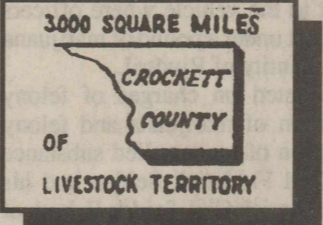

Gravell Family Grief Shared By Community

The plaintive cries of mourning doves and the soft rustle of the leaves on a nearby cottonwood tree were the only sounds to be heard as a hushed crowd awaited the arrival of the family of Jennifer Lee Gravell at Cedar Hill Cemetery Friday morning.

Jennifer would have been 10 on Saturday, Aug. 9, said the preacher, Johnnie Perkins, but instead of celebrating a time of joy, family and friends gathered to say goodbye to this little one whose life was taken Tuesday.

The pastor spoke first to the youngsters who came to mourn their friend, explaining that grief and tears are a part of saying goodbye. Words of comfort to the family by Perkins and Charles Preddy and music from a choir fell on the ears of a grieving assembly while just outside of town large oil tanks were being drained as part of the search for the weapon which was used to murder the little girl.

The soft sobs of women and children and the unashamed wiping of a tearful eye by many of the men at the service gave way to the wails of an ambulance siren after the collapse of Jennifer's grandfather.

The Monday night abduction and murder of the young daughter of Beth and Charlie Gravell stunned a community where people have felt safe to come and go at all hours of the day and night. Searchers turned out to assist law officers hunt for the girl soon after she was reported missing, then to hunt for the murder weapon.

Tireless Search For Weapon Proves Fruitless

Some 60 citizens set out Wednesday evening at 5 p.m. to search for a tire tool believed to be the weapon which killed Jennifer Gravell.

The foot search turned up nothing along the road between town and the location where Jennifer's body was found which could have been the murder weapon. A tire tool discovered Tuesday had already been ruled out.

A weapon search was started again early Friday morning, Aug. 8, at the oil tank battery where the 9-year-old's body was recovered one-half mile west of the junction of Highways 137 and 163.

Although there was no evidence that the murder weapon in the Gravell case was around the tank battery, Sheriff Shane Fenton did not want to take a chance of it being there and remaining undiscovered. He instigated a search of the inside of the tanks by

having the Pool Company drain the oil out of the tanks. Each tank, which had a capacity of 500 gallons, had only 50 gallons of oil in it with about five inches of sludge.

Pride Pipeline Company used one of their trucks to pull out the condensation from the tanks.

Process of the draining of the first tank started at 8 a.m. After opening the door at the bottom of the tank, Jesse Badillo, an employee of D & V Roustabout & Pipeline Construction of Ozona, donned an oxygen mask and used a rake and squeegee to complete the cleaning of the bottom of the tank.

About 9:20, searchers saw something move as the drain hose was being moved. It wasn't until around 10:45 a.m. that a very slender rod was found.

Oil company personnel continued to work through the noon hour and clean out the second tank. Badillo came out of the second tank at approximately 1:40 p.m. and crossed his arms, indicating that he had not found anything.

Official word from the sheriff's office said that nothing was found that appeared to be a weapon.

Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne was also on the scene and assisting in the investigation of the Gravell case.

Vote split 3-2 four times. . . . Commissioners Set Tax Rate

Commissioners took what surely must be a record number of votes Aug. 11 before setting a tax rate of 70 cents per \$100 valuation. Votes split 3-2 four times before the rate was finally set on the fifth try. A previous motion to set the rate at 70 cents had died for lack of a second. Finally approving the 70 cent rate were Rudy Martinez, Frank Tambunga and Judge Jeffrey Sutton. Fred Nicks and Fred Deaton voted against. Motions had ranged from leaving it at last year's effective tax rate of 59.377 cents to 75.1 cents per \$100.

The effective tax rate, which you will see in notices in this week's Stockman, is the amount necessary to generate the same amount of tax revenue as last year. The proposed budget, with all the requests left in, is at \$7.1 million. This is up \$950,000 from the current budget, and obviously, some whittling has to be done. A 70 cent rate will raise \$750,000 more than if the rate was left at 59.377. Anything above 63.8 cents is subject to a rollback election, and you will soon see a notice to that effect in The Stockman.

