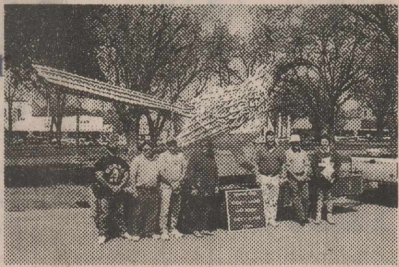

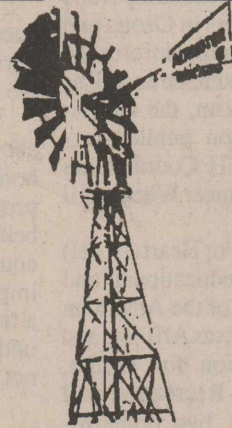
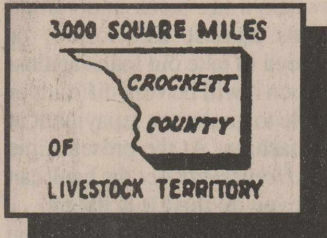

Emergency Preparedness County Plan Implemented

Key emergency management personnel have met to review their duties under a newly developed plan for Crockett County. Judge Jeffrey Sutton called the meeting after attending an emergency management conference several weeks ago.

Wildfires, gas emissions and oil-field spills are among the emergencies most likely to occur in Crockett County, said Judge Sutton. "We're in a high risk area because of sulphur dioxide. We have to maintain readiness."

Severe weather and tornadoes are also of prime concern in Crockett County. A weather spotters' course sponsored by the fire department last month provided training for law enforcement and EMS personnel as well as firemen.

A steady blowing of fire sirens means to take cover says EMS coordinator and fireman Doug Meador. The center of your house is a good place to be in case of a storm. You should have a flashlight and plenty of batteries, and if the power stays on, tune to KLST television in San Angelo or KYXX FM Ozona, KHOS FM Sonora.

In addition to Judge Sutton as emergency management director, Crockett County's emergency management people are Steve Kenley, emergency management coordinator; Sheriff Shane Fenton, County Extension Agent Miles Dabovich, School Superintendent Larry Taylor, Fire Chief Bob Falkner, County Health Officer Marcus Sims, Tax Assessor/Collector Tommy Stokes, DPS Sgt. Carl Mayfield, Road Superintendent Eddie Moore, Crockett County Water Control Dee Keilers, County Attorney Bill Mason, EMS Coordinator

Doug Meador, Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne and Hector DeHoyos of the Texas Department of Transportation.

Many of the duties which must be fulfilled in an emergency situation are things not thought of by the general public.

The county judge is responsible for, among other duties, direction, control and resource management. Emergency management coordinator Steve Kenley will help oversee and coordinate the entire plan. Duties of Sheriff Fenton include law enforcement, communications and warnings.

Extension Agent Miles Dabovich will be responsible for clothing, shelter and food (2000 people from San Angelo would be sent to Ozona in case that city had to evacuate). He would coordinate human services needs with

