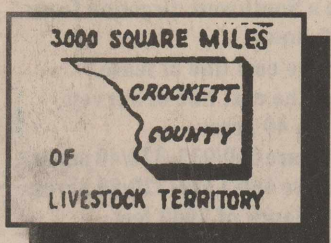

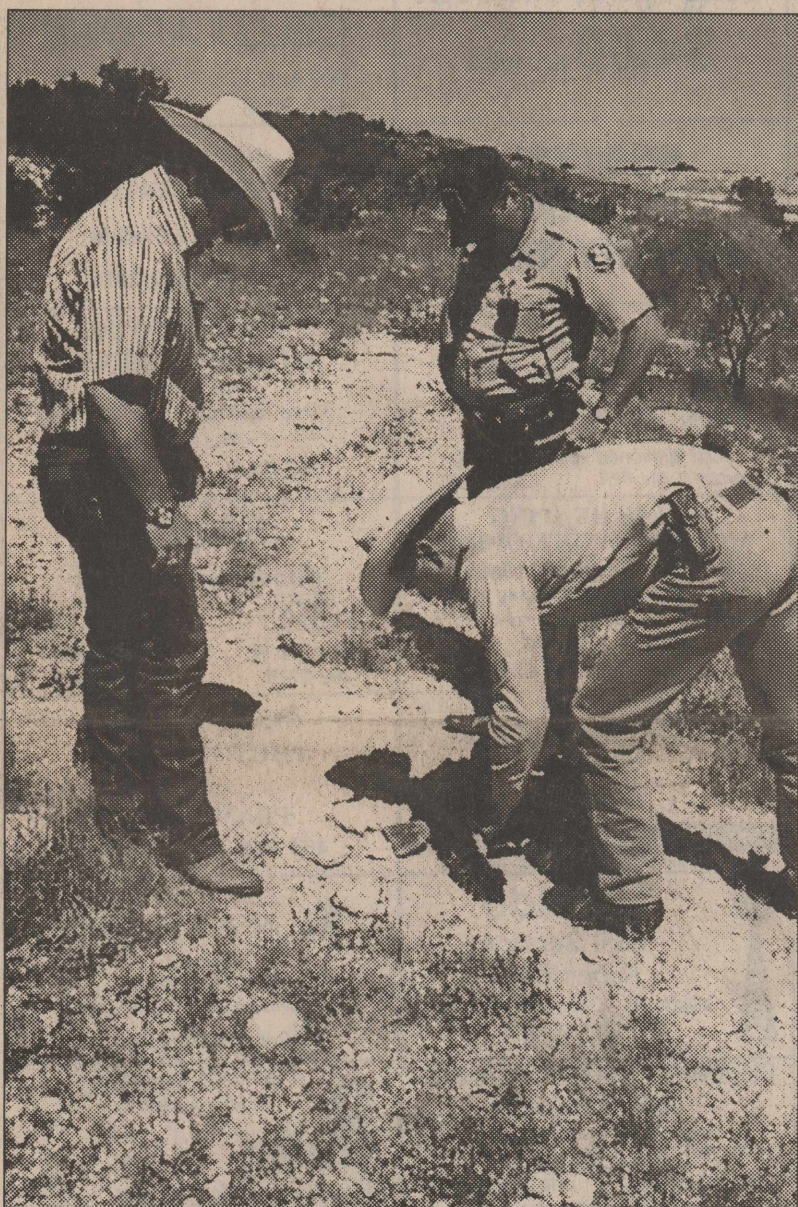

PHILLIPS MURDER SUSPECT FOUND

More than six years ago on Christmas night, December 1990, Dean Phillips was murdered when he went to close his laundromat. A possible suspect was developed through local witnesses recalling a white male in an old blue van looking for laundromats. An image of the individual was captured on the store video at Maness Texaco.

The investigation slowed and then dragged to a halt as all possible leads were checked. Messages sent to all police agencies along Interstate 10 brought in reams of papers with possible suspects. All were checked and discarded.

