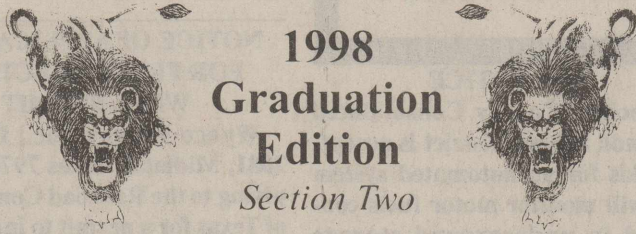

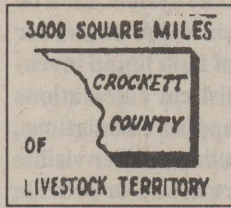

You BECOME 21, you TURN 30, you're PUSHING 40, you REACH 50...and your dreams are gone.

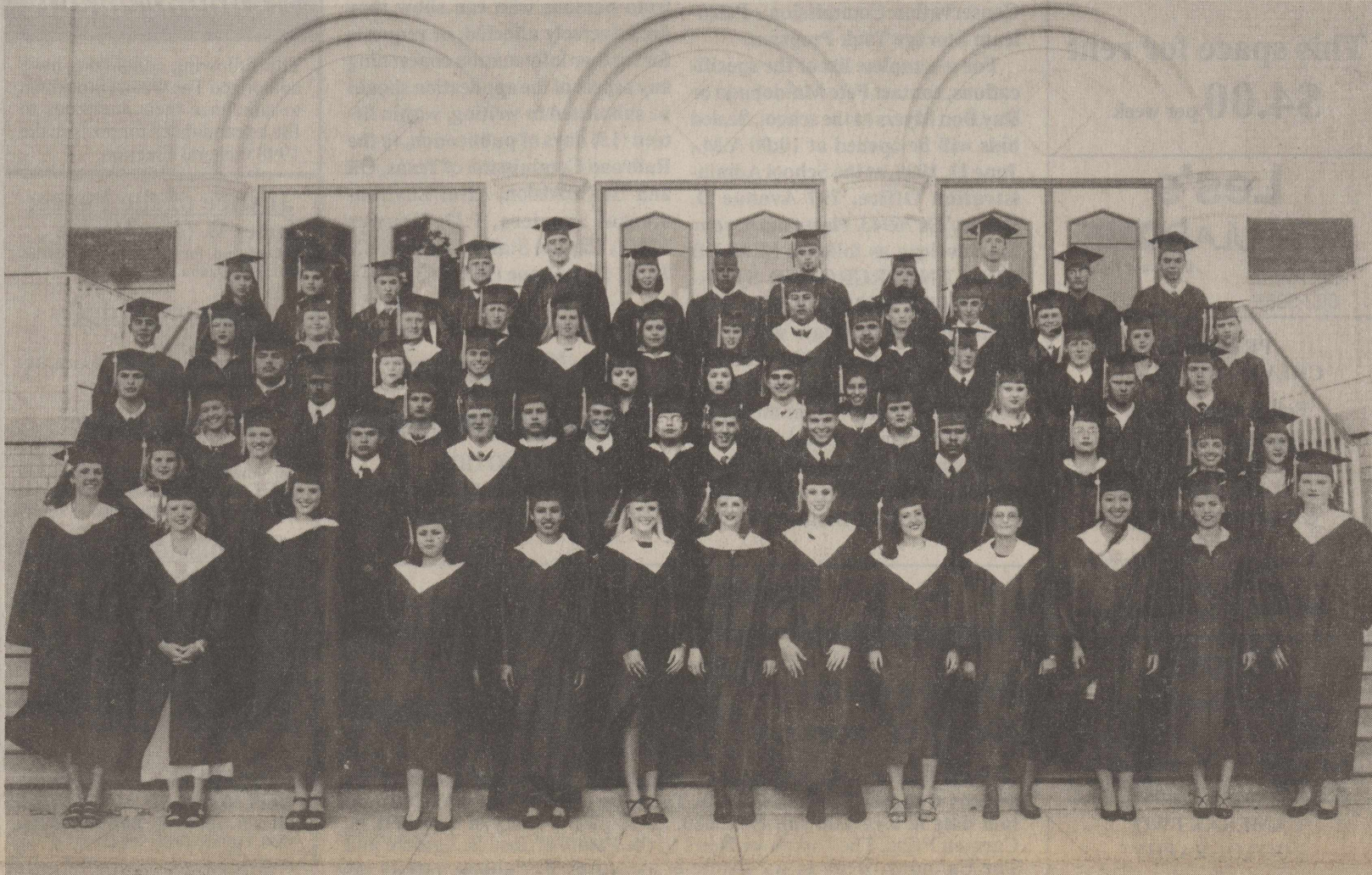

Lady Lion linksters make it a bronze

Led by two outstanding rounds of golf from Kristy Pridemore Ozona's Lady golfers picked up a bronze medal at the state competition in Austin this past week. Pridemore scored a personal best of 80 strokes in the first round, then followed that with an 81 for a total of 161 for the two days. Pridemore finished third in the individual scores.

The all-senior squad faced a daunting challenge from Hamilton and Quanah, both teams turning in super performances for first and second respectively. The Lady Lions actually marked within a few strokes of last year's championship score and played extremely well on the second day as they attempted to make up ground lost in the opening round, but the competition was fierce.

Coach Rodney Johnson said the girls played very well in that opening round, getting off the tee and down the fairways in great shape, but struggled some with their putting game. Lauren Wilkins shot an 87 on day one then improved by 4 strokes for an 83 on the second day. Her 170 was good for a seventh place spot in the individual results.

Melissa Childress also improved by 4 strokes in the second round, shooting 93 and 89 respectively. Haley Holden, a newcomer to the team this year who steadily improved with each tournament, shot rounds of 108 and

102. Loretta Stewart, the remaining veteran on the team, shot 112 on both days.

The state event ended a great run

by this class of seniors in their four high school years. Most of them now have a medal of each color, gold, silver and bronze, to cherish for the rest

of their lives. Coach Johnson will be looking for some new names with new faces to fill some really big shoes next year.

Jan Van Shoubrouek--Cook-of-the-Week

