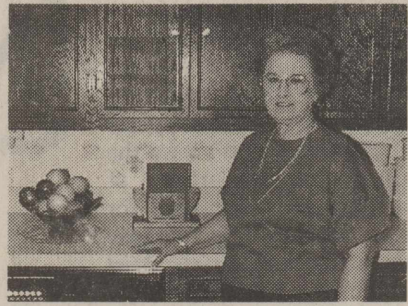

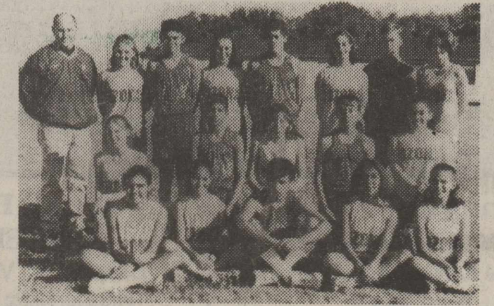

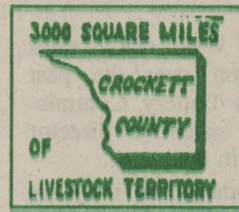

Sanchez, Marshall lead Lady Lions cross country to regional berth

In the District 8-2A cross country meet held on Monday, Oct. 27 junior Lori Sanchez breezed toward the finish line to capture second place in a time of 14:02, followed closely by senior teammate Terren Marshall who took third with a clocking of 14:12.65. The varsity team finished second in the team competition, a mere 1 point behind district champion Winters.

Tiffany Maldonado also finished in the individual medalist brackets at 5th place with a time of 14:51.23. Vanessa Hartman clocked in at 16:16.55 for 19th, and Stacy Mendez was 26th with a time of 16:36.25, to contribute to Ozona's team score. Felicia Ramirez finished the 2 miles in 18:08.73 for 39th individually.

As a result of their second place team finish, all 6 of these ladies will

travel to Mae Simmons Park in Lubbock for the regional meet on Nov. 8. The ladies' Class AA event will begin at approximately 12:30 p.m.

Joining the Ladies team will be individual medalist Ismael Villarreal who finished in 8th place for the men's varsity squad with a time of 18:33.87. He will run in the Class AA race which begins at 12:00 p.m. (Noon). The varsity boys team finished fourth in the team standings.

Other contenders from Ozona in the men's competition were: 15th-George Hernandez in 19:14.44; 16th-Jomie Tebbetts in 19:21.50; 22nd-Josh Tambunga in 20:39.69; 27th-Gabriel Tijerina in 22:04.52; 29th-Ray Ramos in 22:58.91; and 32nd-Gabriel Tambunga in 24:15.55.

The JV Ladies entered a squad of 5 who finished as follows: 3rd-Alex Lira in 16:57.60; 28th-Kristen Shurley

in 19:54.04; 31st-Andrea Hiers in 20:16.49; 34th-Summer Browne in 20:36.46; and 37th-Cecilia Gonzalez in 21:20.32.

In the boys' JV competition Ozona had only three entrants, and they finished as follows: 15th-Cole Wadsworth in a time of 28:14.63; 16th-Ben Forehand in 28:15.96; and 17th-Ryan Bean in 30:45.52.

Coach Pete Maldonado repeatedly expresses how hard each of these individuals, regardless of skill level, works toward improving competitiveness. It takes courage and dedication to repeatedly push your body through the rigors of two and three mile runs.

Coach Maldonado also noted that the Ladies advancing to regional have a strong chance of finishing as one of the top three teams, which would give them an opportunity to compete at the state cross country meet.

Pilot walks away from emergency pasture landing

Glene Pruet was fortunate enough to walk away from his Mooney plane after setting down in a pasture Monday afternoon. Pruet, a consultant for UPR, notified Ozona Municipal Airport that he was low on fuel from a headwind and would attempt to make the airport or I-10.

When he had not reached the air-

port in the allotted time, Charles McCleary went up in a search plane and spotted Pruet walking out from the set-down scene on the Charles Davidson Ranch some two miles north of the Circle Bar Truck Stop.

According to DPS Trooper Tommy Scales, who investigated the

incident, there was minimal damage to the wings and fuselage. Scales' report indicated that Pruet was flying from the Aero County Airport to Ozona Municipal Airport when his engine began cutting out. The pilot attempted to switch fuel tanks, but the engine died.

Mike Cox is chief of media relations with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas' State Law Enforcement Agency. He came to the DPS in 1985 after a 20 year career as an award winning newspaper reporter.

Since joining the DPS, he has been the agency's principal spokesman during several national and internationally publicized law enforcement crises, including the worst mass murder in American history—the October 1991 mass murder at the Luby's Cafe-

teria in Killeen. He also dealt with the news media following the April 1993 fiery aftermath of the Branch Davidson siege near Waco, the recent Republic of Texas standoff in the Davis Mountains and after the Jarrell tornado near Austin.

He is the past-president of the Lone Star Chapter of the National Association of Government Communicators and a member of the board of directors of the O'Henry Museum in Austin.

A nationally published free-lance writer, he is the author of six books and numerous magazine articles, essays and book reviews. He also made a video with Patrick Dearen that holds special interest for Crockett County people, it is titled "Graveyard of the

West-The Pecos River" and is carried at the museum.

In March 1993, he was elected to membership in the Texas Institute of Letters along with 11 other Texas writers, including James Michner and Bill Moyers.