With the assistance of the Texas Ranger and FBI, a federal warrant was issued for an unknown person (John Doe) in connection with the murder. This was the prelude to having the

Phillips murder broadcast on one of the nation's television series for unsolved crimes. It was eventually aired on *America's Most Wanted*.

More than 50 tips were received by the studio after the show. Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne started going through the tips in search of possible suspects. One seemed to fit the description as given by the local witnesses. The suspect was in prison, and at Ranger Byrne's request, the man's photos and fingerprint card were sent to Ozona. The finger print card was turned over to the Texas Department of Public Safety's lab in Austin. They confirmed that the suspect's fingerprint matched one found at the murder scene.

A search was then on for a person or persons who might have been with the suspect when the crime was com-

mitted. Records received from Georgia and Florida indicated that a female may have been with the suspect during that time period. Computer searches and calls to police agencies in Georgia and Florida came up with a name. A local detective in Georgia confirmed that this person was presently paying a water bill in their town. Ranger Byrne and Sheriff Shane Fenton immediately left for Georgia.

The person was questioned and provided officers with an account of the crime and approximately where the suspect discarded his bloody clothing and the murder weapon.

Sheriff's Department personnel, Texas Rangers, and local Highway Patrol officers combed the area. Approximately nine items were collected for lab analysis. The Crockett County Road Department was called for as-

sistance in clearing the high grass and weeds in the area, and Doug Meador brought out the water department's metal detector.

No names can be released until warrants are issued.

Sheriff Fenton wants to be on record as saying that the final resolution of this six year old murder would never have been possible had it not been for the help of the Texas Rangers, Texas Department of Public Safety, Federal Bureau of Investigation, officials in Utah, Georgia and Florida who went out of their way to assist in the investigation, and last but not least, the television series *America's Most Wanted*. There are also many local citizens who provided assistance in identifying the suspect and hands on hard work in helping recover valuable evidence.

Roping resumes at 8 a.m. Saturday, June 21, with three gos of open roping followed by the top 15 in a fourth go.

Finals begin at 7 p.m. Saturday night with junior, senior and open contestants roping in three more gos.

The championship roping will be sponsored by the Crockett County Roping Association and the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. There is no charge to attend the roping.

Due to a change in format this year, there will not be as many ropers, according to association members. Saddles are to be given to the top ropers.

Court Approves Drug Testing

Commissioners approved signing a service agreement with Texas Alcohol and Drug Testing Service when they met Monday night. This will be the second year the county has used this firm for employee drug testing.

After discussion, the court voted to table action on an agenda item to discuss and approve an interlocal agreement with the City of San Angelo to carry out grant objectives of the criminal justice division of the state. County Attorney Bill Mason is to review the agreement.

Under this agreement, Crockett County would participate in a program which makes agents of the Rio Concho Drug Task Force available for area law enforcement. Salary, car and maintenance for an officer stationed in Ozona would be paid through a

federal grant to the City of San Angelo. Crockett County would be required to pay \$2,000 toward the 12-month program. Seven area counties are already participating.

Commissioner Fred Deaton said there are three areas in the agreement he doesn't like. Certain powers of the county will be given up, the contract "ties the county into a lot of federal programs we are not in and probably a lot of people wouldn't want to be in" and the court has yet to see a copy of the grant contract.

Janet Hill McDaniel met with the court to discuss advertising for bids for the Senior Citizens' Building. At present there is \$110,228.36 in the building fund, she said. Two grants

Someone's In The Kitchen

"Have you ever wondered how recipes are created?" asked Cook of the Week Linda Moore. "They're certainly invented by people with more time (and patience) in the kitchen than I have.

"When Scotty and I married, I had never cooked a meal. My kitchen experience came from home economics classes and the occasional chocolate cake (which usually fell) that I baked. All that first year he carried a glass of Alka Seltzer in his hand. I'm still not what I would consider a 'good cook', but I have learned to have more patience in the kitchen."

The red-backed Pandale Cookbook became a standard in the Moore household. That first copy is in pieces now, but it has been replaced by the white-backed version and the still newer Pandale Cookbook.