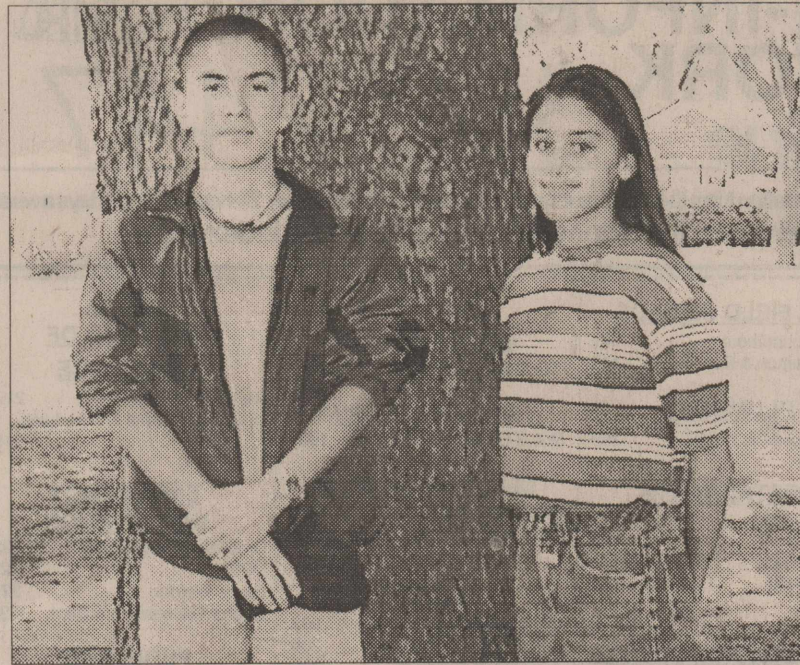

Time to Sign Up For Baseball

Lady Lions Repeat Trip to State

The Ozona Lady Lions missed going to state by one stroke in 1995, did make it to a second place finish at state in 1996, and hope to better that by one-winning the state championship. The Lady Lions qualified for state with a second place finish in the Region I-2A golf tournament held at Shady Oaks Country Club near Baird last Tuesday, April 22. The Lions just missed qualifying for state by seven strokes as they placed third behind district rival Coahoma.

"The competition was pretty much even," said second year Lady Lions' golf coach Brent Pool. "There were five teams that were within striking distance in the boys (division) and two teams in the girls."

The Quanah A team took first place honors with a two-day total of 338-335-673 strokes. Ozona was just three strokes behind the regional champions with 338-338-676 strokes.

"Ozona and Quanah were tied the first day. We had a 30 stroke lead in the first round over the third place team (Albany with a 371)," said

Coach Pool. Quanah was the top team to beat going in. Albany and Anson just didn't shoot as well as what they could do. Quanah got third in the state last year and didn't lose any girls."

Rounding out the top 10 in the girl's division are: 3 Albany 371-355-726, 4 Anson 382-359-741, 5 Quanah B 368-376-744, 6 McCamey 391-384-775, 7 Post 400-402-802, 8 Canadian 395-416-811, 9 Seagraves 422-419-841, and 10 Iraan 431-425-856 strokes. Coahoma was fourteenth with 443-442-885.

Kristy Pridemore and Lauren Wilkins tied for fourth in the girl's medalist race. Pridemore had an 83-82-165 strokes and Wilkins had an 85-80-165 strokes. The first place medalist was Kasey Hardin from Post. She shot a 72-78-150 strokes.

Sue Spoons Caldwell-Cook-Of-The-Week Someone's In The Kitchen

Cook of the Week Sue Spoons Caldwell learned to cook one of the recipes she shares today while working as a mail carrier between Ozona and Barnhart.

On the way to Barnhart each morning, Sue would pick up a boy who lived on one of the ranches and take him to school. One day his mother asked if Sue would like to learn to make tamales, and of course, the enthusiastic Sue was eager to try.

"We started early in the morning and it was about 4 p.m. when we finished with two of us rolling," said Sue.

Sue became the mail carrier when her step-father, J. D. Nairn, took ill and was unable to continue with the job. Soon she was helping in the post office between her twice daily trips to Barnhart. After a while, she got on steady at the post office, and her brother, Jack Brownrigg, carried the mail to Barnhart.

Early attempts at cooking in home economics seemed rushed to Sue. "We had 15 minutes to get our things out, 30 minutes to prepare the food and 15 minutes to clean up," she said. "It was kinda hard to get it all together."

Sue enjoys cooking for a crowd if she has plenty of time, and last December, just before she and Jim Caldwell were married, she helped him prepare a holiday dinner he hosted for a group of single friends.

This summer Sue and Jim are driving to Alaska to visit her son Kenneth Spoons and his family. You can bet that while they are there, Sue will prepare some of those old family favorite recipes.

HOT TAMALES

1 lb. corn shucks. Wash and let soak overnight.
6 lbs. pork
6 lbs. hamburger
5 lbs. Masa
3 lbs. pure lard
3-3 oz. bottles Gebhardt's Chili Powder

Black pepper, salt and cummin powder to taste.

Cook pork roast and grind. Cook hamburger meat and mix chili powder. Add black pepper, cummin and 1/4 of lard. Add pork and gravy over meat mixture.

Mix 5 lbs. masa, rest of lard, 2 handfuls of salt, 1-1/2 bottles chili powder. Mix in hot water to make soft. Place tablespoon masa on shuck and smooth out. Put tablespoon meat mixture on that and roll.

