

Sanchez family celebrates second reunion

Descendants of Buena Ventura Sanchez and Teresa Cardoza Sanchez gathered in Ozona last weekend for their second family reunion. When the clan met in June of 1996, they agreed to meet every two years.

Mr. and Mrs. Sanchez were born in Valparaizo, Zacatecas, Mexico. They were married Nov. 12, 1920, and were the parents of 10 children. They are descended by 35 grandchildren, 32 great-grandchildren and eight great-great-grandchildren. He died in 1989 at the age of 93, and Mrs. Sanchez died in 1994 at 93.

Included in the family photo album is a message declaring the family's reunion to be a celebration of the present with roots in the past and hopes in the future.

The reunion is "a way to pay tribute to the people who have built bridges to where we are now," said Sister Eva Sanchez, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sanchez. "The reunion provides a sense of self-identity. It brings the generations together, even if it is for a short time," said another daughter, Elena Sanchez.

One outgrowth of the Sanchez family reunion is a scholarship fund to promote education within the family.

The weekend of fun and visiting began Friday, June 12, with registration at the Parish Hall, a meal and slide presentation. Saturday's activities began with breakfast at 7 a.m. and included games, an evening Mass and then a dance. Two performances by Ballet Folklorico De Guerrero, a group of young female descendants of Ventura and Teresa Sanchez, also entertained on Saturday. On Sunday, birthday wishes were extended to all, and each family was presented with a certificate commemorating the reunion.

The theme for this year's reunion was Mexican culture. Last year's introductory theme was family heritage.

Congress to the rescue

The Kyoto Global Climate Change Treaty, which the White House signed in Japan last December, could force the United States to put the brakes on our military training, operations and deployments. The purpose of the treaty is to reduce the emission of "greenhouse gases" around the world. The people who wrote the treaty think global warming is occurring because too much oil, gas and coal is burned around the world.

In signing the treaty, the White House has made a mistake that could cost us dearly. The Administration failed to make sure that the United States Armed Forces would be exempt from this treaty. The treaty forces the United States military to scale back its uses of gases, coal and oil. This forced reduction would have a severe impact on the readiness of our military and would jeopardize our national security.

The pentagon says even a 10% cut in the use of Army fuel would mean the Army would need an additional six weeks to train and deploy for its missions. The Air Force would lose thousands of flying hours and our Navy's ships would be limited in how long their engines could run. It's not so easy to protect a nation with grounded aircraft and idle ships. Meanwhile the armed forces in countries like China and Iran would be free to train, deploy and burn as much gas as they want.

Restricting the U.S. military in this way would be devastating. The United States would be asked the United Nations for an exemption to allow our military to operate above emissions levels listed in the treaty and deploy our own troops. This ridiculous situation can never be allowed to happen.

The United States Congress has come to the rescue and averted potential disaster. The House of Representatives voted unanimously to exempt the U. S. Armed Forces from the ridiculous provisions of this treaty. We cannot in all good conscience impose foreign control on our own military.

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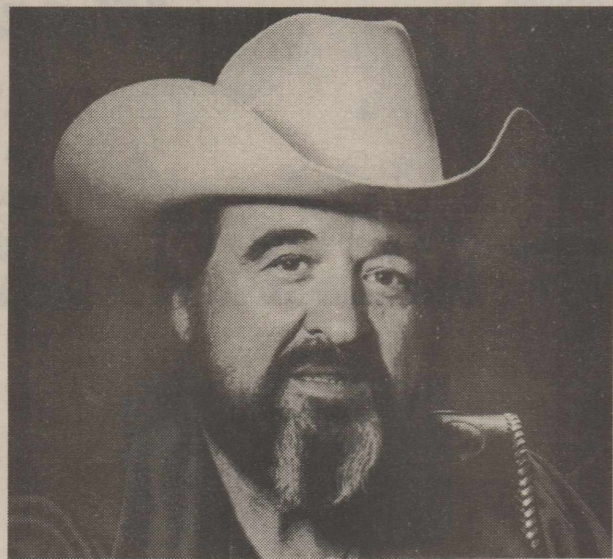