"Standbys from the Pandale Cookbook at our house are Mrs. Welton Bunker's buttermilk biscuit and cornbread recipes, Mrs. David Earl Malone's red velvet cake, Mrs. Buster Deaton's cocoa sheath cake, Mrs. Henry Mills Jr.'s chicken tetraxini and the recently discovered plain cake recipe from Mrs. Gaines Ballew, Jr. This gets frosted with a recipe of Becky Cullins Montgomery's given to me years ago by my sister-in-law, Janet Mason Moore.

"Recipes I'm going to share with you today come from different sources, however. You'll like Mama's Gingerbread, which we make without ginger (maybe we should call it Mama's Gingerless Bread), Apricot Sherbet and a cornbread dressing I clipped from a newspaper, which is close as I can get to the superior one made by my mother-in-law, Maggie Moore.

Mama's Gingerbread

1/2 c. Crisco
1/2 c. sugar
2 eggs
2 1/2 c. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. each cinnamon and nutmeg (1 tsp. ginger if you like it)
1 c. Grandma's Molasses
1 c. boiling water
Cream Crisco and sugar. Add eggs and beat thoroughly. Add molasses. Mix dry ingredients together (I don't sift, so I add a little less flour than called for) and stir in. Add boiling water last. Pour into a Pam-sprayed 9x12 pan and bake at 350 degrees until done.

Apricot Sherbet

Bring to a boil one quart water, one quart sugar. Let cool. This can be done a day ahead and refrigerated. Add one can peeled apricots mashed fine, or you can use one can of apricot nectar. Add the juice of eight lemons (approximately 3/4 cup) and place in freezer. Before mixture begins to harden, add one quart cream or half and half and whites of four eggs beaten stiff. For pineapple sherbet, substitute one can grated pineapple. This recipe was given to me by Scotty's mother and is one of his favorites.

Cornbread Dressing

1 quart crumbled stale bread
1 quart crumbled cornbread
1 quart crumbled biscuits
1 c. chopped onion (including about 1/4 c. chopped onions with tops)
1 c chopped celery
1/4 c. finely chopped fresh parsley (or sprinkle in some dried parsley)

1 1/2 tsp. sage (or to taste as your family likes)
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 c. melted butter
2 eggs, slightly beaten
turkey or chicken broth to moisten

At our house, this is mixed and placed in a large pan on top of the stove and cooked slowly with frequent stirrings, tastings by family members to assure that the sage is "just right" and additions of broth. I usually put in more cornbread and less bread and biscuit.

