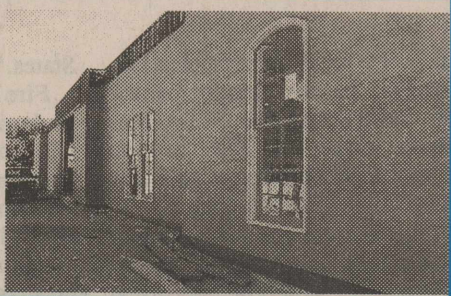

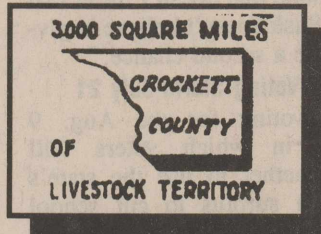

## Eleven-Hour Manhunt Ends In Three Arrests

On Saturday, July 12, Ozona Department of Public Safety dispatcher Glenda Capps was notified at 10:35 a.m. by Sutton County that a gas drive off had occurred in Junction. Sutton County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Joe Fincher was in pursuit of the vehicle on old Hwy. 290, west bound and about to enter Crockett County.

DPS Cpl. Ben English and Kenny Wadsworth, license and weights trooper, set up "the Stinger Spike System". The vehicle, a 1997 Dodge Stratus, tried to avoid the spikes, but the two right hand tires were damaged.

The driver turned off the roadway, went through a fence, and drove approximately one mile into the Mark and Sheila Hemphill Ranch. The three male subjects left the car and escaped on foot.

When officers reached the vehicle, the suspects were gone and the vehicle was on fire. The Ozona Fire Department was called and sent two units to control the fire. As it was not known if the suspects were armed, law enforcement officers rode with the firemen. The fire was extinguished, and firemen returned to town.

The remains of what appeared to be two shotguns were found in the burned out vehicle. Not known by officers at the time, the suspects had taken their bags from the vehicle when they fled.

A call was placed to U. S. Customs, and their helicopter was soon overhead. Also, the DPS helicopter

from Midland with Ranger Captain Caver aboard was en route to assist. The Border Patrol was contacted and sent two trackers to the scene. The Lynaugh Prison Unit in Fort Stockton was contacted. They responded with Cpt. Paul Weatherby and Sgt. Ralph Hager with three horses and two packs of tracking dogs, a total of 12 dogs.

DPS troopers, personnel from Sutton County Sheriff's Office, Schleicher County Sheriff's Office, Reagan County Sheriff's Office, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Rangers and the Pecos County Constable soon had the area sealed off.

Officers were stationed around ranch houses in the area, along main roads and patrolling the interstate. The Border Patrol trackers found where the suspects had crossed a dirt road, and the dogs were brought in.

At 9 p.m. the first of the three suspects, Michael Gibson, age 33, was apprehended.

Ranger Jerry Byrne said that during the afternoon the pack of six dogs were rested approximately every hour. The other pack would be brought up to continue the pursuit.

During the next hour, the dogs continued to trail the remaining two, pushing them west toward the Circle Bar Truck Stop. At 10:15 p.m., Cpl. English captured the two suspects, James Pizer and James Burke, as they crossed the fence on the northeast side of the truck stop.

All three suspects were placed in the Crockett County Jail. Several local charges have been filed against the three.

Sheriff Shane Fenton said that their capture would not have been possible had it not been for the many law enforcement agencies' willingness to assist his department. Some of these

traveled over 100 miles to assist in the manhunt.

At this time, Sheriff Fenton and Ranger Byrne are attempting to find the owner of a video camera the three suspects had in their possession. The video contains pictures of what appear to be a vacation along with a football game showing the Brentwood Eagles and an unknown team. Also on the tape, much to the delight of local officers, are the three suspects in a pawn shop selling a laptop computer. It seems that they were also demonstrating the stolen video camera.

During all of this the fire on the Hemphill Ranch broke back out. The high temperatures and south wind combined to quickly spread the fire. Before the day was over, Sonora Fire Department had two units at the scene as well as two units from Eldorado. A tank truck from the Crockett County Road Department was also sent to the scene to supply water to the firefighting units. Once again, agencies from outside Crockett County willingly came to the assistance of local firefighters.