Jan Van Shoubrouek and her husband, Fred, spent 32 years in Southern California. Now that they are back in their home town, she finds that they entertain more at home. In California, entertaining was geared to restaurants although she did prepare chili for Eastern neighbors who had never eaten any, said Jan.

At one party they hosted in California, the Van Shoubroueks served lamb, cabrito, fried venison, venison sausage, plain Texas cream gravy, rice, potatoes, frijoles and salsa, and their guests "went crazy over this", said Jan. Californians are accustomed to using a lot more spices than found in this Texas meal.

"It's fun being home cooking more for friends," she exclaims.

Jan wasn't always such a proficient cook. She and several of her friends remember well the day she blew up the pressure cooker in Mrs. Hull's home economics class.

"There were potatoes all over the ceiling. I've progressed a lot since then."

Learning new things at Ozona Garden Club meetings are a pleasure for Jan. She currently serves as vice-chairman of the health care board and is busy enjoying being with teenage grandsons in San Angelo about two days a week. When possible, she travels with Fred to consultant jobs. He retired from Douglas Aircraft as chief engineer of the space station project. He still consults for the company, which was bought by Boeing.

Here are some of Jan's favorite recipes.

Texas Chili

4 lbs. ground beef, regular or coarse ground
1 lg. onion
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 tsp. ground oregano
1 tsp. comino seed
3 T chili powder
2 cans enchilada sauce
2 c. water or chicken broth
Salt and pepper to taste
Brown ground beef, chopped onion and minced garlic, add spices, sauce and water. Cook for 2 to 3 hours. Skim fat off as chili cooks

Sour Milk Corn Bread

2 c. flour
2 c. corn meal
2 c. buttermilk
1 lg. egg
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
1 T oil
Mix flour, cornmeal, salt, soda. Add beaten egg and 2 cups buttermilk. Heat oil in pan in oven (she uses a large iron skillet to cook corn bread). Pour heated oil in mixture, stir and pour back in pan. Bake at 400° for 25 minutes.