The 1997 budget is \$6,787,109.00 with funding from a tax rate of .75137 per \$100 valuation.

The county needs to keep two months worth of operating money (1.5 million) in reserve, county fathers say. At the end of 1997, John Stokes, audi-

tor, expects to have about half that.

The care center budget for 1998 has been set at \$419,057.35, the health service center (clinic) at \$367,583.00 and the EMS at \$98,000.00, reported Crystal Hargraves, care center administrator.

At least \$400,000.00 is being placed in the budget for the two capital murder trials Crockett County expects to have during the year. County Attorney Bill Mason said he estimates it will cost a half million to try two capital murders. If the cases are tried here, cost could be \$150,000.00 to \$200,000.00 each. A change of venue would be \$200,000.00 to \$250,000.00 per case depending on the length of the trial according to Mason.

The Texas Attorney General's office has staff which will come and conduct the trial at no charge to the county if the district attorney wishes, Mason said. This is an assistance to counties where capital murder trials are rarely held. The state will also pay for hotel rooms and meals for witnesses if the proper forms are filled out, said County Clerk Debbi Puckett.

Sheriff Shane Fenton commented that he did not like the prospect of a jury making a decision based on the cost of a trial. "You shouldn't put a money figure on guilt or innocence," he said.

Fenton said his office received

OPEN LETTER TO ALL CROCKETT COUNTY CITIZENS & SCHOOL FACULTY MEMBERS

Subject: Safe driving in school zones

We have another school season fast approaching us in a few days, and we are hoping that it will be a safe year for us all. Last year for the first time, The Crockett County Sheriff's Department increased the enforcement of traffic laws around our school areas.

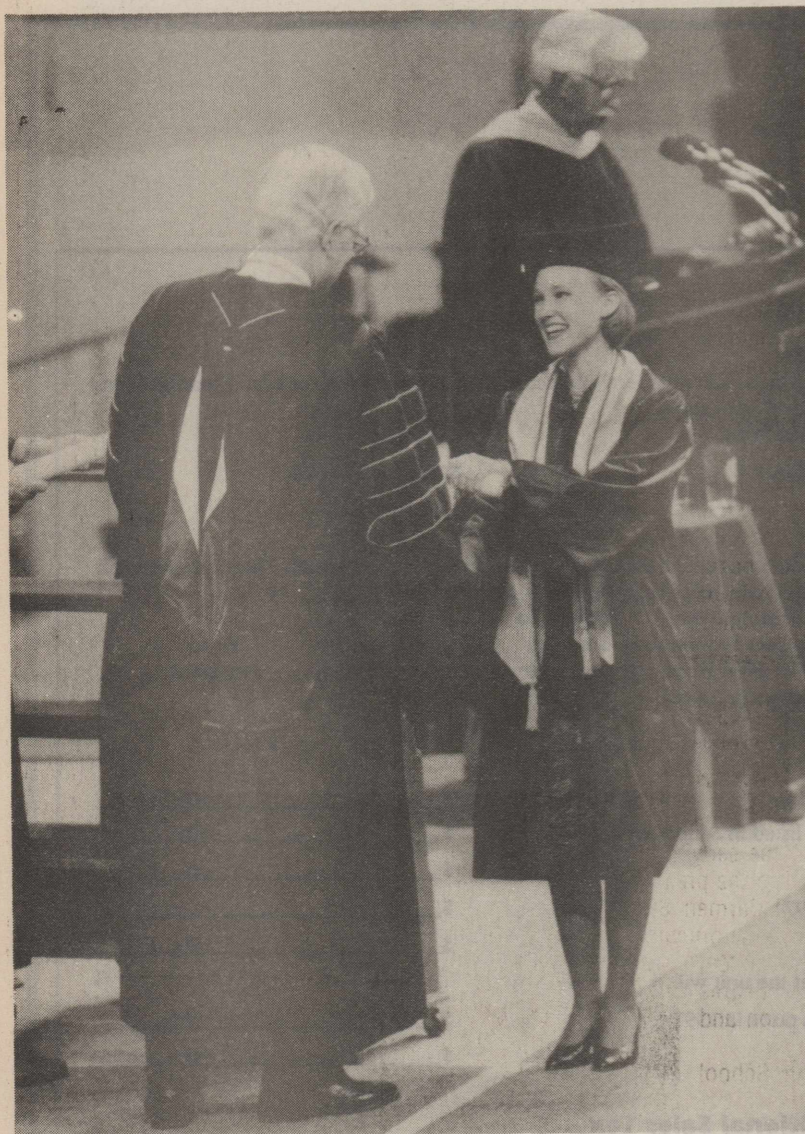
- A. There were some schools more hazardous than others, listed from worst to least:
1. Jr. High School - Due to lack of parking area, and narrow street.
 2. High School - Due to large number of vehicle drivers operating through the main street.
 3. Primary - Failure of drivers to maintain speed under 20 mph
 4. Intermediate - Speed limit is 25 mph in school zone due to access to Interstate.
- B. The most hazardous time frames were identified as:
1. High school lunch period: Due to students/parents speeding out of parking areas, & students running out in front of moving vehicles.
 2. 2:40 p.m. - Due to students speeding and driving recklessly to the Lion Stadium field house.
- C. The most common and frequent traffic violations last year were:
1. Vehicles failing to stop for school bus - Vehicles on both sides of the street must stop while the school bus has its flashing red lights.
 2. Speeding - All school zones are 20 mph or 25 mph, and are marked at both ends with a flashing signal, or a school zone sign.
 3. Vehicles stopping/standing in traffic lane - Vehicles being stopped in traffic lane to unload or load passengers.
 4. Vehicle operators failing to make complete stops at intersections.
 5. Vehicles parked within 30 or 15 ft. of a crosswalk or intersection stop sign.
 6. Vehicles parked exceeding 18 inches from curb.

