

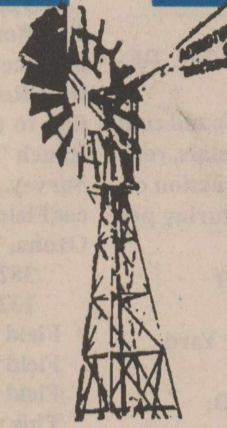
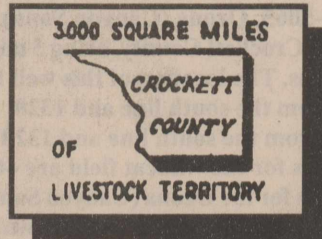

In Phillips Murder

Utah Prisoner Indicted

On Wednesday, June 18, 1997, a Crockett County Grand Jury indicted Paul Wesley Taylor on the felony charge of capital murder in the death of Dean Phillips. For over two hours, grand jury members were presented the facts of the case by Sheriff Shane Fenton, Chief Deputy Alton Davis and Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne.

At the time of the indictment, Taylor was an inmate at the Utah Department of Corrections in Draper,

UT. He was scheduled for a parole hearing on July 10. Prior to the grand jury indictment and at the request of local officers, Taylor was moved from the minimum security facility to a maximum security facility.

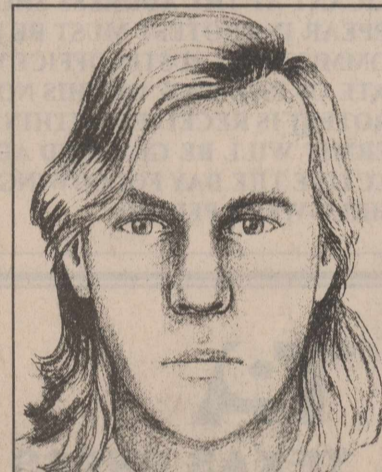
Sheriff Fenton and Ranger Byrne, armed with a warrant, flew to Utah Monday, June 23. The next morning at 9:45, Paul Wesley Taylor was served by Utah Department of Corrections investigator Kevin Nitzel.

After a brief interview with Sheriff Fenton and Ranger Byrne, Taylor refused to answer questions pertaining to the investigation.

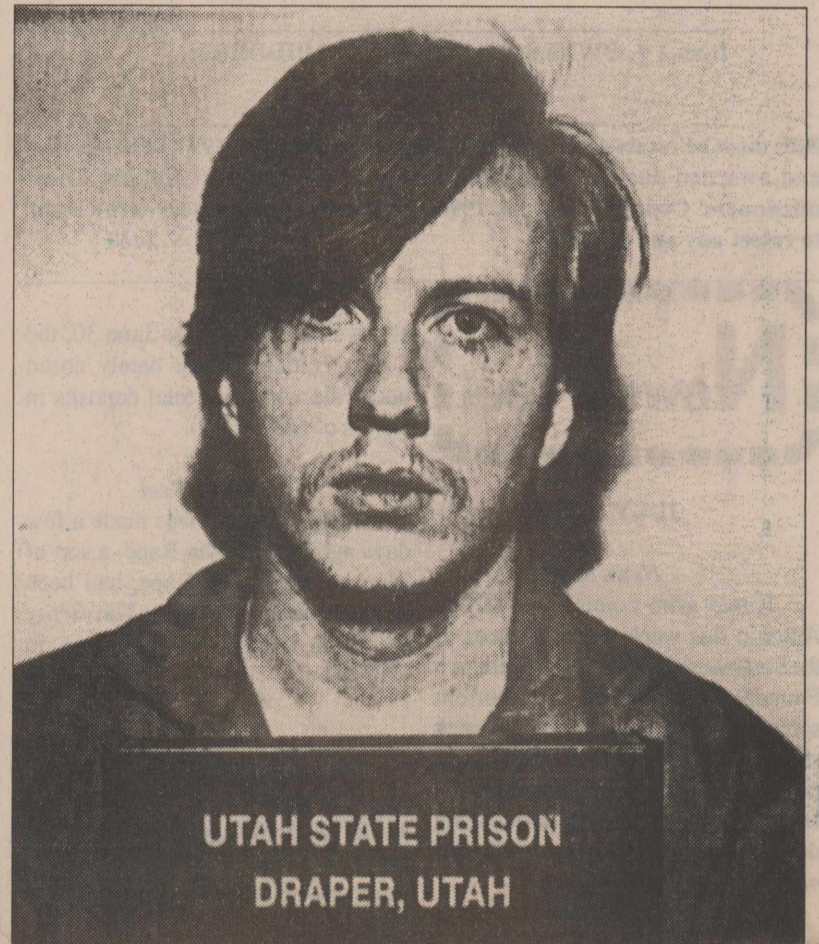
Numerous acquaintances of Taylor were questioned by local officers. During a five day period, Sheriff Fenton and Ranger Byrne drove some 1000 miles and interviewed potential witnesses in Salt Lake City, Ogden City, Provo and Gunnison, UT.