California Crisp

1 c. flour plus 2 T set aside
1 1/2 to 1 3/4 c. sugar to taste
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 beaten egg
5 to 6 cups fruit - sliced peaches and strawberries or combine different fruits

1/4 c. butter
Stir together 1 c. flour, 1 c. sugar, baking powder and salt in large mixing bowl for topping. Stir mix with fork until crumbly. Stir reserved sugar (the 1/2 to 3/4 c. as per your taste) and the reserved 2 T flour into fruit. Place in ungreased 10x8 pan. Sprinkle crisp mixture evenly over fruit mixture. Drizzle melted butter evenly over topping. Bake at 375° for 40 minutes until golden.

Lentil Stew

2 smoked ham hocks and chopped smoked sausage
1 lb. lentils
2 med. onions, chopped
1 bay leaf
2 1/2 quarts water
1/4 tsp. black peppercorns
1/4 tsp. whole allspice
8 whole cloves (Put spices in tea ball)
2 c. diced and peeled carrots
2 c. diced and peeled potatoes
Salt to taste
Combine ham, sausage, lentils, onions, bay leaf, tea ball holding spices and water in large Dutch oven. Bring to boil, simmer covered for 1 1/2 hours, stirring often. Add vegetables, cover and simmer 1 hour. Bone ham hocks and return meat to stew. Makes 10-12 servings.

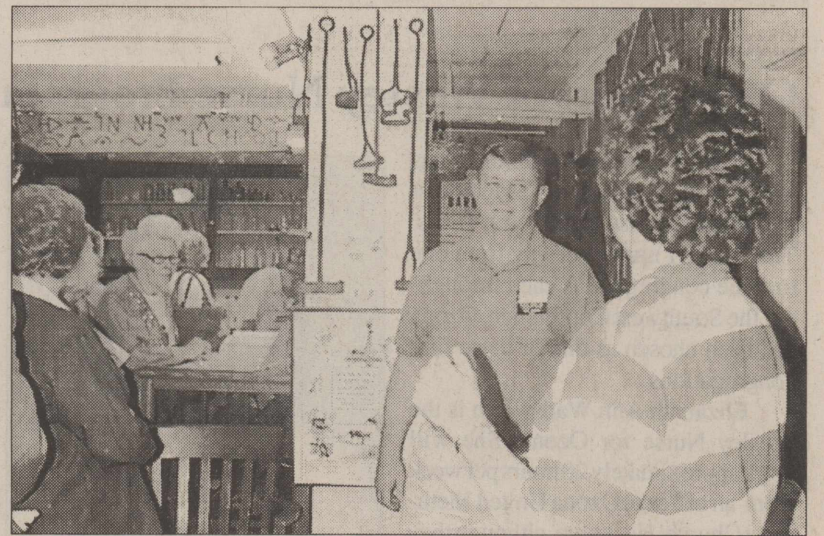

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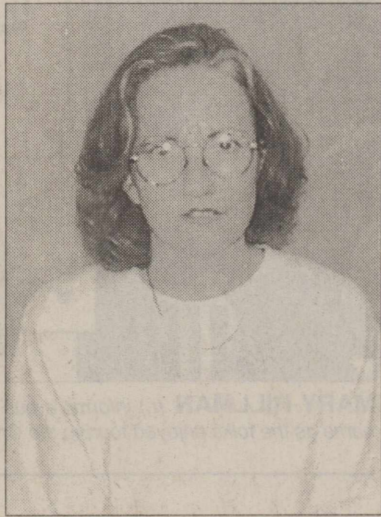

Ozona part of Wesley Nurse Program

The Southwest Conference has begun a new ministry - Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas. There are 31 nurses serving from one to three congregations each throughout the Southwest Conference. Ozona has been chosen as one of these first congregations.

