

Four members of the Crockett County Emergency Medical Service have completed training in Sonora as Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedics. These four members, along with 11 students from surrounding counties, have spent extensive hours in the classroom as well as in San

All students enrolled were certificated as Emergency Medical Technician - Intermediates. The EMT-P program consisted of an additional 120 hours of classroom instruction to include cardiac dysrhythmia interpretation, cardiac drug administration, as well as defibrilliation and cardioversion. Each student spent an additional 90 hours of emergency department observation time at San Angelo Community Medical Center as well as





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

STB Docket No. AB-545 NOTICE OF INTENT TO ABANDON AND DISCONTINUE SERVICE

South Orient Railroad Company, Ltd. ("SORC") gives notice that on or about June 17, 1998, it intends to file with the Surface Transportation Board, Washington, D.C. 20423, an application for permission for the abandonment of a line of railroad known as the San Angelo-Presidio Line, extending from milepost 722 south of San Angelo near Mertzon station to milepost 1029 + 767 feet at the end of the line near Presidio station (including the discontinuance of trackage rights over the Union Pacific Railroad Company from milepost 945.3 at Alpine Junction to milepost 956.7 at Paisano Junction), which traverses United States Postal Service ZIP Codes 76903, 76666, 76930, 76932, 79778, 76752, 79735, 79830, 79832, and 79845, a distance of approximately 307.12 miles, in Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Irion, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Tom Green and Upton Counties, Texas. The line includes the stations of Mertzon, milepost 745.7; Barnhart, milepost 771.6; Big Lake, milepost 790.6; Rankin, milepost 819.9; McCamey, milepost 838.6; Baldridge, milepost 863.8; Sulphur Jct., milepost 869.4; Fort Stockton, milepost 881.7; Belding, milepost 892.9; Hovey, milepost 917.2; Alpine, milepost 944.3; Alpine Jct., milepost 945.6; Paisano Jct., milepost 956.7; Paisano, milepost 956.9; Tinaja, milepost 969.3; Plata, milepost 993.7; Casa Piedra, milepost 1002.9; and Presidio,

The reasons for the proposed abandonment and discontinuance are that present and anticipated local and overhead traffic volumes are not adequate to make the line viable, that the line is incurring substantial operating losses, and that significant rehabilitation costs are expected in the near future with no reasonable possibility that they can be recovered. The line is unprofitable, will be unprofitable in the future and is an undue burden on interstate commerce. Based on information in SORC's possession, the line does not contain federally granted rights-of-way. Any documentation in the railroad's possession will be made available promptly

This line of railroad has been included in SORC's system narrative description (filed pursuant to 49 C.F.R. § 1152, Subpart B) in Category 1

The interest of railroad employees will be protected by the conditions set forth in Oregon Short Line R. Co. -- Abandoment -- Goshen, 360

The application will include the Applicant's entire case for abandoment and discontinuance. Any interested person, after the application is filed on or about June 17, 1998, may file with the Surface Transportation Board written comments concerning the proposed abandonment and discontinuance or protests to it. These filings are due 45 days from the date of filing the application. All interested persons should be aware that following any abandonment of rail service and salvage of the line, the line may be suitable for other public use, including interim trail use. Any request for a public use condition under 49 U.S.C. § 10905 (Section 1152.28 of the Board's rules, 49 C.F.R. § 1152.28) and any request for a trail use condition under 16 U.S.C. § 1247(d) (Section 1152.29 of the Board's rules, 49 C.F.R. § 1152.29) must also be filed within 45 days from the date of filing of the application. Persons who may oppose the abandonment and discontinuance but who do not wish to participate fully in the process by appearing at any oral hearings or by submitting verified statements of witnesses, containing detailed evidence, should file comments. Persons interested only in seeking public use or trail use conditions should also file comments. Persons opposing the proposed abandonment and discontinuance that do wish to participate actively and fully in the process should

Protests must contain that party's entire case in opposition including

(1) Protestant's name, address and business.(2) A statement describing protestant's interest in the proceeding including:

(i) A description of protestant's use of the line, (ii) If protestant does not use the line, information concerning the

group or public interest it represents; and
(iii) If protestant's interest is limited to the retention of service over a portion of the line, a description of the portion of the line subject to protestant's interest (with milepost designations if available) and evidence showing that the Applicant can operate the portion of the line profitably,

including an appropriate return on its investment for those operations. (3) Specific reasons why protestant opposes the application including information regarding protestant's reliance on the involved service [this information must be supported by affidavits of persons with personal knowledge of the fact(s)].

(4) Any rebuttal of material submitted by Applicant.

In addition, a commenting party or protestant may provide a statement of position and evidence regarding: (i) Intent to offer financial assistance pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 10904;

(ii) Environmental impact;

(iii) Impact on rural and community development; (iv) Recommended provisions for protection of the interests of the employees;

(v) Suitability of the properties for other public purposes pursuant to 49 U.S.C. § 10905; and (vi) Prospective use of the right-of-way for interim trail use and rail banking under 16 U.S.C. § 1247(d) and 49 C.F.R. § 1152.29.

