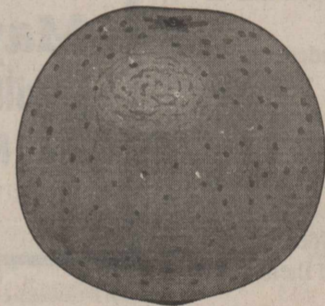
For those of you who wondered, the letter written by county attorney Orlando DeHoyos regarding a junior membership for golfers did not say "county" club instead of country club. That was a typo.

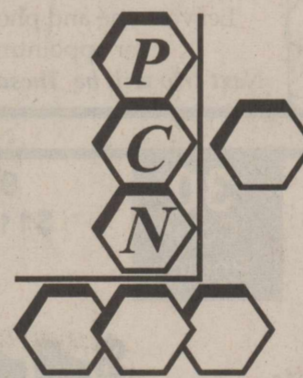

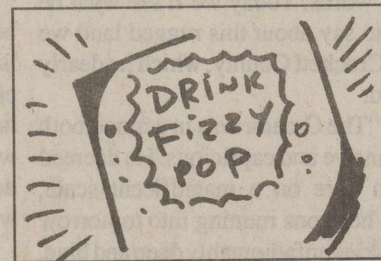

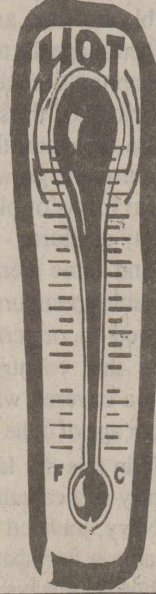

Toxic Range Plants And Drought

When managing livestock during drought conditions, toxic range plants can become a major problem. The possibility of toxic plant consumption by grazing livestock is more pronounced during drought due to reduced grazing selectivity. Such problems may be accentuated by livestock deficiencies of phosphorus or vitamin A which can greatly alter livestock grazing behavior.

During periods of drought, many of the more palatable range plants mature and dry up early. Thus, little good forage is produced during much of the grazing season. In contrast, several toxic plants have the ability to remain green during these periods. As a result, these toxic plants increase in relative palatability and receive increased use.

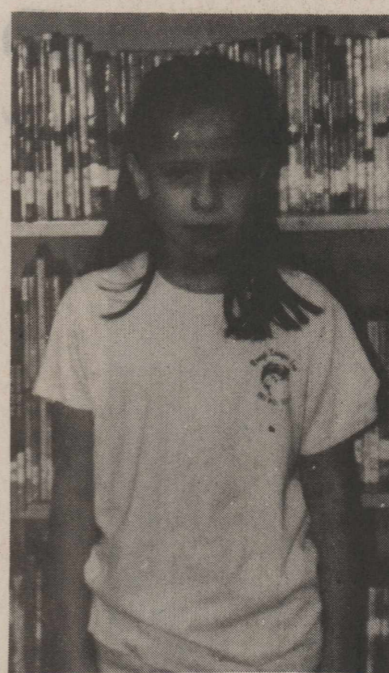
The effects of drought are greatly intensified on overgrazed ranges. On overgrazed ranges, the more palatable non-toxic range plants are already in a weakened state and even the slightest of droughts can cause severe problems. Overgrazed ranges and those that are in a weakened state due to drought, are highly susceptible to a sudden flush of toxic plant growth when the drought initially breaks or when small thunder storms pass through during a drought. It is because of this, that as the drought becomes more severe, the potential for toxic plant problems becomes even greater. Temporary drought or extended dry periods may also cause some plants to wilt and become toxic that would normally not be a threat.

So how can we prevent livestock poisoning due to toxic plants during a drought? If grazing must occur, as it usually does, livestock poisoning may be inevitable. However, there are a few general rules that help reduce or eliminate the chances for toxic plant poisonings. First, use good grazing management practices. Stocking rates should be flexible to match forage demand with forage supply. Grazing systems which give additional rest to plants during drought are preferred over continuous grazing, and livestock distribution within a pasture becomes even more important during drought situations. Good grazing management helps to maintain an alternative forage choice over toxic plants.