Elizabeth Ann Wadsworth is the Wesley Nurse for Ozona. She will work approximately 20 hours per week from an office at Ozona United Methodist Church. Her hours, although they won't all be in office hours, are from 8 a.m. to noon on Tuesday and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday. Housecalls Health Care will be at the office on Tuesday from 9 to 11 a.m. to do free blood pressure and blood sugar checks. Katharine Russell is at the church office Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until noon, and there will be an answering machine on the remainder of the time if Mrs. Wadsworth is not there.

Services provided through the Wesley Nurse program are to educate and coordinate preventative healthcare for the congregation and the community. The outreach focus is for working people who are not insured through work and cannot afford private insurance and do not qualify for state and federal programs. "I will be here to educate them on ways they can improve their health, and finding funds and services to provide them with needed health care," said Mrs. Wadsworth.



Mrs. Wadsworth welcomes input from citizens regarding interests and subjects with which they need help. "Some ideas that come to my mind are specific disease education such as diabetes; support groups such as death and dying, dealing with retirement, dealing with teens, teens dealing with peer pressure or parent pressure; health promotion such as nutrition, exercise, Bible study and individual teaching on individual medicines and treatments. The list is limited only by you. If you don't tell me, I don't know."

Wesley Nurse is based upon the Parish Nurse ministry begun by the Lutheran Church approximately 15 years ago. Placement of Wesley Nurses

is based on the medical needs of a community. Towns having the program are San Antonio with 10 nurses, Buchanan Dam, Bastrop, Edna, Rockport, Brady, Austin, Lockhart, Victoria, Corpus Christi, Mission, McAllen, Brownsville, Kingsville, Laredo, Beeville, Eagle Pass, Kerrville and Ozona.

Serving Humanity to Honor God is the title of the mission statement of Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas.

"We are here to improve individual and family health in South Texas.

"We have a duty to develop and maintain a thorough understanding of the constantly changing health resources available to people in our region.

"We are charged to use this understanding to provide innovative and effective physical, mental and spiritual resources. Our services, above all, promote healing and wellness. We educate, empower and nurture wholeness of body, mind, and spirit among all people, with particular concern for lasting benefits to those least-served in our geographic area."

Elizabeth Ann and Kenny Wadsworth came to Ozona four years ago. He is the license and weight man with the DPS. They have three children: Cole 16, Millie 14 and Dean 10. Mrs. Wadsworth is a native of Lomax, and he is from Devine. She is a graduate of Howard College of Big Spring with an associate in nursing degree.

May 16 service for Wilma West Carson

Wilma West Carson passed away Friday, May 15, 1998, in the Crockett County Care Center.

Funeral service was Saturday at 4 p.m. in Ozona First Baptist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery. Arrangements were by Preddy Funeral Home.

Wilma West was born Jan. 29, 1901. She was the last survivor of a pioneer family who came to Crockett County in 1890. Wilma had two brothers, Wayne and Robert Massie, and one sister, Alice West Baker. The true pioneer spirit brought this family to settle in Crockett County and Val Verde County. Wilma's mother and grandparents, Sam and Alice Smith, helped organize Ozona and also the First Baptist Church.

Wilma attended school in Juno and Ozona. She graduated valedictorian of the 1918 class in Ozona High School and attended Baylor University.

She married Ira Melosent Carson Dec. 29, 1920. Ira Carson preceded Wilma in death March 7, 1975. Ira and Wilma lived on a ranch north of Ozona and later moved to Val Verde County in 1923. She was active in several organizations, contributing much to the community through her work in the First Baptist Church, Parent-Teacher Association, Music Club, Garden Club, the Historical Society and was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, tracing back to a fifth cousin to Sam Houston.

The love of her family was shown through photography, making many pictures of family and historical interests. Some of the pictures were used in the History of Crockett County book.

Wilma wrote a book in 1966 called *Ozona*. The profits benefited the Crockett County Historical Society and the Fort Lancaster Development Society. She was in the process of gathering materials to publish a second book on wildflowers when she became ill.