At the time the warrant was

served, Taylor indicated that he would sign extradition papers, allowing officers to bring him back to Texas. However, there is a 30 day waiting period in which time Taylor can change his mind. If that happens, a governor's warrant will be issued and Taylor brought to Crockett County.

Crockett County Retail Sales Drop

A report released by the state comptroller June 13, shows a 14.6% drop in retail sales in Crockett County for the fourth quarter of 1996. There were 97 reporting outlets for the period with \$7,716,197 in gross sales compared to 113 reporting outlets and \$9,036,481 in gross sales for the same period in 1995.

The comptroller's report for all industries indicated a 2.9% increase in the county, however. In 1996, there were 159 reporting outlets with gross sales of \$14,880,283 compared to 193 outlets reporting \$14,458,765 in sales for the fourth quarter of 1995.

Fourth quarter retail sales reports for area counties follow.

Irion County - 1996 gross sales of \$917,595 from 30 reporting outlets, down .6% from the \$922,816 in sales reported by 39 outlets in 1995.

Reagan County - 1996 gross sales of \$5,758,063 from 58 reporting outlets with a decrease of 2.1% compared to \$5,880,258 for 64 outlets in 1995.

Sutton County - 1996 gross sales of \$6,923,983 from 88 reporting outlets for a 3.5% decrease compared to \$7,172,426 from 98 outlets in 1995.

Terrell County - 1996 gross sales of \$1,221,236 reported by 35 outlets for a 37.3% decrease from the

\$1,948,451 reported by 39 outlets in 1995.

Tom Green County - 1996 gross sales for the fourth quarter of \$256,800,169 from 1,709 outlets for a 4.6% decrease compared to 2049 outlets reporting \$269,262,744 in 1995.

Upton County - 1996 gross sales of \$3,448,962 from 77 outlets for a decrease of 8.0% compared to 96 outlets with \$3,747,511 in 1995.


Val Verde County - 1996 gross sales of \$74,908,488 for an increase of 2.1% from 576 reporting outlets compared to 693 outlets and \$73,403,108 in sales for the same period in 1995.

Accident Fatal To Tony Lewis

Tony Lewis of Ozona was killed June 24 in a motor vehicle accident in Crockett County. A 1995 Mack truck driven by Lewis overturned on County Road 406 some 15 miles south of U. S. Hwy. 290 and 40 miles west of Ozona. Lewis was a driver for Ackerly Services.

According to an accident report filed by DPS Trooper Ron Hernandez, the vehicle, which was westbound on

CR 406, approached a curve too fast, the driver lost control and the vehicle overturned one-half time, coming to rest on its top. Lewis was wearing a seatbelt.

Hernandez was assisted in the investigation by Trooper Robert Bybee of Eldorado, Sgt. Carl Mayfield and license and weight Trooper Kenny Wadsworth of Ozona.

4-H Members Sweep District Record Book Competition

Twelve 4-H members from Crockett County submitted record books for district competition this past week. 4-H records were judged in Fort Stockton on Thursday, June 26, by adult leaders and agents from the eastern half of the 23-county District VI. Each contestant placed and received a blue or red quality ribbon from the judges.

Judging from Crockett County were: Sara Hignight, Jeannine Henderson, Neal Ulmer and County Agent Tedra Ulmer. Each county was required to send three adult leaders as judges.