When all shucks and meat are used, place on rack inside large cooker and pour pan of boiling water in cooker. Put lid on and steam for 1 hour.

ENCHILADAS

Chili

2 lbs. ground meat
1- 2 Alarm Chili kit
1- 8 oz. can tomato sauce
2- 8 oz. cans water
Make chili according to directions inside chili kit.

Enchiladas

24 tortillas
3 cups chopped onions
3 lbs. grated cheese. Plain American or mild cheddar
3 cups cooking oil

Get oil hot (but not real hot) in skillet. Place one tortilla at a time and only leave until it is soft enough to roll. Place one tablespoon of chili on tortilla and 1 teaspoon onion and roll. Put in baking dish. When all tortillas are rolled, pour remainder of chili on enchiladas. Cover with grated cheese and place in 375 degree oven until cheese is melted.

SUE'S CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

1- 20 oz. can sweet potatoes
3/4 c. sugar
1/2 c. white Karo
2 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. allspice
1 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 c. butter or oleo
Marshmallows to cover

Place one 20 oz. can of sweet potatoes in sauce pan, pouring most of juice off. Add 3/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup oleo or butter, 1/2 cup white Karo, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 2 tsp allspice, 1 tsp. nutmeg. Cook until syrup is thick, then place in greased cooking pan and cover with marshmallows.
Place in 375 degree oven and let stay until marshmallows are melted.

PECAN PIE

1 c. sugar
1/2 c. white Karo
3 eggs
1/2 c. butter or oleo (melted)
3 tsp. vanilla
Pecans - enough to cover top of pie

Beat 3 eggs in large bowl, add 1 c. sugar and 1/2 c. white Karo. Add 1/2 c. butter or oleo (melted). Add vanilla. Pour mixture in uncooked 8 inch pie crust and cover top with pecans. Bake in 350 to 375 degree oven until mixture will not shake and crust is brown.

The bride was given in marriage by her uncle, Sammy King.