All who knew Wilma remember many programs she gave with slides of her travels and flowers. The artistic talent was reflected in her oil paintings.

Wilma's patriotic pride still



showed when she voted in the primary election at the age of 93.

Ira and Wilma Carson had three children who survive her, Crystelle Carson Childress and husband, James R. Childress (deceased), Eloise Carson Clegg and husband, W. R. Clegg, and William James (Bill) Carson and wife, Norma Champion Carson. She is also survived by her grandchildren, Bob Childress, Carmen Sutton, Bill Carson Jr., Bonnie Baldrige and Chris Beckham; great-grandchildren Ira Childress, Clay Childress, Heather Hill, Cody Sutton, Steffy Sutton, Julie Lawford, Haley and Chelsey Najjar, Amanda Carson, Barbi Sprinkle, Brook Culbertson, B. J. Baldrige; one sister-in-law, Mrs. Oma Carson Ford, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Faith, Hope and Love always prevailed in the Wilma and Ira Carson home.

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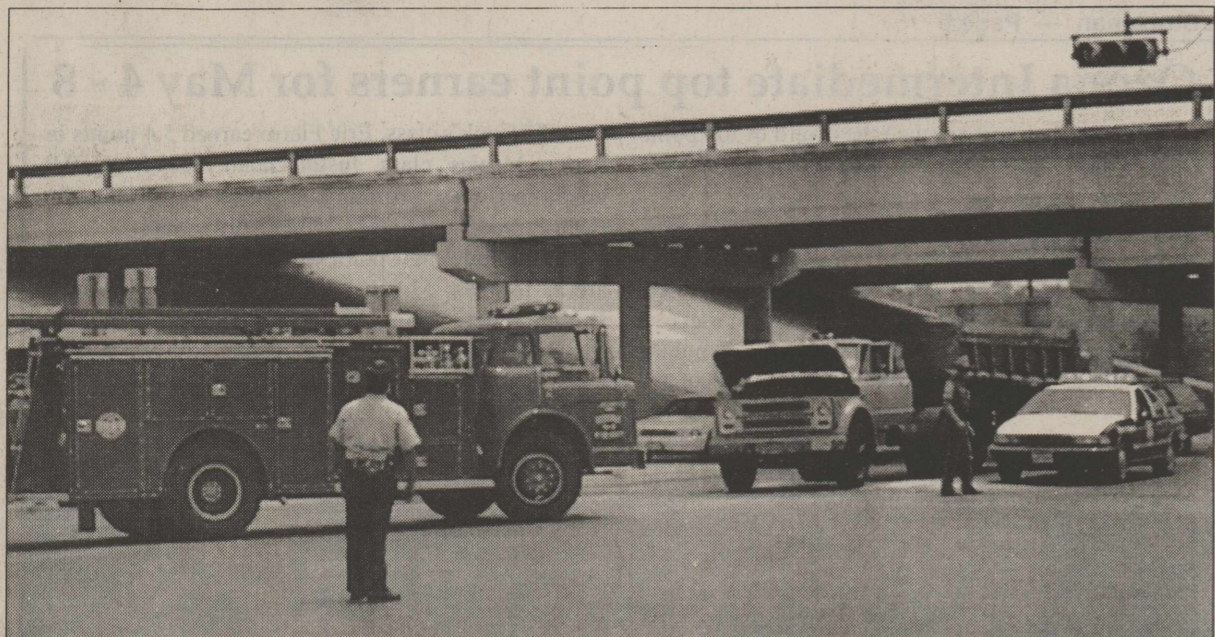

