

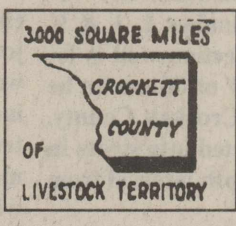

Airport improvements nearing completion

Construction of runway, taxiway and a parking apron at Ozona Municipal Airport are nearing completion according to Mary Joan Hearne, flight base operator. Painting of lines and numbers on the runway was halted temporarily to wait for a surface coating to cure, Mrs. Hearne said. The treatment, which is being applied at several airports in West Texas, is supposed to extend the life of the surface.

Ozona Municipal Airport was instituted in its present location north of town in the mid-1950's when Dick and Ethel Henderson gave the county a 99-year lease on their airstrip and surrounding land. When J. Cleo Thompson bought the Henderson Ranch in 1968, this lease contract continued to be honored.

This lease remained in effect until December 1996 when it was terminated by the granting to the county of the original airport and enough additional land to make up 143 acres, the amount required to meet a matching grant from the Texas Department of Aviation and the Federal Aviation Administration.

Value of the land was allowed as part of the county's 10% share of the two and one-half million dollar project.

The engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Midland represented the county throughout the design and construction phases. After the design was completed and accepted

by the involved parties, bids were requested, and Reece Albert Inc. of San Angelo became the prime contractor. Doyle Lovell is resident project representative.

Construction began in October of 1997. "The threat of 'El Niño' was omnipresent, and plans included extensions for rain, etc.," said Mrs. Hearne's husband, Jim. There have been no rain delays.

Grass planting was underway late last week, and water line from town was installed. Water has previously been supplied from a well on the Thompson Ranch.

Once the contractor releases the airport to the county, the removal of the remainder of the old runway will take place. Final grading of drainage ditches, completion of the deer-proof fence and removing old runway make up the major portion of the project remaining to be completed.

The new runway is 6,000 feet by 75 feet with a new parking apron with 15 tie-downs and connecting taxiways. Grant funds would only pay for a 5,700 foot runway. The additional 300 feet is being paid for by J. Cleo Thompson.

Paving material was hot mix provided by Reece Albert and resulted in a very smooth surface. Runway alignment is "16" southbound and "34" northbound, which are the prevailing winds at Ozona.

New runway lights are medium intensity which dim to low intensity to

Who has the biggest snakes?

County shows sales increase 13.4% over 1996

Crockett County recorded sales increases in all industries and the retail trade division during the third quarter of 1997 according to a recently released report from the state comptroller's office.

The 126 reporting outlets for all industries had gross sales of \$13,373,071, up 13.4% from the 1996 gross sales of \$11,792,961 from 139 outlets.

In the retail trade division, Crockett County had 77 reporting outlets with \$7,863,455 in sales for the third quarter of 1997. This is up 15.9% from \$6,783,933 reported by 83 outlets for

the same period in 1996.

Third quarter statistics for neighboring counties follows.

Crane - 1997 down 18.7% with 61 outlets reporting \$6,518,478 in sales compared to 68 outlets and \$8,014,314 in 1996

Irion - 1997 down 6.5% with 23 outlets reporting \$819,586 in sales compared to 25 outlets and \$876,746 in 1996

Reagan - 1997 down 1.0% with 49 outlets reporting \$7,270,739 in sales compared to 55 outlets and \$7,345,834 in 1996

Sutton - 1997 up 11.3% with 82

outlets reporting \$7,453,134 in sales compared to 87 outlets and \$6,695,818 in 1996

Terrell - 1997 down 11.1% with 26 outlets reporting \$852,740 in sales compared to 27 outlets and \$959,338 in 1996

Upton - 1997 up 32.2% with 62 outlets reporting \$4,497,050 in sales compared to 72 outlets and \$3,401,192 in 1996

Val Verde - 1997 up 2.1% with 437 outlets reporting \$72,857,276 in sales compared to 72 outlets and \$71,383,874 in 1996

In accordance with law, the School Board of Trustees, at their regular meeting on February 11, 1998, ordered an election to be held on May 2, 1998, for the purpose of electing a school board trustee for Single Member District No. 1, Single Member District No. 6, and Single Member District No. 7. No proposition was to appear on the ballot.