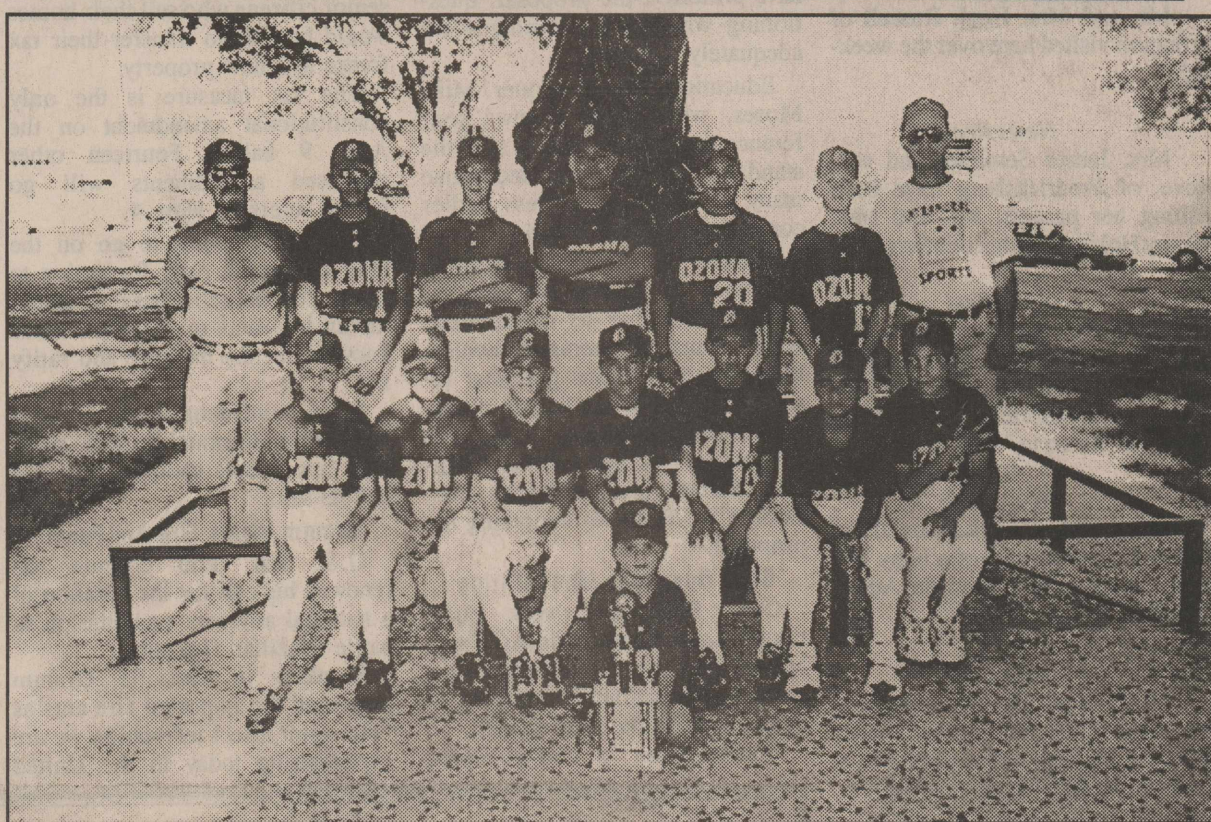

## Commissioners/Care Center Board Meet

Difficulty in getting ambulance crews in the daytime sparked an emotional but controlled joint meeting of commissioners and care center/health services board members July 10. The meeting was called to review ambulance policies and look at the health care and care center budget.

Doug Meador, ambulance coordinator, said "to those who are complaining about transfer time, the course (EMT) is open to everybody." Meador is currently instructing an Emergency Medical Technical-Basic class and will begin another one after the first of the year.

Ambulance policy has been to have three EMTs on board, but two certified people can roll the ambulance. Anytime there are five or more injuries at an accident, the fire department is automatically called to provide extra personnel.

In a prepared statement, Meador made it plain he was displeased that Eddie Moore, a board member and county road and parks superintendent, had been asking questions of some of the EMS members about the service.