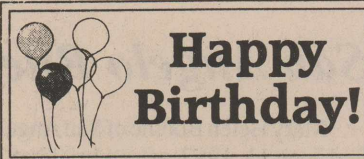

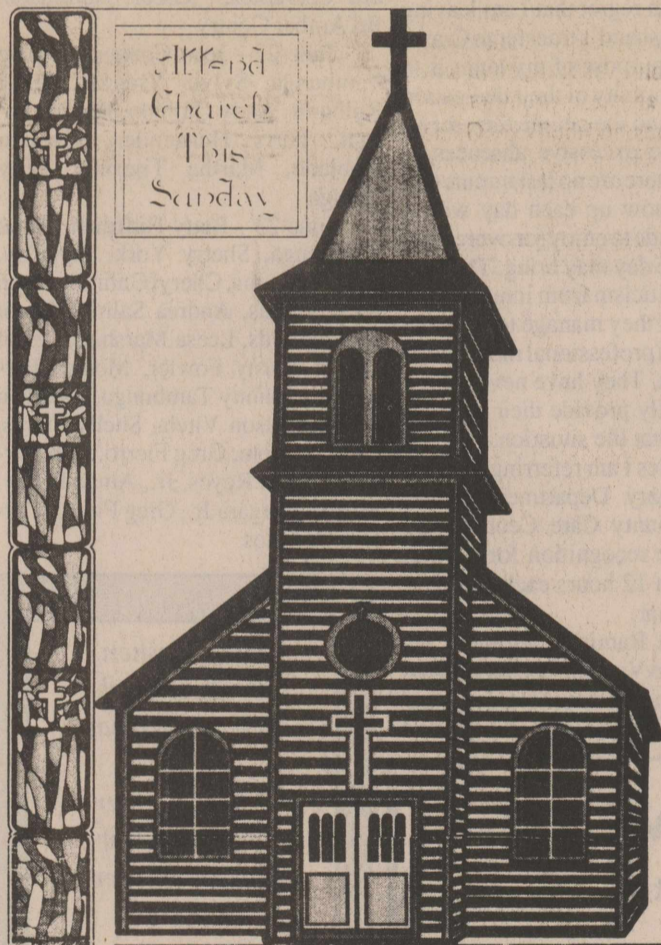

Lefty And Blanche Walker Start Fifty Year Tradition

In 1947 when Lefty Walker told wife Blanche, "let's call some of our buddies and go to the river," little did they know it was the beginning of an annual tradition which would stand 50 years later.

The buddies Lefty spoke of were friends from college days. Back at Abilene Christian College, money was scarce for students during the Depression. "It didn't cost but 25 cents to go to the movies, but we didn't have 25 cents," Lefty said. "I'd get Blanche by the hand and we'd walk the loop. Then we'd get in the parlor with friends and have a bull session."

Friends from those days have lasted a lifetime, and this month the buddies, some 30 of them, held their reunion in Abilene. Lefty is the oldest of the group at 86 and others range back to 80 years of age.

There were three widowers, 12 widows and eight couples this time,

said Blanche. None of the friends have ever divorced. "We were married back when people didn't divorce like they do now," Blanche said.

The friends met for 16 years at the fishing lease on Devil's River. Then there were four or five years each of gatherings at San Marcos, then Brady and Cisco. They also met in Kerrville.

"At the Devil's River camp and in San Marcos and Brady we'd have cooks," said Lefty. By the time they decided to meet at Cisco, where several of the group had cabins, two couples would be responsible for preparing each meal. When Kerrville became the meeting place, "we stayed in a motel where they provided us with a room for bridge and dominoes and we would eat at cafes," Lefty said.

The saga of the friends from ACC was told by Bill Whitaker in the Abilene Reporter June 9 and is reprinted below with permission of the newspaper.

No, this isn't some student association or class reunion, let alone family gathering. It's simply a group of students who got to know each other at ACU back when it was Abilene Christian College and officials there wondered if they'd be able to survive America's Great Depression.

"As students, we weren't always aware of how bad things really were," group quasi-historian Mose McCook told me. "But Coach A. B. 'Bugs' Morris told us the reason we were probably so close was because we had to stay together to exist." If the bleak times forged strong bonds on ACU Hill, they were reformed during the prosperous era following World War II. In 1947, Lefty Walker of Ozona and wife Blanche got together a group of pals who were classmates at ACU, inviting them to a place he had leased on Devil's River.

Wives were invited to join the affair. The men fished and cooked, and times good and bad were recalled. At the end of the reunion, everyone had had such a high time of it, they decided to meet the following year - and so it's continued, without fail, to this day. "Of course, back at Devil's River, there was no bathroom," 82-year-old Boots Hill of Abilene marveled. "On top of that, there were lots of rattlesnakes. When you went out in the middle of the night, you didn't know whether there was a rattlesnake coiled beneath you or not!"

"But," Weezie added, "our kids thought Devil's River was heaven."

Dealing from the bottom

Indeed, the small fry were always part of the reunion, which was good for Maxine Hill.

"They always joked, at least during the early years, that if they held the thing long enough, I wouldn't be pregnant or nursing a baby!"

Eventually, the group expanded from the five couples on Devil's River in 1947 to some 50 people. And while members sometimes lent themselves flippant names and gave the impression of never taking themselves seriously, almost no one ever missed the reunion every second weekend of June.

In a way, they feel such togetherness strengthened them during the rest of the year.

"There were no divorces in our group," said Boots, now a widow. "Also, no drinking and no smoking,

though there was a lot of card-playing!"

Humor was also an ingredient at the festivities. Fondly remembered was Chesley McDonald of Sterling City, who proved a droll storyteller.

"We called him Henry Wadsworth Shortfellow," Mose said. "He was a sort of country poet. He would tell us the best stories. One time he was telling us about this Mexican fellow who was working for him and was going with a woman who had a pretty shady reputation."

