


Board Hears Architect Report On Proposed Renovations

During their regular meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 19, members of the Ozona School Board heard a report from district architect Larry Harvey concerning his conceptual designs for renovation of the three science labs in Ozona High School, the installation of erasable marker boards in classrooms at Ozona Primary, Ozona Intermediate, and Ozona High School, and the installation of teacher storage cabinets at Ozona Intermediate School.

Mr. Harvey said that he had completed his survey of all high school science classrooms and storerooms that are to receive renovations, including new furniture and equipment, as well as all district classrooms, workrooms, and meeting rooms that are to receive new liquid marker boards and all Ozona Intermediate classrooms that are scheduled to receive storage cabinet renovations.

Following board discussion with Mr. Harvey concerning renovation ciation of School Boards. options, product information, and his field investigation of the above projects, the concensus of the board was to give Harvey permission to proceed to draw construction plans with a projected target date of May 1 for the opening of bids for the renovation. The project is scheduled to be substantially completed by Aug. 4.

Harvey also reported to the members that he was still working on his survey on renovations that will be necessary in order to make Davidson Gymnasium handicapped accessible. He will present an expenditure estimate on this project at his next meeting with the school board.

Tarr Chosen MVP Of District 8-2A

For the third straight year in a row, Ozona Lady Lion Amber Tarr was chosen as the district's Most Valuable Player. Ozona was in District 5-2A the past two years. The UIL realigned districts last year, so this is the first year she has received the honor in District 8-2A.

The 6-foot junior post has scored 368 points in the first 22 games of this season and had 129 rebounds, 87 steals, 83 assists and 57 blocks.

Another fellow junior and teammate, Leslie Avila, was chosen the Newcomer of the Year. Avila, a 5'5" guard, had 38 steals, 32 rebounds, 40 assists, four blocked shots and 84 points in those first 22 games.

"Leslie Avila was a good choice for Newcomer of the Year. Good

choices," said Lady Lion coach Dickie Faught. "They all deserved it as to the place where they were. I'm real proud."

Senior post Shelly Sullivan and junior wing Amber McWilliams were chosen to first team of District 8-2A. 28 blocked shots. McWilliams made 160 points including 22-of-56 threepointers and had 25 steals, 52 rebounds, 33 assists and one blocked shot.

Chosen to the second team were juniors Stormi Sessom and Autumn McWilliams. Sessom, a 5'9" post, scored 133 points and had 84 rebounds, 26 assists, 16 steals and nine blocked shots. As a 5'4" wing, McWilliams made 63 points including 11-of-19 two-pointers and had 27 rebounds, 18 steals, 30 assists and one blocked shot.

Selected honorable mention were seniors Amy Laughlin and Julie Perez. Laughlin, a 5'9" post, scored 42 points and had 28 rebounds, 11 steals and four assists. Perez, a 5'2" guard, made eight points, but more importantly, had 22 steals, 21 rebounds, 19 assists and two blocked shots.

AUSTIN - Auto insurers sub-Survivors include her father, Ol- mitted proposals for 1997 rates before the deadline passed last week.

> The Texas Insurance Organization, which represents medium and small auto insurance companies, asked for an 11 percent increase in standard, or "benchmark" insurance rates. Farmers Insurance Group, a large company, asked for a 7.4 percent hike.

Mark Toohey, a spokesman for Farmers, said the company's proposed rate increase is tied to higher costs for repairing and replacing cars and because 20 to 25 percent of Texas motorists are driving without insurance.

But Rob Bordelon, a state A delegation of Ozonans is being consumer advocate for insurance, countered the rate increase proposals, calling for a 3.9 percent cut in benchmark rates.

"We feel strongly that industry losses for auto liability have gone down in recent years," Bordelon told The Dallas Morning Frank Mills is critically ill in News. "And," he said, "consumers should see their premiums reduced as well."

State law allows insurers to Entries from twenty West Texas charge 30 percent above or below the benchmark rate.

Victim-Rights Bill Passes The Senate last week approved

a victim-rights bill that would prohibit state appeals courts from throwing out criminal convictions because of minor or technical errors in the trying of cases.

Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson, said the measure is intended to spare crime victims from repeated trials that result when convictions are overturned because of "harmless errors."

