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





What's In An Anniversary?

Nations, families, and individuals. Each punctuates life with anniversaries, pointing to the past and defining the present. The Birth of a Nation, Twenty-Five years of Marriage, the Receipt of an Award - can bring joy and celebration. Those anniversaries may be observed in different ways but what does it mean when a church marks a significant date?

This year the Missouri Synod of the Lutheran Church celebrates its 150th Anniversary. The Evangelical Lutheran Church was born out of the 16th Century Reformation which began in Germany, and on April 26 in 1847 immigrants formed the Missouri Synod (a Synod being an elected advisory group), headquartered in St. Louis. It began with 14 Charter Congregations, and now-by God's grace, has grown to over 6,000-consisting of 2.6 million members. While it is not the largest group of Lutherans in the U.S., it has remained faithful to the Word of God-the 66 Canonical books of the Old and New Testaments. But

above all, this anniversary is a confession-a confession with the Apostle Peter in Matthew 16 that Jesus of Nazareth is the Christ, the Son of the

Each year the Christian Church elebrates the anniversaries of her Lord's Birth, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension to the right hand of God the Father. These are more than a Remembrance, however, for everyone who is in Christ is a new creation-and has a new calendar, a new way of measuring time: ANNO DOMINI, "The Year of our Lord-One Thousand Nine Hundred and ninety seven. For them every year, and month, and day is a confession of His Holy name-that by faith in Him there is new and eternal life. through the forgiveness of sins He has won for us on the Cross of Calvary-and guaranteed by His glori-

ous Resurrection. Nations will come and go. Corporations and tycoons will flourish and fade. But Christ's Church will remain to the end, being built on the solid rock confession of Peter-so that not even the forces of Hell will overpower it. Much of our world still exists in the darkness of sin and walks in the shadow of death, and our calling as the Church

is to carry the Good News of Jesus Christ, the Light of the world, to all corners of the globe-so that the darkness may be dispelled. While our modern culture's technological glitz and entertainment life-style tries to disguise the reality, death ultimately devours every emperor and nation and family. That's why the Missouri Synod of the Lutheran Church has missionaries in 57 countries, declaring that by the Cross and Empty Tomb of Jesus Christ the powers of Sin, Death and Hell have been undone!

In this "Anniversary we rejoice that Martin Luther rested his hopes solely on the Cross of Christ-which was the meaning of the Reformation. and is the meaning of the Missouri Synod. We confess Jesus as the Christ, and our Living Lord-who has given this Church body 150 years of life. And we invite you to join us in this Confession, as we await His return to take His bride-the Church, to that Great Wedding Feast-and that continual celebration of an Anniversary that has no end. May the Triune God-Father, Son, and Holy Spirit-grant such a life and such a confession of Christ to each





"We were able to finally put a solid game together for the first time in a while," said David Delgado, Ozona's baseball coach. "We had some excellent pitching with some good defense and good hitting."

The earlier loss must have had a definite effect on the Lions as they came roaring back in the second game. In the second inning, Ramon Longoria walked to get on base with one out. Pete Castaneda hit a single and John Ortiz was walked to load the bases. Peter Rodriquez singled to score

Longoria and Castaneda. Kenny Vargas hit a single to score John Ortiz. Next, Anthony Ortiz follows with a single to score Rodriquez. With two outs, Jon Sanchez knocks a single to score Vargas for a big Lion lead of 6-

The Lions add two more runs in the third inning. Longoria singled to begin the inning, then Castaneda followed with a two-run homerun to increase the Lions' score to 8-0.

One more run was added by the Lions in the fifth inning. Rodriquez began the inning with a walk. He advanced to second on an Eldorado error, and scored on a single by Sanchez for a 9-0 lead.

Just when a person thinks the game is about won and over, it is not. In the seventh inning, the Eagles made a gallant come back. Although it was not enough to tie the game or win, they scored four runs on three hits, two walks, and one Ozona error to trail in an Ozona 9-4 victory.

The Lions' season record is 6-6, and district record stands at 1-3 through April 22.





License numbers should be listed in all yellow page ads, on business cards, invoices and company vehicles. Call the Texas Department of Licensing & Regulation to check the status of the license before requesting service.

Be Suspicious of Extra-Low Prices.

Companies offering unusually low prices could be more interested in selling you unneeded equipment.

Get a Second Opinion.

Check with another contractor when recommendations are made to replace a system, or to make repairs costing more than \$300. Compare prices.

Other Tips.

· Try to watch the technician at work. Some may loosen wires, release freon or tamper with equipment to make it appear you need unnecessary repairs.

· Compressors and fan motors that are noisy when first started after winter do not necessarily need replacing.

Keep Removed Parts.

This will prove the part was really worn and defective and was actually replaced.

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Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Compiled by Charles Lewis Communications, Lindale, Texas

Now in its 72nd year of production, Crockett County's World Field will see more developmental action when two new wells are drilled by Midland-based Costilla Energy Co.

The wells are designated as the No. 8 Powell and No. 4 Powell "A". They carry authority for 2,700 and 3,000 feet of hole, respectively.

The No. 8 is 17 miles south of Big Lake in a 256-acre lease, GC&SFRR Survey A-5177. The No. 4 "A" is in a 250-acre block, BS&F Survey A-4697, about 13 miles south of Big Lake.

With cumulative production topping 53 million barrels, the field still produces over 250,000 barrels of oil yearly.

A potent new producer has been brought on line in the Hunt Baggett Field about eleven mile south-southeast of Ozona. Sonat Exploration is the operator. Designated as the No. 5 Baggett "C", the well earned a 5,103,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. It produced at the rate of 2,892,000 CF of gas per

day when gauged on a 2.25 inch choke. Sonat took the hole to an 8,700 ft. bottom. Production is from a perforated interval in the Strawn formation, 8,454 to 8,488 feet into the wellbore.

A 6,500 ft. developmental well is scheduled to be drilled in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field, about 44 miles southwest of Ozona. It will be known as the No. 6 Daniel-State with Enron Oil and Gas of Midland as the operator. It is in the TCRR Survey A-5453, where Enron has 583 acres under lease. Production in the Canyon Sand is the target.

Far northwestern Crockett County will see more developmental drilling when the No. 210 South Cross Unit is spudded by Houston-based Altura Energy. It will be a 5,600 ft. Detrital Formation test and is in the South Crossett Field. Located 67 miles northwest of Ozona, drillsite is in a 5,267-acre lease assembly in Crockett County's HT&CRR Survey A-5096.

The Ozona Field gained a good producer when the No. 6 Millspaugh was completed 24.8 miles southwest of Ozona.

The well is known as the No. 6 Millspaugh, with Union Pacific Resources

It potentialed at 1,368,000 CF gas daily on a 1.25 inch choke. The open flow

rating was calculated at 1,452,000 CFD. The well bottomed at 7,156 feet and will produce from the Canyon Sand,

6,328 to 6,940 feet into the wellbore. Parker and Parsley Development Co. has posted first production data for a

newly completed gas well in the West Hunt-Baggett Field. The well is designated as the No. 9 Helbing and is located 4.8 miles southsouthwest of Ozona.

It flowed 430,000 CF gas per day on a 1 inch choke. The open flow rating

came in at 463,000 CFD. Bottomed at 8,700 feet, the well will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Sand, 8,544 to 8,488 feet into the hole.