District contestants from Crockett County were: Jason Hignight, who placed first and received a blue ribbon in Senior Achievement; Amanda Hignight, placing first and receiving a blue ribbon in Senior Rabbit; Ashlee Worley, first with a blue ribbon in Senior Swine; Ty Porter, first with a blue ribbon in Senior Foods and Nutrition; Trey Hale, fifth place and a blue ribbon in a tough and highly competitive Intermediate Sheep category; G. L. Bunger, fourth and a blue ribbon, also in Intermediate Sheep; Clay Hale, first and a blue ribbon in Junior Horse; Clint Hale, fifth and a red ribbon in Junior Sheep, which was also a huge category with a large number of contestants; Kristin Bunger, first and a blue ribbon in Junior Clothing; Jenna Henderson, first and a blue ribbon in Junior Home Economics Achievement; Mica Aaron, first place and a blue ribbon in Junior Meat Goat; and Hilary Huffman, first place in

Junior Foods and Nutrition. The four senior-level record books will be sent to State competition in August after making revisions suggested by the judges.

Books were judged at the county level by County Extension Agent Robert Scott of Big Lake on June 25. Jason Hignight's book was submitted to district for the boys' J. T. Rutherford Trophy, and Ashlee Worley represented Crockett County in the girls' category. Both were also nominated for Outstanding Senior Boy and Outstanding Senior Girl awards, given by the district Adult Leaders Association. In the junior division, G. L. Bunger and Kristin Bunger represented Crockett County with Outstanding Junior Boy and Junior Girl record books. Results from those categories had not been released from District at presstime.

Record books are a cumulative record of a child's 4-H experiences. They list the projects they have completed, what activities they have participated in, and what they have learned from their projects as well as their leadership, citizenship and accomplishments. Each 4-H'er writes a story about their 4-H career which is also submitted, along with up to three pages of photos about project work, leadership and citizenship. The books are judged on growth and depth of project work, leadership and citizenship.

Someone's In The Kitchen

Doris Hood and her granddaughter, Paige Tambunga, are often in the kitchen at the Hood home. Paige is an active 4-H Club member, participating in foods and sewing, and her grandmother works with her as a foods leader.

"Paige loves to cook and is such a pleasure to work with," said Doris, who has been Paige's foods leader for four years.

"We've adapted recipes to what we like," said Doris. "Cooking is not all just making delicious dishes - it's techniques, being resourceful and not being afraid to try to adapt a recipe to make it better for your family."

Pies are Doris and Paige's favorite things, and in Paige's third year of 4-H cooking, she mastered a lattice top crust which was just beautiful, said Doris.

In addition to 4-H, Paige, who is an A student at Ozona Middle School, takes voice and dancing and plays flute in band. She loves basketball and went to Wayland Basketball Camp this summer at Plainview.

Doris and Gene Hood have been Ozona residents for 26 years. He is a teacher at Ozona High School, and she has been secretary to the superintendent for a total of 14 years.

She has taught Sunday School for third and fourth graders, was girls' camp director at Paisano Baptist Encampment for three years and was a leader for G.A.'s and Acteens and a 4-H leader for her daughter Wendy, Paige's mother.

Gene is an avid gardener, and Doris diligently cans what he raises.

The Hoods have three children, Eugene, who is caretaker at First Baptist Church of Ozona; Wendy, an employee at Ozona National Bank, who is married to Robert Tambunga and has two children, Josh and Paige; and Bret, who lives in Houston and is a doctor.

Paige sums up the special relationship she has with her grandmother through their 4-H cooking by saying, "we're not just cooking food, we're making memories."

FAVORITE RECIPES OF PAIGE TAMBUNGA AND DORIS HOOD

ALL PURPOSE PIE CRUST

Makes three 9" or 10" pie crusts
3 c. flour
1 tsp. salt
1T sugar
1 c. shortening
1 T butter
9 T water

Mix flour, sugar, salt; cut in shortening and butter with a pastry cutter until mixture is coarse. Add water one T at a time. Mix with a fork to form a ball. Divide into equal balls. On a floured surface, roll each ball to size needed for pie plate. Flute as desired and bake according to pie recipe.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

Mix together: 2c. flour, 2c. granulated sugar
In microwave, melt together: 1 stick butter, 1/2 c shortening, 4 T powdered cocoa, 1 c water

Add microwave mixture to sugar and flour; mix, then add: 1/2 c buttermilk, 2 eggs, 2 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. ground cinnamon, 1 tsp. vanilla.