His book "Texas Ranger Tales" is a collection of 28 stories dealing with the history of the Rangers. His latest book "Standoff In Texas: Media Relations In A Crisis" is due for release this fall. He is a native of Amarillo, he is married and has a three-year-old daughter.

Despite their earnest efforts to pull themselves together for their father's funeral, the Turpins' other problems keep overshadowing the solemn occasion: first-born Ray-Bud drinks himself silly as the funeral bills mount; Junior, the younger son, is juggling financial ruin, a pack of no-neck monster kids, and a wife who suspects him of infidelity in the family car; his spinster sister, Delightful, copes with death as she does with life, by devouring junk food; and all the neighbors add more than two cents.

As the situation becomes fraught with mishap, Ray-Bud says to his long-suffering wife, "When I die, don't tell nobody. Just bury me in the backyard and tell everybody I left you." Amidst the chaos, the Turpins

turn for comfort to their friends and neighbors, an eccentric community of misfits who just manage to pull together and help each other through their hours of need, and finally, the funeral.

Accident fatal to Californians

An accident 35 miles west of Ozona on I-10 took the lives of two Gilrow, CA, residents Tuesday morning.

Norberto Garza Jr. of Gilrow, the driver of the 1997 Chevrolet involved in the accident, was westbound on I-10 when he fell asleep about 7:10 a.m. After the vehicle left the highway on the south side, Garza overcorrected, and the vehicle went across the median and overturned several times. It came to rest in the eastbound lane of I-10.

Garza, 17, was airlifted by Medi-

vaco to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo with critical injuries.

Also injured was Gustavo Garza, 41, of McAllen. He was transported to Shannon Hospital in stable condition with contusions and abrasions. Both men were wearing seatbelts.

Deceased at the scene were Norberto C. Garza, 48, and Eric Garza, 14. Neither wore a seatbelt, and both were ejected from the vehicle.

Investigating the accident for the DPS were Sgt. Carl Mayfield and Troopers Tommy Scales and Scott Frazier.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — With ticket sales down \$1 billion over the past year, the Texas Lottery Commission fired its executive director Lawrence Littwin last week.

The slump comes after five years of record-breaking sales.

In the past year, however, the agency also has been troubled by negative publicity over its contract with lottery operator GTECH and a new mandate by the Legislature that places a higher percentage of lottery proceeds into the state budget.

Littwin, who had been lottery chief since last June, blamed the Legislature for the agency's troubles.

"When the public catches on to the fact that they are basically being ripped off by the lottery, they are going to stop buying tickets altogether," Littwin said. "This is a serious, serious problem for this lottery, and one that the Lottery Commission is unwilling to address."

To build more funds into the 1988-89 state budget, the Legislature lowered the payouts for instant games (scratch-offs).

Sales will only get worse, Littwin said, because later this year the lottery will pay out less than 50 percent of money taken to balance games now being

sold at higher payouts, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

Littwin said his investigation of whether GTECH made campaign contributions to state lawmakers may have had something to do with his firing, but GTECH spokesman Marc Palazzo said the company had no role in the commission's decision to fire Littwin.

Deputy executive director Linda Cloud succeeds Littwin.

Bush for Anti-Fraud System

Results of a yearlong study suggest that the Lone Star Imaging System does not work.

The system — part of a \$1.7 million welfare reform program — uses fingerprint images to detect when welfare recipients are doubling up on applications for cash or food stamp benefits.

The study was conducted at 10 Department of Human Services offices serving Bexar and Guadalupe counties.

"We don't have any evidence to suggest that this would be an effective tool to detect or deter the receipt of duplicate benefits," said Deanna Schexnayder of the University of Texas at Austin's Center for the Study of Human Resources.

Schexnayder said only one person was caught applying for duplicate benefits.

Despite the study's conclusions, Gov. George W. Bush still supports implementation of the fraud-detection program statewide, his spokesman Ray Sullivan said.

Expansion of the program, which is projected to cost \$13 million over the next three years, is expected to foil cheaters who reapply for benefits in counties other than where they reside.

Prisoners and Personal Data

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock asked the Senate Joint Committee on Criminal Justice to determine what type of personal information about Texans that inmates have access to while working in prison.

Bullock, who presides over the

Senate, said he wants lawmakers to make sure prison inmates are not able to misuse information they get while working in prison industries.

"Strong policies must be in place to ensure prisoners don't have the chance to violate the privacy of anyone. While it is important for inmates to work to help to repay their debt to society, safety must always come first," Bullock said.

Other Capital Highlights

State agencies are cutting payrolls and laying off workers to comply with a Sept. 1 cap on the number of state employees. The Texas Department of Health plans to lay off 165 workers and the Texas Department of Human Services, 266.

Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who still hasn't formally declared his intention to seek the Democratic nomination for governor, told supporters he is in a statistical "dead heat" with Republican Gov. Bush. "Polling, focus groups and mall testing ... have convinced me that I can win the governor's race in 1998," Mauro said.

The University of Texas at Austin's student body is the nation's largest, totaling 48,866 students this semester. Second is Ohio State University with 48,278 students enrolled.

Texas school districts should not tempt students to take "cream puff" courses because of a new state law that requires public universities to admit students who finish in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating classes, Education Commissioner Mike Moses said last week.

Following an investigation by the Texas Department of Human Services, the state of Texas has sued five nursing homes and an unlicensed care home for inadequately caring for residents. Attorney General Dan Morales is asking courts to fine homes \$10,000 per violation and order the unlicensed home to cease operating without a license.

