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

Marshall and Pauline (Perner) Montgomery

Editor's Note: The following was written by Pauline Perner Montgomery and was published in A History of Crockett By Pauline Montgomery

Pauline Perner and Marshall Montgomery were born in Ozona, Crockett County. Pauline is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Perner; Marshall is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clay Montgomery.

They graduated from Ozona High School, Pauline in 1928, Marshall in 1925. Pauline attended Lindenwood College in St. Charles, Missouri for one year. Marshall attended the University of Texas at Austin for one and one half years, so he says he is better educated than Pauline.

Marshall and Pauline are members of the Methodist Church. Marshall and I were married in the Ozona Methodist Church at 6 o'clock in the evening Dec. 31, 1929. This Church later burned,

was rebuilt, and is now used as a Courthouse Annex. Rev. J. H. Meredith performed the ceremony. Following the wedding reception, we started on our honeymoon in a model A Ford Coupe. Our destination was Del Rio. The road was rough and our Coupe slow, making us arrive at the Roswell a little past midnight. The next day we went to San Antonio, Tex., intending to go to Galveston later, but Marshall became anxious to get back to his new ranching operation, so after a few days in San Antonio, we came home. I finally got to Galveston 35 years later!

Marshall had leased some of the S. E. Couch ranch west of Ozona. Our land join the Patrick ranch on the east, and the famous German Waterhole was in our horse trap.

Our home was a part of the Couch headquarters house that was moved and located at the McIntyre well. The house was not very pretty, and Marshall's Mother cried when she saw it, but I was not bothered because I had much rather be outdoors riding a horse or helping Marshall with the chores. My Daddy gave me my first saddle on my fifth birthday, and Marshall gave me my last

Soon after our marriage the "Great Depression" of the thirties hit and was followed by a drought. The price of cattle and sheep dropped to nothing. We sold wool for a nickle a pound. Things were tough.

To bring relief to the ranchmen the government started a program of killing the stock and paying them for it. The stock was killed an racked in stacks about head high.

We had to do most of the ranch work ourselves. Those Bar B Cows we bought from the Couches were wild and spooky, and though Marshall was not a rodeo cowboy, I have seen him rope and throw many a cow in the pasture and in the pen. He rode a big Palomino horse that was mine when we married. Marshall said, "Old Buck was his dowry for marrying me!" We had a pack of hounds, using them for bobcat control, and for fun. Forty years later we put together another pack of hounds

for mountain lion control and we were dead serious this time. Highway 290 was built while we lived on this ranch. Jess Wade, the Contractor, with the help of mules, fresnos and scrapers

built it and it is still in use over 40 years later. We lived on this ranch for five years. Our next ranching venture was on the George Thompson ranch in western Crockett County across the Pecos from Red Barn, a town that sprang up during the boom days of the Yates Oil Field, and died soon after we moved there. Iraan, about 5 miles from our ranch was our post office.

I will never forget those steep, rough Pecos hills; how long it took Marshall and me to ride our horses up them; how hard it was to get contrary old sheep off the rim rocks. We never dreamed that one day there would be a nice, smooth, paved road up one of

Some of the best ropings we have ever seen took place in Sheffield, Texas, while we were on the Thompson ranch. All the best ropers of that era roped there and all were in their prime.

I also remember Jud and Ida Montgomery, an aunt and uncle, coming to spend the night with us, but we were not home. We had taken our mattress to San Angelo to have it made over. I had covered the springs with quilts, the pillows and a spread. When they went to bed, Ida turned and tossed and finally said, "This is the worst mattress I have ever slept on." Judd, not wanting her to talk about his relatives said, "I don't see anything wrong with it, it's a darn good mattress." In a minute Ida said, "Judd, there's not a mattress on this bed, just a pair of springs!" He said, "Well, it's a darned good pair of springs!"

In 1943 we made our last move. We returned to Ozona and Marshall entered a partnership with his Dad on the ranch. This partnership lasted until his Dad's death in 1944. We have continued to operate the ranch.

I would like to mention one of two unusual things that have happened since that time. Oct. 20, 1946 we sold 1000 head of our Rambouillet ewe lambs, through Floyd McMullan, to go to Guatamala in Central America by plane. It was the first such shipment of more than a few head of sheep transport plane. We got our full share of the 1954 flood. Government men came to the ranch and estimated our rain fall was more than 40 inches, which is more rain that we have had in 45 years!

The most shocking and devastating thing to happen to us was discovering a panther (mountain lion) had located on our ranch a few years ago. Lion dogs from the west failed to check him, but we put together a pack of our own that did catch the lion on three separate occasions, with disastrous results to the dogs. The horse back riders were unable to get there in time, because of brush and fences. But the lion finally did move away. Since then other lions have moved in 3 or 4 times a year, but our dogs quickly send them

Our history would not be complete without mentioning a man who has worked on our ranch for 28 years. Tom Parisher has been Marshall's right hand man all these years.