"But she's slept with everyone in town," Chesley supposedly told his ranching amigo at one point.

"Yes sir, meester, that's true," the ranch hand replied, "but it's such a small town."

By now routinely calling themselves the Devil's River Rats, the group eventually began meeting other places outdoors, including San Marcos, Brady, Cisco and Kerrville, though many still have special memories of Devil's River.

"Only reason we gave up Devil's River was because Lefty lost the lease on it," Mose said. "Otherwise, we'd probably still be going there."

Although death and the infirmities of old age have reined in the groups' activities, they still meet with an eye to next year.

"Of course," 80-year-old Maxine Hill lamented, "there will be a time when it's no longer possible."

"And I'm afraid," Mose added, "it won't be long."

Tenth Annual Hunter Education Camp Completed

Since June 1988, volunteer instructors, contributors, sponsors and concerned citizens of Crockett County and the surrounding area have assisted students from Ozona and nearby counties in successful completion of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Hunter Education Course. The 10th annual West Texas Hunter Education Camp was held on the Gene Perry Ranch in Crockett County on June 6, 7 and 8, 1997. Seven girls and 18 boys ages 12-15 were successfully certified for hunter safety as per a mandatory hunter education law that went into effect on June 1, 1988.

During the 3-day weekend, students were instructed in firearms and ammunition; handling firearms safely in the field; wildlife management and identification; marksmanship and field dressing of big game; hunter ethics; wilderness survival; compass reading and orienteering; game laws; private ownership of firearms; poisonous snakes; archery, blackpowder and muzzleloading; and hunter first-aid. Students had hands-on training on the firing range and shot .22 rifles, .243 rifles, .20 gauge shotguns, several different calibers of pistols, and blackpowder firearms. Students took their new-found knowledge to the field on Sunday and trekked through a shoot-don't-shoot walk-through, and tracked wounded game on a simulated blood trail.

This type of camp is successfully completed only with the assistance of many people. Dorris Haire, San Angelo - registration of students, making sure camp ran on schedule, gun handling field exercises, firing range master, conducted test, and prepared paperwork for camp. Lloyd Winkley, Ozona - compass reading and orienteering. Doug Meador, Ozona - poisonous snakes identification and demonstration. Mary Humphrey, Sonora - wildlife

management and identification, firing range, hunter first-aid, and general paperwork for camp. Bob Harris, Ozona - field dressing big game, firing range, and walk-through and tracking wounded game. Ed and Will Collett, Jim Heame, Jack Gillit and Tommy Anderson of Ozona - firing range.

Crockett County Game Warden Joe Guidry and Reagan County Game Warden Rick Gully instructed students in hunter ethics, game laws, private ownership of firearms and firearms' responsibility. They also assisted on the firing range.



totaling \$27,500 are to be received in July, and there are fund raisers planned, also, Mrs. McDaniel said. Commissioners voted to authorize advertising for bids once final plans are completed.

In connection with establishing a policy for use of the former doctors' clinic building, Judge Jeffrey Sutton recommended that the health services board (hospital/care center board) set a rental rate comparable to office space elsewhere in town and that the board be responsible for screening applicants. The court voted to approve the recommendation.

Also approved by commissioners was authorizing advertising for bids for tub grinding to dispose of wood. A

grant in the amount of \$17,500 was approved last year for this purpose.

An agenda item to apply for a grant for tub grinding in 1998 was tabled to give court members time to examine the new application. The grant for grinding is an ongoing project for five years, but application must be made each year.

Awarding of bids for the airport improvement project was tabled until Monday, June 23.

The county personnel policy was discussed. The court voted to table action on this policy until a future meeting.

Also discussed was the county drug policy. There are a few unanswered questions to be resolved at a future meeting.

