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

OHS adds new technology program to curriculum

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, May 19, approved the implementation of a Net XV Cisco Network Academies program in Ozona High School that will begin during the second semester of school next year.

In presenting the proposal to implement this program in Ozona High School, Superintendent Larry Taylor said, "During the 20th century, auto shop and similar high school classes taught vocational skills for that era's economy. Today the national and state economies are run on information which revolves around computer and networking technologies. Yet business and industry face a shortage of information workers with the technical expertise to develop, construct, and maintain advanced technology network systems.

According to an Information Technology Association of America study, there are now approximately 190,000 unfulfilled technology jobs in mid-to-large sized United States companies. This is growing every day while Texas schools are struggling to supply the needed skills. More than 80 percent of our nation's schools lack the basic technology for direct Internet connection.

The Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo and Cisco Systems, Incorporated, a nationwide leader in Internet networking systems, are preparing to implement a Network Academies Program to develop a partnership between public high


schools, colleges and universities, regional businesses, and governmental agencies located in the San Angelo

Taylor went on to explain that this innovative training and certification program will help Ozona students accomplish four objectives: develop opportunities for them to receive concurrent high school graduation and college credit with selected colleges, universities and technical schools; help them receive high level certification in networking technology; position them for immediate openings in a talent-hungry job market by providing opportunities for job recruitment and placement for Academy graduates; and, prepare them for engineering and science-focused college or technical school studies.

Taylor also stated that the startup cost for the networking course will be \$13,000; however, Mr. Don Ickles, Texas Education Agency field service representative who is based at the Region XV Education Service Center, has written an innovative grant proposal that may cover this start-up cost. "For this cost we will receive \$60,000 of networking equipment and material from Cisco to establish our networking course," he said.

Superintendent Taylor went on to explain that the district would not need to employ another teacher for this additional vocational offering. "Mr. Wiley and I are recommending that Pete Maldonado, vocational automechanics teacher and coach in Ozona High School, teach this new





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

AND DISCONTINUE SERVICE
South Orient Railroad Company, Ltd. ("SORC") gives notice that on or about June 17, 1998, it intends to file with the Surface Transportation Board, Washington, D.C. 20423, an application for permission for the abandonment of a line of railroad known as the San Angelo-Presidio Line, extending from milepost 722 south of San Angelo near Mertzon station to milepost 1029 + 767 feet at the end of the line near Presidio station (including the discontinuance of trackage rights over the Union Pacific Railroad Company from milepost 945.3 at Alpine Junction to milepost 956.7 at Paisano Junction), which traverses United States Postal Service ZIP Codes 76903, 76666, 76930, 76932, 79778, 76752, 79735, 79830, 79832, and 79845, a distance of approximately 307.12 miles, in Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Irion, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Tom Green and Upton Counties, Texas. The line includes the stations of Mertzon, milepost 745.7; Barnhart, milepost 771.6; Big Lake, milepost 790.6; Rankin, milepost 819.9; McCamey, milepost 838.6; Baldridge, milepost 863.8; Sulphur Jct., milepost 869.4; Fort Stockton, milepost 881.7; Belding, milepost 892.9; Hovey, milepost 917.2; Alpine, milepost 944.3; Alpine Jct., milepost 945.6; Paisano Jct., milepost 956.7; Paisano, milepost 956.9; Tinaja, milepost 969.3; Plata, milepost 993.7; Casa Piedra, milepost 1002.9; and Presidio, milepost 1026.7.

The reasons for the proposed abandonment and discontinuance are that present and anticipated local and overhead traffic volumes are not adequate to make the line viable, that the line is incurring substantial operating losses, and that significant rehabilitation costs are expected in the near future with no reasonable possibility that they can be recovered. The line is unprofitable, will be unprofitable in the future and is an undue burden on interstate commerce. Based on information in SORC's possession, the line does not contain federally granted rights-of-way. Any documentation in the railroad's possession will be made available promptly to those requesting it.

This line of railroad has been included in SORC's system narrative description (filed pursuant to 49 C.F.R. § 1152, Subpart B) in Category 1

The interest of railroad employees will be protected by the conditions set forth in Oregon Short Line R. Co. -- Abandoment -- Goshen, 360 I.C.C. 91 (1979).

The application will include the Applicant's entire case for abandoment and discontinuance. Any interested person, after the application is filed on or about June 17, 1998, may file with the Surface Transportation Board written comments concerning the proposed abandonment and discontinuance or protests to it. These filings are due 45 days from the date of filing the application. All interested persons should be aware that following any abandonment of rail service and salvage of the line, the line may be suitable for other public use, including interim trail use. Any request for a public use condition under 49 U.S.C. § 10905 (Section 1152.28 of the Board's rules, 49 C.F.R. § 1152,28) and any request for a trail use condition under 16 U.S.C. § 1247(d) (Section 1152,29 of the Board's rules, 49 C.F.R. § 1152.29) must also be filed within 45 days from the date of filing of the application. Persons who may oppose the abandonment and discontinuance but who do not wish to participate fully in the process by appearing at any oral hearings or by submitting verified statements of witnesses, containing detailed evidence, should file comments. Persons interested only in seeking public use or trail use conditions should also file comments. Persons opposing the proposed abandonment and discontinuance that do wish to participate actively and fully in the process should

Protests must contain that party's entire case in opposition including the following:

(1) Protestant's name, address and business.(2) A statement describing protestant's interest in the proceeding including:

(i) A description of protestant's use of the line, (ii) If protestant does not use the line, information concerning the

group or public interest it represents; and (iii) If protestant's interest is limited to the retention of service over a portion of the line, a description of the portion of the line subject to protestant's interest (with milepost designations if available) and evidence showing that the Applicant can operate the portion of the line profitably, including an appropriate return on its investment for those operations.