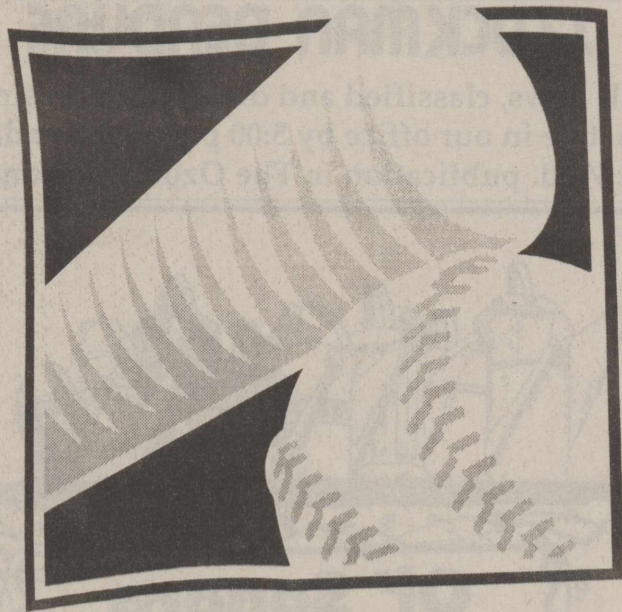
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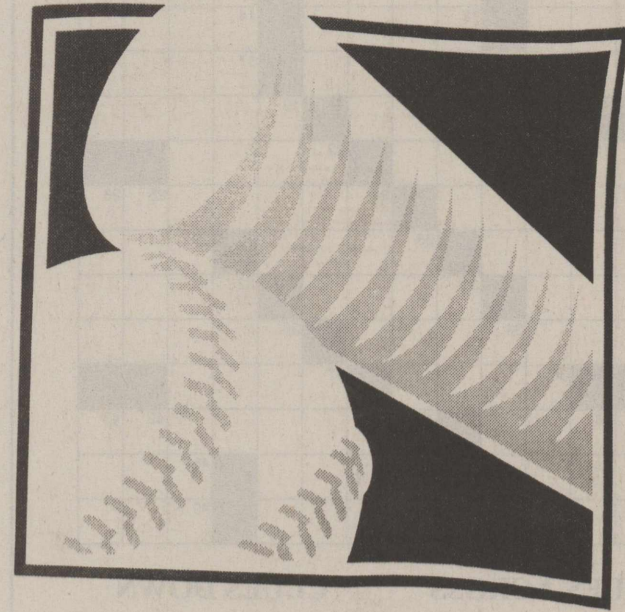

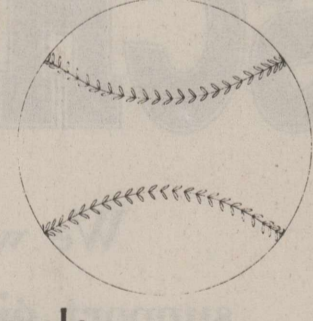
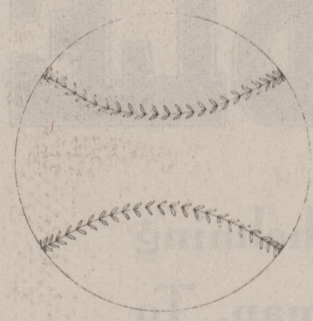

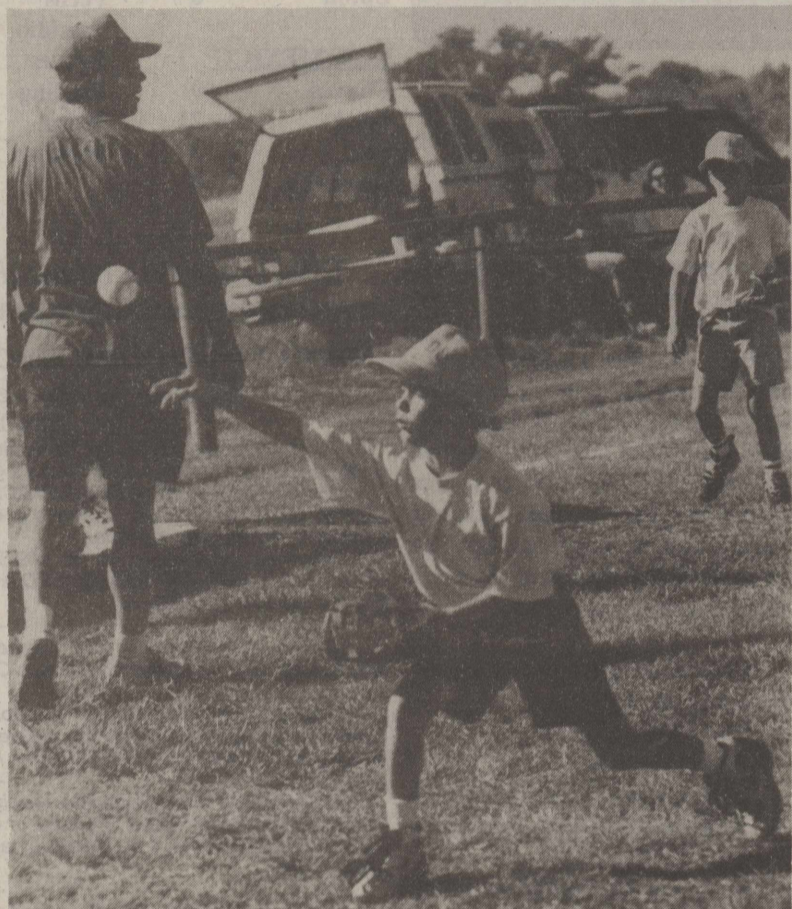