The above information is being furnished to you, in hopes that you will assist us in taking whatever steps necessary, in educating students, parents, and faculty members of the importance of exercising safe driving/conduct around our schools.

Our main objective is not to issue as many citations as we can, but to have another safe year. Any help that will assist us in reaching our objective will be greatly appreciated.

Students Need Breakfast For Good Performance

While the nutritional quality of food Americans consume at breakfast has improved, the number of persons eating breakfast has actually declined—particularly young people.

A study published in the Summer of 1996 in The Journal of the American Dietetic Association says adolescents and young adults under 30 are more likely to skip breakfast than are middle-aged or older adults. The study examined data from three U.S. national surveys collected in 1965, 1977 and 1989 and found that breakfast consumption among U.S. adults declined from 86 percent in 1965 to 75 percent in 1991. The largest observable decline occurred among adolescents and young adults.

Scientists agree that breakfast can be an important contributor to diet quality and the ability to think, particularly in children. According to one of the authors of the study, the declining trend in breakfast consumption shows the importance of breakfast has not been passed along to the public.

Related studies have also shown: —Children who skip breakfast aren't as efficient as children who have had breakfast in recalling and using new information, verbal fluency, controlling attention and in selecting critical information to solve problems...all skills needed to perform well at school.

—Skipping breakfast hurts the mental performance of young adults because lower glucose levels affect memory. Brain function is sensitive to variations in the immediate supply of nutrients and energy.

School breakfast programs may actually increase daily school attendance and test performance. According to the American Dietetics Association, a nutritious early morning meal is the most important and easiest first step to ensure kids get the nutrients they need to do their best at school and at play. How can parents help? Here are a few ideas for making morning meals run more smoothly!

—Get started the night before. Set out fruit, put out bowls or plates and utensils, make sure orange juice is ready to pour, set out boxes of cereals.

—Lose your pre-conceived notions about breakfast. It's okay not to

eat toast, scrambled eggs and orange juice! A bagel with jelly, English muffin with melted cheese, or pancakes with peanut butter and jelly can be a quick and easy main course—just add fresh fruit or juice and milk.

—Use that freezer space! Pancakes, waffles and other quick breads freeze easily. Just nuke it and breakfast is ready! Breakfast burritos can be made quite economically ahead of time—just wrap with aluminum foil and when it's time to serve, reheat in the microwave.

—Remember that prepackaged small containers of juice as well as pre-cooked breakfast entrees and other items can be expensive. Save money by cooking from scratch and freezing ahead.