"Crime victims all across the state are asking the Legislature to make it very clear that while criminals are entitled to a fair trial, they are not entitled to a perfect trial," Brown said.

The bill has moved to the House for consideration.

Bill Broadens Right-to-Carry

Sen. Jerry Patterson, R-Pasadena, is trying to push his concealed handgun bill, which became law in 1995, a few steps further with new legislation that would prohibit handgun bans in many public places.

Patterson's bill would lift the state ban on carrying concealed handguns in churches, nursing homes, amusement parks and hospitals, but would preserve the ban for hospital emergency rooms and trauma centers.

His bill also would allow people convicted of nonviolent felonies who have had their rights restored to apply for concealed handgun

And, under the bill, Texas would recognize right-to-carry permits issued by other states.

A number of state and local municipal and nursing groups oppose the bill.

Counterfeit Trademark Bill

Selling counterfeit goods bearing trademarks meant to make them appear genuine would be a crime under legislation passed by the Senate last week.

"Organized crime syndicates as well as certain terrorist groups are utilizing counterfeit goods to raise money for their various causes." said Sen Ken. Armbrister, D-

Victoria.

The goods range from purses and watches to electronic equipment, he said, adding that the sales are a problem primarily in the Dallas and Houston areas. An estimated \$10 million to \$25 million in counterfeit goods are warehoused in the Houston area, Armbrister

The bill, which now goes to the House for consideration, would create a range of criminal penalties and provide for seizure of counterfeit goods.

Cashless Welfare Bill Filed Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, filed a bill that would create a cashless welfare system.

Hilderbran, chairman of the House Human Services Committee, said the measure is intended to ensure that benefits given to welfare recipients are used on behalf of children in families on the wel-

The bill would expand the list of items welfare recipients can buy with their monthly welfare checks. But it also would make it impossible for recipients to get cash with the Lone Star Card.

"If recipients could not get cash with the card," Hilderbran said, "they could not use their money to buy cigarettes or alcohol."

■ State Sen. Drew Nixon, R-Carthage, was charged last week with soliciting prostitution on Austin's South Congress Avenue after police said he offered an undercover officer \$35 to have sex. Nixon was one of 82 people arrested in one day, as part of a sting operation. Nixon spent one night in jail and was released on \$750 bail.

 Agents from the Internal Revenue Service seized the Austin home of prominent atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair and loaded two moving vans with her furniture and other possessions. O'Hair disappeared 18 months ago, leaving more than \$260,000 in unpaid

Seminoles Topic Of Museum Program

February is National Black History Month. It's a time when programs are presented to enlighten citizens of the significant contribution black individuals have made to the history of our great nation.

The Crockett County Museum is sponsoring a special program for the public which promises to be outstanding. It will focus on the Seminoles, who left their mark on Crockett and Val Verde Counties for all time. Seminole Canyon is named for these people and research points out that some of Ozona's own residents are descendants of these hardy folks.

Texas Tech University Press carries a book written by Kevin Mulroy called "Freedom on the Border" which chronicles the lives of early Seminoles in Florida, the Indian Territory, Coahuila and Texas. Published in 1993, the book is quoted as "An extraordinary study of the Black Seminoles from the 18th Century.'

This book is also a 1993 winner of the San Antonio Conservation Society Publication Award and the 1993 T. R. Ferenbach Award from the Texas Historical Commission. Len Hillman will present highlights of this writing, giving special emphasis to those descendants among us, both now and in the recent past, as far as re-

search and memory permit.



and research, and contains a colored photograph of each courthouse. Quite that boasts 1,199 folks. It lies to the an outstanding work to say the least, because there are 254 in our state. Although I couldn't begin to describe them to you, let me tell you some of the facts these two have collected. Published in 1993, the book has enough details to promote a real yen to travel and see each one of these buildings as well as the area they serve.

First on the list is Anderson County, whose population is 48,024, and is a beautiful area of East Texas. It was named for Kenneth Lewis Anderson, who was vice-president of Texas from 1844 to annexation. The county seat, Palestine, population 18,042, was so named by Pilgrim Church minister Daniel Parker, who remembered Palestine, IL. The county was organized in 1846, and the courthouse is a brick Renaissance Revival style.