"I love to cook and to collect hometown cookbooks," said Carolyn Harris. This cook of the week also has many good recipes shared by family and friends.

Carolyn and Bob's sons, Tim and Rick, have favorite foods she likes to prepare for them when they come home. Tim lives in Howe, and Rick and Martha make their home in San Angelo with their daughters, Kimberly and Skylar.

Red velvet cake and cream puffs are favorite desserts at the Harris home. Carolyn doesn't always follow a recipe with whatever she cooks. "I do something different every time. You never know what I'll put in," she said. Carolyn and Bob moved to Ozona in 1970 with plans to stay one year. He was a truck driver when they came here, and then started a job with GTE. He has retired from the phone company and presently works for Southwest Electric Co-op.

"We will have been here 30 years when he retires there," said Carolyn.

Plans are to build a home at Lake Ivy where they both expect to do a great deal of fishing. Carolyn also loves playing canasta and 42. She expects to cook more and look for additional hobbies once she retires to Lake Ivy.

The recipes she shares today are easy to fix when working or in a hurry, says Carolyn.

Pink Fluff Salad

1 15 oz. can fruit cocktail
1 box mixed fruit Jello
1 - 8 oz. sour cream
1 - 8 oz. Cool Whip
Drain all but 3 T juice from the fruit. Sprinkle Jello over the fruit and set for 10 min. Stir well, then add sour cream and Cool Whip. Mix well.

Pork and Bean Salad

1 reg. size can of pork and beans
1 or 2 boiled eggs, chopped
Bell pepper, chopped
Onion, chopped
1 to 2 T Miracle Whip
Drain juice from beans. Add other ingredients. Use the amount of onion and pepper to your taste. I like to use different colors of peppers if possible.

Chicken and Rice Soup

This recipe is from my daughter-in-law. It is my granddaughter's favorite soup.

1 large chicken, boiled. Dice when cooled.
1 1/2 c. carrots sliced very thin
1 1/2 c. celery sliced very thin
1 med. onion diced very small
1 1/2 c. rice
3/4 small box Velveeta cheese
Have at least 2 1/2 to 3 quarts of broth from chicken. Cook carrots, celery and onions for 15 to 20 minutes. Then add rice. Cook until done. Add diced chicken and cheese. Salt and pepper to taste. If soup is too thick, add water, or if too thin, add more rice.

Stove Top Chicken and Dressing

I got this recipe from Ronda Shaw last year. It is easy and very good. My family really likes it.
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of celery soup
2 1/2 cups chicken broth
1/2 c. chopped onion

1/4 c. chopped celery
Diced meat from one cooked chicken
2 eggs
1 box original Stove Top Stuffing
Mix and bake 45 min. at 350°. If you don't have time to cook your chicken, use one package Schwan's diced chicken and canned chicken broth.

Taco Flavored Oyster Crackers

1 pkg. dry taco seasoning
1/2 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. oregano
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
2 pks. oyster crackers
3/4 c. salad oil
Mix everything but crackers in a jar. Pour over crackers and store in plastic bag.

Ranch Flavored Crackers

1 pkg. Ranch Dressing mix
1 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1 T dill weed
3/4 c. salad oil
2 pkg. oyster crackers
Mix as for Taco Flavored Oyster Crackers.

Pistachio Chocolate Cake

This was my Mother's favorite recipe. People were always asking her to make it for them.

1/4 c. chocolate chips
1/4 c. pecans, finely chopped
1 box white cake mix
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. cooking oil
1 pkg. instant pistachio pudding mix

1 c. water
5 eggs
5 1/2 oz. can chocolate syrup
Confectioner's sugar
Grease and flour Bundt pan.
Sprinkle chocolate chips and pecans over bottom of pan. Mix cake ingredients in usual manner except chocolate syrup and confectioners sugar. Reserve 1 c. batter. Pour remaining batter into prepared pan. Add chocolate syrup to reserved batter and pour over top of white batter. Bake for 1 hour at 350°. Cool in pan for about 30 min. Turn out on cake plate and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

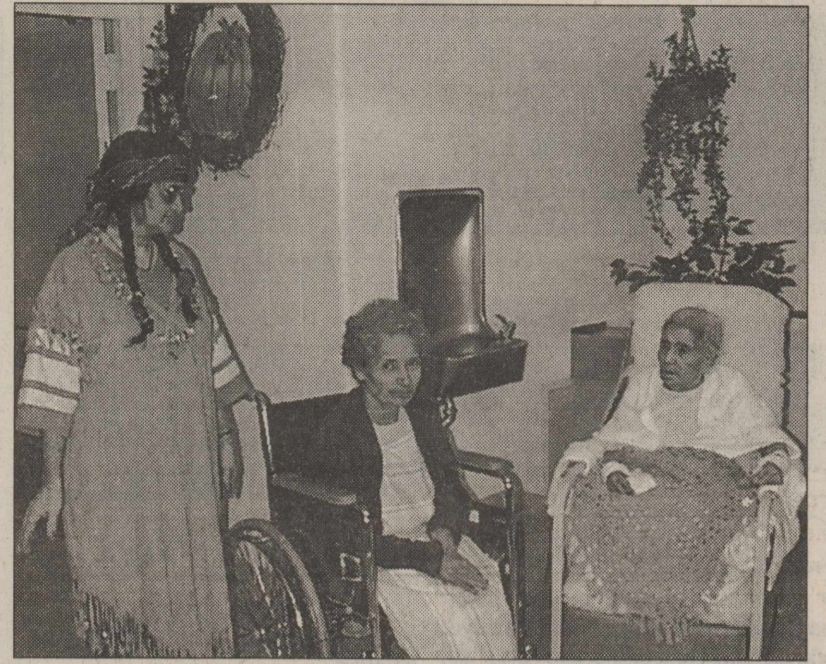

- Math teacher Deborah Ramon gives a hearty recommendation to any of John Grisham's books.

