

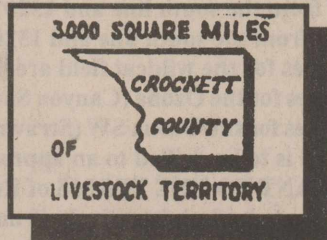

Fields Wins Two WCGR Saddles

This year cool, cloudy weather greeted the goat ropers as the Texas Goat Roping Association's 1997 World Championship Goat Roping got underway Friday evening, June 20, at the Ozona Fair grounds. A total of 52 contestants roped in three events.

The event attracted contestants from all over Texas, including Knickerbocker, Brady, Sterling City, Rocksprings, Iraan, Bronte, Barksdale, Del Rio, San Angelo, Eldorado, San Saba, Big Lake, Bronte, Junction, and Ozona. The number of entries were down from 123 in '96, and 163 contestants in 1995.

Gary Vannoy, president of the Crockett County Roping Association said, "I think the goat roping was successful despite fewer entries. We dropped the B, C and the ladies in order to make it a two-day roping."

"Next year we hope to have enough added money to put into the roping, to have over 100 ropers. The roping was a financial success," said Vannoy, one of this year's ropers. "We are very optimistic about having it here next year. There is a group getting together to try to get better sponsorship."

This is the fifth consecutive year for Ozona to host the goat roping. Though the event is called the world championship, it is really the culmi-

nation of a six-event series of ropings sponsored by the Texas Goat Roping Association.

Although, it is very similar to calf roping, it is pretty exclusive to West Texas. Also, the prize money is not the same.

Freddie Fields, a roper from Knickerbocker, amazed the crowd by not only becoming the 1997 world

champion in the open roping, but won the senior division as well. Last year's winner Justin Frizzell had a tough time with some goats, but he won second place in the first go.

Fields impressed the crowd by winning the championship with 98.80 seconds on seven goats. Although the time was not faster than Frizzell's

TAAS Results Outstanding

Members of the Ozona School Board happily reviewed during their monthly regular meeting on Tuesday, June 18, student results on the 1997 administration of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) in grades three through eight and ten, and student results on the IOWA Tests of Basic Skills in grades kindergarten through two.

Student results on TAAS were outstanding, showing solid gains in student performance for the third year in a row, and when compared to other students across the state and in the region, the results were even more outstanding.

In Ozona Intermediate School's third grade, which is the first grade for assessing student performance on TAAS, 77% of the students passed reading (81% state and 85% region), 89% passed math (81% state and 85% region), and 74% passed all tests taken (74% state and 78% region).

In the fourth grade, 84% passed reading (82% state and 83% region), 88% passed math (82% state and 86% region), 93% passed writing (87% state and 89% region) and 76% passed all tests taken (72% state and 74% region).

89% of Ozona's fifth graders passed reading (84% state and 86% region)