—Choose ingredients that are lower in fat, cholesterol, salt and sugar when shopping.

—If Junior isn't a morning person, he or she may need extra time to wake up. Sometimes it's helpful if they have a little more time to come to life—they can drink a glass of juice, watch a little TV, then have time for a quick breakfast before school.

Remember, breakfast can have a big impact on your child's academic success, but it's up to you to see that breakfast is a standard part of every day's schedule. For recipes kids enjoy, information on what the daily diet for yourself and your child should include, and other nutrition-related information, give me a call at 392-2721.

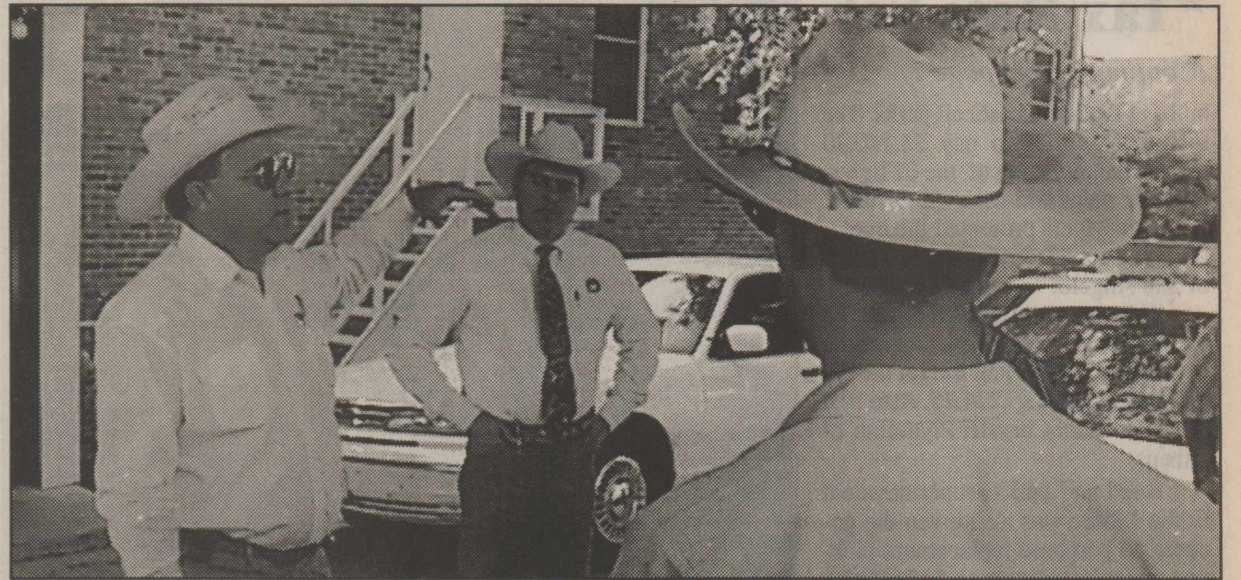
These players are only a partial list. According to Coach Hargrove, 82 players worked out last spring and said they would play in the fall. He sent out letters to 103 possible football athletes.