Next is Andrews County, population 14,338, in West Texas. The county seat is the same name, Andrews, population 10,678, and the two were named for Richard Andrews, who was the first man killed in the Texas Revolution. The county was organized in 1910, and their present courthouse is Moderne style built of brick in 1939.

Angelina County, population 67,884, was organized in 1846, and the name means "little angel" for a young Indian girl who was a faithful follower of the Franciscan missionaries' teachings. The county seat of Lufkin has a population of 30,206 in far East Texas, and was named for E. P. Lufkin who was a railroad engineer. The courthouse was built in 1955 in a Modern style of brick and stone.

Aransas County, along the coast, has a population of 17,892, and the name came from the "Rio Nuestra Señora de Aranzazu", which has its origin in an estate in Spain. The county was established in 1871, and the modern motel-style courthouse, built in 1956, stands in Rockport, population 4,753. You can almost guess how Rockport was named - and you're

North Texas' Archer County, population 7,973, organized in 1880, has Archer City as the county seat, with a population of 1,748. Their courthouse is Romansque Revival style, built of sandstone, and was finished in 1928. The county and city were named for Branch Tanner Archer, a Texas revolutionary and congressman. The Archer County Historical Museum is in the old jail there.

> Atascosa County is just south of San Antonio, has a population of 30,533, and was organized around 1856. The name is Spanish for impediment to travel - such as mud, bog, etc. There's more to that story, I suspect. County seat Jourdanton, population 3,220, is named after a local land promoter, Jourdan Campbell. Their courthouse, built in 1912 in the Mission style, is beautiful.

Austin County is closer to Houston than to Austin and has a population of 19,832. It was organized in 1836 and named for none other than Stephen F. Austin. The county seat is Bellville, population 3,378, and named for Thomas B. Bell, one of the old three hundred of Austin's first colony. The courthouse is Modern style of granite and concrete, built in 1960.

We've already covered eight of our counties. See how fascinating the history of Texas is? I'll share more with you another time.

FDA Re-issues Warning On GHB

Consumers need to be aware that just because a product is marketed in the media it isn't necessarily safe or effective. Gamma hydroxybutyric acid or GHB as it is commonly known, is one of those substances. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is renewing its warning against the use of this product, which is used for body building and "recreational" purposes.

GHB is a chemical which has been promoted as a steroid alternative for body building and other uses for several years. Recently it has gained favor as a recreational drug because of its intoxicating effects.

Although in the past GHB has undergone clinical testing for several uses, it has never been approved for sale in the U.S. In fact, the FDA began investigating the product after numerous cases of related illness were re-

Symptoms have included vomiting, dizziness, tremors and seizures. Many of those injured have required hospitalization, and some deaths have been linked to the consumption of GHB products.

By the end of 1991, the FDA and the Department of Justice had taken enforcement action against several firms and individuals involved in manufacturing, distributing and promoting GHB. The agency also prevented products containing GHB from being imported.

Faith Minus Works?

Some folks reject any relationship of works to faith in salvation. They may have an unhealthy view of both faith and accompanying works. They think if you make a confession of faith in Christ it does not really matter how you live.

You are still bound for heaven. We may state this position as follows: Faith>> Justification [Right standing with God] - Works.

Several Bible texts contradict this thinking. "What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin so that grace may increase?" (Romans 6:1). "Pursue peace with all men, and the sanctification [holiness] without which no one will see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14).

'Show me your faith without the

works, and I will show you my faith by my works." (James 2:18). James 2:24 also speaks to this position. "You see that a man is justified by works, and not by faith alone." The word "justified" may be translated "vindicated."

Compare Matthew 11:19, "Yet wisdom is vindicated [justified] by her deeds." This is a legitimate alternate meaning of the word. James 2:24 then reads, "You see that a man is vindicated by works, and not by faith alone."

We are justified, have right standing with God, by grace alone through faith alone. However, this is not a faith that stands alone. "Even so faith, is it has no works, is dead, being by itself" (James 2:17).

Should your children consume drinks that contain caffeine?

Nutritionists at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston say little is known about the effects of caffeine on children.

"There are no established guidelines on caffeine consumption for children," said Dr. Corinne Montandon, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor. "But, keep in mind that drinks high in caffeine are not included in any of the five major food groups."