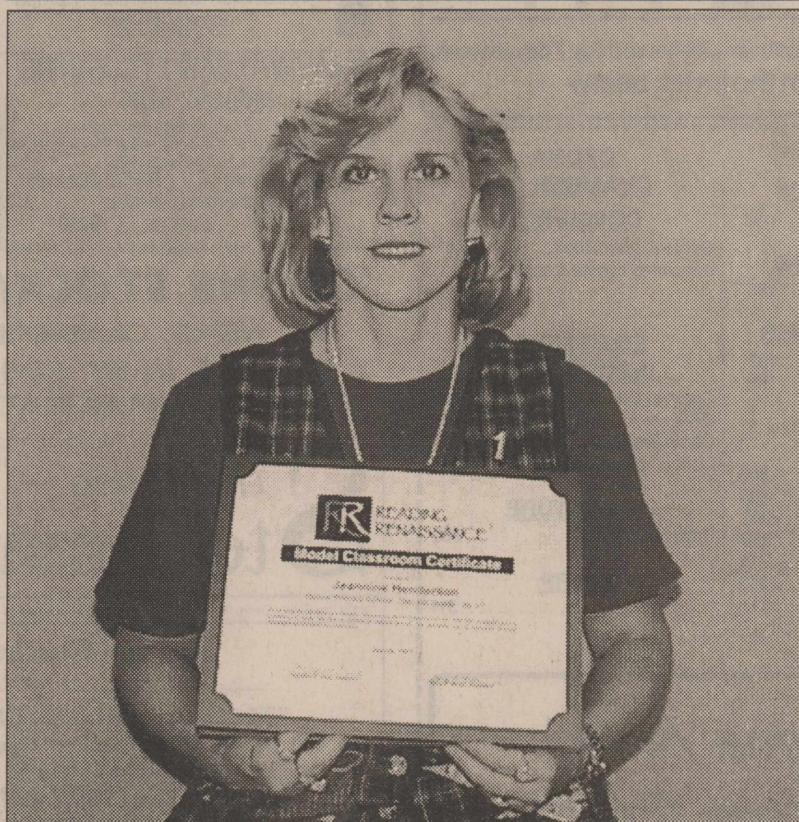

Michael Sharp Loses Appeal

Michael Eugene Sharp, convicted by a Crockett County jury in 1983 of the murder of Brenda Kay Broadway, has lost an appeal before the U. S. Court of Appeals, Fifth Circuit, in New Orleans, LA. Sharp has one more line of appeal, the U. S. Supreme Court, in his bid to get off death row.

On June 10, 1982, Sharp forcibly abducted Brenda Kay Broadway and her two daughters, Selena Elms and Christy Elms from a Kermit car wash. The girls were 14 and 8 years of age at the time. Court records show that Sharp made the three remove their clothing, tied them with rope and forced the woman and older daughter to perform sexual acts on each other.

When Sharp began to stab the mother, the 14-year-old escaped. After spending the night in the pasture, she was found the next day by oilfield workers.

Ms. Broadway and the younger girl were stabbed to death and buried in a shallow grave. Sharp, an Odessa tool pusher, was tried in Lubbock for Christy's murder. Because of a defect in the indictment, the death penalty could not be imposed, and Sharp received a life sentence.

At his trial in Ozona for the death of Ms. Broadway, the state presented testimony from several women that Sharp had attempted to lure them into

his truck on the evening of the murders. Selena Elms identified Sharp as

Airport Bid Awarded

The bid for a 1.930 million dollar airport improvement project was awarded to Reese Albert Inc. when commissioners met June 23.

Ninety percent of the cost will be paid through The Texas Department of Transportation with Crockett County to match with the remaining 10 percent. Most of the county's portion has come from the land which was donated by J. Cleo Thompson.

TXDot funding could only pay for a 5,700 foot runway, and Thompson is paying for an additional 300 feet which could cost from \$50,000 to \$60,000.

Improvements at the airport include the new 6,000'x75' runway with turnarounds at each end, new 150'x700' paved parking apron, new taxi-way from runway to new parking apron, new approach areas at each end, new

8' deer-proof fence all around and new lighting.

The project bid came in under the estimates said Danny Winchester of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Inc., a firm of engineers, architects and planners. This will enable all the alternates to the project to be added and still remain within budget.

Now that the bid has been awarded, TXDot will put contracts together to be approved in Austin. Construction could begin in 30 days, Winchester said, and completion will take approximately six months.

Other bidders for the project were Jones Brothers Dirt and Paving of Odessa and Price Construction Inc. of Big Spring.

At the Monday night meeting commissioners also approved applying for a 1998 grant for tub grinding of wood materials.

Juanita Delgado-Cook-of-the-Week Someone's In The Kitchen

The kitchen is the family gathering place at the home of Juanita and Herculano Delgado. When any of their eight children come with their families, everyone is in the kitchen, said Mrs. Delgado. Learning just how Mama makes a favorite dish is often a topic of conversation.

"My kids are eaters," said Mrs. Delgado, and when they left home, she found it hard to cook for just two people.

When the Delgados married, all she could cook were fried eggs and potatoes and eggs. Her husband and his brother, the late Leon Vargas, worked together, and it was her brother-in-law who taught her to cook, she said. One of the recipes she shares today is chorizo like he made.

The chorizo is also one of the children's favorites, and they love to take frozen packages when they go home.

Mrs. Delgado likes to experiment when she cooks, and "it usually comes out good," she said.