Mix until smooth. Pour into a large 13x9 greased and floured pyrex dish. Bake at 350 degrees until tests done. Cool slightly and frost.

FROSTING FOR CHOCOLATE CAKE

In microwave, melt together: 1 stick butter, 6 T milk, 4 T powdered cocoa.; add: 1 lb. powdered sugar. Mix well, add: 1 c. chopped pecans, 1 tsp. vanilla. Spread on warm cake.

CUSTARD PIE

4 eggs
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/8 tsp. salt
2 - 1/2 c. milk (scalded)
Ground nutmeg
Single pie crust in a 10" pie plate
In a mixing bowl beat eggs slightly

with a whisk. Stir in the sugar, vanilla, and salt. Gradually stir in the milk; mix well. Place one unbaked pie shell on oven rack; pour filling into crust shell. Sprinkle with a little nutmeg and bake at 400 degrees until a knife inserted off-center comes out clean. Sprinkle on more nutmeg if desired and cool pie on a wire rack.

PECAN PIE

3 eggs
1/2 c sugar
1 c white corn syrup
1 - 1/2 c pecans, sliced
1/4 tsp. salt
3 T butter (melted)
1 tsp. vanilla
Single pie crust in a 9" pie plate
Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, syrup, pecans, salt, butter and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake 50 minutes at 325 degrees.

GRILLED CHICKEN BREASTS

4 to 6 chicken breasts (skinned)
1 tsp. salt and pepper to taste
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
1 tsp. corn oil
1/2 c Italian salad dressing
Marinate chicken and remaining ingredients in a plastic bag in refrigerator for two hours. Grill outside until chicken is slightly brown and tests done.

In medium size bowl, combine lite cream cheese, sugar, juice and vanilla. Mix at medium speed until well blended. Add egg yolks one at a time and mix well after each addition. In a separate bowl, beat egg whites until stiff and fold stiffly beaten egg whites into cheese mixture. Pour over Graham cracker crust. Bake in a 300 degree oven for 45 minutes. Top with your favorite fresh fruit. This recipe serves 8-12.

Giving blood to United Blood Service can be very rewarding when you're on a diet. You get to eat something sweet without feeling guilty.

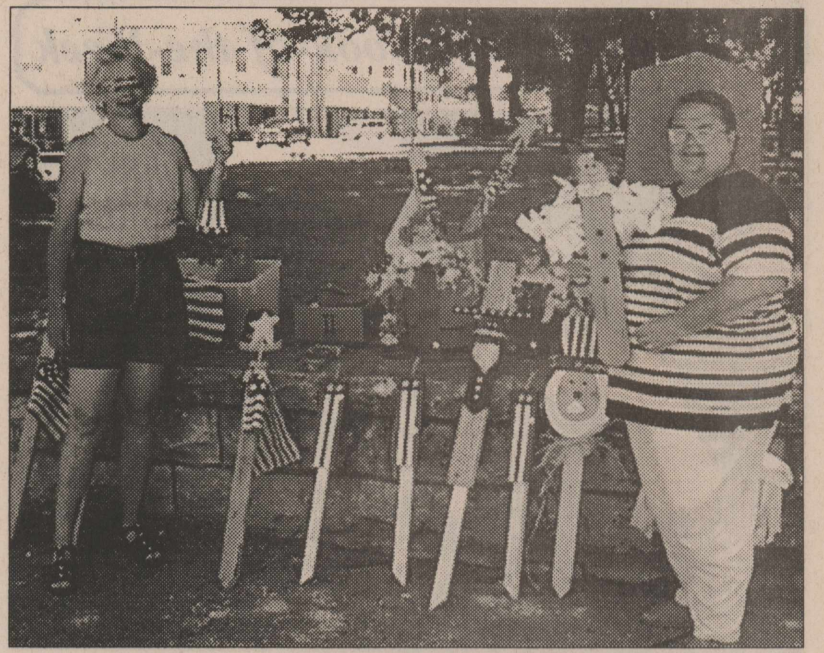
No matter how angry you make your mom, she'll still always love you.