I must mention "Bob", a big black and white border collie that lived with us for 11 years. He was our constant companion; he worked sheep with us; he hunted with us, and he rode in the pickup with us. He was some dog.

Today we live in town and Marshall commutes to the ranch, as many ranch people do. We are glad that our parents, and their parents before them moved to Ozona, so that we might be born and live in Crockett County

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

> **CHICKEN MACARONI** (Chicken Spaghetti the way kids like it)

2 pkgs. Schwann's diced cooked chicken

4-5 cans chicken broth 4 chicken bouillon cubes

1/2 bag elbow macaroni

1 can tomato sauce 1 can tomato soup

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 diced onion

1/2 tsp. garlic powder

1-1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese, cubed Use large dutch oven. Boil macaroni, garlic powder, onion and bouillon cubes in the chicken broth until macaroni is tender. Add chicken, soups, sauce and cubed cheese. Cook over medium to low heat until cheese is melted. If it seems dry, add another can of broth. You may put this in a casserole dish and bake for 15-20 minutes at 350 or just cook on low heat

BUTTERMILK PIE

Janie made this recipe for The Cottage Collection Tea Room.

3 c. sugar

1 c. buttermilk

4 lg. eggs 1 stick melted oleo

2 tsp. vanilla

Dash salt 2 T flour

Pre-heat oven to 400. Beat eggs until fluffy, add sugar and flour. Beat well. Add oleo and vanilla and beat well. Pour into 9" unbaked crust. There will be some

Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes then lower heat to 350 and bake until center doesn't shake or knife inserted in middle comes out clean. (20-25 min.)

PIE CRUST

3/4 c. Crisco 1 T milk

1/4 c. boiling water 2-1/4 c. flour

1 tsp. salt

Whip Crisco, milk and water with fork until all liquid is abosorbed and resembles whipped cream. Mix flour and salt together and add to Cricso mixture. After mixture is ready to roll out, wet cabinet top with wet cloth and put waxed paper or Saran wrap down. a layer of wrap on top of dough. Roll out - lift top wrap, put pie plate on top of dough, go under bottom wrap and

Sunday evening the message for our youth at the baccalaureate was "Living Every Day With Confidence". The Question comes ringing back, "where is our confidence?" When Job lamented his suffering, his friend Eliphaz answered and said, "is not your fear of God your confidence?" Job 4:6

One thing that gives a person more assurance than any other is to understand clearly their relationship with Jesus. When a person is in doubt or places his trust in a thought or teaching that is unclear to him, then confidence is hard to keep.

As you probably know, a SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER has been in the planning stages for quite some time. JANET HILL McDANIEL was appointed by the County Judge to be Chair man of a committee to plan and construct this Center, along with Committee Members OSCAR KOST, BUSTER MILLER, TROY WILLIAMS, DICK KIRBY, MARIA DE LA ROSA, R. L. BROWN and FRANK TAMBUNGA.

The committee has studied costs, drawings, proposals, etc. for over a year and Crockett County Voters voted a bond issue in which \$80,000.00 was included for this project. There have been numerous fund raising efforts with OSCAR KOST and myself establishing an account at each of the local banks with personal contributions from each of us so that the accounts would be self sustaining -- that is, over \$1,000.00.

The County has given a building site on the North side of First Street and you have probably seen the sign there. A sketch has been presented which provides adequately for "Helping Hands" or "Meals on Wheels" with a single office and a room large enough to feed and seat 100 people with the building to be 110 feet long and 60 feet deep. It will cost approximately \$125,000.00 to build such a "plain" building of metal construction from funds on hand.

I have questioned whether this building will provide for the additional needs that other Senior Citizen Buildings have provided in other towns such as an Arts and Crafts Room, an Exercise Room, a Recreation or Game Room and a Lounge Area with a TV, as well as an office or room for out of town agencies to use when they come to Ozona to work with senior citizens. Therefore, I have proposed that they make this 110' x 60' Building 20 feet longer to have additional rooms for other interest besides the preparation and serving of the food for "Helping Hands" or "Meals on Wheels. I have also proposed that the building be brick or rock rather than just a "plain" metal building.

I have pledged to give \$5,000.00 on the day the work is started IF the building is at least 130 feet x 60 feet and the wall construction is brick or rock rather than metal. Something that ALL the community can use and be proud of; one that will add to the appearance of the community.

I have also pledged to write 25 letters to people like you, who have a good income and may be looking for a way to give a tax deductible gift for the community. Will you please join me in pledging a goodly sum toward this worthy project? Remember, a building will be built with or without our help. Let's see that it is a thing of beauty of adequate size to provide many different activities and services to senior citizens of Crockett County.