HOMEMADE CHORIZO

2 1/2 lbs. ground beef
3/4 c. vinegar
1 T garlic powder
1 T cumino powder
1 tsp. oregano
1/2 c. chili powder
Put all together in a pan. Mix it real good. Cover and put in refrigerator overnight. Then put small amounts in plastic bags and freeze. It's ready to use for burritos or whatever you want.

Mrs. Delgado sometimes mixes the chorizo with refried beans for burritos instead of using eggs.

PORK CHOPS WITH CHILI SAUCE

4 pork chops
Cooking oil (enough to fry chops)
2 T flour
2 T chili powder
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/4 tsp. ground comino
Salt to taste
Fry pork chops. Set aside. Pour out oil, leaving about 3 T in pan. Mix chili powder, flour, garlic and comino powder. Put in hot cooking oil. Stir for about a minute. Pour enough water to make a thick gravy. Add salt to taste. Pour over chops and simmer for about 10 minutes. You can do this with chicken, too. This is good with Mexican rice or mashed potatoes and any kind of vegetable you like.

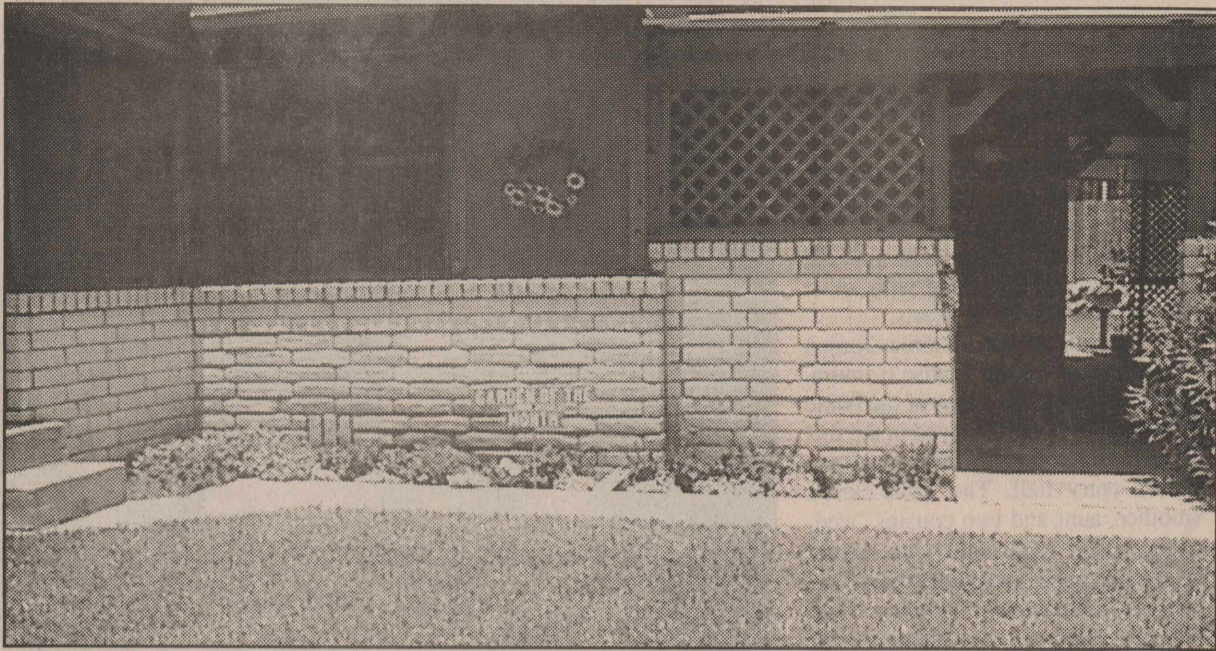

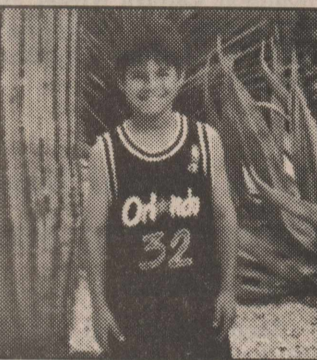

"Love Is A Many Splendored Thing", or so the song goes. Perhaps that's because it covers such a broad range of human emotions. People say: "I love pizza," or "I love Elvis Presley," or "Let's make love" - none of which help at all in getting to know what LOVE IS...