- Art teacher Kristi Ellis shows her creativity by recommending works of fantasy by J. R. R. Tolkien, *The Hobbit* and *Lord of the Rings*.

- *The Hobbit* was also selected by physical education teacher and trainer, J. D. Holtz. Coach Holtz also recommends *Comeback* by Dave Dravecky and *PT 109* by John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

- *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People* by Stephen Covey was recommended by both Coach Holtz and Coach Hargrove. Mrs. York also offers her approval of this title.

Both are excellent additions to the field of Latino young-adult literature.

Counselor David McWilliams continues to recommend *Reviving Ophelia* by Mary Pipher as a "must read" for teachers and for parents.

Have you read these books? If someone asked you, "What books have you read and loved?" what would your response be?

Ozona High School Library materials are available for all high school students and teachers. The Crockett County Public Library is available to all county residents. "The more our children and young adults read, the better educated they become, and the greater their chances of success in the competitive future that faces them," said Mrs. York. Soon the sounds of roaring crowds in open-air football arenas will emigrate into gyms across the country. The football will be replaced by the rhythmic thumping of the round ball on wooden floors. Some exciting basketball games should be shaking the new roof on Davidson Gymnasium this year.

Ozona High School's men's team returns almost every single player from a team that won its own mini-playoff to make the playoffs a year ago. It took a pair of extra victories for the team to advance, but both games were as exciting as any playoff game. The men open this year's slate by hosting the McCamey Badgers in Davidson Gym on Oct. 18, starting with the JV game at 6:00 p.m. with the varsity to follow.

The Lady Lions return a powerhouse once more and should challenge for another state title, looking to avenge a last second loss to Spearman at the regional level a year ago. Returning all-stater Amber Tarr, who is already committed to a career at Texas Tech after high school, will lead a multi-talented team as they open their season at San Angelo Central. That date is also Oct. 18 and will begin with a JV game at 6:00 p.m., followed by the varsity contest.

The middle school ranks will begin a few days ahead of the high school and those games should be just as interesting, with both 8th grade squads coming off very successful seasons. On Nov. 13 the Cubettes will travel to Eldorado for 7th and 8th grade contests starting at 5:00 p.m. The boys will remain in town, hosting Eldorado for both grades, also beginning at 5:00 p.m.

Cubs halted a Grape Creek drive at the Ozona 23. From that point they began a 77 yard march culminating in an 18 yard score by Abel Rodriguez. The PAT failed, leaving the Cubs up 6-0 at the half.

The Cubs dominated the second half. "Our kids did a lot of gang tackling," added Delgado. "A lot of hard hits made their backs run a little softer, maybe forcing them to run out side when they should have been running inside."

"Offensively," commented Coach Bachman, "I felt like this was the best game we've played all year. All the kids ran hard and the line blocked hard."

Rodriguez led a balanced rushing attack that would amass 211 yards with 69 of his own. Martin Sanchez added 47, including a 5 yard score and a 2 yard score in the fourth period. Sanchez' first tally came after Luis Cruz stepped in front of an Eagle pass, picked it off and returned it for 30 yards.

Cruz had 41 yards rushing, including an 18 yard scamper for a Cub

score at the 5:37 mark of the third stanza. Cruz also carried for the two point conversion to put the Cubs up 14-0 before the Eagles could get on the board to narrow the lead to 14-6. Jared Shafer, who ran for 34 yards, gave the Cubs a margin of comfort when he raced 24 yards for 6 points early in the fourth period. The PAT failed but the Cubs led 20-6.

After the pair of scores by Sanchez and one successful extra point kick, the Cubs led by 33-6 when Grape Creek got loose on an 80 yard touchdown run to finish the scoring at 33-12.

Other Cub runners who figured into the offensive output were Zeke Rivera with 25 and Kyle Richardson with 5. With the ground game working well, the Cubs were not forced to pass much, but Richardson was perfect for the night, completing his only throw for 5 yards to Shayne Albers.

"The kids just seemed to be real fired up, real motivated," said Coach Bachman, "and extremely focused this week, which really made a big impact on the ball game."

nullified by a clipping call. The Cubs retained possession of the ball and marched 45 yards for the tally. Koby Fenton carried this one in from the 3 yard line. The PAT failed, but the Cubs had a 14-0 lead with only 1:08 remaining in the contest.

Grape Creek returned the ensuing kickoff for 82 yards and a six-pointer, then attempted an onside kick, but the Cubs held on to the ball, then ran out the clock.

The passing game of Michael Savala included 9 completions on 11 attempts for 74 yards. Combined with Ogle's pass to Garza the Cubs had 112 yards in the air. Ogle caught 4 passes for 51 yards, Garza had the 38 yarder, Mark Gandar caught one for 15, Wilton Stokes one for 8, Derek Faught one for 7, and Fenton one for 3.