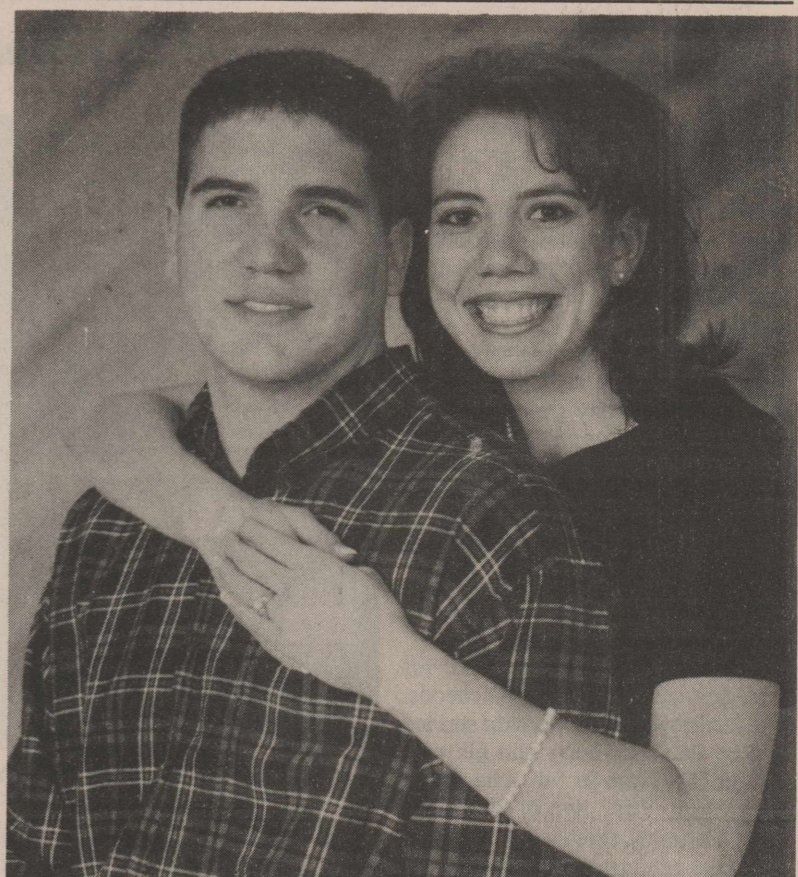

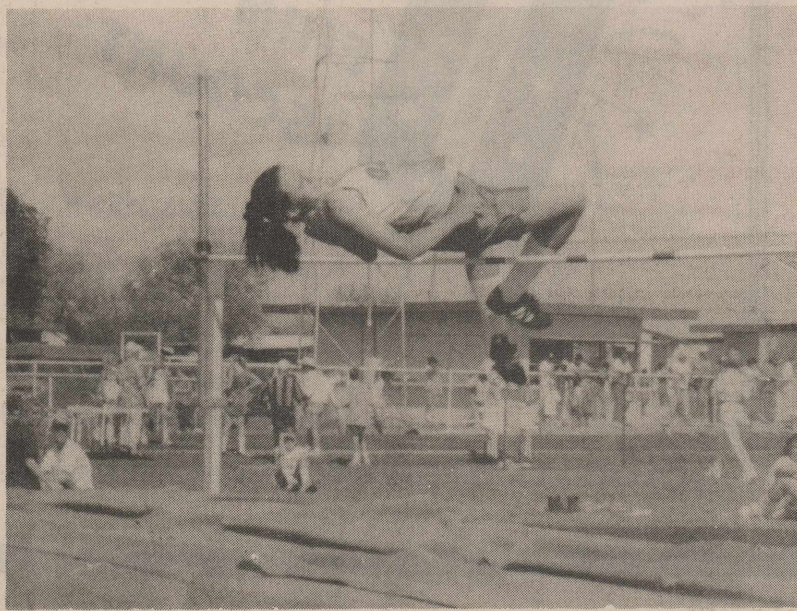
placed third with 7'0", and Rodriguez tied for fourth with a vault of 6'6" with Logan and Herrera, both from Wall.

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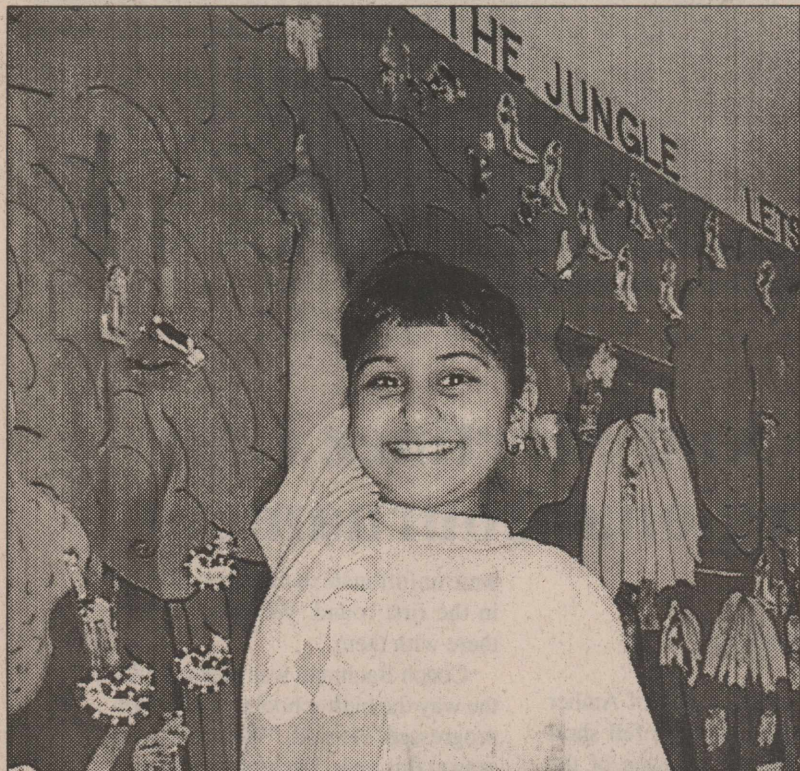