Meador praised the EMS personnel, saying "there's not a better bunch anywhere" as he distributed a list of EMS members and pointed out that most of them work and are often unable for daytime transfers. Last month, there were 27 ambulance runs with 13 of those being transfers to or from San

Angelo. In the January through June period, the Crockett County Emergency Medical Services made 74 local runs, 97 transfers and put in 8,170 hours on call.

State requirements to remain certified are a nightmare according to Meador. And the cost is \$15 per continuing education hour, he said. Paramedics such as Meador must put in 160 hours over a four year period, with 80 of those in a two year span. 120 hours in four years are required by EMT-Is, 80 hours in four years for

EMTs and 40 hours in four years for ECAs.

Because of the cost and the number of hours required, some EMTs are dropping their certification but offering to drive the ambulance, Meador said. He stated that he doesn't mind using such drivers but that they should come to monthly meetings or at least the infection control training and be able to give CPR.

## Early Voting Starts July 21

Early voting by personal appearance in the Aug. 9 special election begins July 21 at the county courthouse. The proposed constitutional amendment would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the resident homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons currently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing

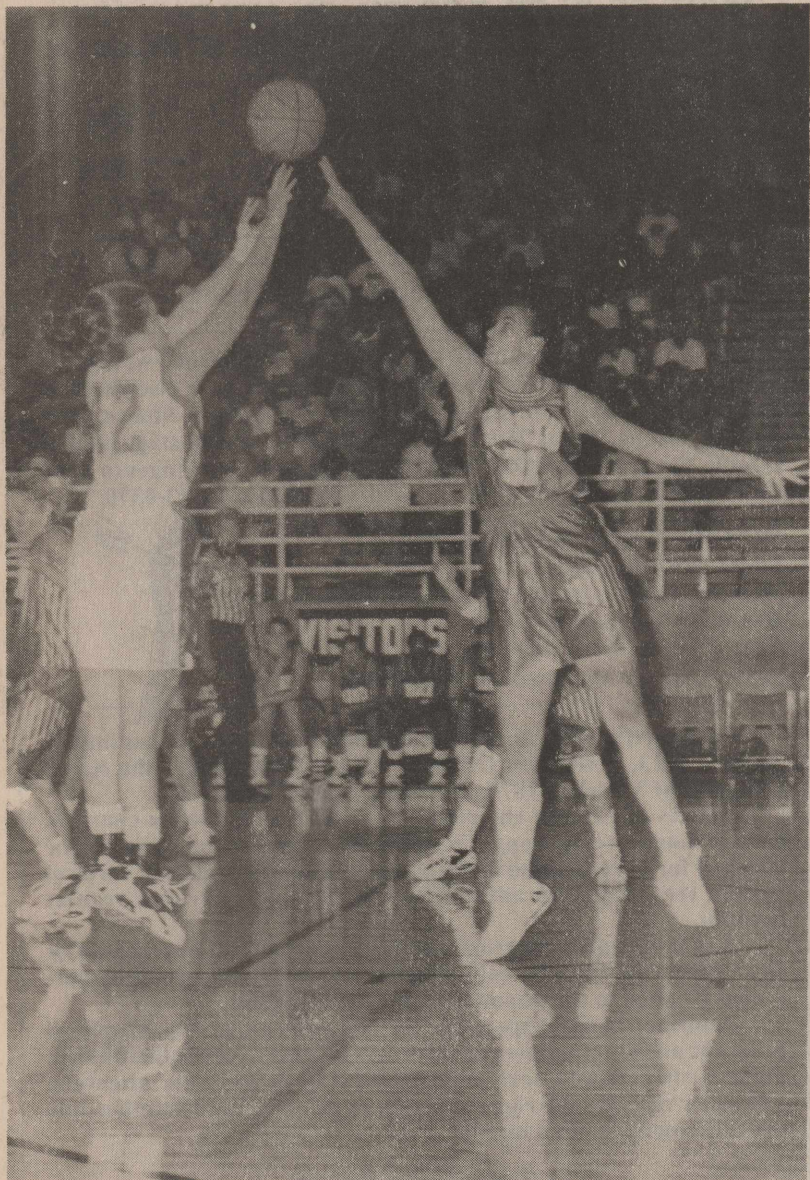
for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

Early voting will be held Monday through Friday July 21 through Aug. 5 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the courthouse. To request a ballot to vote by mail, write Crockett County Clerk Debbi Puckett at Dr. C, Ozona, TX 76943. Applications must be received no later than Aug. 1.