It's Grubtime

For those of you who have been asking about the proper time to treat for grubs (especially those with St. Augustine lawns), now's the time.



The target date for grub treatments are mid-July thru late August. For those who want to use Otfanol, now's the time to apply. Otfanol is a slow release long lasting insecticide, so you need to apply before the target date in order to ensure good control. If Diazinon is what you use, you will need to wait and apply around mid-July. There will need to be 1-2 follow up treatments of Diazinon, depending on the amount of rainfall. If you apply Otfanol, the 1 follow-up treatment around mid to late August will be all that's needed. Remember, by the time you can tell if you have grubs, it's too late. The damage has already been done. Grub treatments are like fungus disease application, preventative in nature. We apply grub control to prevent problems instead of curing the problem.

How To Select A Stock Broker

Which investments provide income exempt from federal and state taxes?

Together, you and your broker should review the many financial options available to you, such as corporate and municipal bonds, common

and preferred stocks, listed options, and tax-advantaged investments, to name a few. Your broker will help you to understand the different types of investments and can point out to you which of the diverse financial instruments available would best fulfill your objectives.

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Commission Adopts Dove, Teal Hunting Seasons

AUSTIN - Texas dove hunters could see a daily bag limit that could include up to 15 whitewings during the regular mourning dove season, pending final approval by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service later this month. The increase was adopted in Austin June 5 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission as part of the 1997-98 Migratory Gamebird Proclamation - Early Season Provisions.

Wildlife biologists say whitewings are expanding their range in Central Texas and population densities continue to increase. Since 1991, the daily bag limit for whitewings was no more than six birds in the aggregate dove bag limit. The department has asked the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service to lift this limit so the entire 15 bird daily bag limit could be whitewings. TPWD officials say that an answer from USFWS is expected by the first of July. This would make enforcement of an aggregate bag limit easier for game wardens. Proposed season dates for mourning doves are Sept. 1-Oct. 30 in the North Zone; Sept. 1-Oct. 19, Dec. 26-Jan. 5 in the Central Zone; and Sept. 20-Nov. 7, Dec. 26-Jan. 5 in the South Zone. The daily bag limit is 15 doves.

The proposed white-winged dove season is Sept. 6, 7, 13 and 14 in the Special White-winged Dove Area of South Texas. Bag and possession limits in the Special White-winged Dove Area are 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than five mourning doves and two whitetips per day. Shooting hours will be noon to sunset.

Texas teal hunters could see a 16-day season this September, should the federal framework be liberalized later this month. The Commission adopted a Sept. 13 teal hunting season opener, with the provision that an additional seven days would be added to the end of the season if approved by the FWS.

The bag limit for teal will also remain at four birds per day and eight in possession, unless the FWS approved more liberal bag limits.

As last year, the rail and gallinules hunting seasons will remain concurrent with the waterfowl seasons. General waterfowl season regulations will be set by the Commission at its August public meeting.

Four different age groups of future Lady Lions have participated in two basketball tournaments recently. They played in the Sonora Invitational Basketball Tournament held on June 21, and in the Ballinger Basketball Tournament held June 24.

"The girls could have won some of these games with an experienced coach, but they still played well with lots of team effort," said one of Ozona's coaches, Randy Herring.

"We were not particularly out to win games, but for the girls to gain experience for the future. I feel this is a learning experience for them, and not a state championship."

What You Should Know About Your Disability Coverage

Not everybody is aware that their Social Security taxes pay for disability insurance protection in addition to retirement, survivors insurance and Medicare hospital insurance. Four out of five workers are covered and would receive benefits if they became disabled and unable to work.

Even if you are aware of the coverage you may not know that you need recent work to keep the disability protection current. The amount of recent work you need for disability benefits depends on your age at which you become disabled. It varies from as little as 1 1/2 years out of the past three years for people disabled under age 24 to a maximum of five years out of the last 10 for people disabled after age 30.