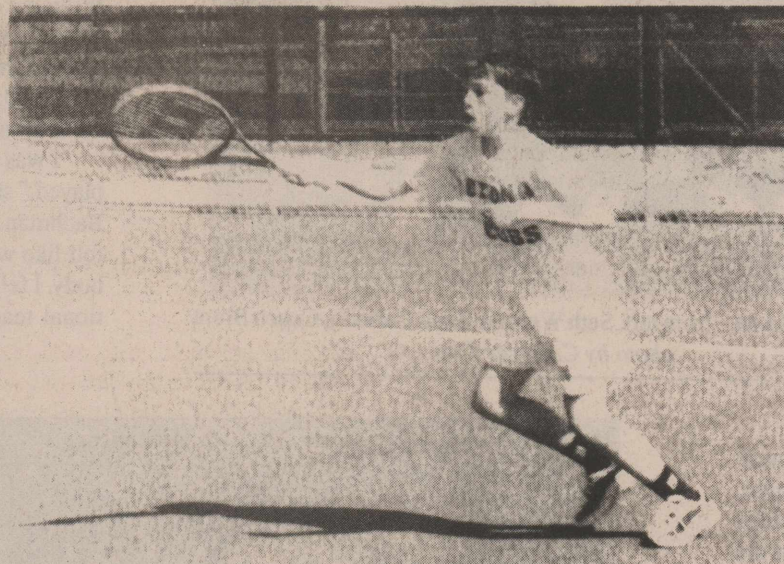
JOHN RODRIGUEZ threw the softball 11.11 meters for fourth place recently in the Odessa Area 18 Special Olympics.

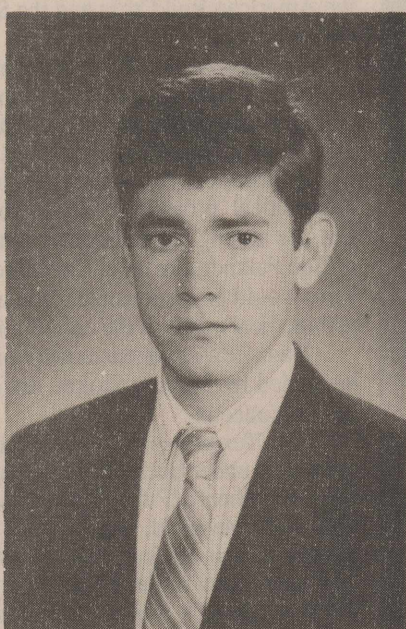

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

Disaster Loan Filing Deadline May 5

Businesses in some Texas counties have until May 5 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from various disasters including drought, freeze, high winds, freezing temperatures, sleet and snow which occurred June 1, 1995 through June 11, 1996 and continuing. Farmers or ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans.

Crockett County businesses are eligible to apply.

Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the weather reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the weather are not eligible.

the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Transportation, shelter and a feeding area would be under the emergency management duties of Larry Taylor, superintendent of schools.

Evacuation, fire and rescue and radiological protection responsibilities are among the emergency duties of Bob Falkner, fire chief. Dr. Marcus Sims would be responsible for health and medical needs of the community.

Damage assessment duties would be tended by Tommy Stokes, tax assessor/collector.

The Texas Department of Transportation, under Hector DeHoyos, and the Department of Public Safety, under Sgt. Carl Mayfield, would work on transportation routing, road closings and such. The Abilene office of the DPS is Ozona's link to more assistance in an emergency.

Public works assistance with barricades for hazardous areas, traffic control and restoration of utilities would be among the duties of Eddie Moore, road superintendent, and Dee Keilers of the water district.

Legal backup and establishing of rationing would be part of County Attorney Bill Mason's duties.

"We have a good plan and good people able to carry out a situation," said Sutton. "We all have to work together to do this deal."

Additional assistance to the county in fighting fires and helping with search and rescue operations may be forthcoming, Judge Sutton said.

On Tuesday, the Senate was examining House Bill 1 which could result in placement of Texas Forest Service Rangers and fire fighting equipment in Barnhart. Attempts are being made to get this station in San Angelo, also. "We need it more in this direction," Sutton said. "There are not many fires north and east of San Angelo."

"We have the potential this year for some super big grass fires."

Crockett County Museum is very important to our community as our history is kept safe within its walls. That history may not affect each one of us directly, but surely all of us indirectly, because we enjoy the town that the people before us created. Change comes, sometimes slowly and sometimes abruptly, but it does come. As I see it, we need the changes to keep us healthy, as well as in step with the rest of the world. Just think, if the people of Ozona didn't accept Ralph Watson's switch to the automobile as a new mode of transportation in 1908, we might still be hitching up the team to take a trip. His change was progress, indeed.

