





Emergency Feed Program Ends

The Emergency Feed Program for Crockett County was not extended, says Laurie Hale of the Crockett County Farm Service Agency. The program ended on May 31, and producers have until June 14 to turn in head count changes, feed receipts and feed on hand.

"You should have received through the mail a letter and form to fill out with the required information; if not, they are available in the office," said Mrs. Hale.

"It will take congressional action to extend the feed program for Crockett County. To date, this office has not heard if anything will happen. As soon as we know something, we will contact producers. If you have questions, call or come by the FSA office at 201 11th Street."

Crockett is one of 24 counties whose feed assistance programs were cancelled when the new farm bill was signed into law April 4.

The program is extended to Aug. 31 for counties which had started their 1996 crop year prior to the bill's signing. For most of the state, the starting date was March 1, but for 24 West Texas counties, the starting date was April 15.

Crockett, Andrews, Martin, Howard, Sterling, Irion, Terrell and all the counties west to El Paso are included in the May 31 program ending.



Hunter Education Camp A Huge Success

The ninth annual West Texas Hunter Education Camp was held on the Gene Perry Ranch of Crockett County on June 7, 8 and 9, 1996. Five girls and 17 boys ages 12-16 were successfully certified for hunter safety as per the mandatory hunter education law implemented on June 1, 1988.

During the 3-day weekend, students were instructed in firearms and ammunition, handling firearms safely in the field, wildlife management and identification, marksmanship and field dressing of big game, hunter ethics, wilderness survival, game laws, private ownership of firearms, poisonous snakes, archery, blackpowder and muzzleloading, and hunter first-aid. Students also had hands-on training on the firing range by shooting .22 rifles, .243 rifles, .20 gauge shotguns, several different calibers of pistols, and blackpowder firearms. Students took their new-found knowledge to the field on Sunday and trekked through a shoot-don't-shoot walkthrough, and tracked wounded game on a simulated blood trail.



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

"Jesus can take a black heart, wash it in red blood. and make it whiter than snow."



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






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Frankly, Fathers

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Commissioners Approve New Rules For 4-H/ FFA Feeding Barn, Horse Barn and Arena

Miles Dabovich, Extension Agent. Commissioners voted to accept the proposed rules.

The rules, as submitted by Mr. Dabovich, follow.

As stated, stalls will be emptied by August 1 and all stalls repaired, cleaned, numbered and locked. Reservations for stalls in the horse barn will not be taken until all work is finished in the fall. Reservations in the 4-H/FFA feeding barn (for horse stalls) will not be taken until after April 1, 1997, and will only be allowed until Aug. 1 of each year. After that time, all stalls in the 4-H/FFA feeding barn must be turned back over to 4-H and FFA for feeding projects until the next April.

Set date when horses must be out of stalls so 4H/FFA livestock can be put in barn each year (Aug. 1). At that date in 1996, put new rules into effect. > All adults wishing to stall a horse during this time period must pay a \$300 deposit per stall and a \$20 monthly fee to go toward upkeep of the facility. There will be no exceptions. If a stall is released and it is clean and no repairs are needed, the \$300 deposit will be returned. These stalls will be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis; however, priority will be given to 4H horse project participants and high school rodeo team members. This rule will go into effect on Aug. 1, 1996. There will be only one horse allowed per stall. All stalls will be reserved through the Extension Office. Deposit must be paid at time of reservation.

All stalls will be locked until rented. Stalls will be numbered and all animals must be kept in assigned stalls. Two to four stalls will be reserved and kept empty for youth who want to start their livestock feeding

kept open (unrented) for travellers. No horses will be turned loose in the arena or the faigrounds area. All must be kept in stalls. Only one horse is allowed per stall.

RODEO ARENA RULES

All arena rules apply to every individual. No exceptions.

"Youth only" activities take precedence over all others.

Arena will be reserved for general public use for riding only (barrels, poles, etc.) on every Monday and Tuesday. No roping is allowed on these days and no bookings will be accepted.

Every event held in arena must be booked with the Extension Office a week ahead of time. This includes all ropings, Play Days, rodeos, barrel races, Horse Shows, etc.

A booking fee of \$25 per day per event will be charged for all events to cover cost of arena upkeep and electricity. Exceptions are "youth only" activities, High school rodeo, 4-H Club events, etc. Keys to facility will be picked up and returned to Extension Office. Exceptions must be officially approved by the board.

Youth may ride in arena any nights there are no booked events. They will not be asked to leave.

A monthly charge of \$50 will be paid by the Crockett County Roping Association for use of the arena for practice sessions only. All other events must be booked and paid.

Livestock pens and other areas around the arena are to used by organizations, clubs and for events only, not for private livestock storage. No outside grazing of animals is allowed. All livestock must be kept in assigned stalls or pens.


