

In April 1993, shortly following the death of his wife, Mr. Albers met Loretta Neumuller at the White Horse Lounge in Del Rio, Texas. By June, Albers had asked Neumuller to move to Ozona with him. In September, Albers deeded his home to Neumuller and agreed to extensive remodeling. Neumuller then moved in. Albers also promised Neumuller that he would revise his will in her favor.

Shortly after moving to Ozona, Neumuller met Tyrone "Pete" Parker, a tenant of Albers. By October, Neumuller and Parker had become lovers. In September 1993, Neumuller told Parker she was so mad at Albers that she could just kill him. Parker replied that that could be arranged. After that, Parker would occasionally mention killing Albers.

In January 1994, Albers began transferring significant amounts of property to Neumuller. He added her name to his checking account signature card. On February 28, 630 shares of common stock in the Ozona National Bank were transferred from Mary Frances West Albers (Albers' deceased wife) to Larry Albers or Loretta C. Neumuller. Also in January, Albers retained attorney Troy Williams to prepare a new will naming Neumuller his executrix and sole beneficiary. He signed the new will on January 24, 1994.

The Ozona Lions played with the Sonora Broncos for three quarters until Sonora started running down the field to take a 17-0 win over the Lions last Friday night in Lion Stadium. Friday's non-district game appeared to be another interesting one as both teams played about even and Sonora's first score was a field goal.

The Lions, who are now 1-1 for the season, are not discouraged, but are disappointed with the outcome.

Well, I'm not disappointed nor discouraged. I'm disappointed in the game, but I'm not discouraged about the game. I think the kids are disappointed in the outcome, but Sonora has a good outfit," said Ozona's head coach Walter Hargrove. "We saw the game at a real fast pace and physical pace. ealth Science **Technology Education**

By Linda Coates, Ozona High School Health Science Technology instructor

According to the Department of Labor's Bureau of Statistics, 30 of the fastest growing occupations through the year 2005 are in health care services. In response to these statistics, Ozona High School started a comprehensive education program in Health Science Technology. This Tech-Prep program is designed for students who have an interest and desire to explore over 300 health careers. The student is able to earn college credit through our partnership with Howard College, and the school to work transition is easier.

The Health Science Technology Education Division of the TEA spent numerous hours designing a curriculum framework that contained a coherent sequence of courses. The following is a result of their hard work and summarizes the course content.

Introduction to Health Science Technology gives an overview of the therapeutic, diagnostic, environmental and informational systems of the health care industry. The focus is on career exploration, leadership development, ethical and legal issues, and the history, economics, and trends in financing health care. Students develop a concept of health and wellness from the perspective of a consumer as well as a potential professional in the health

Health Science Technology I is a course designed to develop health care specific knowledge and skills in effective communications, ethical and le-

gal responsibilities, client care, safety, First Aid and CPR. This course prepares the student for the transition to clinical or work based experiences in

Health Science Technology II is for students in the 12th grade. Recommended prerequisites for this course are HST I, Biology and Chemistry. The course is designed to provide for the development of multi-occupational knowledge and skills related to a wide variety of health careers. Scheduled clinical rotations provide the handson experiences needed for continued knowledge and skills.

Health Science Technology III offers a CNA course which is occupationally specific. The course provides the knowledge and skills needed for certification as a Nurse's Aide. During this course, students develop advanced clinical skills necessary for employment in the health care industry or post secondary education in a

I feel very honored in having a part in the education of these fine young people whose hearts are full of compassion and a desire to help those in pain and suffering. These young people will be the physicians, the nurses, and pharmacists of our future.

This year the program has 15 first year students and five second year students. We had nine seniors in the program last year. In the Spring we hope to start interviewing new prospects for next year's classes.

Right now the classes are writing a play celebrating health occupations.



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 4, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead.'

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented.

PROPOSITION NO. 4

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 104 proposes an

amendment to update the Texas Constitution by deleting duplicate numbering in its provisions and removing certain of its ob-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to allow the Supreme Court of Texas to hold sessions at any location in this state. Currently, the court is limited to holding sessions only at Austin, the seat of state government.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the supreme court to sit to transact business at any location in

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the current provision which provides that the board of the Texas Growth Fund may not invest money in a business unless the business has disclosed to the board whether it has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set forth in the amendment

The amendment would also allow the Board to use loan repayments coming into the fund after the end of the fiscal year to make bond debt service payments, and would provide certain conditions for the flow of funds for repayment of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the authorization to the Texas Water Development Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water the use of existing funds and relating

to more efficient operation of the bond

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

programs.'

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize home equity lending, in which a loan could be secured by a lien against the borrower's homestead. The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to authorize a property tax of five cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The constitution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts regardless of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund (and its auxiliary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were de-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment designating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may