Rozzie Ten Eyck - Cook Of The Week

### Someone's In The Kitchen

Cook of the Week Rozzie Ten Eyck's aunts made cooking look so easy. As a tot, she joined others in the family gathered around the kitchen table watching while they worked.

"I was always in the kitchen helping Mother," she remembers. A friend of her mother's loves to tell about coming to visit and finding Rozzie standing in a chair making cornbread.

"When I was in the fifth grade, Mom went to work and turned the kitchen over to me." Rozzie's father was a strong believer in having the family together at dinner, and as a result, "I've always tried to make dinner time special for the guys (her husband Eddie and sons Eric, Bill and Jake).

When the TenEyck family moved here in 1990, they lived 30 miles out, and "cooking at that time was my only entertainment," she says. Eddie Ten Eyck works for UPR.

#### Rozzie's Lemon Chess Pie

3 eggs  
1 stick margarine  
1 1/4 c sugar  
1/2 c. buttermilk  
1 tsp. lemon extract  
Cream sugar and margarine. Add eggs, milk and extract. Blend and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

#### Rozzie's Chocolate Cake

Put in a bowl: 2 c. sugar, 2 c. flour  
Put in a pan: 1/2 c. shortening, 1 stick oleo, 3 T cocoa, 1 c. water. Bring to a boil and pour over sugar and flour; beat well.  
Add: 2 eggs, 1/2 c. buttermilk, 1 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. vanilla  
Pour into 11x14 pan and bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes. Do not over bake.

#### Chocolate Icing

Melt in a pan: 1 stick oleo; add: 2 T cocoa, 6 T milk, 1 tsp. vanilla. Add one box powdered sugar, 1 c. pecans. Stir pecans into the icing. Pour over cake while still warm.

#### Rozzie's Plain Pound Cake

2 sticks Parkay or Blue Bonnet margarine  
1 3/4 c. sugar  
2 c. cake flour  
6 eggs  
1 T lemon extract or pineapple flavoring  
1 T vanilla  
Cream margarine and sugar together. Take turns adding 1/3 c. flour and an egg, beating really well after you add each.  
Bake at 325 degrees from one hour to one hour and 15 minutes.

For some reason this does best in an old bundt pan, says Rozzie.

#### Rozzie's Meat and Rice

1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 can rice (20 minute kind)  
1 c. water  
Whatever seasonings you like.  
Use whatever kind of meat you want: chicken, steak, pork chops or smoked sausage. - Whatever!  
Cover with foil, cook for two hours at 325 degrees.  
This doubles however many times you want to double it.

#### Rozzie's Italian Cabbage

Mix together:  
3-4 cups cabbage  
1 green pepper  
2 bunches green onions  
Then:  
Small pkg. Ramen chicken noodles  
1 tsp. sugar  
Mix chicken flavor pkg. that came with noodles and sugar in 1 c. Italian dressing.  
Crush noodles, cook slightly, drain. Add to cabbage mixture. Sprinkle with sunflower seeds or almond pieces. Salt and pepper to taste.  
It is best to at least let it set overnight.

William J. "Bill" Wilson, 64, of Ozona died Tuesday, July 8, 1997, at his residence.

Graveside service was at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona with Rev. Bill Fuller of First Baptist Church leading the service and Past Grandmaster Graham Childress conveying the Masonic rites. Rev. Fuller and Laurie English sang a duet. Arrangements were by Preddy Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were brothers of the Ozona Masonic Lodge. Honorary pallbearers were: Harvey Hill, Shane Fenton, John Watkins, David Pagan, R. B. Babbitt, Tom Mitchell and David McCluchen of Big Spring.

Bill was born July 26, 1932, in Centralia, IL, to William James and Edna Morris Wilson. He joined the Central Baptist Church of Livingston in 1946. He was a member of Operating Engineers Local #12, being a heavy equipment operator for most of his life. For 38 years he was a member of San Juan Lodge #25 in Aztec, NM, and a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason out of Houston. He sat in lodge in many places throughout the United States as his job as a cross-country owner-operator took him to many destinations.