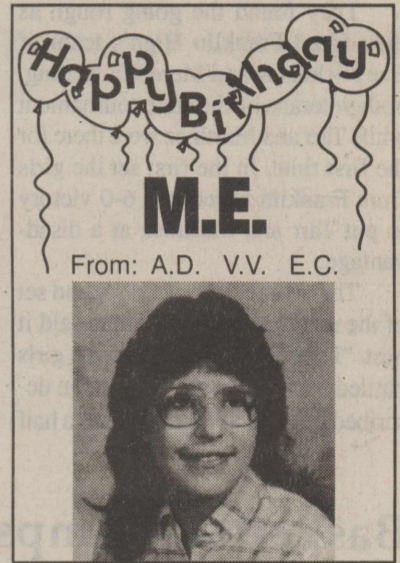

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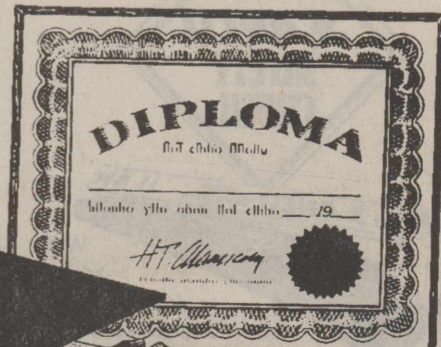
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Ozona Intermediate library program year best ever