(3) Specific reasons why protestant opposes the application including information regarding protestant's reliance on the involved service [this information must be supported by affidavits of persons with personal knowledge of the fact(s)].

(4) Any rebuttal of material submitted by Applicant. In addition, a commenting party or protestant may provide a state-

ment of position and evidence regarding:

(i) Intent to offer financial assistance pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 10904; (ii) Environmental impact;

(iii) Impact on rural and community development; (iv) Recommended provisions for protection of the interests of the

(v) Suitability of the properties for other public purposes pursuant (vi) Prospective use of the right-of-way for interim trail use and rail banking under 16 U.S.C. § 1247(d) and 49 C.F.R. § 1152.29.

A protest may demonstrate that: (1) the protestant filed a feeder line application under 49 U.S.C. § 10907; (2) the feeder line application involves any portion of the rail line involved in the abandonment and discontinuance application; (3) the feeder line application was filed prior to the date the abandonment and discontinuance application was filed; and (4) the feeer line application is pending before the Board.

Written comments and protests will be considered by the Board in determining what dispostion to make of the application. The commenting party or protestant may participate in the proceeding as its interests If an oral hearing is desired, the requester must make a request for an

oral hearing and provide reasons why an oral hearing is necessary. Oral hearing requests must be filed with the Board no later than 10 days after the application is filed. Those parties filing protests to the proposed abandonment and dis-

continuance should be prepared to participate actively either in an oral hearing or through the submission of their entire opposition case in the form of verified statements and arguments at the time they file a protest. B. All Improvements: water and sewer, shall conform to TNRCC and District specifications and are subject to District inspection throughout the design and construction process.

D. Definitions:

UTILITY IMPROVEMENTS WITHIN THE **DISTRICT BOUNDARIES**

Where a service applicant desires to improve a single property lying entirely within the District boundaries and where this property cannot be construed to be part of, or a result of, a subdivision of a larger tract, the following shall define the extent of District participation in said improvement(s):

A. The District will furnish material and labor for installing the first one hundred (100) feet of service or extension, but same shall not be accumulative to subsequent purchasers or assigns. The service applicant will be responsible for all excavation including the first one hundred (100) feet, as well as any materials and appurtenances for the extension beyond the first one hundred (100) as required for the extension.

B. All extensions will conform to District specifications if applicable, and are subject to inspection by representatives from the District through-

C. All tap fees and deposits must be paid in advance. Priorities will be set by the District and all District work will be done on a priority basis. D. The District will install meter coupling and unspecified length of ipe not to exceed twelve (12) inches on customers side. The owner/Customer must install a manual cutoff for owner/customer use when making repairs or during times of an emergency on the private side of the

E. Upon completion to the Districts specifications. The District will assume ownership and control of the new sewer and/or water mains, meters, and other appurtenances associated with the extension, and any new connections to the main will be made to District specifications. Tap fees will be retained by the District for new connections.

F. All mains will be located within the County owned streets and alleys or upon easement granted to the District in writing and properly recorded at the County Clerks office.

2. Where a developer, who subdivides land or request more than two (2) water or sewer connections on a single contiguous tract of land, this developer is responsible for all costs involved to extend mains to service the developed property in addition to Paragraph 1 A-F above.

IMPROVEMENTS OUTSIDE DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

1. Property owner(s)/customer outside the District Boundaries requesting water, sewer, and sanitation service, shall make an application to the Board for said services. If approved by the District, the property owner(s)/ customer shall follow the same rules and regulations as set in paragraphs and 2 above, with the exception of: A. The District will furnish material and labor for the first one

hundred (100) feet within the District only. The service applicant/developer shall furnish all excavation including the first one hundred (100) feet of the extension.

B. The District shall not furnish any excavation, material or labor for the first one hundred (100) feet for extensions outside the District boundaries.



All of these treatments are adequate. The pecan tree does not care if zinc comes from zinc sulfate or zinc nitrate, just as long as coverage is delivered with adequate

> Young pecan trees in the second growing season respond to zinc sprays every two weeks from April to August. If the trees are on good soil with excellent irrigation, nitrogen fertilization, and weed control, weekly foliar zinc sprays will push growth even faster. In the third and fourth season, young trees can be pushed to grow six to 10 feet in a single season with very

There are limit to how much growth is best, A famous horticulturist once said many ways to manage zinc deficiency, however, because a freeze in October that the pecan industry would never but the following is the simplest, least can kill young pecan trees to the ground if growth does not slow down in September and stop in October. So, most growers stop pushing young trees in late July or early August.