He attended school in Livingston then joined the U. S. Navy where he

was assigned to the Seabees with the 1st Marine Division, spending 19 months in Korea and 19 months in Guam with CBMU #1 and CBMU #101.

Bill stopped at the new Circle Bar Truck Stop in 1978 and met the owner, Tom Mitchell, and Carolyn Stuart Clayton. One year and six months later, Tom was at the wedding of Bill and Carolyn Dec. 28, 1979. Needing a fuel driver, he bought Bill's truck and hired him to drive it. For the next 12 years, Bill hauled fuel including two years hauling the Circle Bar Indy car across the country and making the Indianapolis 500 in 1984.

The last six years he was with Circle Bar 76 as parttime security until the time of his death.

Bill was a loyal friend to many and a kind and loving husband.

He is survived by his wife, Carolyn, of Ozona; a son and daughter-in-law, Steven and Penny Wilson of Livingston; one daughter and son-in-law, Linda and Wayne Overstreet of Carrollton; three stepdaughters and their husbands, Debra and Tommy Ezell of Fort Stockton, Lisa and Freddy Garza of Ozona and Lori Ward of San Angelo; one sister and brother-in-law, Sue and Dale Halsey of Lufkin; a granddaughter, six grandsons and two nieces.

Raul and Maria De La Rosa and Leroy and Carol Adcock of Ozona were in Amarillo June 6-7 to attend the State Federation Square and Round Dance Festival.

The grand march had 74 squares, and attendance was 1531.

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

## The Message Of Salvation

(Mat. 16:18)

A vivid story out of American history tells of a man who committed a crime, was pardoned, but refused to accept his pardon. It seems that this man robbed the United States mail in the early years of this country. At that time, such a crime was a capital offense. He was caught, tried, and, after due process of law, was sentenced to be hanged by the neck until dead. But this man's neighbors remembered his outstanding war record. He had been a hero in the War of 1812 and has fought bravely to defend his country. So they circulated a petition in his behalf and submitted it to Andrew Johnson, the President of the United States. President Johnson reviewed the nature of his crime and weighed it over against his service to his country. He then signed a pardon, repealing the death sentence, and sent it to the warden of the prison where the condemned

man was awaiting execution. But much to the surprise of the warden, the criminal refused to accept the pardon. He said to the warden, "I have made my peace with God and am ready to die. I choose not to accept the pardon." This presented the courts with a perplexing problem. Here was a man who had received a reprieve from the death sentence but refused to accept it. The case was reviewed by the courts until finally it reached the Supreme Court of the United States. This story parallels our salvation. The Bible says that "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23) and "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). This means that every human being is under the penalty of eternal death. But God has provided us with a pardon from the penalty for our sins. 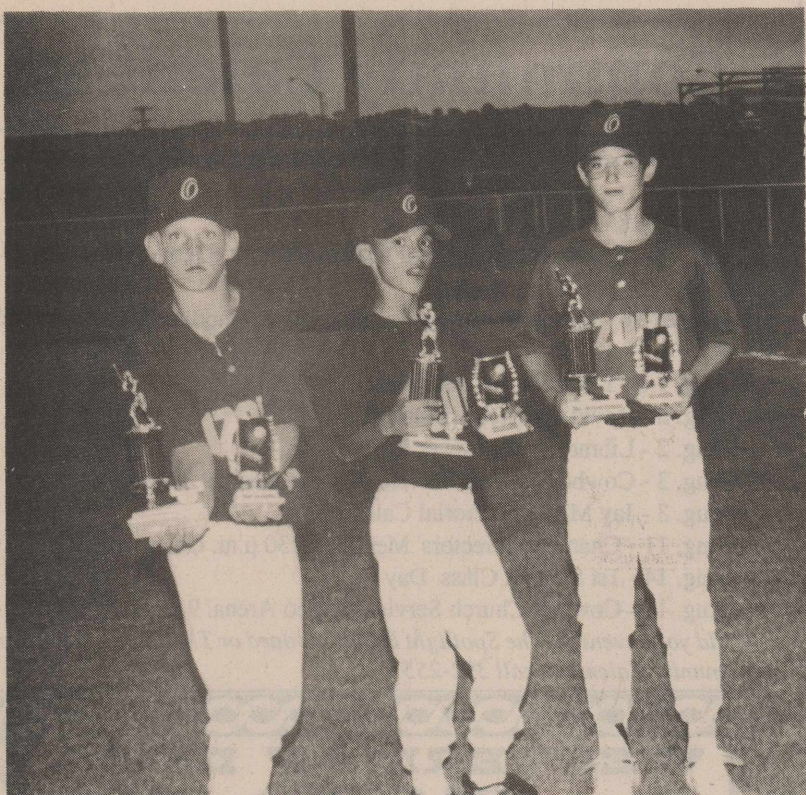
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# Sullivan Excels As A South All-Star