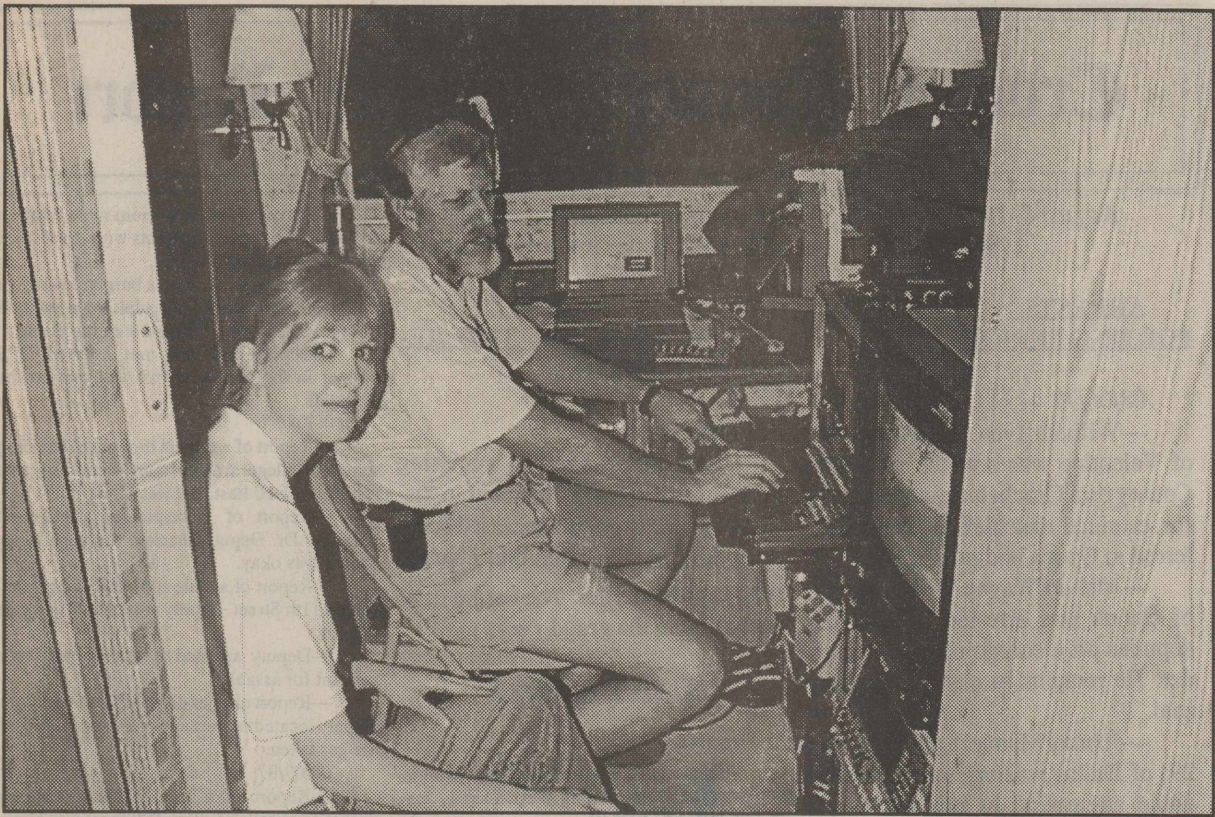

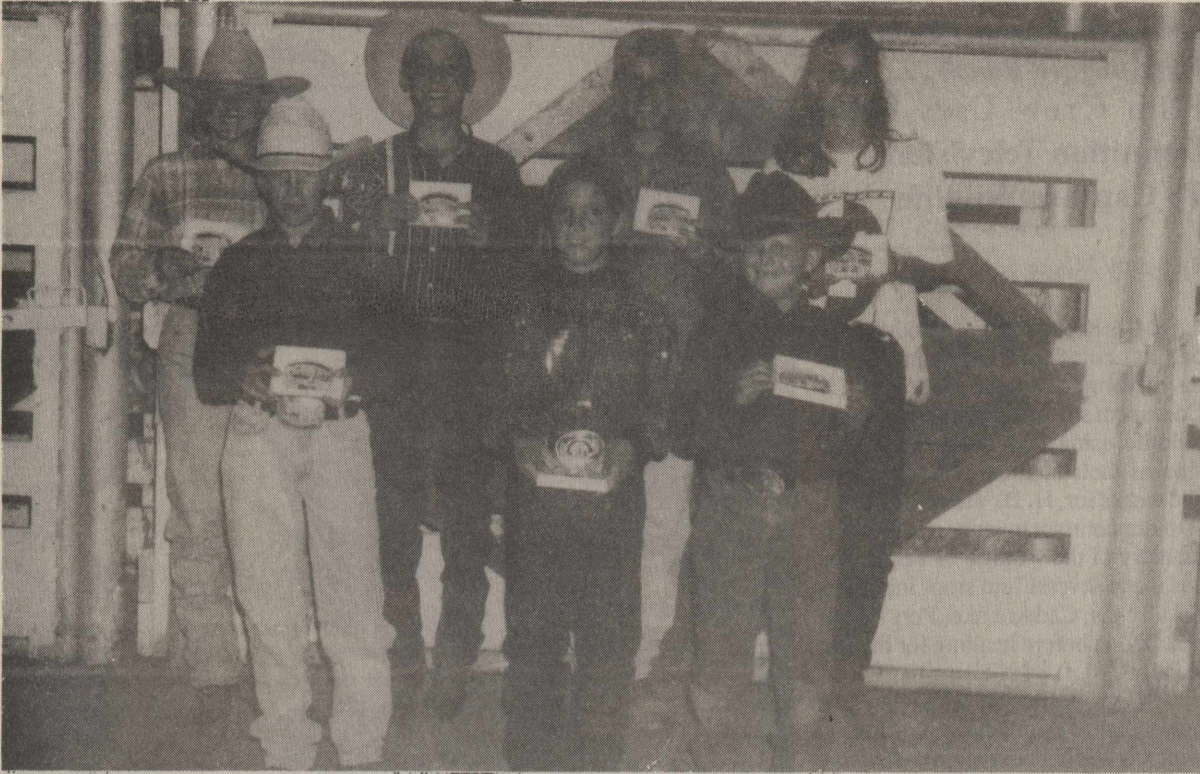

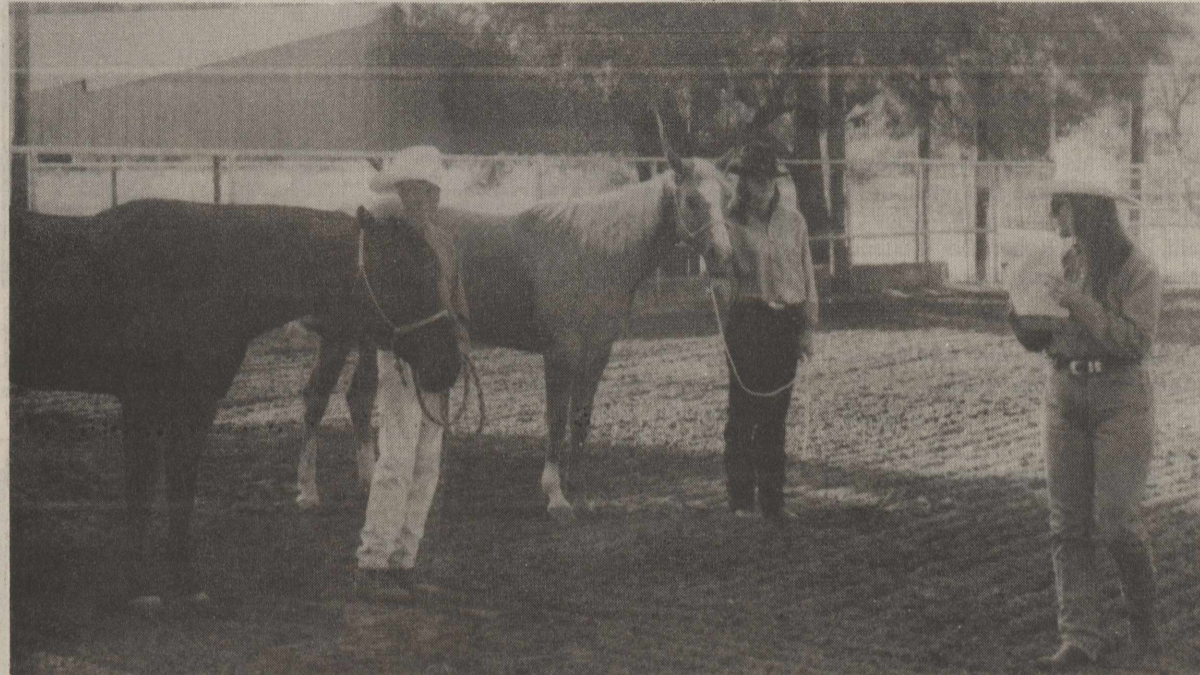

New Orleans, Nashville Prove Exciting For 4-H'ers

New Orleans, home of limited parking, heat and no left turns, proved to be a challenge for the 4-H Exchange group. Nine 4-H'ers and four chaperones braved the big city for a really different experience.