In chapter 4 of his first letter, St. John declares: "This is love, not that we loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to pay for our sins. Dear friends, if that's how God loved us, then we should love one another." The Apostle indicates that we learn what LOVE IS by experiencing it in God's gift of His own beloved Son. In other words, the more we learn about how God loves, the more we'll know what LOVE IS...and the more we'll be able to love.

Maybe it's kind of like a father who gives up his son to go to war. It's not because he loves his son too little, or others more than his son - but because he believes it's necessary, the good thing to do. God gave up His Son, whom He loved dearly, because it was necessary - the good thing to do. God the father sent His own beloved Son to do battle with our enemy, Satan - who'd won a victory over us in the Garden of Eden, and was plundering the world with Sin and Death. And

since the Devil's too strong for us, the eternal Son of God came to save us from that destruction.

We can be sure that God's Son, who came into the world to "serve and give His life as a ransom for many", didn't endure His agonizing suffering and death on the Cross in order to 'Feel Good'. Jesus loved us, not for His sake - but for ours, and that's Commitment, not Feeling. Therefore, the close commitment which exists between the Father and the Son has become the Definition of Love for many people. LOVE IS...the Commitment that keeps a Marriage alive, even after the early Thrills are gone - because Love looks for deeper rewards than Feelings. LOVE IS...the Commitment to carry through a Pregnancy that doesn't Feel very good - or that isn't very convenient. LOVE IS...the Commitment that wakes a Parent in the middle of the night to care for an ailing Child. LOVE IS...the Commitment which motivates a Teenager to go against their Peers who'd lead them into something Wrong. LOVE IS...the Commitment that moved God to give up His only begotten Son, and which moved Jesus to give up His own life - for YOU and ME. Feeling doesn't have much to do with any of those situations, because it really doesn't have all that much to do with Love.

One favorite illustration of Jesus' love is found in the account of His betrayal in the Garden of Gethsemane, where we see the enormity of the Savior's Commitment. Judas, who'd been with Jesus throughout the glori-

ous time of His Ministry and known His love, led the Mob to arrest Him. As the Traitor approached the Savior to carry out his pathetic act, Jesus - whose Feelings must've been devastated by what was happening - reached out to His disciple once more in Love and said: "Friend, what are you here for?". He didn't call Judas names, curse him, or forsake him - but called the Traitor Friend! What would YOU have said to Judas? But Jesus Loved Judas, was committed to him, and called him Friend. Furthermore, that means the Savior's Commitment to US is so great that He loved us in spite of the Cross, thinking nothing of its shame. He loved us with His Life, and He still loves us - for He intercedes for us. (Romans 8:34)

The kind of Commitment the Father and the Son display toward us is what Jesus commands us to have for each other - as He says in John 10: "Love one another...as I have loved you". From St. Paul's description of Love in 1 Cor. 13 - what it Does and Doesn't Do, it sounds as if we'll have to Put Up With a Lot of Stuff from others. It doesn't sound as if it'll Feel very Good. But again, John says: "We love because He first loved us!" Through Baptism God has Recreated us in His Image - and His Image is Love. Therefore, Love is our image as well - for we've come to know the Love of God personally in our lives, and in Jesus Christ that Love is perfected - In us and Through us, so that we Do Love. And remember that LOVE IS...Commitment, not Feelings.

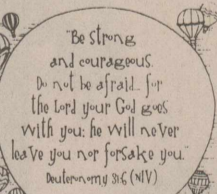

region), 94% passed math (86% state and 90% regions), and 86% passed all tests taken (79% state and 82% region).

At Ozona Middle School, 83% of the sixth grade students passed reading (84% state and 87% region), 88% passed math (81% state and 87% region), and 81% passed all tests taken (76% state and 81% region). 87% of Ozona's seventh grade students passed reading (84% state and 85% region), 87% passed math (79% state and 83% region), and 80% passed all tests taken (75% state and 77% region).