Wedding Gown Storage Protects Family Heirlooms

textile heirlooms. Proper storage is just as important in preservation. It tions for many years.

protection against textile deterioration oughly rinsed white cotton sheets can or damage, there are some precautions also be used to line the box. Acid you can take to limit these problems and maintain the textile.

There are several things to con-After the item has been properly cleaned, you will need to decide if commercial or at home packaging is appropriate. A decision about horizontal or vertical storage will also need to be made. All of these decisions will need to be made depending on the type of item you are preserving.

Commercial Packaging - Most drycleaners offer a special package to clean and box wedding gowns. This could be requested for other heirloom

The service usually involves a large box of acid-free cardboard in which the gown is packed with acidfree tissue between folds of the garment and as padding in the bodice and sleeves. Over time, the acid produced by standard tissue paper and cardboard can deteriorate textiles, especially cellulosic fibers such as cotton, linen and rayon.

The initial box is usually placed in a larger protective box. Sometimes slits are present in the box to allow air

Some drycleaners offer an optional vacuum seal. However, the International Fabricare Institute indicates that this process isn't necessary. No seal is permanent. Also, heirloom textiles should be checked yearly for general condition, at which time the seal would be broken.

IFI also suggests that clear plastic or cellophane "windows" on boxes be removed or punctured to allow air movement. Moisture could condense on the clear window and support growth of mildew.

At Home Packaging - Packaging heirloom garments can be done at home. Before doing so, check garments carefully in sunlight for soils and stains, even if they have been professionally cleaned.

Look for soil, stains or the presence of wrinkles that have been pressed in. Both stains and wrinkles may be impossible to remove at a later date.

To package garments at home, use a large, deep box to avoid excessive folds. If possible, the box and tissue should be acid-free. Cardboard

> To pack a large garment, such as a wedding gown, line the box with tissue or cotton sheeting. Place the garment in the box so as to limit folds. Place crumpled tissue at folds and in the bodice and sleeves for shaping.

> If possible, remove fabric-covered metal buttons, rubberized dress shields, or foam padding. These items can oxidize, rust, or deteriorate and result in damage to fabric over time. If not possible, use crumpled tissue as a buffer between these items and the

> Place tissue over the garment and add the lid. Do not seal. In fact, slits to allow air circulation could be added.

Avoid wrapping in plastic unless water damage is possible. Plastic bags are unstable. Plastic bags can give off damaging fumes, trap moisture and provide an environment for mildew to

Horizontal versus vertical. - Storage Box, or horizontal storage has been discussed above. This is desirable for heavy garments with beading or wedding gowns with heavy trains or sheer bodices. Knitted garments should be stored flat to avoid stretching over time. Also, small garments such as christening gowns are easily

In some instances, vertical or storage on a hanger is acceptable. Vertical storage reduces wrinkling, but can weaken shoulders or bodice since the full weight of the garment hangs from these areas. If vertical storage is possible without undue damage to the garment, generously pad and wrap a sturdy hanger with cotton batting and cotton sheeting.

Sew cotton twill straps or a bodice shell slightly shorter than the bodice to the waistline. The weight of the garment will fall primarily on the twill straps or shell, and distribute the stress on the fabirc. Stuff the bodice and sleeves with crumpled tissue or cotton

Make a clean cotton sheeting

cover. Avoid synthetic materials, as they develop static and attract dust. Wash the cotton cover and other cotton storage supplies yearly. Also, do not use plastic bags for long term

Occasionally, small textile or accessory items can be stored flat or rolled on tubes. When using tubes, they should be acid-free or wrapped in clean cotton sheeting.

If the textile is subject to dye fading, contains metallic threads, or is unusually fragile, interleaf acid-free tissue as you roll the item. Roll without tension and be careful to prevent wrinkles or folds from forming. Wrap the tube in cotton sheeting and tie loosely with cotton twill tape for storage. If possible, avoid rolling textiles that are painted, as cracking may occur over time.

Storage - Store heirloom textiles, either hanging or boxed, in cool, dry areas, free from drastic temperature changes. Basements, attics or exterior wall closets are generally unsatisfactory. High attic temperatures cause oxidation of stains, finishes or trims. Basement areas are subject to moisture, mildew and flooding. Exterior closets have less stable temperatures.


Select an area with adequate air circulation, but away from light. Each year, remove the item to check its condition. This is especially important the first year. If stains are noticeable, the potential for removal is greater than if left for longer periods.

Replace non-acid-free tissue or wash cotton sheeting wrappings. Repack the textile so folds are in different locations.

If garments are kept in drawers rather than boxes, do not place heavy items on top of them which may cause crushing and folds. Also, certain fibers, such as cotton, linen or rayon, should not be stored in cedar chests. The acid given off by the wood in the cedar chest can weaken the textile

Caring for textiles and garments worn for special occasions can prolong their beauty and reduce deterioration over time. With proper treatment, items bought or made new today can be the family heirlooms of future generations. A little extra effort now can enrich the lives of family members to come.