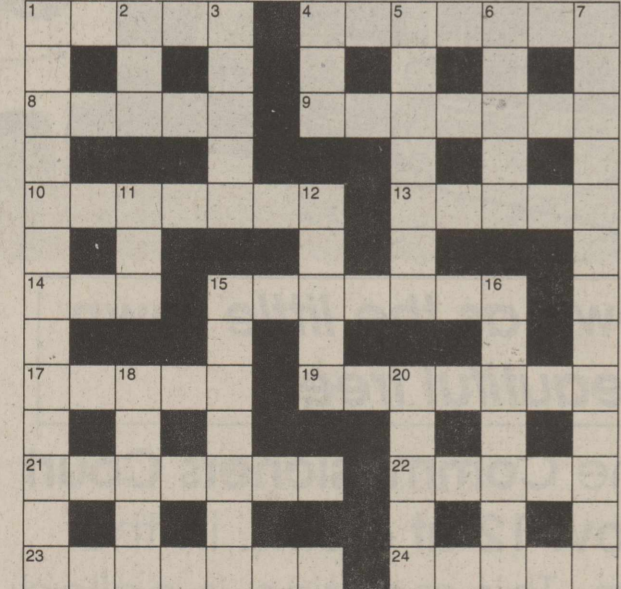

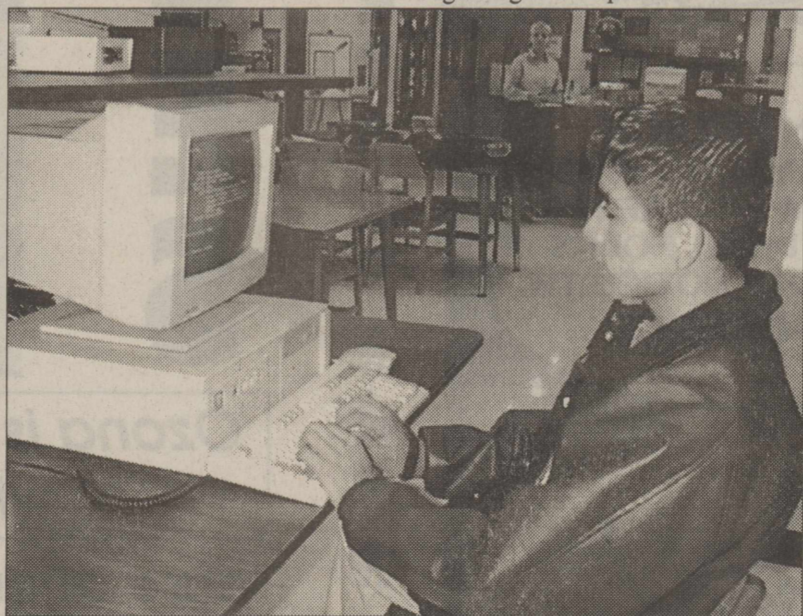

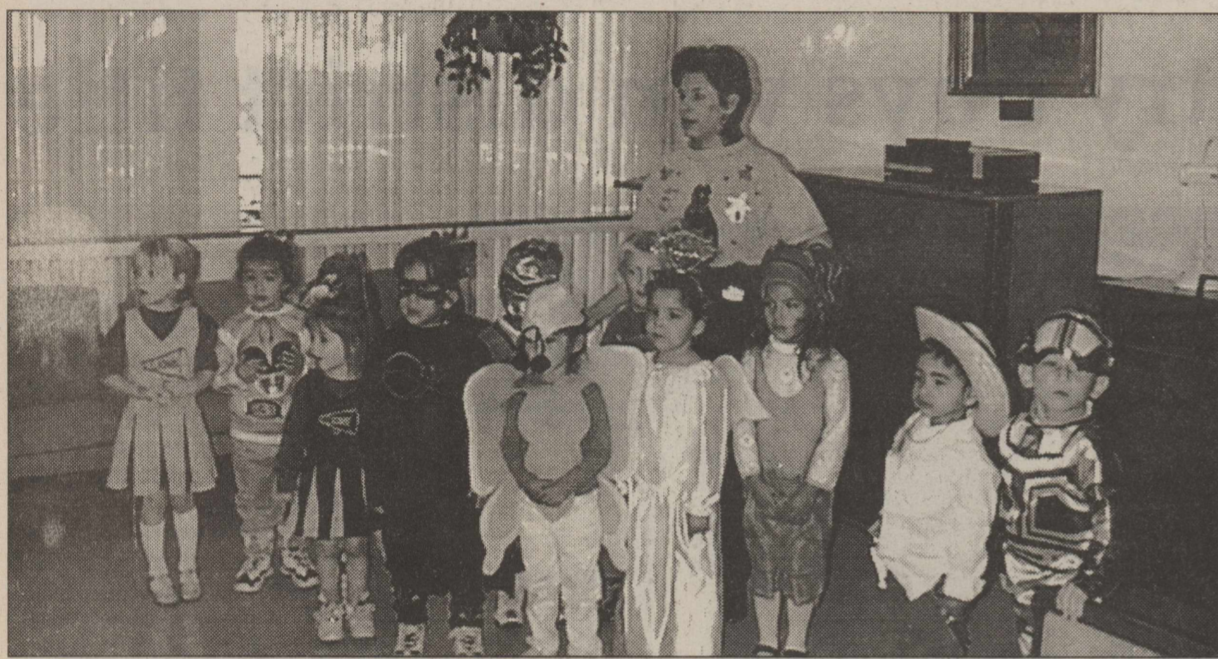

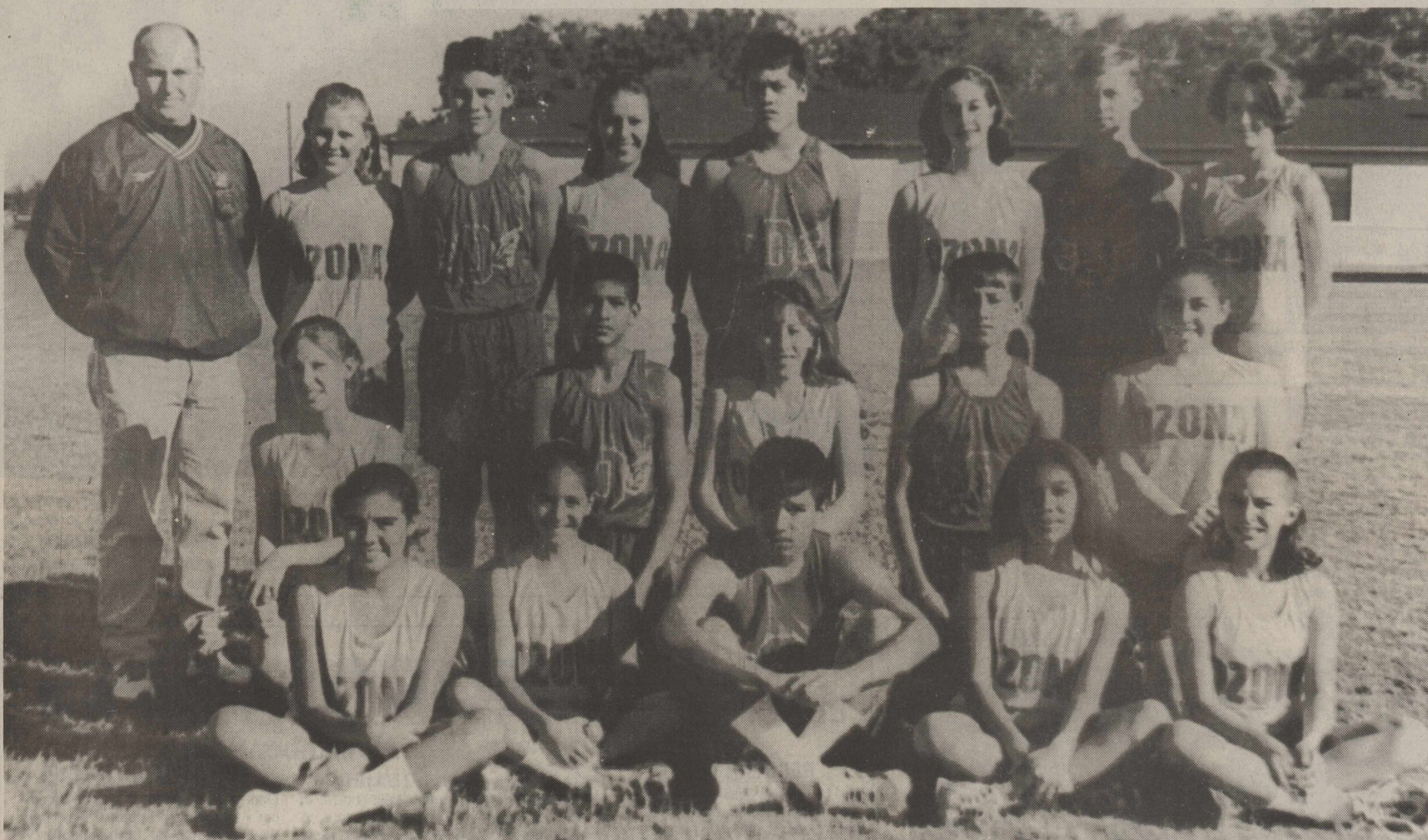

Lions drop final home game to Forsan 26-12

The Forsan Buffaloes took an early 12-0 lead over the Ozona Lions in Friday's action at Lion Stadium, then held on for a 26-12 victory in the closing moments. Ozona falls to 3-6 for the season and to 1-4 in district action.

With the game still scoreless Ozona nearly had great field position but they fumbled a punt at the Forsan 40. The missed opportunity set up a 60 yard drive by the Buffaloes, ending in a 6 yard score by Justin White with :03 to play in the opening period. The extra point gave the Buffaloes a 7-0 lead. Midway through the second quarter Brian Fielder put the Buffaloes ahead 13-0 when he hauled in a 40 yard pass from Cade Park.

On the ensuing possession Justin Browne nailed Brian Badillo in a wide open field, and Badillo outraced everyone for a 75 yard touchdown run to narrow the score to 13-6. A 19 yard kickoff return by Ferrol Voight after the score started the Buffaloes on their way to another TD with 4:44 remaining in the first half, and Forsan rebuilt their lead to 19-6.

The Lions weren't done for the night. Coach Hargrove had this to say about the effort. "Our kids played extremely hard and with a lot of effort. We had some good opportunities in the game offensively, but we did not capitalize on them."

However, the Lion's did capitalize on one opportunity late in the first half on a play that could have occurred only on Halloween night. On a possession that saw Justin Browne carry the ball 5 times for runs of 7, 12, 19, 11, and 8 and throw a pass to Kenny Vargas for 14 more, the Lions were knocking at the door. Then Browne threw an interception to Ferrol Voight,

who would have three pickoffs for the night for Forsan, and Voight attempted to run the ball back. He fumbled it at the 5 yard line, and Brian Badillo was in position to pick up the loose ball and stride untouched into the end zone for the score. At the half Ozona trailed 19-12 and was definitely in the game.