In the eighth grade where students are tested by TAAS in five subject areas, 85% passed reading (83% state and 83% region), 87% passed math (76% state and 78% region), 91% passed writing (80% state and 80% region), 89% passed science (84% state and 86% region), 73% passed social studies (67% state and 71% region), and 63% passed all tests taken (66% state and 67% region).

In Ozona High School's tenth grade, 88% passed reading (86% state and 86% region), 72% passed math (72% state and 72% region), 88% passed writing (88% state and 89% region), and 66% passed all tests taken (67% state and 67% region).

A composite summary of all of the TAAS results revealed that Ozona's students had either equaled or surpassed students across the state in 22 of the 26 areas and had either equaled or surpassed students across the region in 21 of the 26 areas of the 1997 state assessment instrument.

The school board members also compared two, three and four year

the murderer of her mother, and the state offered evidence that Sharp's truck contained hairs matching that of the three victims, that mud at the scene of the crime was consistent with mud at the oil rig where he worked, and that traces of human blood had been found on Sharp's knife.

Sharp's conviction on May 19, 1983, and death sentence were upheld on direct appeal by the Court of Criminal Appeals in April of 1986.

The U. S. Supreme Court on Oct. 3, 1988, let stand the ruling that he had received a fair trial and was sentenced properly.

Second and third death dates were set, but appeals and stays of execution prevailed.

In his appeal before the Fifth Circuit Court, Sharp claimed that evidence of the murder of a third person, when presented during the punishment phase of his trial, violated his fifth, sixth and fourteenth amendment rights. He had given police statements about the murder and led them to the remote location where Blanca Arreola was buried. He also claimed deficient and ineffective assistance of counsel.

The U. S. Court of Appeals, Fifth Circuit, affirmed the judgment of the U. S. District Court in Sharp's appeal there.

Sharp has 90 days to file an appeal with the U. S. Supreme Court. Normally the court decides whether or not to hear a case no sooner than three months and no longer than seven months from the date an appeal is filed according to the Texas Attorney General's Office. A new execution date can be entered by the district judge 30 days after the Fifth Circuit appeal was lost.

Judgment in the appeal was issued as a mandate June 16, 1997.

TAAS results of student performance by the same group of students. 84% of the students in the third grade last year passed reading, and 88% passed math, and while passing percentages remained the same for this group as fourth graders, more questions were correctly answered by the students than last year.

Third graders' performance in 1995 was compared to their performance as fifth graders in 1997, and in reading 80% passed TAAS in 1995 and 86% passed TAAS in 1997. 79% of the class passed TAAS math in 1995, and 94% passed TAAS math in 1997.

Third grade performance in 1994 was compared to class performance as sixth graders in 1997, and in reading 75% passed in 1994, and 83% passed in 1997. 63% of the class passed math in 1994, and 88% passed in 1997.

Fourth grade performance in 1994 was compared to class performance as seventh graders in 1997, and in reading 55% of the class passed in 1994, and 87% of the class passed in 1997. 54% of the class passed math in 1994, and 87% of the class passed in 1997.

Fifth grade performance in 1994 was also compared to class performance as eighth graders in 1997, and in reading 63% of the class passed in 1994 and 85% passed in 1997. 38% of the class passed math in 1994, and 87% of the class passed math in 1997.

Student performance of the sixth grade class in 1994 was also compared to their performance as an eighth grade class in 1996, and in reading 69% of the class passed in 1994 and 86% passed in 1996. 52% of the class passed math in 1994, and 89% of the class passed math in 1996. No comparison could be made of this class as ninth graders this year because TAAS is not tested in the ninth grade.

Student performance on the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills, which is a stan-

dardized achievement test that is given to kindergarten through second grade students in Ozona Primary School, was also exceptional. The kindergarten, first, and second grade classes were all above the 50th National Percentile Level in their comparison groups in all test taken.