A typical case is that of Mary Jones, who left the workforce at age 21 to raise her twin daughters. When she was diagnosed with breast cancer three years later, she found out that she could not qualify for disability benefits because, even though she had worked for four years, at age 24 she needed at least a year and a half of work out of the preceding three years.

It's easy enough to keep your disability coverage current. You get a credit of coverage for a certain amount of earnings - \$670 in 1997, with a maximum of four credits in a year. This means you only need earnings of \$2,680 during a year to qualify for a year of coverage in 1997. The amount of earnings that constitute a credit of coverage increases annually with increases in general wage levels.

Few workers have private, long-term disability insurance. Social Security disability protection is equal to a \$201,000 disability policy for an average income earner with a spouse and two children. Once you start receiving benefits, they continue as long

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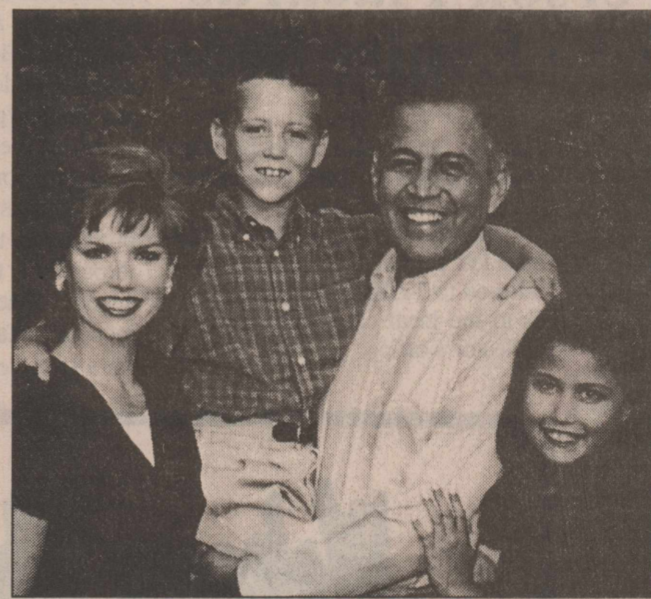

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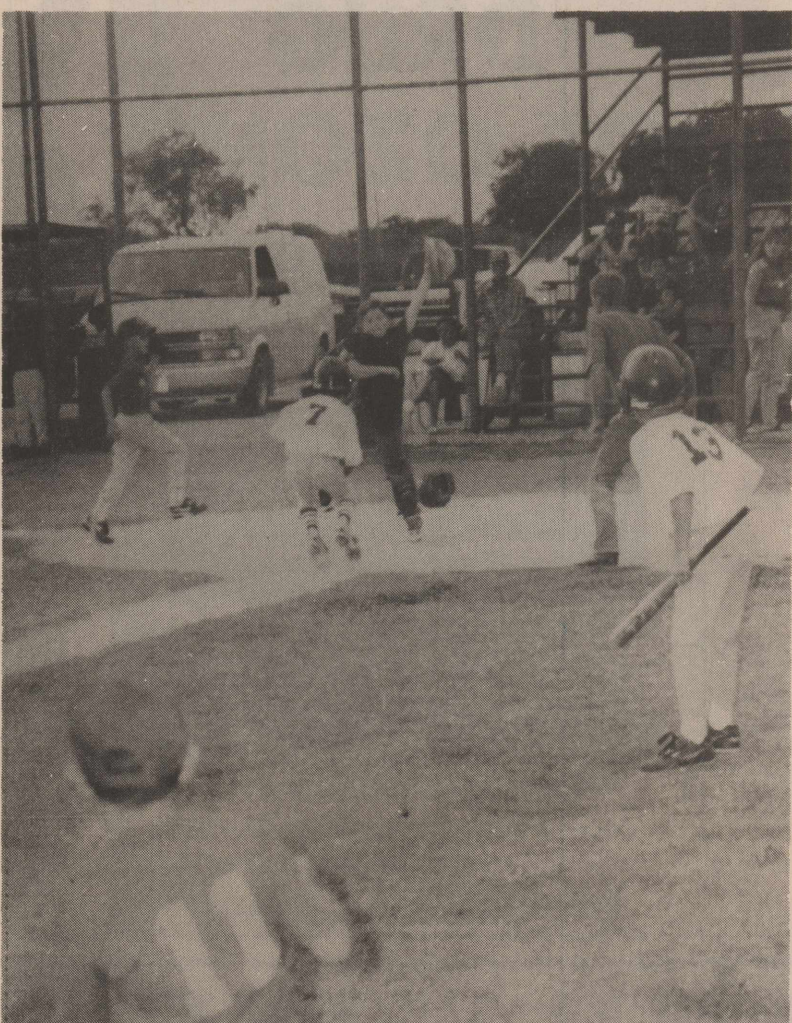