"I'm proud of our kids and their effort," commented Hargrove. "All of them, and I mean each player, played with a lot of heart, a lot of pride, and a lot of dignity. These kids do not give up. That is a real credit to this group. Myself, the staff and our players appreciate the positive support and encouragement."

Starting at their own 43 on the first possession of the third period it appeared the Lions were on the way to knotting the contest. They moved the ball well, but a series of penalties and losses stifled the attack, and Ozona turned the ball over on downs at the Forsan 18 yard line.

From that point the Buffaloes launched their final scoring drive of the evening. With 6:04 remaining in the contest, Justin White pushed through from the one yard line. The successful extra point kick closed the scoring at Forsan-26, Ozona-12.

Ross Crawford led the rushing game for Ozona with 72 yards, followed by Justin Browne with 66. In the receiving department Badillo had one snatch for 75 yards and Kenny Vargas one for 15. On the defensive side of the ball Jaime Ramos had 14 stops, and Gabe Tambunga had 10 to lead the Lions' effort. Matt Castaneda and Rusty Bishop had 8 tackles each while Browne and Ty Mitchell had 7 per man.

The Lions will close out the season when they visit the Winters Blizzards next Friday for an 8 o'clock contest. The Blizzards clinched a playoff

spot a week ago but lost the game for first place to Eldorado last Friday. Of the Blizzards Coach Hargrove noted, "Winters has an outstanding football team. They are large on the line and their backs and receivers are skilled. They will be the biggest team we have faced this year. I expect our kids to have a good week of practice and to play hard and well against them."

Yellowjackets down JV Lions 34-6

An undefeated Menard Yellowjacket junior varsity squad methodically conquered a stubborn Ozona team last Thursday in Menard, 34-6. The Jackets scored once in the opening period, twice in the second, then added two more in the final quarter, utilizing a well-balanced offensive passing and running game.

Perhaps the real story on the Ozona JV is not even on the field. As the 1997 season draws to a close the ranks of the squad have been decimated by injuries and other problems. Many players have moved to the varsity to fill gaps there.

At the key position of quarterback, four different men have taken snaps in game situations. Of those, Dustin Faught has been sidelined with an injury for several weeks, and Clay Richardson was moved to the varsity two weeks ago. Stephen Tarr had assumed the leadership role during the wild affair with Wall a week ago, but he sustained a season-ending injury to his left ankle on Ozona's third offensive possession in Menard. Casey Jamerson was called upon to take the snaps, having done so on only 8 plays prior to Thursday night.

Considering the lack of practice, Jamerson put on a good show, completing a number of passes, including a 34 yarder to Ray Ramos and a 46 yard touchdown strike to Seth Webster at the 9:50 mark of the 4th stanza. That late in the game the Lions were down by only 20, so the tally drew them to within 14 points of a tie.

The Lion defense spent a lot of time on the field, stopping an early Yellowjacket threat at the Ozona 16. Two other Menard possessions were halted at the Ozona 17 and 26 yard lines in the second half, and a Menard fumble was recovered at the Ozona 6. A weary defense gave up two late scores to the Yellowjackets, giving the impression of a one-sided contest.

The Lions' sole tally of the night was an impressive 94 yard march. Leon Garcia picked up 17 yards on one carry, then 26 on another to move the Lions to their own 43. Garcia picked up 10 more before Webster hauled in the touchdown pass from Jamerson.

Garcia closed out the evening with a total of 71 yards rushing, and Jamerson added 85 yards in the air for the Ozona offensive effort.

"Our kids didn't give up," praised Coach Casey, "they played as hard as they could."

"That was our fourth quarterback this year," added Casey, "Casey came in and did a real good job all night. I

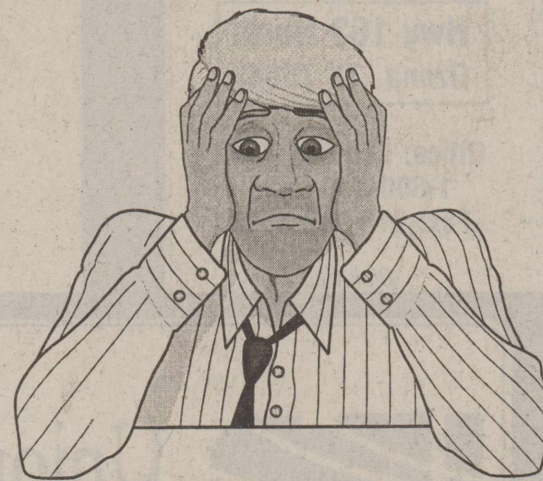

Far-West Texas counties to host predator meetings

Predator awareness workshops have been scheduled for several Far West Texas counties during November. These programs, all with similar context but in different locations, are designed to bring producers up to date on the latest control methods and information concerning livestock predators. The workshops are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The hosting counties, their meeting location and dates are:

- 1) Val Verde County - Nov. 6 at the Dink Wardlaw Agriculture Complex in Del Rio.
- 2) Ward County - Nov. 12 at the Ward County Coliseum in Monahans.
- 3) Culberson County - Nov. 13 at the Van Horn Convention Center in Van Horn.
- 4) Reagan and Crockett Counties - Nov. 18 at the Reagan County 4-H Center in Big Lake.

Each of the meetings will last from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Lunch will be served on-site. Participants who complete any of the four meetings are eligible to earn six continuing education units.

The morning programs first session topics include: "Appreciating Predators?"; "An IPM Approach to Predator Management"; and "Interpreting Physical Evidence of Predation".

Following a 10:00 a.m. break the morning session resumes with "Predator Management Alternatives".