In 1995, the Texas Legislature amended the Election Code to permit the cancellation of an election if the candidates on the ballot are unopposed and no write-in candidates have filed to challenge them and if no proposition is to appear on the ballot. This new law is in Section 2.051-.054 of the Election Code.

On March 24, 1998, the Business Manager for the School District certified to the Board of Trustees that Elliott Barrera had no opposing candidate for District No. 1, Wade Richardson had no opposing candidate for District No. 6, and Dr. Marcus Sims had no opposing candidate for District No. 7, and no write-in candidate had filed to be placed on a list of write-in candidates.

Therefore, by action of the Board of Trustees at their regular meeting held April 14, 1998, the above-named unopposed candidates were declared elected to office. The Certification of Election, signed by the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, will be posted at the polling place on May 2, 1998.

Sonora Federal Land Bank announces merger

Nancy has worked as a contract postal carrier for 11 years and is still going. She is a member of the Canasta Club and Preceptor Mu Chi.

"My children each have a favorite food I prepared from mashed potatoes to beef and cheese enchiladas my son loves to chicken and dumplings, chicken and rice casserole to chili my girls like.

"My niece Tonya Bullard's favorite and she has an order in for my holiday standard yeast rolls.

Nancy's Yeast Rolls

1/3 c. warm water 110 degrees to 115 degrees
2 pkg. dry yeast

1/2 c. lukewarm milk, scalded (This means bring to a boil then cool it down. This is necessary to destroy enzymes.)

1/4 to 1/2 c. sugar depending on how sweet you like

2 tsp. salt
2 eggs
1/2 c. soft shortening
7 to 7 1/2 c. flour

In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in water. In another bowl, measure flour by dip-level-pour method or by sifting. (I sift the dip-level-pour.) Set aside. Add milk, sugar, salt, eggs, shortening to yeast. Add 1/2 of flour. Mix with spoon until smooth.

Add enough flour to handle dough easily. Turn onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth, about 5 min. Round up in a lightly greased bowl. This means pull each side up from the bottom after putting into the greased bowl, then turn over so that the top is not the bottom.

Cover with a cloth. This keeps the dough from drying out. Let rise in a warm place (about 85 degrees) until double in size. Takes about 1 1/2 hours. If kitchen is cool, place dough on a rack over a bowl of hot water and cover completely with a towel.

Punch dough down. Let rise again until almost double, about 30 min. Shape. (I just tear off a piece of dough and roll out in my hand about 1/2 size of a biscuit, but thicker space to give room to rise. Place in lightly greased pan, baking sheet or muffin pan. Let rise 15 to 20 min. Heat oven 400

degrees. Bake 12 to 15 min.

This takes lots of time, planning, but the rave reviews will be worth the work.

Next is my son's favorite, favorite cake, coconut without the coconut. You see, my son loves coconut, but he hates the coconut flakes to get in between his teeth, so I just add flavoring and leave out the flaked coconut.

Coconut Pound Cake

5 eggs
2 c. sugar
1 c. oil
2 c. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 tsp. coconut flavoring
1/4 c. water

Mix in order listed. Mix well, beat well. Bake at 350 degrees one hour in a Bundt pan. Test for doneness.

While cake is baking and about 5 min. before done, prepare glaze.

1 c. powdered sugar
1/4 c. oleo
1/2 c. water
1 tsp. coconut flavoring.

Bring to hard boil and boil 1 min. Pour over cake while both are still warm and cake is in cake pan. Be sure to pour around wall of cake pan. When cake has cooled a little, turn out into plate.

One of Monica's favorites is my chicken and rice casserole. This recipe is difficult for me because I don't measure. It depends on who is eating and what they like. I boil a chicken or a piece of chicken depending on how many.