Secondly, use good livestock management practices. Strategic supplemental feeding may help reduce losses to toxic plants. Supplementing adequate protein and phosphorus may keep animals from seeking out toxic plants that are high in protein. Vitamin A deficiency, also common on drought stressed rangeland, may alter the grazing habits of the animal and cause it to consume toxic plants that would normally not be consumed. Good livestock management practices also means never releasing hungry animals into a pasture that is known to have toxic plants, especially when toxic plants are the only "green" forage available.

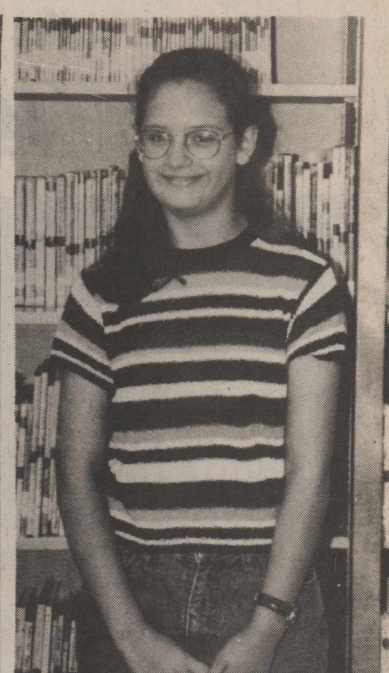
Finally, plant control measures may become necessary to avoid livestock losses to toxic plants. Generally during a drought, fire is not the first control method to choose. However, mechanical, chemical and biological control methods are valid options. It is extremely important to know what, where, when and how to control toxic plants during drought. Individual plant treatments (IPT) may be more effective over broadcast treatments for chemical control during drought. IPT treatments allow the applicator to selectively control only target species leaving the other broadleaf weeds as potential feed. While some plants are toxic to one class of livestock they may not be to another class. Cleaning up the range by first grazing with animals not affected by the plant toxins and following later in the season with grazing animals that would be affected by the plant is an example of biological control.

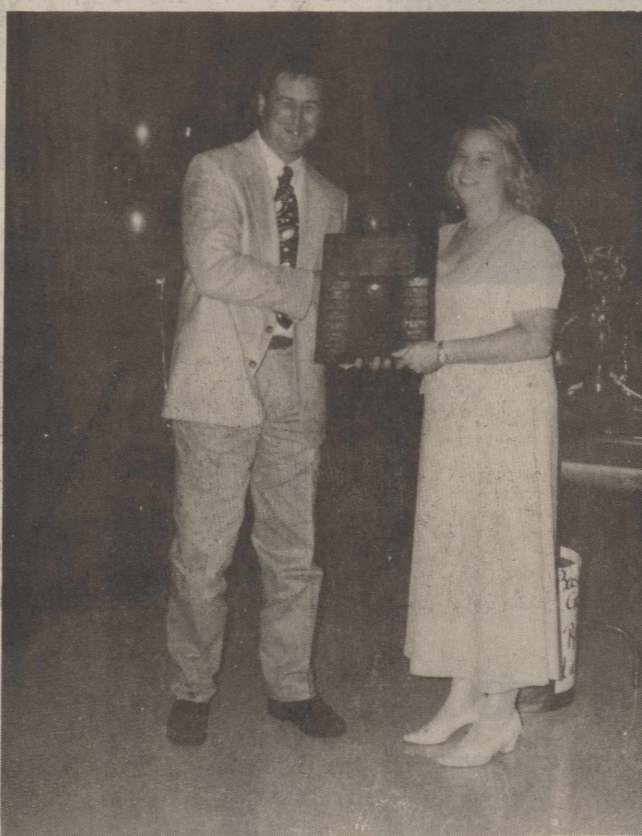

Since 1983, the world's total output of primary energy—petroleum, natural gas, coal, hydroelectricity and nuclear electricity—has increased steadily at an average annual rate of 2.3 percent.

Here's To Your Health

The U. S. government has joined the debate on whether to drink alcohol. For the first time, the government recommends moderate alcohol consumption in its revised "Dietary Guidelines for Americans".

Dr. Norman Kaplan, professor of internal medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas and an expert in hypertension and preventive cardiology, has long advocated a few alcoholic drinks for better health.

"A couple of beers each day or a glass of wine with dinner is not only okay, it is helpful," Kaplan says. "Studies show that people who regularly consume moderate amounts of alcohol have less heart disease."

Alcohol may increase the risk of cancer in women slightly, but not significantly if alcohol intake is limited to three or four drinks a week, Kaplan says. For men, one or two drinks a day is adequate.