This demonstration series addresses the M-44 device, traps and snares, calling and aerial gunning, and coping with feral hogs. The morning session concludes with a video on using the livestock protection collar.

The afternoon program includes: "Predators in the Classroom School Enrichment Module"; "Role of predator Control in Wildlife Management"; "Coping with Birds of Prey"; "Mountain Lions in Texas"; "Coping with Coyotes and Bobcats"; and "Predators as Vectors of Zoonotic Diseases".

The programs' final session features "Curbing Illicit Use of Pesticides in Predator Control Programs" (video); "A Code of Ethics for Predator Managers"; and "Predators A Matter of Perspective" (video).

The programs conclude with evaluations and completion of CEU paperwork at 4:30 p.m. Adjournment is set for 5:00 p.m.

West Texas Prospect Show scheduled for Dec. 13 in Ozona

The annual West Texas Prospect Show will be held in Ozona on Saturday, Dec. 13. Classes will be offered for market lambs and meat goats only this year - no Angora goats. To be eligible to show, exhibitors must be official 4-H members or members of FFA.

There will be no limit on the number of animals each exhibitor may enter. Entry fees are \$10 per head,

with the fees being used to cover the cost of awards. Entries are not due ahead of time. Exhibitors will fill out entry cards upon arrival at the prospect show on Dec. 13.

In the market lamb show, either ewes or wethers may be shown. Only classes for finewool and finewool cross lambs will be offered. A champion and reserve champion will be named

in each breed.

In the meat goat show, only mutation goats will be eligible for entry. A champion and reserve champion meat goat will be named.

Awards will also be given for champion and reserve champion jun-

ior and senior lamb showman and champion and reserve champion junior and senior goat showman.

Perner re-elected to SWCD

Paul Perner III was re-elected to the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on Oct. 7. Perner represents Zone Five of the district.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD, with headquarters in Ozona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district. In addition, the district serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out

its purposes.

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and procedure for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 216 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCDs programs.

Crockett County's Northeast Ozona Field gained new production when the No. 2012R Shell Clayton was completed 25 miles northeast of Ozona. Tom Brown Inc. is the operator. The new gasser flowed 150,000-CFD on a 1.125-in. choke and earned a 5,000,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 7,810 feet, it was perforated for Canyon Formation pay, 7,420 to 8,540 feet into the wellbore.

Sonat Exploration Co. has completed the No. 2 Baggett "2" about 12 miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Hunt Baggett Field. It flowed 808,000-CF gas daily on a 1.375-in. choke and was rated at 892,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Sonat took the hole to a 9,900-ft. bottom and perforated the Strawn Formation to produce at 9,462 to 9,544 feet into the hole.

Lomak Production Co. has posted first production reports for the No. 6 W. E. Fiend "A", seven miles south of Big Lake in Crockett County's North Weger Field. It pumped 27 barrels of oil per day. Bottomed at 2,670 feet, the well will produce from 2,249 to 2,318 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 18 A. R. Kincaid Trust has been brought on line three miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Southeast Ozona Field. Texaco Exploration & Production Co. is the operator. The new gas well was rated at 471,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke and earned a 1,775,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. It was taken to a 6,550-ft. bottom and will produce from a Canyon Sand Formation interval, 6,138 to 6,300 feet into the hole.

Operating out of Fort Worth, Union Pacific Resources has staked location for a couple of developmental wells in Crockett County's Ozona Field. The No. 2 Bean

"2" is located 16.5 miles southwest of Ozona in a 320-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-4608. It is under authority for 9,800 feet total depth. Located in a 160-acre lease 28.5 miles southwest of Ozona in the T&STL Survey A-4175, the No. 5 Moody Minerals "21B" carries permit for 7,450 feet of hole making.

The same operator recently posted first production figures for six new wells, also in Crockett County's Ozona Field. The No. 2 Moody Minerals "29", 32.2 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed at the rate of 201,000-CFD on a .75-in. choke and was rated at 213,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 7,116 feet, it will produce from 5,746 to 6,936 feet into the hole.

With 6,916 feet total depth, the No. 1 Childress "8D" flowed 494,000-CFD on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 452,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke. Located 24.1 miles southwest of Ozona, it will produce from 5,884 to 6,396 feet into the wellbore.

The well designated the No. 14 C. C. Montgomery "11S" is located 18 miles southwest of Ozona and was drilled a total of 6,627 feet. It flowed 313,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was rated at 340,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It will produce from 6,280 to 6,394 feet into the hole.

Bottomed at 6,617 feet, the No. 15 C. C. Montgomery "11S" is 17.8 miles southwest of Ozona. It earned a 611,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow and yielded 413,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke. The well will produce from 6,210 to 6,380 feet into the hole.

Located 10.6 miles southwest of Ozona, the No. 5H Couch "D" earned a 5,042,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 4,099,000-CFD on a 2.25-in. choke. It was taken to a 12,131-ft. bottom and will produce from 9,000 to 11,971 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 3H University 32-18 was assigned an absolute open flow evaluation of 889,000-CFD and indicated ability to flow 685,000 CF gas daily on a 1.75-in. choke. It was bottomed at 11,210 feet and will produce from 9,876 to 10,920 feet into the hole.

Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field will gain new production when the No. 802 Daniel is spudded 38 miles southwest of Ozona with Silver Oil & Gas Co. of San Angelo as the operator. Location is a 485-acre lease in the TCRR Survey A-5402. Canyon Formation will be the target at a depth of 6,200 feet.