"They all improved dramatically and had a good time. Both Carolyn and I enjoyed it, also," Bachman said.

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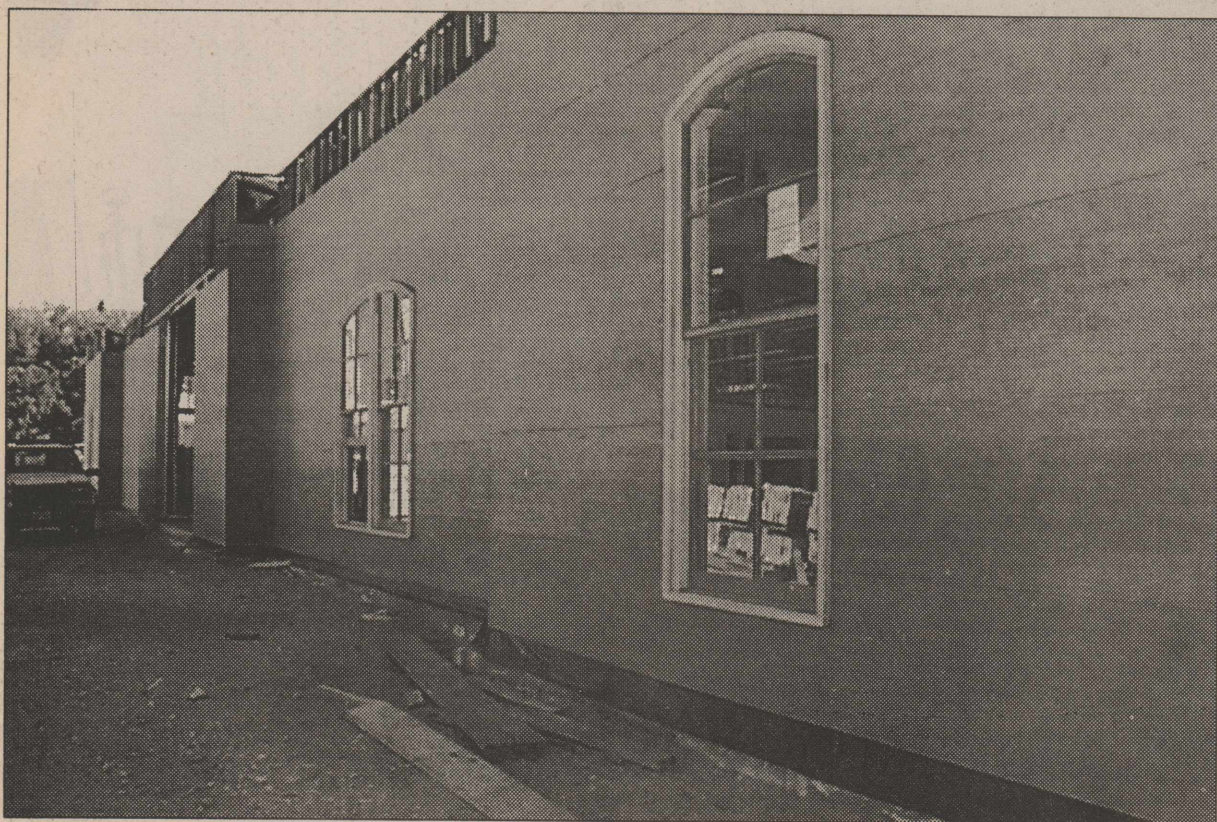

## Lengthy Agenda For Commissioners Court

Commissioners traveled to Big Lake Monday night to discuss a waste disposal contract with the Big Lake City Council. They are searching for a receiving point for the trash which is being left at their recycling center on 14th Street and will also look into the possibility of taking the material to Eldorado.