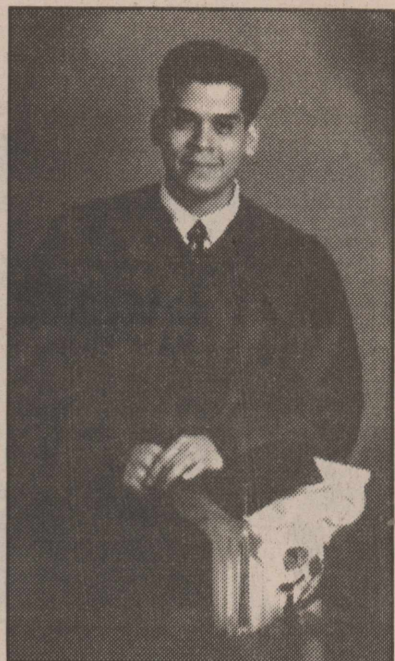
Vargas Nominated To Who's Who

Librarian Certification

Librarian Louise Ledoux has just received notification from Edward Seidenberg, director of the Library Development Division of the Texas State Library, of renewal of certification as county librarian in Texas through 1999. For renewal, librarians must receive a minimum of 20 hours of continuing education, or earn three hours of college credit every two years. Mrs. Ledoux has held a Grade II Certification since taking the job of Crockett County librarian in 1984.

Certification requirements are set by the Texas Legislature and include a Grade I Certificate which is permanent for anyone holding a fifth-year degree in librarianship accredited by the American Library Association, or a master's degree in library or information science. Most large metropolitan libraries require a Grade I Certificate for all library positions. A two-year Grade II Certificate is required for employment in any city/county library having a service area with a population of 25,000 or fewer persons and requires graduation from an accredited senior college or university. A two-year Grade III Certificate is similar to Grade II, but is for a service area with a population of 10,000 or fewer persons and only requires graduation from high school or GED.

Plant Tips
from M&R Nursery

SUMMERTIME....

When it starts to get hot outside, it sure feels good inside under the A/C.

Unfortunately, we can't ignore our landscapes. Here are a few of the summertime high points.

- 1) If your lawn is growing fine but it needs a green-up, apply an iron product such as Ionate. If you need to grow & green, then use the lawn tonic, 14-0-0 with 10% iron. This will excite some new growth and put in the green.
- 2) Check your roses for diseases such as powdery mildew and black spot. Also checking for aphids and thrip damage. Use Fertlome Rose Spray. This will treat both disease and insects with one product. Be sure to feed roses regularly. They are heavy eaters this time of year.
- 3) If you have put down any St. Augustine sod recently, check for new growth. When this happens, you can start to use a foliar fertilizer such as Hasta-Gro or Miracle Gro's Hose End Feeder. You should feed the grass every 2 weeks for the rest of the growing season.
- 4) With all the rains, you should be seeing more fire ant mounds than usual. If so use the 2-step approach of Amidro and Orthene. Ronnie wrote on this application last week.

