County Attorney Bill Mason told the court he had researched their lease and that one executed on March 12, 1963, was probably the most valid lease between the county and Crockett County Fair Association. A Jan. 1, 1991, lease signed by Judge Katherine Mayfield and Pleas Childress Jr. was not signed by commissioners. A later lease, signed by commissioners on Feb. 11, 1991, was never signed by a representative of the Fair Association.

Pon Seahorn, a member of the Fair Park Convention Center committee, asked whether or not the lease of \$1.00 a year has been paid.

Mason also questioned the validity of the Fair Park Convention Center board, asking if the board met in regular open meetings which were posted so that the public might attend, were minutes kept and did the board report monthly to the commissioners court.

This discussion took place as several residents of the area near the convention center waited to learn what the court would do about excessive noise from dances in the building.

"We need somebody to go over there and get a hand on the volume," said Judge Jeffrey Sutton. All agreed that it would take a special person to take care of the building and be firm

No bookings are being taken until something can be done regarding management, said Miles Dabovich. An increase in rent from \$500 to \$600 would help pay for someone to take care of the entire fair park area, Dabovich said.

Commissioners voted to appoint Moore as temporary manager of the convention center and also voted to authorize a permanent position for an employee for the fairgrounds area and

The Texas Water Development Board has released a draft of a map dividing the state's 4,959 square miles of inland water into 14 regional water zones.

Judge Defends Prof's Right

American-Statesman, Judge Fortunato "Pete" Benavides of the 5th U.S. Court of Appeals said University of Texas law professor Lino Graglia has the right to speak his mind, even if his ideas are offensive to some.

Graglia's comments sparked national attention in September when he said most black and Mexican-American students can't compete with white students because those groups don't look upon failure as a disgrace.

He made the comments at a news conference in support of the New Orleans-based 5th Circuit's "Hopwood" decision which barred the University of Texas School of Law from using race as a factor in student admissions.

Benavides said it is "wrong to call for (Graglia's) resignation. We all say things that are wrong.'

And he defended the "freedom of professors, above all, to speak out even when they're wrong or when they're perceived to be wrong or whatever by the community, whether they are or not."

"To me," Benavides said, "a college campus is supposed to be for ideas that are spoken about freely and checked out to see whether they're true or not."

Other Capital Highlights Teachers would have to be recertified every five years under a proposed state requirement. The Texas Federation of Teachers says teachers should be allowed to vote on the proposal. Currently, 97 percent of teachers in Texas are certified but at least half teach subjects outside their field of certification.

■ Democrats are airing television ads in East Texas asking voters to call the district office of Sen. Drew Nixon, R-Carthage, and demand his resignation. Nixon said he would not resign after a Travis County jury sentenced him to six months in jail on gun and prostitution charges.

■ The U.S. House voted 309-106 last week to approve an agreement allowing Maine and Vermont ship their radioactive waste to a disposal site near Sierra Blanca in West

AUSTIN - Child support payments by delinquent parents in Texas rose to \$700 million last fiscal year, an increase of 13 percent over last year, the attorney general's office announced last week. The attorney general's Child

Support Program collected \$427 million through wage withholding, \$78 million through IRS refund receipts and \$55 million through its license suspension program. Another \$140 million was collected through direct payments, lien collections and lottery winnings inter-

Attorney General Dan Morales credited his staff with the increase in child support payments, and said that each year the collections program increases and improves it services to children and families despite an ever-growing case load.

He added, however, that "Texans shouldn't lose sight of the fundamental absurdity of expecting government to force parents to take care of their own children. No technological innovation, indeed no government program can ensure that children will get the support that they are due."



pieces 1 c. buttermilk

3/4 c. flour 1/4 c. yellow commeal

1 tsp. garlic salt

1 tsp. chili powder

1/4 c. grated Parmesan cheese 1/2 c. butter Place chicken pieces in butter-

milk. Combine flour, cornmeal, garlic salt, chili powder and Parmesan. Dip chicken into cornmeal mixture. Melt butter in baking dish. Add chicken, placing skin side down. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. Turn and bake 20 minutes longer or until chicken is tender; baste with drippings as needed.