During the meeting the trustees accepted the resignations of two employees and approved the employment of five professional personnel. Tanya Sorrells, high school principal, resigned to accept a principal's position in Lorraine, and Tamara Kacmarynski, primary school music teacher, resigned due to her husband's job relocation. Personnel approved for employment included: Valarie Johnston (prekindergarten); Janina Savala (kindergarten); Heatherly Childress (transfer from prekindergarten to fifth grade); Priscilla Cook (fourth grade); and, Bridget Sewell (high school business).

The board also voted their approval to continue the Drug Awareness Resilience Education (DARE) Program that is sponsored jointly with the Crockett County Sheriff's Department. A low bid from Griffin Fuels of Eldorado for school gasoline products for the 1997-98 school year was accepted, as well as quotations from Caldwell Music Company and Tarpely Music Company for band instruments to be purchased next year. The board also voted to accept bids from all of the companies submitting bids for athletic supplies.

The members voted to appoint Veronica Tijerina as their official delegate and Elliott Barrera as their official alternate delegate to the Texas Association of School Boards-Texas Association of School Administrators Annual Convention that will be held in Houston on September 26-29.

During the meeting Superintendent Larry Taylor presented a sum-

As we all know, lawns need water and fertilizer. What we may not know is how much and how often.

Many of us may be watering too often and possibly too much. Frequent watering causes shallow root systems and leaches nutrients from the soil. The shallow root systems will require more water and will be more susceptible to winter damage.

To cure this, gradually increase the length of time you water and decrease the frequency. Eventually, you will notice your landscape will need less water and less fertilizer.

There is a caterpillar with horns that has invaded some of our trees. Sycamores, cottonwoods and poplars are their favorites. Ferti-lome Bagworm Killer will control them. There's the promo I was looking for. Some of these worms can sting, most can't. So be careful.

OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 9, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons currently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

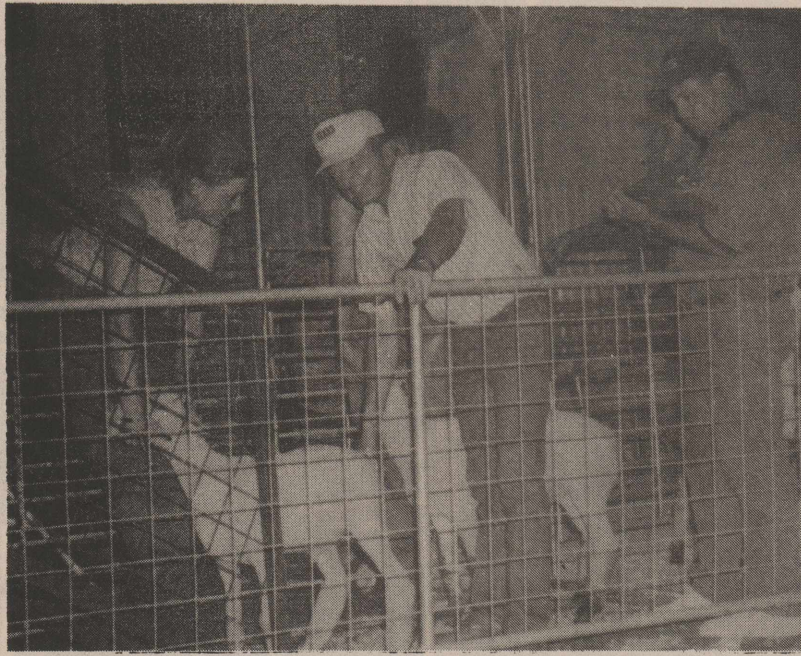

Sugar In The Diet

Sugar—who doesn't love it? Did you know sugar comes in many forms? Sugars are carbohydrates, one of our major nutrients. Carbohydrates are basically divided into two types: simple and complex. Complex carbohydrates include starch and fiber. During digestion, even complex carbohydrates break down into simple sugars. Sugars and starches occur naturally in many foods that also supply other nutrients. Examples include milk, fruits, some vegetables, breads, cereals and grains.

Americans eat sugars in many forms, and most of us enjoy their taste. Some sugars are even used as natural preservatives, thickeners, and baking aids in foods. They're often added to foods during processing and preparation or even when they're eaten. Your body can't tell the difference between naturally occurring and added sugars because they are identical chemically. Sugar comes in many forms, including sucrose, glucose, dextrose, fructose, corn syrups and corn sweeteners. Look for these words on labels if you want to reduce your consumption of sugar. Many of us waste calories on highly sweetened foods without many vitamins, minerals or protein. You can find many of them at the top of the USDA Food Guide Pyramid.