> Mature bearing trees are sprayed entirely differently. One good zinc spray before pollination is better than no zinc spray. Two sprays are better than one, and five sprays are ideal. The very best system for spraying mature bearing pecan trees in Texas and in the irrigated west is as follows: first spray at bud break; second spray seven days later; third spray seven days later; fourth spray 14 days later; fifth and final spray 21 days later.

The volume of water and coverage is very important. Make sure every leaf is wet. Spraying to runoff is best but not always practical. As with all management practices, one helps another. Zinc sprays alone are of little value. A good management program includes giving trees deep, welldrained soil, two inches of irrigation water every week from April to October, frequent nitrogen fertilization, good weed control and frequent foliar zinc sprays.

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



Harvey Hill has been constable for Crockett County for a few years, but before that he was a deputy on the Sheriff's Department. He's been upholding the law for longer than he wants to admit. I think everyone knows Harvey, one way or another. Len and I have seen him around town

He drives the most distinctive car I've ever seen. He said folks traveling from all over the world have photographed him and his car. Some say, 'You couldn't tell it's Harvey' cept for those horns on the front!" I asked him about them one day. I knew it would be a great story, because he grinned, leaned back in that chair and told me this tale.

"An old boy got 'em from his girlfriend for Valentine's Day one year, oh, a long time ago," said Harvey. "He was real pleased about this gesture of love she'd gotten him from the gift shop at the truck stop, and put 'em on his car right away. Well, they weren't there too long when she ran off with some truck driver, and he was really mad. He was ready to just tear 'em off and throw 'em away, when I told him he shouldn't do that. He said he'd give 'em to me if I'd mount 'em on my official car and leave 'em there. I said I would, and I did, and we're headin'

for 30 years together now." One time someone got ornery and stole them off his car, and it sure didn't look the same. It was about a week later when some kids gave them to Granny Williams, who was working at the truck stop gift shop at the time. The kids didn't want to give them to Harvey themselves, but they knew who took them, and they got them back for him. They had been held with screws into the hood of his car, which was just light metal or plastic, but after he got them back, he fixed

Rio on May 28 to accept comments from the public regarding a proposal to add the Devil's River minnow (Dionda diaboli) to the Federal list of endangered species. The hearing will be held from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Freshmen School Cafeteria at 90 Memorial Drive.

The minnow, a small fish found only in spring-fed streams in Val Verde and Kinney Counties, Texas, and in northern Mexico, is threatened by declines in water quality and quantity, plus predation from non-native fish such as the smallmouth bass. The fish is currently recognized by the State of Texas as a threatened species.

Concern over the Devil's River minnow dates back more than 20 years when the Service initially proposed the fish as threatened in 1978. Due to a lack of information, the Service withdrew the proposal in 1980 when a two-year time limit for finalizing the decision expired. Since then the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has monitored the status of the fish and found substantial declines in abundance and range of the species.

During the 1950s and 1970s, biologists found the Devil's River

ever, by 1989, the fish was one of the least abundant, and in 1997 and 1998, the fish has been found in only one location. The exact reasons for decline are unknown,; however, the quality and quantity of spring waters of the Devil's River and other streams that provide habitat for the fish are key to its conservation. Coordination between the Service, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, local landowners and community leaders has resulted in an effort to develop a conservation agreement which should improve the status of the species and

reduce the threat of extinction.

The Service will accept the information and comments from the public on its proposal until July 27, 1998. Written comments and materials concerning the proposal should be sent to the Field Supervisor, Austin Ecological Services Field Office, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 109711 Burnet Road, Suite 200, Austin, TX 78758. After the comment period closes, the Service will evaluate all available information and comments, and within a year of the date of the proposal, decide whether to add the minnow to the Federal list of threatened and endangered species.

Wildcat drilling action is slated for Crockett County. It has been designated the No. 1 A. C. Hoover with Texplor T&T Corp. of Houston as the operator. Located 27 miles northwest of Ozona, the venture is in a 960-acre lease in the B&B Survey A-5404. It is under permit for 8,200 feet of hole.

Union Pacific Resources has completed a couple of developmental gas wells 24.3 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

The No. 3309 Moody flowed 803,000-CFD on a 1.5-in choke and earned a 990,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. With 7,400 feet total depth, it will produce from 6,334 to 6,919 feet into the wellbore.

Bottomed at 7,400 feet, the No. 3305 R. Moody received a 584,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 483,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke. Production will be from 6,320 to 7,230 feet into the hole.

The same operator has staked location for the No. 88H Union Pacific about 10.9 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's West Hunt-Baggett Field.

Location is a 4,304-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-2415. Strawn Formation will be the target at a depth of approximately 10,000 feet.

Flowing 116 barrels of oil per day on a 20/64 choke, the No. 20 C. E. Davidson, Jr. "B" has been brought on line in Crockett County's Ozona Field. Texaco Exploration & production Co. is the operator. The new oil well was taken to 8,350 feet total depth with plugback to 6,643. It will produce from a Dean Formation interval ranging from 5,303 to 5,357 feet into the wellbore.



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