A protest may demonstrate that: (1) the protestant filed a feeder line application under 49 U.S.C. § 10907; (2) the feeder line application involves any portion of the rail line involved in the abandonment and discontinuance application; (3) the feeder line application was filed prior to the date the abandonment and discontinuance application was filed; and

(4) the feeder line application is pending before the Board. Written comments and protests will be considered by the Board in determining what dispostion to make of the application. The commenting party or protestant may participate in the proceeding as its interests

If an oral hearing is desired, the requester must make a request for an oral hearing and provide reasons why an oral hearing is necessary. Oral hearing requests must be filed with the Board no later than 10 days after the application is filed.

Those parties filing protests to the proposed abandonment and discontinuance should be prepared to participate actively either in an oral hearing or through the submission of their entire opposition case in the form of verified statements and arguments at the time they file a protest. Parties seeking information concerning the filing of protests should refer to

Written comments and protests, including all requests for public use and trail use conditions, should indicate the proceeding designation STB Docket No. AB-545 and must be filed with the Secretary, Surface Transportation Board, Washington, DC 20423, no later than August 3, 1998 (or 45 days after the application is filed, whichever is later). Interested persons may file a written comment or protest with the Board to become a party to this abandonment and discontinuance proceeding. The line sought to be abandoned and discontinued will be available for subsidy or sale for continued rail use, if the Board decides to permit the abandonment and discontinuance, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations (49 U.S.C. § 10904 and 49 C.F.R. § 1152.27). No subsidy arrangement approved under 49 U.S.C. § 10904 shall remain in effect for more than one year unless otherwise mutually agreed by the parties (49 U.S.C. § 10904(f)(4)(B)). The waste must first be a product with a large portion of large, course fragments then further reduced to fine fragments with a second pass through the grinding equipment. Waste from this location shall be removed by Crockett County for disposal.

The successful bidder must be able to process such material that will normally shred in yard waste grinding equipment and remove and stack for disposal by Crockett County, such material as found in the waste stream which cannot be ground, and or may be oversized. Oversized materials shall be deemed to be any trunk, or formed timber over 12" in diameter.

The successful bidder shall process all grindable waste, removing contaminates and oversized as possible by the use of mechanical loading equipment. Any contaminates or oversized materials removed from the yard waste will be piled in a place separate from the finished reduced materials for disposal by Crockett County. Further, the successful bidder will be solely responsible for the loading of yard waste into his equipment.

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



Box 465, Terlingua, TX 79852 or contact the county tax assessor/collector at the courthouse in their area. The \$50 fee for the plates includes a free one-year membership in the group. The license plate was designed by the Texas Department of Transportation in consultation with Friends of Big Bend National Park. The plate features Casa Grande Peak, which is a prominent landmark in the park's Chisos Mountain Basin, and an agave

"This is the most beautiful of all Texas," said Palmer.

Friends of Big Bend National Park promotes, supports and raises funds for Big Bend National Park. It has no paid staff. The board of directors, all volunteers, includes West Texans Jack and Joan Lamkin of Marathon, Alvis Johnson of Sonora and Greg Henington in Terlingua. Other board members are from Lubbock, Dallas, Austin, San Antonio and College Station.







operations and deployments. The purpose of the treaty is to reduce the emission of "greenhouse gases" around the world. The people who wrote the treaty think global warming is occurring because too much oil, gas and coal is burned around the world.

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In signing the treaty, the White House has made a mistake that could cost us dearly. The Administration failed to make sure that the United States Armed Forces would be exempt from this treaty. The treaty forces the United States military to scale back its uses of gases, coal and oil. This forced reduction would have a severe impact on the readiness of our military and would jeopardize our national security.

The pentagon says even a 10% cut in the use of Army fuel would mean the Army would need an additional six weeks to train and deploy for its missions. The Air Force would lose thousands of flying hours and our Navy's ships would be limited in how long their engines could run. It's not so easy to protect a nation with grounded aircraft and idle ships. Meanwhile the armed forces in countries like China and Iran would be free to train, deploy and burn as much gas

Restricting the U.S. military in this way would be devastating. The United States would to ask the United Nations for an exemption to allow our military to operate above emissions levels listed in the treaty and deploy our own troops. This ridiculous situation can never be allowed to happen.

The United States Congress has come to the rescue and averted potential disaster. The House of Representatives voted unanimously to exempt the U.S. Armed Forces from the ridiculous provisions of this treaty. We cannot in all good conscience impose foreign control on our own military.

"This is a heavy Shetland type of sweater that has a softer feel and is more affordable. It is not a fashion sweater," he said.

The apparel development project was initiated by Dick Pactor of the council's New York marketing office and Willard, working together toward reaching customers in the mass mar-

The yarn for the garment is being spun in the United Kingdom, and knitting machines in Taiwan, Hong Kong, China and South Korea are producing the sweater in a number of different styles and colors.

"We are really excited about this," Willard said. "We are trying to get away from one dimensional products and get new products on the retail