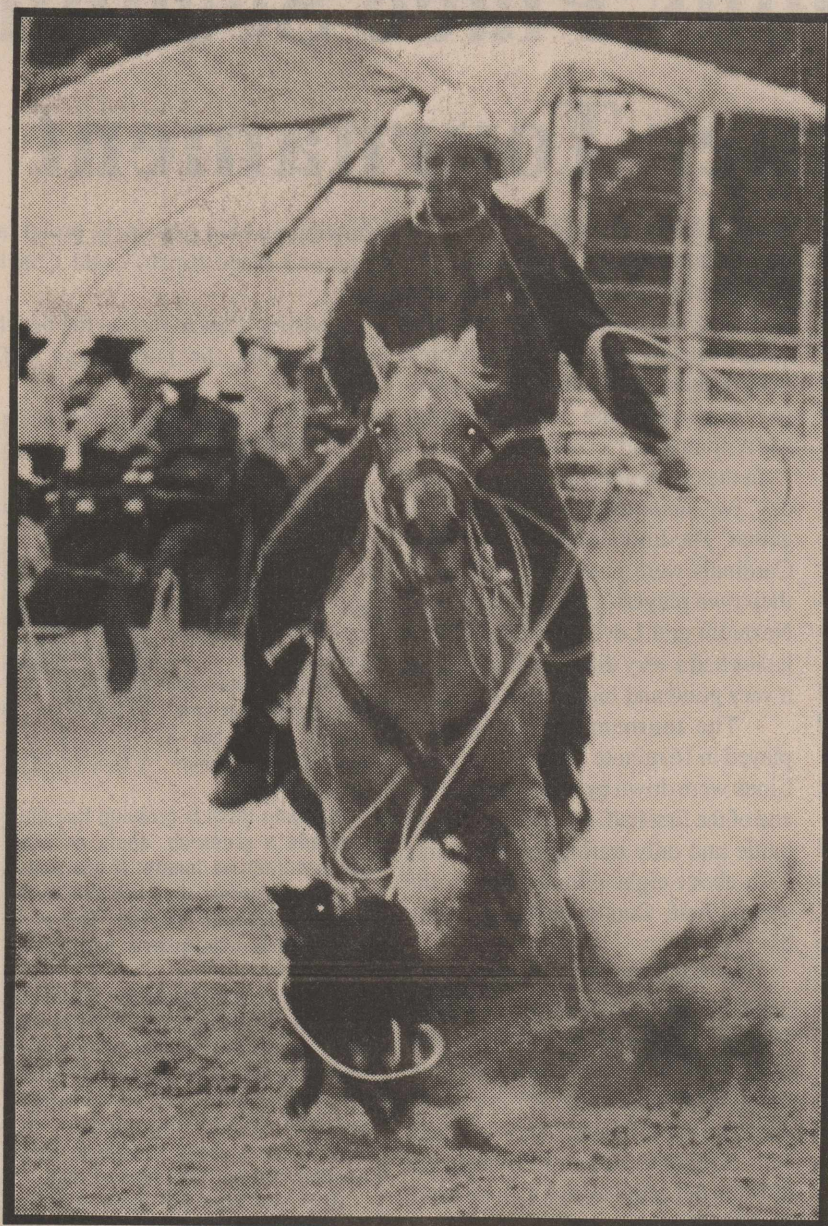

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 9, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

rently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

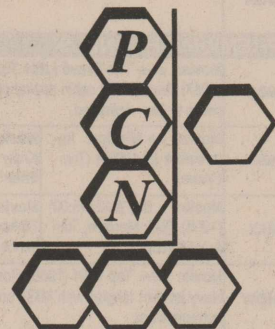

The biggest and most looked forward to in high school rodeo is the 1997 Texas State High School Rodeo finals held in Abilene on June 8-14. Representing Ozona High was bullrider Ruben Cruz and team roper Cody Hunnicutt. They both qualified at the regional rodeo in April to make the state finals.

Riding bulls is Ruben Cruz's sport and he had a chance to ride some of the best at the state rodeo finals. Cruz was given the chance to ride two bulls and unfortunately for him, he was thrown off before completing the two eight-second rides.

On Monday afternoon, around one p.m., Cruz got his chance to ride his first bull. Most bullriders try to find out some information about the bull they are riding.

"I didn't really know him (the bull)," said Cruz. "I took him three or four jumps, then the bull started spinning and I went straight off."

To get a picture of approximately how many bullriders there were, Cruz said that 10 bullriders rode on Sunday, 30 rode on Monday, and 40 rode on Friday. About a total of 100 bullriders get two bulls each, and the top 15 riders make the short go on Saturday.

"There were some pretty good bullriders and some pretty ranked bulls. Some riders that scored pretty

high points--into the high 70s and low 80s probably made the finals," Cruz said.

On Friday, Cruz got his second chance to make an eight second ride. Cruz was very impressed with the bulls as he said, "On Friday, I drew the PBR (Professional Bullriders) bull, he blew out of there and started spinning. He threw my legs and out I went," said Cruz. "He was real strong and a pretty rank bull, too!"

All in all, Cruz enjoyed the trip and

Producers Marketing Coop Sells 1.6 Million Pounds Of Wool

Producers Marketing Cooperative, Inc. offered approximately 1.6 million pounds of wool on May 31 in San Angelo. There was an estimated 1.3 million pounds of 12 month fleece wools offered in five micron categories from 22.5 micron to 18.5 micron and finer.