To the boiling water I add about 4 chicken bouillon cubes, 1 tsp. poultry seasoning, 2 tsp. garlic powder or salt, 1/2 a chicken or 4 meaty pieces. Boil until chicken is done - about 1/2 hour. You can use canned chicken, about 4 cans.

Now I cook rice, the old fashioned kind, according to directions using my chicken broth instead of plain water and butter. If I'm watching the fat, I cook the broth ahead and refrigerate and skim off the fat. I cook 1 c. of rice in 2 cups of broth.

De-bone cooked chicken, add chicken and rice, 1 small chopped onion, 1 lg. jar of diced pimientos (or 1/2 jar), cut up some fresh mushrooms, 1/2 to 1 c. Add chicken broth and milk to cover to top of chicken mixture in a casserole dish. Season to taste with garlic salt, pepper, and a pinch of poultry seasoning and bake at 350 degrees covered for 30 min. until onions are done. Rest is already done.

We serve this with crackers and choice of vegetables. Freezes well for later.

A Prophecy Fulfilled

"Strike the shepherd that the sheep may be scattered" (Zechariah 13:7). These are words spoken about Christ over 500 years before His birth. How is this possible? These words were spoken by a true prophet of God. They are therefore words of God. They were explicitly fulfilled.

not resist and was taken, the disciples "all left Him and fled" (Mark 14:50). So it was that these words spoken about Jesus over 500 years beforehand were fulfilled in intimate detail.

This is wonderful evidence concerning the truth of the Bible. It is confirmation that the Bible is the Word of God. Only God could give us words that are infallibly fulfilled. Therefore, they are words "to which you do well to pay attention" (2 Peter 1:19).

Weather spotter class prepares for tornado season New championship roping caps here

Approximately 35 people attended a severe weather spotter class here earlier this month. For many of the emergency personnel in the county, this was a refresher, but there were others who saw the dramatic slides and videos and heard the information for the first time.

Buddy McIntyre with the National Weather Service in San Angelo conducted the class at Crockett County Courthouse using videos and slides in teaching what to look for, how tornadoes form, about lightning and what severe weather can do.

Law enforcement personnel, EMS and fire department members were on hand along with other interested citizens.

Citizens need to be aware of tornado danger signs such as large hail, a cloud of debris or roaring noise. Powerful thunderstorms create torna-

does and large hail. Tornadoes often come from near the hail-producing portion of a storm. A cloud of debris can mark the location of a tornado even if a funnel is not visible, and a tornado's high winds can cause a roar that sounds like a freight train. The wind may die down, the calm before the storm, and the air may become very still before a tornado strikes.

If a tornado warning is issued, you should go to a safe place and turn on a battery-operated radio and wait for further instruction.

If you are at home, go to the lowest level of your home. If you have no basement, go to an inner hallway or a smaller inner room without windows, such as a bathroom or closet. Get away from windows.

Go to the center of the room. Stay away from corners, which attract debris.

Get under a sturdy piece of furniture, such as a heavy table or workbench. Hang onto it.

Use arms to protect head and neck. If you are in a mobile home during a tornado, get out and find other shelter. If shelter is not available, lie in a ditch or low-lying area a safe distance from the mobile home.

If you are at work or school and a tornado warning is issued, go to the basement or to an inside hallway at the lowest level.

Avoid places with wide-span roofs such as auditoriums, cafeterias large hallways or shopping malls. If you are in such a place, try to get up against something that will support or deflect the debris.

Do not use elevators. If you are outdoors during a tornado, get inside a building if possible. If no shelter is available, lie in a ditch or low-lying area or crouch near a strong building. Crouch in order to make yourself a small target for flying debris. If you are in a low-lying area, watch out for flooding. Use arms to protect neck and head.

If you are in a car during a tornado, don't try to outrun the tornado. Tornadoes can change direction quickly. Get out of the vehicle immediately and seek shelter in a building, or lie in a ditch or low-lying area away from the vehicle.

Families should develop an emergency communication plan. If family members are separated from one another during a tornado, have a plan for getting back together.