4-H'ers were Jason Hignight, Amy Laughlin, Dustin Shaffer, Leana Baggett, Ty Porter, Amanda Hignight, Trey Hale, Ashlee Worley and Mark Childress. Adults were agents Miles Dabovich and Tetra Ulmer, and adult 4-H leaders Ray Shaffer and Laurie Hale. In last week's account, the guys' suburban had missed the turn and gone on to New Orleans. Eventually, the ladies arrived at the motel to find the luggage had already been unloaded and brought to the rooms (there may have been method in the madness!).

Everyone was starving, and the group prepared to take the hotel shuttle down to Bourbon Street for sightseeing and more Cajun food. The van was full, so the group waited what seemed to be an eternity. The desk clerk assured Miles that a popular restaurant about six blocks off Bourbon St. would be open. After hiking thorough what Amy Laughlin called "the Trash Capital", the group was really hungry - unfortunately, the restaurant was closed, and the group trudged on a few more blocks to another restaurant. Most of the 4-H'ers didn't really know each other except from attending county council. Everyone introduced themselves, and we were off with our host families. Plant Tips

Summertime Rains

I don't now how many of us had to wash our cars in order to make it rain, but it worked. As usual, some of us probably got more than others. Here are some of the problems that may arise from an abundance of rain. Fire ants seem to make an appearance when it rains. The workers will make mounds and bring the eggs up to the surface. The 2-step approach is still the best. Apply a bait form such as Andro or Logic off of the mound. Then 1-2 days later, apply a contact killer such as Orthene or granular Diazinon or Dursban. This will give the workers adequate time to move the bait form to the queen before we kill them. Remember, it's the worker ants that sting you.

If you have St. Augustine and heavy shade areas, be sure to watch for the development of a fungus disease. It will start out as yellowing grass or dead spots in the lawn. These spots will multiply or get bigger in size. An application of Bayleton liquid or granular, as well as liquid Daconil in 2-3 applications usually will stop any further problems.

Lastly, we could start to see iron problems in our lawns, as well as trees and shrubs. Broadcasting ironate on the lawns or in the shrubs beds will do the trick. If you need to increase the growth rate of your lawn and green it up, try Lawn Tonic. This is a 14-0-0 with 10% iron. It's a grower and a greener.

TS&GRA To Hold Sheep And Goat Check-Off Election

SAN ANGELO - The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association will hold an election to allow eligible sheep and goat producers an opportunity to vote on the proposition of whether or not they wish to assess themselves in an amount not to exceed 20 cents per head of sheep and goats to be collected at each point of sale to finance promotion, research and education pertaining to sheep and/or goats across the 254 counties in the State of Texas on a refund only basis.

Balloting will be done by mail, and ballots may be obtained from County Extension offices across the state from Sept. 26, 1997, through Oct. 10, 1997, or by calling the Texas

Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association office at 915 655-7388 and asking that a ballot be mailed.

Completed ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Texas A&M Research & Extension Center, 7887 U.S. Hwy. 87 North, San Angelo, TX 76901 and postmarked on or before midnight on Friday, Oct. 10, 1997.

Further, the election will enable all eligible sheep and goat producers to elect nine (9) producers, three (3) each from the three referendum districts, to serve on the Sheep and Goat Producers Board. Upon election, board members will draw lots to determine length of term to be served.

A producer is eligible to vote in

the election if:

- (1) the producer's production occurs within the 254 county area making up the State of Texas and covered by the election; and
- (2) the producer would be required to pay the assessment collected on sheep and goats by the board.

Any person qualified to vote in the election may place his or her name in nomination for a position on the nine-member board by submitting a nomination form signed by the nominee and 10 other eligible voters of record no later than 30 days prior to the election as long as he or she resides in the district. Nomination forms must

be mailed to Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Assn., P. O. Box 2290, San Angelo, TX 76902, and postmarked on or before midnight on Thursday, Sept. 11, 1997.