Clean basis, FOB warehouse, BOU and classed wool 20.6-21.5 micron (um), 3-3.25 inches brought \$2.50-2.628, with an average price of \$2.52. Skirted and classed wool brought \$2.70-2.828 and averaged \$2.72. Wools with length over 3.25 inches brought \$2.82. This translates to grease price highs of \$1.63 on specific lots.

On 19.6-20.5 um BOU classed prices received were \$2.80. Skirted and classed wool in this same category brought \$3.00 with grease prices converting to levels of \$1.903 for 3.25 inch staple.

Approximately 75,300 pounds of 18.6-19.5 um wool was sold for base bid on BOU classed lots at \$2.90, skirted and classed at \$3.10 and length premium wools at \$3.20. Grease prices

reached levels of \$1.965.

Wool testing finer than 18.5 um was paid \$3.00 for BOU classed, \$3.20 for skirted and classed, and \$3.30 for premium length skirted and classed.

Bellies and pieces brought \$1.666 clean, FOB warehouse. Tags/locks were bought at \$0.551 grease price.

Short wools offered on a clean basis amounted to approximately 106,000 pounds. Felting type wools under 2 inches brought \$2.076-2.086, resulting in grease price ranging mainly from \$1.14-1.209. Wools 2-2.5 inches finer than 21.5 um brought \$2.042-2.054 clean calculated out at 1.131-1.19 greasy. One lot 19-20 um 2-2.5 inch brought \$2.23 clean with grease price calculated at \$1.25.

Shot lamb wool 2-2.5 inches, up to 20.4 um was purchased at \$2.026 clean. Lamb wool 1-1.5 inch received \$1.56 clean.

Out of the 1.6 million pounds offered only 0.5% of the volume was not accepted at the prices bid by the buying trade. There was active participation from all wool buyers.

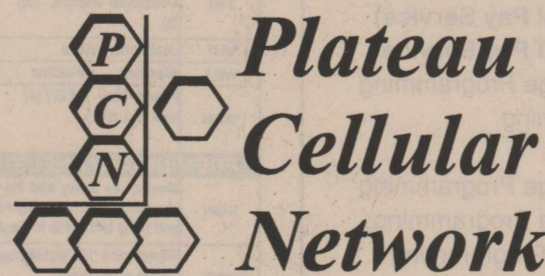

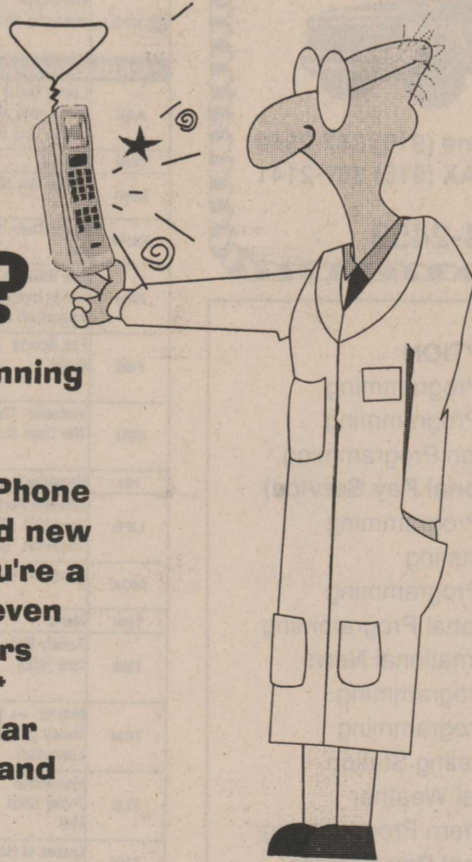

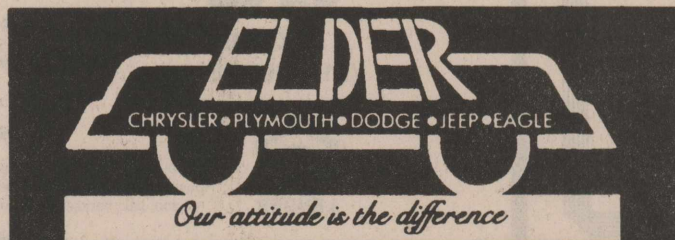