Scientific evidence indicates diets high in sugars don't cause hyperactivity or diabetes. However, overweight in adults is a definite factor in the most common type of diabetes, and reducing empty calories from sugars in the diet is just one step you can take to reduce your risk.

For very active people with high calorie needs, sugars can be an additional source of energy. However, don't go overboard. Getting calories from complex carbohydrates is still much better for you in the long run.

A food is likely to be high in sugars if the item appears first or second in the ingredients list of a food, or

if several sources are listed. Here are some of the sugars you may see on a label: brown sugar, corn sweetener, corn syrup, syrup, fructose, fruit juice (concentrate), glucose (dextrose), table sugar (sucrose), honey, invert sugar, lactose, high-fructose corn syrup, maltose, molasses, raw sugar or corn syrup.

It's important to remember that just because a food has a sugar substitute, it may not be lower in calories than a food with real sugar. Unless you reduce the total calories you eat, the use of sugar substitutes won't help you control your weight.

Don't Mix Kids And Yard Chemicals

The chemicals you spray around your yard may kill bugs or weeds, but they also could hurt your children.

"It is not uncommon for children to get agricultural pesticide poisoning from inhaling yard chemicals or getting them on their skin," says Dr. Charles Ginsburg, chairman of pediatrics at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

Ginsburg advises parents to make sure children are never downwind of any chemicals being applied in the yard.

When yard chemicals are not being used, they should be kept out of reach of children. Don't store chemicals in soda bottles or other containers that would tempt children.

The No. 2 Baggett "C" has been brought on line about 11 miles south-southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Hunt Baggett Field. Sonat Exploration Co. is the operator.

It flowed 1,462,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke and was rated at 2,058,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Sonat bottomed the well at 9,750 feet and perforated for Strawn Formation pay, 9,376 to 9,583 feet into the wellbore.

Flowing 95 barrels of oil per day on a 20/64 choke, the No. 303 Laura Hoover Estate has been completed about 30 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's American Field.

Primal Energy Co., the operator, took the well to a 4,619-ft. bottom. Production will be from a Sprayberry Formation interval, 4,460 to 4,485 feet into the wellbore. Flowing tubing pressure stood at 175 PSI.

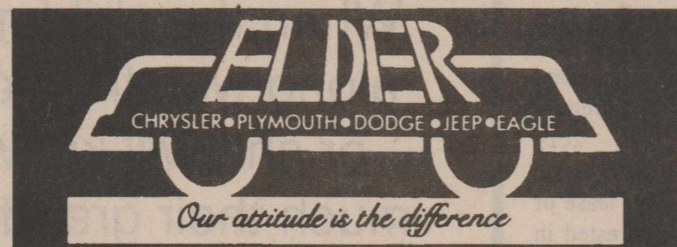

SECTION 2.0 - TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

SCOPE AND LOCATION

The work to be performed under the terms and conditions of this contract shall consist of furnishing all labor, transportation, equipment and supplies required to produce mulch from yard waste supplied by Crockett County. The process shall involve grinding of yard waste for volume reduction. Vendor shall be required to provide yard waste grinding services at two locations. The first location is an area north of the town of Ozona. The finished production at this location shall be a shredded product of fine fragments accomplished with a single pass through the grinding equipment. The second location is next to the cemetery located south of the town of Ozona. The waste at this location must first be a shredder product with a large portion of large, course fragments then further reduced to fine fragments with a second pass through the grinding equipment. Waste from this location shall be removed by Crockett County for disposal at the first location.

The successful bidder must be able to process such material that will normally shred in yard waste grinding equipment and remove and stack for disposal by Crockett County, such material as found in the waste stream which cannot be ground, and, or may be oversized. Oversized materials shall be deemed to be any tree trunk, or formed timber over 12" in diameter.

The successful bidder shall process all grindable waste, removing contaminants and oversized as possible by the use of mechanical loading equipment.