Disabled Person Placards Will Begin To Expire Soon

The first of the permanently disabled person placards that were issued in 1992 will begin to expire on June 30. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) reminds citizens that they must obtain new placards to remain in compliance with state and federal laws.

Permanently disabled person placards are hung from a vehicle's rear view mirror and entitle the holder to certain parking privileges. Placards may also be displayed in any vehicle used by or for the transportation of a disabled person.

"State law requires that permanently disabled person placards be renewed after five years," said Jerry Dike, director of TxDOT's Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. "We started issuing placards in July 1992 through the county tax assessor-collectors. Five years later, the first wave of these placard holders must get replacements. Citizens should pay close attention to the expiration date because there won't be any renewal notices for placards."

Placard renewals are processed through the local county tax assessor-collector. Citizens are asked to take their expired placards to the tax office, where they will complete a form and pay a \$5 statutory fee per placard. Permanently disabled Texans may obtain up to two placards; they also have the option of getting one placard and one set of disabled person license plates.

Approximately 800,000 permanently disabled placards have been issued statewide since 1992. First-time applicants for permanently disabled person placards or license plates have to meet certain eligibility requirements; their application must also bear the signature of a licensed Texas physician or optometrist. The county tax assessor-collectors issue placards locally to individuals, not motor vehicles. Because there's no centralized

database, information as to the bearer of a placard is available only through the county tax offices.

Questions about permanently disabled person placards should be referred to TxDOT at 512/465-7611, or to the local county tax assessor-collector's office.

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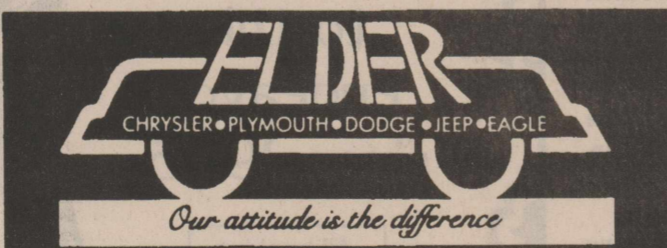
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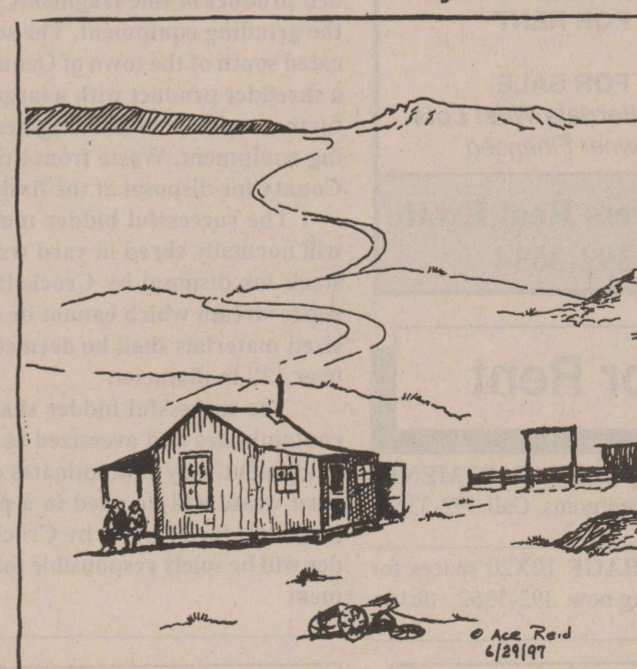

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

The successful bidder shall indemnify and save Crockett County harmless from any and all claims, liability, losses and causes of action which may arise out of the fulfillment of the Agreement. The vendor shall furnish Crockett County Procurement Management Division Certificates of Insurance which indicates that insurance coverage has been obtained for Workmen's Compensation Insurance, Public Liability Insurance on a comprehensive basis in an amount not less than \$1,000,000, and Automobile Liability Insurance covering all owned, non-owned and hired vehicles used in connection with the work in an amount not less than \$5000,000.