Belinda's Blueberry Salad 2 pkg. (3 oz.) Concord grape gelatin

1 c. boiling water

1 can (1 lb., 4 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained and juice reserved 1 can (16 or 17 oz.) blueberries,

drained and rinsed (May use frozen) 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese

1 c. sour cream

1/2 c. pecans (optional) Dissolve gelatin in water. Add enough water to juice to make 2 cups, add to gelatin. Add fruits and pecans. Chill until partially set. Blend cream cheese and sour cream. Drop spoonfuls of thickened gelatin alternately with cheese mixture into 9x13-inch glass dish. Run a knife in both directions through mixture several times to make swirls. Chill until firm. Serves

Taylor receives academy scholarship

Crockett County CCISD, has been chosen as one of 40 superintendents to receive a scholarship to participate in the Lamar University Superintendents' Academy, an advanced leadership training program on Lamar's Beaumont campus. Red Ribbon Campaign set for Oct. 23-31

This year's Red Ribbon Campaign against drug abuse has been scheduled for Oct. 23-31, according to officials with the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, who will be helping to promote the annual event.

The Red Ribbon Campaign helps coordinate a wide range of substance abuse prevention efforts on the part of schools, businesses, prevention agencies, community groups and religious

Kids, parents and other concerned adults show their support for a drugfree life and future by wearing red ribbons on their clothing during this special time.

The Red Ribbon Campaign was founded in the wake of the brutal murder of a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration agent in 1985. Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, a 37-year-old father of three, was killed in the line of duty while investigating a multi-billion dollar drug marketing operation in Mexico.

The Texans' War on Drug program (TWOD) was the official state sponsor of the campaign through 1996. TCADA this year has been helping to update and produce new program tools that communities can use in their own local campaign.

TCADA executive director Terry Bleier said: "One of the best prevention tools we have in the fight against substance abuse is increased public awareness. The Red Ribbon Campaign offers us an excellent opportunity to help the public focus on the need for prevention work.'

Bleier said many Texans have been involved in prevention work for years, and TCADA is making major efforts to emphasize the importance of prevention in its programs and contracting. Helping to promote the Red Ribbon Campaign gives TCADA an opportunity to build support for

new and existing substance abuse prevention initiatives in communities across the state.

The effectiveness of each year's shots declines with time, therefore, annual immunizations with the appropriate vaccines are recommended for everyone except people with serious allergies to eggs.

People most at risk of severe or fatal complications of the disease include those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems, diabetics and children on aspirin ther-

Influenza kills about 20,000 in The centers have a wide variety the U.S. each year. According to Jim Schuermann, public health technician in the TDH Infectious Disease Epidemiology and Surveillance Division, the elderly are the group hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

> "Fewer than 30 percent of elderly Americans and others in high-risk groups heed our regular warnings to have yearly influenza vaccinations," he said. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of a persistent, unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated persons may still contract some strains of influenza, but not from the vaccine. If they do become ill with flu, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of the case."

Other categories of people who are most likely to develop influenza complications are:

*Adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma;

*People under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, diabetes, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems; and

*Children (18 and younger) who already are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye's syndrome after influenza.

"We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in The vaccine CDC has recom- high-risk groups, international travelers or pregnant women," Schuermann advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flu complications." TDH also recommends that physicians, nurses, emergency medical technicians and other health professionals be immunized against influenza to avoid spreading the disease to their patients. Residents and employees of nursing homes and other facilities treating chronically ill patients also should be immunized.

Physicians are advised to offer vaccine to all their patients during routine clinic visits, beginning in September and throughout the influenza season. The vaccine can take two weeks to become effective and about six weeks to reach peak strength. Children younger than 9 who have never received flu vaccine need their first shot, followed a month later by a booster. Adults need only one shot each season.

Schuermann said that the only person who should not receive the influenza vaccine are those with severe allergic reactions to eggs. Influenza vaccines are produced with virus cultured in eggs.