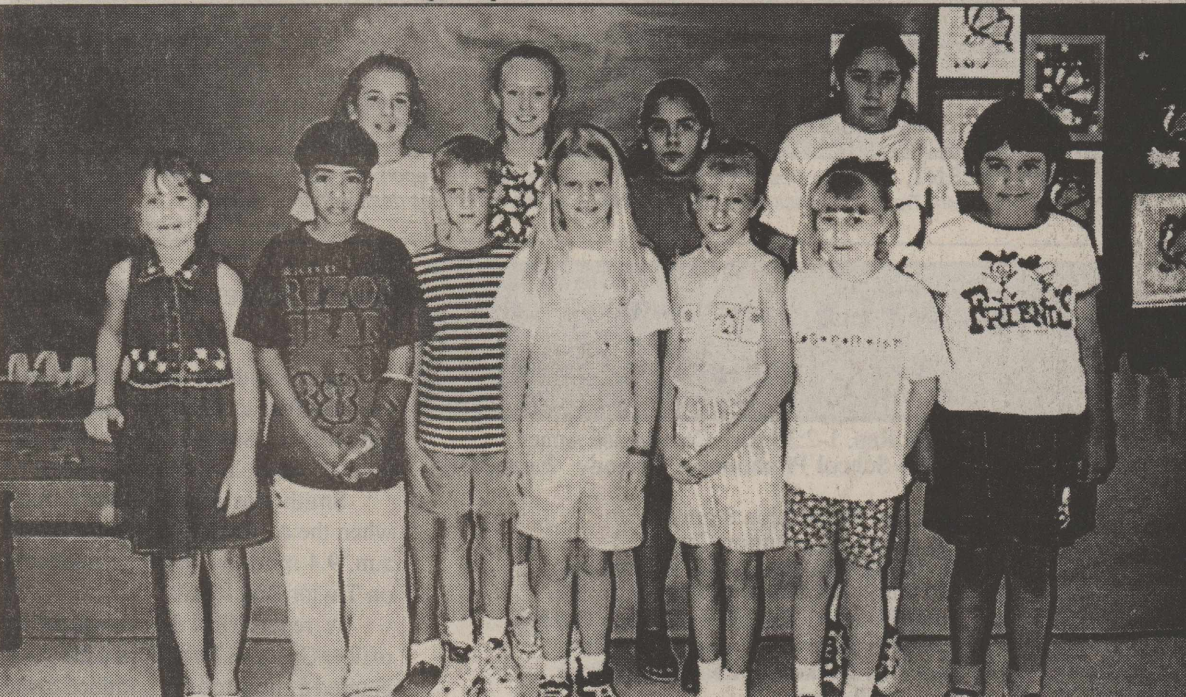

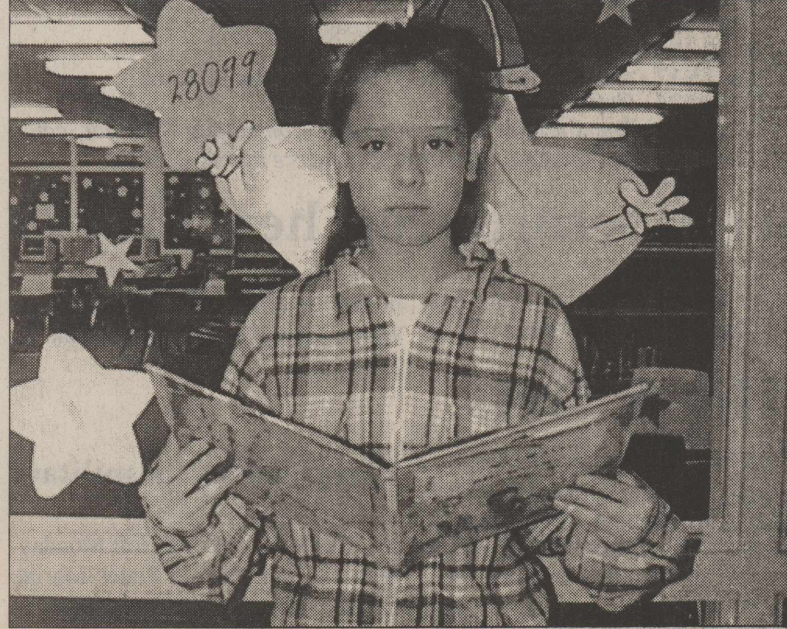

Star testing conducted in the OIS Library

All students in the Ozona Intermediate School were tested three times this school year with the computerized Standardized Test for Assessment of Reading (STAR). The first round of testing at the beginning of the school year determined the appropriate reading level for each individual student. All books in the library are color coded according to reading level. With information garnered with the STAR test, students were given the appropriate beginning point for their choice of library books.

The test was also given in January and May in order to track the reading abilities of each child. This assists the teachers and children in maintaining correct instructional reading levels for each individual.

Most of the students gained from one to four reading levels this year. Matthew Harris-Cane, a fourth grade student, began the year with a first month sixth grade independent reading level and ended the year with a first month 11th grade level, clearly an outstanding feat. Jared Bird, a fifth grade student, began the year with a first month sixth grade independent reading level and ended the year with an astounding first month 12th grade level.

The STAR test has been very helpful in determining the reading level for each student, as well as providing an incentive to beat their own previous score.

CROCKETT COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1 IMPROVEMENT POLICY

A. General: Administration and enforcement of this policy is the responsibility of the Manager or his authorized representative(s).

B. All Improvements: water and sewer, shall conform to TNRCC and District specifications and are subject to District inspection throughout the design and construction process.

C. Failure to Comply: Failure to comply with the regulations established by the District shall result in rejection of improvements offered for dedication.

D. Definitions:

BOARD-The "Board" shall mean the Board of Directors of the Crockett County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, consisting of five (5) elective members.

Developer-means a person who subdivides land or requests more than two water or sewer service connections on a single contiguous tract of land.

District-Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1

Service Applicant-means a person, other than a developer, who applies for retail water or sewer utility service.

TNRCC-Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission.

UTILITY IMPROVEMENTS WITHIN THE

1. Where a service applicant desires to improve a single property lying entirely within the District boundaries and where this property cannot be construed to be part of, or a result of, a subdivision of a larger tract, the following shall define the extent of District participation in said improvement(s):

A. The District will furnish material and labor for installing the first one hundred (100) feet of service or extension, but same shall not be accumulative to subsequent purchasers or assigns. The service applicant will be responsible for all excavation including the first one hundred (100) feet, as well as any materials and appurtenances for the extension beyond the first one hundred (100) as required for the extension.

B. All extensions will conform to District specifications if applicable, and are subject to inspection by representatives from the District throughout the installation process.

C. All tap fees and deposits must be paid in advance. Priorities will be set by the District and all District work will be done on a priority basis.

D. The District will install meter coupling and unspecified length of pipe not to exceed twelve (12) inches on customer side. The owner/Customer must install a manual cutoff for owner/customer use when making repairs or during times of an emergency on the private side of the line.