People also should eat a balanced diet, exercise regularly and stop smoking to keep their hearts in tiptop shape.

their property because the cost and exposure to liability from the fuel tanks located on this property was unacceptable to the district.

The trustees voted to approve the implementation of a new kindergarten through grade two phonics program, Saxon Phonics, next year. The program, recommended by the teachers at Ozona Primary School and presented by Marilyn Luce, Ozona Primary principal, will be funded through federal funds.

Saxon Phonics for kindergarten students begins by working with auditory discrimination skills to see if the children are aware of the different sounds of the English language and are ready to learn to read. When they are ready, the teacher begins by teaching the name, sound and written form of each letter. In order to provide plenty of time for practice, one week is devoted to each letter.

When the next letter is taught, the students review all previously taught letters, as they do every day for the entire year to make sure they have enough exposure to master each letter. After learning three letters, the children begin to blend letters together to create words and unblend words to learn to spell. Children are never asked to read or write with sounds they have not been taught.

In the first grade, Saxon Phonics begins by the teaching of a new letter or letters every day, then student review of those letters for as long as necessary. First-graders learn two letters, then begin blending words together to read and unblending words to spell. As the children progress, they are given small take-home books (readers) that contain words with sounds they can blend. Comprehension tests are provided to monitor progress.

Each day the children review all previous learning and have a homework page for continued reinforcement. Spelling rules are taught so the children learn to spell by using knowledge instead of memorization only. Common suffixes and a few prefixes are taught.

Phonics 2 (second grade) begins with a quick review of vowels and consonants, then moves to decoding and reading comprehension. Second graders review all situations covered in the first-grade program, then are exposed to higher levels of comprehension, harder words for spelling, higher level vocabulary, and a more in-depth study of prefixes and suffixes.

The board also approved the starting of a health science program in Ozona High School for next year and participating in tech prep for health science and auto mechanics. The health science program will interface with tech prep in that the goal of tech prep is qualified high school, 2-year, and 4-year college graduates who will enter the workplace ready to meet the new challenges facing Texas. High school students who are participating in the tech prep program will have the opportunity to earn free college credits

from participating colleges while still in high school. Upon graduation from high school the students can go straight to work and/or on to college.

The health science program is one of the 1995 priority occupations for the state of Texas, as is auto mechanics. The program includes not only occupations relating to employment in the field of nursing but also medical laboratory technician, medical laboratory technologist, medical secretary, pharmacist, radiologic technician, and radiologic technologist, and other health-related occupations.

The board also approved: all bids received for athletic supplies for next year; the appointment of Supt. Larry Taylor to the Region XV Education Service Center Regional Advisory Committee; tuition payments for Ozona students who live in the outlying boundaries of Crockett County and who transfer to other districts; Veronica Tijerina as the board's delegate and George Ybarra as the alternate to the Texas Association of School Boards Delegate Assembly; and, the employment of Jodie Childress as a fifth grade teacher in Ozona Intermediate School. Ms. Childress will take the place of Susie Childress, who is transferring to Ozona Primary School to teach second grade.

During the reports section of the agenda, maintenance supervisor Ray Don Myers reported on the beginning of the installation of an underground sprinkler system on the main football field at Lions Stadium and the installation of additional doors in the Ozona High School Band Hall. Supt. Larry Taylor reported that there are five high school seniors who are not eligible to graduate because they did not successfully pass one or more parts of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) Exit-Level Test for Graduating Seniors. He also reported that he had approved the transfer of Tomasa Flores, kindergarten teacher at Ozona Primary School, to Ozona High School to teach Spanish III and English as a Second Language (ESL). Due to a low student enrollment in kindergarten next year, the primary school will not need a replacement for her position.

During the meeting the board held a public hearing on the use of the district's Title VI and Title I federal funds for next year. The school district will use its Title VI funds to improve the four campus libraries and will use Title I funds for reading and mathematics at Ozona Primary and Ozona Intermediate School. Title I funds will also be used to fund summer school for students in all four schools.

Also during the meeting, Mae Lay, school business manager and notary public, administered the oath of office to school trustees Becky Childress and George Ybarra. The board voted to retain the same officers for next year. The officers are: Wade Richardson, board president; David Bean, board vice-president; and, Elliott Barrera, board secretary.