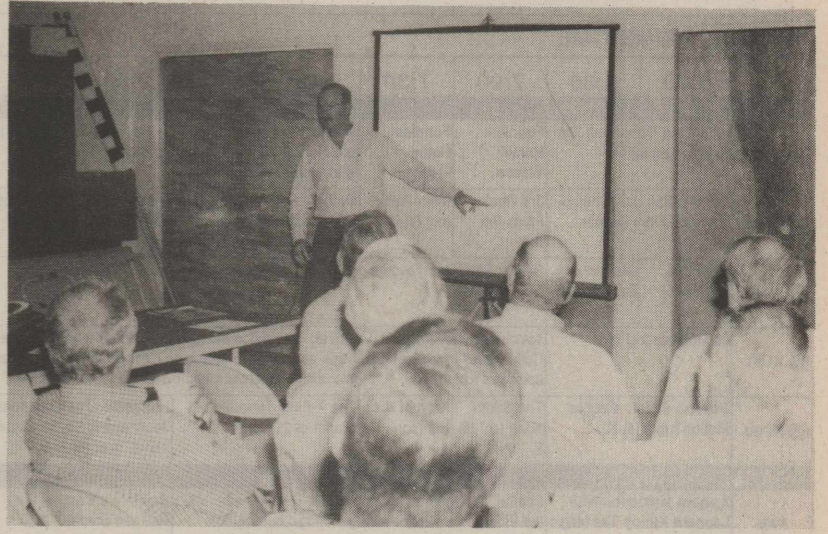

Commissioners Approve Gas Lease

Commissioners voted July 28 at a called meeting to approve an oil and gas lease with Union Pacific Resources. County Attorney Bill Mason told the court portions of the lease he had objected to had been corrected to his satisfaction.

Access to the lease, which is behind the cemetery, will be some other way than through a residential area or the cemetery.

An agenda item regarding a request by Triple G to park on county property south of town was tabled as there was no Triple G representative present.

Members of Crockett County Civic Center Board and Fair Park Convention Center Board met with commissioners regarding appointing

Garland Young as convention center director. Young had been asked by the court to consider adding this to his responsibilities as director of the civic and youth center.

Pon Seahorn, speaking for the convention center board, asked that the matter be tabled for 30 days to give his group time to work something out. The Fair Park board will stay together at least until the building is paid for, which should be after the first of the year.

John L. Henderson of the convention center board suggested that someone be hired to operate the convention center/rodeo and park area with the manager to be under the supervision of the county agent's office. Bookings are currently done through that office.

Belinda Wilkins of the civic center board said her group would be willing to tend to building but none of the additional area. She suggested that a board like theirs might be the answer.

Need for a director was brought up by Judge Jeffrey Sutton after reports of the building being left dirty and items missing from the premises.

"We need to get together on somebody to watch that building very closely," Sutton said.

Action on the matter was tabled.

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Houston-based Harrison Interests Ltd. continues its developmental activities in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field and is preparing to make hole for a couple of additional wells about nine miles southeast of Ozona.

The No. 24 Joe Tom Davidson Jr. "D" is located in a 673-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-4415. It is under permit for 9,450 feet total depth.

Location for the No. 27 Joe Tom Davidson Jr. "F" is a 330-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-2394. It carries authority for 9,300 feet total depth.

Operating out of Midland, Sonat Exploration Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Baggett "2" about 12 miles south-southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Baggett Field. Drillsite is a 640-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-4700. Clear Fork formation will be the target at a depth of approximately 10,000 feet.

The No. 7010D C.C. Montgomery is scheduled for spudding 18.8 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field. Union Pacific Resources Corp. of Fort Worth is the operator. Location is a 320-acre lease in the TCRR Survey A-2987. The operator will seek Canyon Sand formation pay at 6,800 total depth.

UPR has posted first production data for the No. 3 E. H. Hatton Estate "10D," about 27.6 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field. It flowed 162,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was rated at 172,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The well was bottomed at 7,200 feet with plugback to 7,014. Production will be from a Canyon sand formation interval, 5,890 to 6,998 feet.

UPR also completed the No. 5D O.B.T.C. about 4 1/3 miles south of Ozona in Crockett County's West Hunt-Baggett Field. 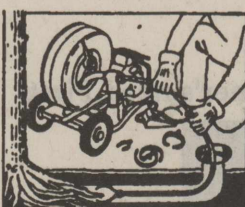

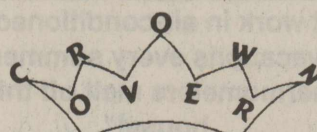