E. Upon completion to the Districts specifications. The District will assume ownership and control of the new sewer and/or water mains, meters, and other appurtenances associated with the extension, and any new connections to the main will be made to District specifications. Tap fees will be retained by the District for new connections.

F. All mains will be located within the County owned streets and alleys or upon easement granted to the District in writing and properly recorded at the County Clerks office.

2. Where a developer, who subdivides land or request more than two (2) water or sewer connections on a single contiguous tract of land, this developer is responsible for all costs involved to extend mains to service the developed property in addition to Paragraph 1 A-F above.

IMPROVEMENTS OUTSIDE DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

1. Property owner(s)/customer outside the District boundaries requesting water, sewer, and sanitation service, shall make an application to the Board for said services. If approved by the District, the property owner(s)/customer shall follow the same rules and regulations as set in paragraphs 1 and 2 above, with the exception of:

A. The District will furnish material and labor for the first one hundred (100) feet within the District only. The service applicant/developer shall furnish all excavation including the first one hundred (100) feet of the extension.

B. The District shall not furnish any excavation, material or labor for the first one hundred (100) feet for extensions outside the District boundaries.

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Union Pacific Resources Corp. of Fort Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 4 Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field. It is known as the No. 3 McMullan P-2. Location is a 353-acre lease in the J. Armstrong Survey A-5512. Canyon Sand Formation will be the target at a depth of approximately 7,300 feet.

The same operator has posted first production figures for the No. 3307 Moody, 24.3 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

The new gasser flowed 927,000-CFD on a 1.5-in. choke and earned a rating of 1,168,000-CFD on a 1.5-in. choke. Bottomed at 7,550 feet, it will produce from 6,328 to 7,184 feet into the hole.

Another Union Pacific operation was brought on line 10.2 miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field. It is known as the No. 3 McMullan P-2.

Flowing 373,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke, it was rated at 422,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The well was taken to a 9,155-ft. bottom and will produce from 8,066 to 8,016 feet into the wellbore.

First production figures have been posted for the No. 2H Henderson "23" in Crockett County's West Hunt-Baggett Field, 14 miles southwest of Ozona. Cross Timbers Operating Co. is the operator.

The 11,219-ft. horizontal well flowed at the rate of 2,055,000-CFD on a 2-in. choke and earned a 5,601,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. The well will produce from 9,420 to 11,095 feet into the hole.

The No. 4 Henderson has been completed 20 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field with WTG Exploration Co. as the operator.

It probed to 6,977 feet total depth and flowed 153,000-CFD on a 0.5-in. choke. The well earned a 239,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. It will produce from 6,194 to 6,783 feet into the wellbore.

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Deadline nears for conservation program applications

The Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQUIP) is the newest natural resource conservation program in Texas. As part of the 1996 Farm Bill, EQUIP takes the place of previous USDA programs including both the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) and the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP).

To receive funding for EQUIP, producers are required to enter into a long-term contract. Contracts must be at least five years long and cannot be longer than 10 years. Producers can receive up to \$10,000 of EQUIP funding per year not to exceed \$50,000 for the life of the contract. EQUIP will pay up to 75 percent of the cost of installing some conservation practices.

Each producer will be required to develop a local conservation plan. To develop a plan the producer and Natural Resources Conservation Service conservationist will inventory the producer's natural resources and identify problems and concerns. They will also determine treatment needs and agree upon the conservation practices the producer will install. The planned practices, as well as the cost-share rate the producer will accept, are used to prioritize and rank EQUIP applications. Contracts will then be awarded based on their ranking. Applications for a single conservation practice on an individual field addressing a single natural resource concern may not be competitive with other applications. Contract will be ranked and awarded to those persons who provide the greatest benefits at the least cost to the program.

Applications for assistance will be accepted until Friday, May 29. Landowners and producers can obtain additional information by contacting the Natural Resources Conservation Service or the Farm Service Agency here in Ozona.

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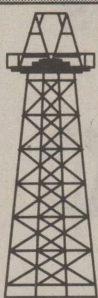