The museum is about to take a step in a new direction. Soon the new courthouse annex building will be completed and the present annex will be vacated - except for the museum, which will lease the structure for \$1 a year from the county. This will give two more floors of usable space for the museum. 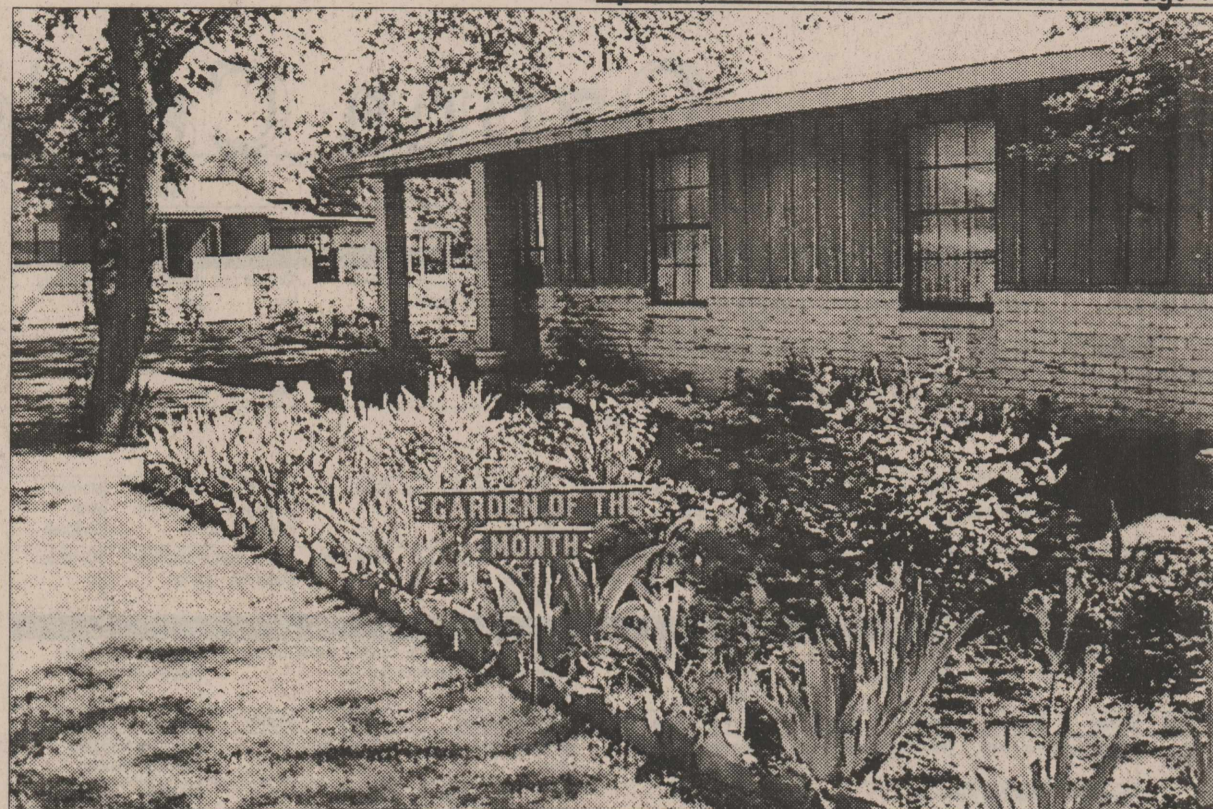

Did you know that every hunter born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course in order to hunt in the state of Texas? It's true - and it's the law. It's the law in Texas, as well as many other states in America. It also makes good sense to be certified in hunter education.

Where can you attend a course? Right here in Crockett County.