The Big Lake trip ended a full meeting day during which the court reviewed a preliminary budget for 1998. Budget figures on the "wish list" show a 1.4 million dollar increase, and court members will have another session soon to whittle away the excess.

Court members approved helping Crockett County Water District with water well fencing projects by allowing inmates from Fort Stockton to work on the fencing. Water works personnel are to drill the post holes with county equipment, and the prisoners will set the posts and stretch the chain link fence.

Approval was given for purchase of a lowboy trailer for the road department at a cost of \$8,000. The purchase will be made from the state. Under a new state program, the county can make direct purchases before items go to auction. Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent, was asked to look into what other equipment the state has to offer.

A proposal was approved to obtain uniforms for road, parks, cemetery and maintenance employees with the employees to pay half the cost through payroll deductions. Commissioner Fred Deaton voted against the plan.

Commissioners also approved purchase of a new power unit for the fire department's jaws of life. Bids were opened to rent a tub grinder using grant money. Low bidder Austin Wood was approved at \$16,795. The grant amount is for \$17,500, and the two other bids received were in excess of \$25,000.

Sheriff Shane Fenton reported 79 calls, 49 prisoners jailed and \$1620 in Justice of the Peace fines received during June. The county also received \$710 in out-of-county Justice of the Peace fines. There were 23 civil papers served by his office during the month.

Commissioners approved the sheriff's request for a county credit card.

Commissioners agreed to put the sheriff's request for a drug dog on a future agenda. Letters sent out by Fenton have resulted in \$2675 in donations for the dog.

An interlocal agreement (with modifications to be added) with the City of San Angelo which would bring a drug task force officer to Ozona was approved by the court on a three-two vote. Judge Jeff Sutton and commissioners Rudy Martinez and Frank Tambunga approved the motion. Commissioners Fred Nicks and Fred Deaton voted against. Deaton has expressed concern regarding portions of the agreement.

County Attorney Bill Mason said he is comfortable with the agreement and that the county can back out at any time.

Placement of new lights at the baseball field was tabled as a result of Ray Don Myers, head of school maintenance, being out of town. No action was taken regarding purchase of roll off containers for the recycling center pending location of a landfill which

will accept the material. Also tabled was discussion and approval of an alcohol and drug policy because a DPS Trooper who was to present information was unable to be present.

In addition, a lease agreement with Union Pacific Resources for an oil and gas mineral lease was tabled until corrections are made in the document. This is to be on the agenda at a called meeting July 21.

A court costs agreement regarding child support with the office of the attorney general was approved, and election judges were appointed. They are: Pct. 1- Juanita Delgado, Pct. 2- Donna Sanders, Pct. 3- Bobbie Fatout, Pct. 4- Concha Zapata and Early Voting- Jean Conner.

Reports received at the meeting include those of Garland Young, civic and youth center director; Louise Ledoux, librarian; John Stokes, auditor; and Crystal Hargraves, care center administrator. Written reports were received from Janet Hill McDaniel of Helping Hands and Bob Falkner, fire chief.

## School Board Hires New Personnel

Harvey went on to say that work on the installation of teacher storage cabinets at Ozona Intermediate School and the installation of a metal roof on Davidson Gymnasium is progressing smoothly.

Monday morning it seemed that Crockett County officers were again looking at another possible manhunt. A vehicle was reported driving erratically north of town near Midway Lane.



**Help Available For Needy Medicare Beneficiaries**

Medicare beneficiaries with limited income but who are not poor enough to qualify for Medicaid should be aware of the help available from two Medicare programs, according to Frank Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo. "These programs - the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program and the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary Program - are designed to make Medicare available to people who have problems paying the Medicare premiums and out-of-pocket medical expenses," Upp said.

The Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program is available to people who are below the federal poverty guideline. People who qualify may get help in paying the deductibles, copayments and other out-of-pocket medical expenses. A single Medicare beneficiary may qualify if his/her income is less than \$678 per month. A couple may qualify if their combined monthly income is less than \$905.

The Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary program is for people whose income is slightly above the federal poverty level. It helps beneficiaries pay the Medicare premium for Part B, which provides help with doctor bills and many other medical expenses not provided by Medicare hospital insurance (Part A). The income limits are about 20 percent higher: \$809 per month for singles and \$1,081 per month for couples.

The asset limits for both programs are \$4,000 for individuals and \$6,000 for couples. But not all assets count, such as a home (of any value) and an applicant's car, insurance policies, burial plans, household goods and personal effects (of a reasonable value).

"If you have Medicare and you need help in paying your Medicare bills, you can apply for help from these programs at your State Social Services Agency," Upp said.

**AARP Urges Members To Vote In Election**

Texas members of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and other senior citizens are being urged to vote Aug. 9, 1997, on a number of Constitutional Amendments which will be offered as a result of action taken by the 75th Legislature.

Of particular interest to homeowners will be a proposal for an increase in the school property tax homestead exemption to \$10,000 and limiting the school property tax rate increases to eight cents above the rollback rate and transferring the over 65 tax freeze to a new homestead. If this measure is passed, it will apply to the tax year beginning Jan. 1, 1997.

A related bill, Senate Bill 841, addresses concerns dealing with appraisals. Appraisal procedures are defined and voting is required for rate increases. Tax deferrals or abatements are allowed for the elderly at 8 percent interest under this measure. An annual appraisal increase may not exceed 10 percent. Public hearings are required if the effective tax rate is increased more than 3 percent, and the appraisal appeal process is simplified.

Another tax measure, SJR 43, to be voted on Nov. 4, 1997, is a Constitutional Amendment to limit increases in appraisals and to make property tax freezes portable.

Property tax reform was a priority for AARP's state legislative committee during the 1997 session. AARP is the nation's leading organization for people age 50 and over. It serves

**Summertime Checklist**

For the grubs, be sure not to wait too long to put out Oflanal or granular Diazinon and water it in. While treating for the grubs, you will also take care of any other lawn pests, such as fleas, ticks and ants. Remember for the grubs it will take a follow-up treatment 30-45 days from the first application.



If you use a midsummer fertilizer, be sure to water in thoroughly. Most fertilizer damaged lawns happen because of improper or inadequate watering. The partially wet nitrogen will stay in contact with the leaf and burn it. Also, fertilizers will increase the growth rate of your grass for a few weeks, so be sure to increase slightly your watering to keep up with the new growth. Aphids start to show up in greater numbers in the summer. They can be found on pecan trees, (makes that sticky honeydew mess) roses, ash trees, even vinca groundcover. It will take some occasional leaf inspections to verify if you have the little critters. There are a number of insecticides we can use, it all depends on what plant system we have the problems.

Last but not least, if you have St. Augustine lawns, be sure and keep a close eye out for fungus problems such as brown patch and dollar spot. It is always a good idea to treat regularly during the summer with a preventative fungus application in liquid or granular. The granular is usually easier and the most popular in the summer. We spend less time out in the heat.

If you have any question, please call or come by and see us. You might want to bring in a sample of the bush, tree or insect that you are having problems with, it makes it easier to identify the problems.

In a response by Moore, he questioned Meador for not having told dropouts in the current EMT-B class they could continue the class and become Emergency Care Attendants without doing hospital rotation.  
 "I started an EMT course and that's what I was going to end with," said Meador. He commented that the policy of "three absences and you're out", a policy he adheres to, is that of his training supervisor, Keith Butler of Columbia. The three absences also applies to ECA students.  
 Moore also suggested that Ozona have classes for continuing education, and at one point apologized to Meador for "stepping on your toes" by talking to EMS members about response time. He had been asked by commissioners to look into the matter.  
 Lawrence Leonard of Shannon Health Systems in San Angelo was present to give a report on Ozona's clinic, and he commented that Shannon sends some instructors out to present classes in rural communities. He also pledged assistance from Shannon with equipment for communications and training. "We've bought communications equipment and pagers for other communities," said Leonard in requesting a list of equipment needed by Crockett County EMS.

and the care center/health board held its meeting. R.N. Peggy McWilliams reported 696 clinic visits during June.