SECTION 2.0 - TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

SCOPE AND LOCATION

The work to be performed under the terms and conditions of this contract shall consist of furnishing all labor, transportation, equipment and supplies required to produce mulch from yard waste supplied by Crockett County. The process shall involve grinding of yard waste for volume reduction. Vendor shall be required to provide yard waste grinding services at two locations. The first location is an area north of the town of Ozona. The finished production at this location shall be a shredded product of fine fragments accomplished with a single pass through the grinding equipment. The second location is next to the cemetery located south of the town of Ozona. The waste at this location must first be a shredder product with a large portion of large, course fragments then further reduced to fine fragments with a second pass through the grinding equipment. Waste from this location shall be removed by Crockett County for disposal at the first location.

The successful bidder must be able to process such material that will normally shred in yard waste grinding equipment and remove and stack for disposal by Crockett County, such material as found in the waste stream which cannot be ground, and, or may be oversized. Oversized materials shall be deemed to be any tree trunk, or formed timber over 12" in diameter.

The successful bidder shall process all grindable waste, removing contaminants and oversized as possible by the use of mechanical loading equipment. Any contaminants or oversized materials removed from the yard waste will be piled in a place separate from the finished reduced materials for disposal by Crockett County. Further, the successful bidder will be solely responsible for the loading of yard waste into hi-quip-ment

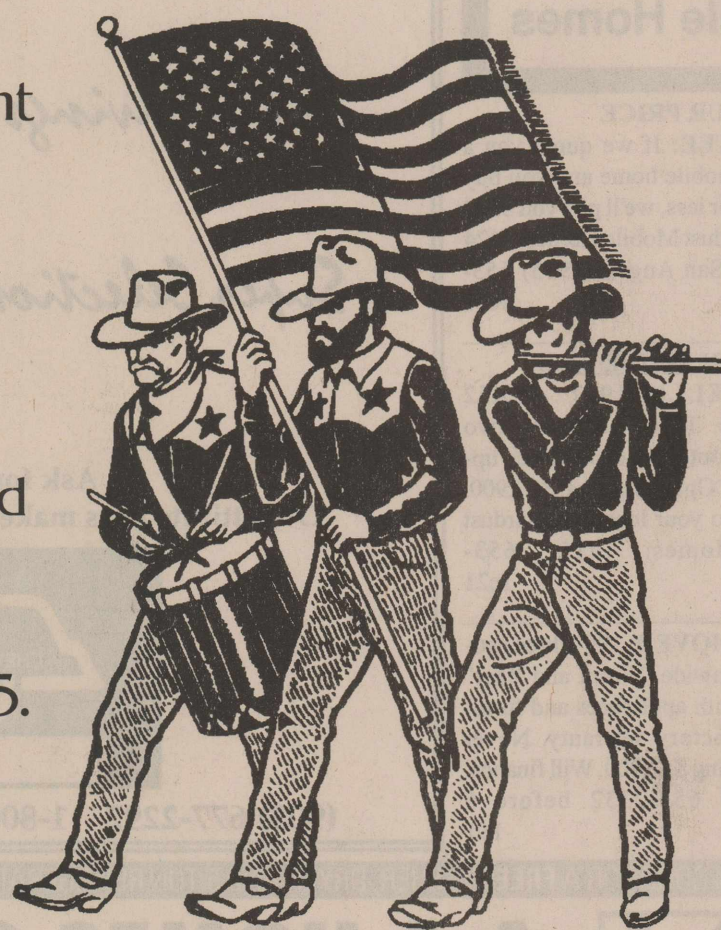
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