The 10th annual West Texas Hunter Education Camp will be held on the Gene Perry Ranch in Crockett County June 6-8. It is open to boys and girls 12-15 years of age. There is no cost to the participants as scholarships

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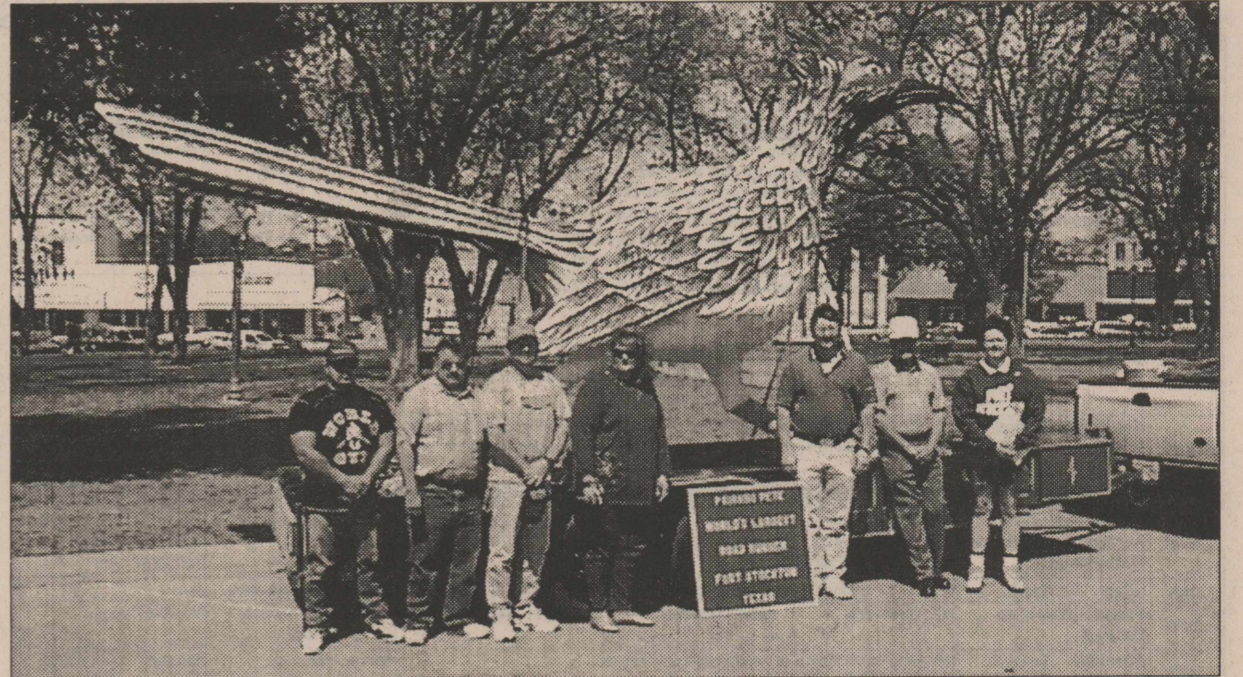

Pete passed through Ozona last

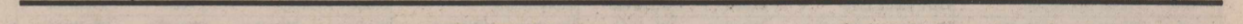

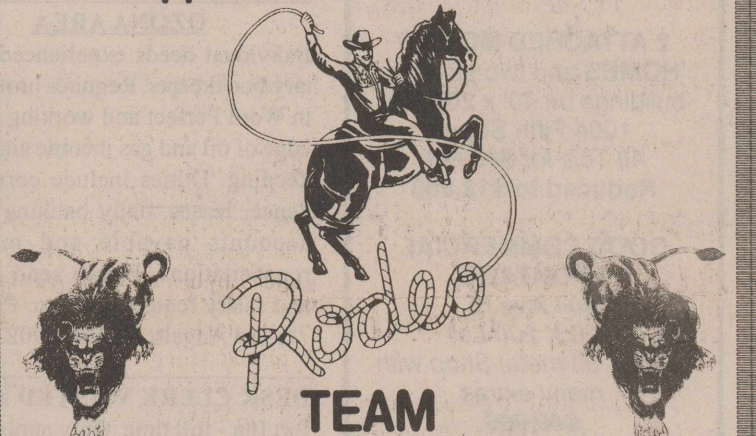

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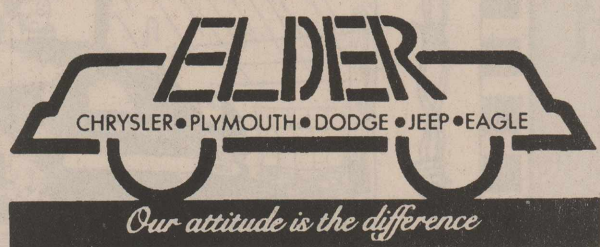