If you are not the property owner, PLEASE give this important notice to the owner.

WTU has identified windblown tree limbs in contact with power lines as a major cause of interruptions of electric service. To maintain the safety and reliability of your electric service, WTU has employed a professional tree service to trim and/or remove trees near electric power lines. Trees under or near electric lines may be removed with property owner's permission. This work will be done at no charge to you.

If you notice a tree interfering with power lines, please call us. Never attempt to trim a tree near our wires yourself.

The professional tree service under contract with WTU will be working in your area in the near future. Trees to the side of the power lines will be trimmed according to national aboricultural standards, removing all limbs to provide a minimum of three years clearance from regrowth, or back to the next available limb fork so that no branch stubs are left. All limbs overhanging the line will be trimmed back to eliminate the danger of them falling on the power

All trees within five feet of a pole or guy-wire will be removed to allow access for maintenance of WTU equipment. Herbicide will be applied to the stumps to prevent resprouting. Wood can be cut to firewood length and stacked on site if requested. Monarch butterflies stalled midway across Texas

of Monarch butterflies migrating through Texas appears to be "stalled" on a line stretching roughly from Fort Stockton through Abilene through Dallas to Paris, with unusually heavy concentrations of Monarchs in West Texas. Texans are being urged to help in a nationwide effort to solve the mysteries of the migration, with Texas State Parks being some of the best places for people to witness the Monarch spectacle and look for tagged

The top scientist studying the Monarch migration through Texas believes the migration front line came to Texas with a weak cold front about a week ago, but has stalled in its current position due to a lack of repeated, strong cold fronts. Dr. Bill Calvert is leading the Monarch research effort in Texas with funding from the Nongame and Urban Wildlife Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Margaret Cullinan Wray Trust.

Calvert says Monarch viewing is excellent in areas along and behind the stalled Monarch line. A cold front is expected at the beginning of next week. Once it comes, the butterflies should start to move again, and viewing should be good in a 300 miles swatch from Wichita Falls to Del Rio.

While there are no guarantees in nature, many Texas State Parks in the path of the current stalled migration line are good bets for Monarch view-

Average Texans can help answer these and many more questions by getting outside and collecting information about the migration and Monarch populations each year. Keeping a Monarch migration calendar of the presence and abundance of Monarchs and tagging them all over the country also helps researchers to keep track of where they go from year to year. The data are compiled showing where and when tagged butterflies are found and their numbers reported to Monarch Watch Centers.

To report the tag numbers and locations of tagged butterflies found, people can call the Texas Monarch Watch Hot-line at 800-468-9719. Once the tag number is read and confirmed and the sex of the butterfly noted (male Monarchs have two small black dots on their hindwings), the butterfly may be released to continue its journey.

To receive a mailed newsletter or brochure about the Monarch migration through Texas, or for information about Monarchs in Texas State Parks, people can call the TPWD toll-free information line at 800-792-1112, option 3 for state parks, option 3 for park information.

TPWD to hold public scoping meeting in Kerrville

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is hoping to increase constituent involvement in the process to determine how the state's natural and cultural resources are to be managed by conducting a scoping meeting this month in Kerrville. The meeting is scheduled for 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday, Oct. 21, at the former Texas State Comptroller's Building (125 Lehman Drive) located directly behind the Department of Public Safety office on Hwy. 16 south.

According to Dr. Jerry Cooke, Upland Game Program Director for TPWD in Austin, "the public meeting is being held mainly to seek input on new legislation that allows our Department to issue special permits to private landowners who want to have more control over wild white-tailed deer confined behind a high fence on their property. House Bill 3061 mandates that TPWD develop requirements and procedures for issuance of the permits and guidelines for ensuring program compliance."

Dr. Cooke emphasized that although the high fence issue is the main topic of concern for the meeting. TPWD staff on hand will welcome discussion on any other natural resource matters that might be brought up by those in attendance. Similar meetings are being conducted throughout the state during the months of September and October.
