

DECLARATION OF DISASTER THREAT OF WILDFIRES

June 30, 1998

WHEREAS, Crockett County has not had rainfall for an extended period; and

WHEREAS, Weather forecasters offer little promise of a change in the hot, dry conditions in the near future; and

WHEREAS, These hot, dry conditions pose the threat of large, dangerous and fast moving wildfires; and

WHEREAS, Such fires have the potential of endangering lives and damaging property on a large scale; and

WHEREAS, The Texas Disaster Act of 1975 authorized the declaration of a state of disaster "if the threat of disaster is imminent"; and

WHEREAS, The magnitude of the potential damage and the rapidity at which such a fire could escalate to major proportions constitute an imminent threat of disaster; and

WHEREAS, Declaration of such disaster authorized the imposition of controls on activities which tend to increase the likelihood of fires; and

WHEREAS, Such controls, once implemented, have the potential of protecting lives and property by mitigating the threat of dangerous fires;

BE IT THEREFORE PROCLAIMED that I, JEFFREY SUTTON, Crockett County Judge, do hereby declare a state of disaster based on the threat of large wildfires in Crockett County, Texas; and

BE IT ALSO PROCLAIMED that this state of disaster will continue until rescinded in accordance with the above statute and order, but in no instance will this declaration continue for more than seven days with authorization by the Crockett County Commissioners Court;

BE IT ALSO PROCLAIMED that this state of disaster is being declared solely for the purpose of implementing controls aimed at mitigating the hazard posed by wildfires during the current hot dry weather;

BE IT ALSO ORDERED that the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the hazard posed by wildfires by curtailing the practice of outdoor burning and the use of all fireworks, which purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement upon this order. Bedford deployed to Western Pacific



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

Property Tax Protest and 50-195 (7-97/3) [41.41, 41.70] **Appeal Procedures**

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your propertythe unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
 the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property • the local governments which should be taxing your

- propertythe ownership of propertythe change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected vou

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold

their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 909 Avenue D.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

Informal Review Come by the Tax Office at 909 Avenue D, or After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB'

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Febru-ary 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

Eleventh annual hunter education camp completed

San Angelo Recycling **Center open**

The Citizens' Recycling Collection Center and San Angelo Friends of the Environment want to help their rural neighbors solve disposal problems through various recycling programs. Drought conditions and bans on burning in some areas are making waste disposal more difficult, notes Sharon Skrabanek, director of the recycling center.

She commented that glass jars and bottles, tin or steel cans and magazines and catalogs quickly fill burn barrels. Newspapers and feed sacks also accumulate quickly.
