### Tonya's Chicken Verde

4 boneless chicken breasts  
1 can Old El Paso Green Enchilada Sauce  
1 c. mozzarella cheese  
Fry chicken breasts and layer in a casserole dish. Cover with enchilada sauce, then top with cheese. Place in 350 degree oven just until cheese melts.

### TACOS

2 lbs. ground beef  
1 can diced tomatoes  
2 cloves of garlic  
1 small onion  
1 T cumin seed  
Salt to taste  
Brown the meat. Drain the excess grease and return to heat. Add tomatoes, one can of water, garlic, onion, cumin seed and salt. Simmer to desired consistency. Fry corn tortillas just enough to heat. Spoon one and one-half tablespoons of meat into each and top with cheese, lettuce and tomatoes.

### CHILI RELLENOS

4 cans whole green chilies (12) slices)  
1 lb. Colby-Jack Cheese (wedge slices)  
2 eggs  
1/4 c. milk  
1/2 c. flour  
2 sleeves saltine crackers (finely crushed)  
Rinse seeds out of the chilies. Whisk eggs, milk and flour into a nice batter. Stuff the chilies with cheese and lightly salt. Heat a small amount of oil in a skillet. Dip each chili in the batter. Roll in the cracker crumbs and

place in the skillet. Brown each side.

### Pan Chili Rellenos

3 cans whole green chilies (9)  
1/2lb. Colby-Jack Cheese (wedge slices)  
4 eggs (beat lightly)  
1 can diced tomatoes  
Salt and pepper to taste  
Rinse seeds out of the chilies and stuff with wedges of cheese. Place in a skillet. Pour the eggs over the chilies and dot the tomatoes around. Salt and pepper. Place a lid on and simmer on low until the eggs are cooked. Careful...it burns easily.

### Salsa

1 can Rotel  
1 can tomatoes  
1 tsp. fajita seasoning  
1/4 tsp. garlic salt  
Juice of one lime  
Sprinkle of sugar  
Blend to desired consistency. Very mild.

### Hot Cakes

1 c. flour  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
Sprinkle of sugar  
1 egg  
1 c. milk  
Whisk until almost smooth. Pour 1/4 c. onto a hot griddle. Let bubble, then flip. Spread a thin layer of butter over each while still cooking. Drizzle each with syrup while layering. Adding pecans to the batter makes for a nice variety. Serves three.

### Syrup

2 c. sugar  
1 c. water  
1 tsp. mapleine  
1/4 tsp. butter flavoring  
Heat just until it comes to a full boil, then remove from heat.

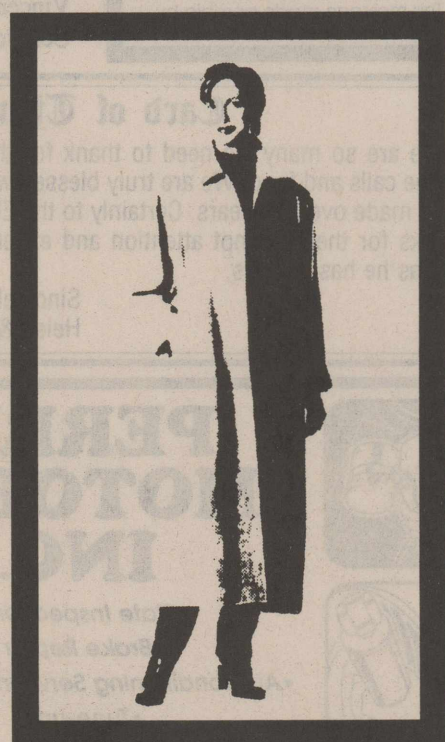

dropped back 8 or 10 yards or been chased back 10 or 12 yards and he throws the ball out of bounds to avoid a sack, his team will lose all that yardage plus 5 more and lose the down.

The fumble rule has been clarified somewhat. It really boils down to three sets of circumstances and where the ball is placed after the three. If a fumble goes out of bounds ahead of the fumbler, it is brought back to where the ball was lost. If it goes out of bounds behind the fumbler, it is put in play where it goes out. The third application is for fumbles that go out of

bounds behind the goal line. If the offense fumbles near their opponent's goal and the ball goes out behind the goal, it will be a touchback. If the offense fumbles near their own goal and the ball rolls out behind the goal, it will be scored a safety for their opponent.

The last two rule changes are simple ones. In prior years when an ineligible receiver touched a pass, the penalty was 5 yards and loss of the down. This year it is simply a 5 yard penalty with no loss of down. Finally, any illegally thrown pass, such as a second forward pass on the same down or a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage, will cost you 5 yards and the loss of the down.

Outside of the above-mentioned rules, the avid fan of football on the Texas high school level and at the college level will see much the same game. The University Interscholastic League uses the same NCAA rules book that colleges across the nation utilize, and this year's rules committee saw fit to leave most of the book intact. From the standpoint of an official this is always a great relief. I don't have to remember a long slate of new rules.

As the Ozona Lions gear up for

what coaches, players and fans are hoping is a much improved football season, it is worth noting here that the team will be traveling to Coahoma on Aug. 20 for their first scrimmage, a three-way tilt with Coahoma and 3A power Midland Greenwood. That date is only 15 days away. Menard is scheduled to visit Ozona on Aug. 27 for another practice scrimmage, but that may not be set in stone at this time. School officials are anxiously watching the newly seeded football field in hopes that it is ready. If not, be prepared to hear about a change in the scheduling for the Menard scrimmage.

Opening night should go off as planned with the Lions hosting the Grape Creek Eagles at 8 p.m. Sept. 3 in what will be the historic first varsity game for the new Grape Creek High School. The Eagles will be eager to chalk that one up in the victory column, and they have a solid nucleus of juniors and a seasoned coaching staff capable of pulling it off. The Lions and their coaches will be preparing to spoil that historic event for the Eagles.

**Know where school zones are, obey posted speeds**

"School season is just around the corner again," reminds Sheriff Shane Fenton. "The goal of the Sheriff's Office and the community is to provide a safe environment around our schools for the sake of our children. The Sheriff's Office is asking every licensed driver to become familiar with all the streets, which are affected by the school zone, and to please obey the posted speeds."

Last year one deputy issued over 204 citations around the schools alone. The good news for Ozona students was that the average speed of 28 to 35 mph at the beginning of the year was reduced to 20 and 27 by the end of the school year. This year, any driver who insists on driving at any speed over 20 mph in a school zone will be subjected to a traffic stop, which could result in a 5 to 10 minutes delay, and a traffic citation.

The high school and junior/middle school areas led the violation zones last year. Students and parents rushing to lunch and other school locations

are a major problem. Drivers failing to stop for school buses with red flashing lights were another big area of violations, followed by failure to stop at stop signs, intersections.

School zones are controlled by flashing yellow lights, which are activated when the school zone is in effect. Other school zones are identified by posted signs, which have the times the zone is in effect.

These zones are located at: Primary School - Martinez Street, Monterey Street, One-way Street and Hwy. 163 south; Intermediate School - 14th Street 13th Street and Jones Street; Junior/Middle School - Ave. G, 5th Street and 6th Street; High School - Ave. E, Ave. D and 8th Street.

"Every licensed driver has the responsibility to drive safely and obey all traffic laws," says Sheriff Fenton, "especially around our schools. Please let's all drive safe and ensure our kids have a successful and safe school year."

"To this end, we are committed to serving as many eligible women, infants and children as we possibly can.

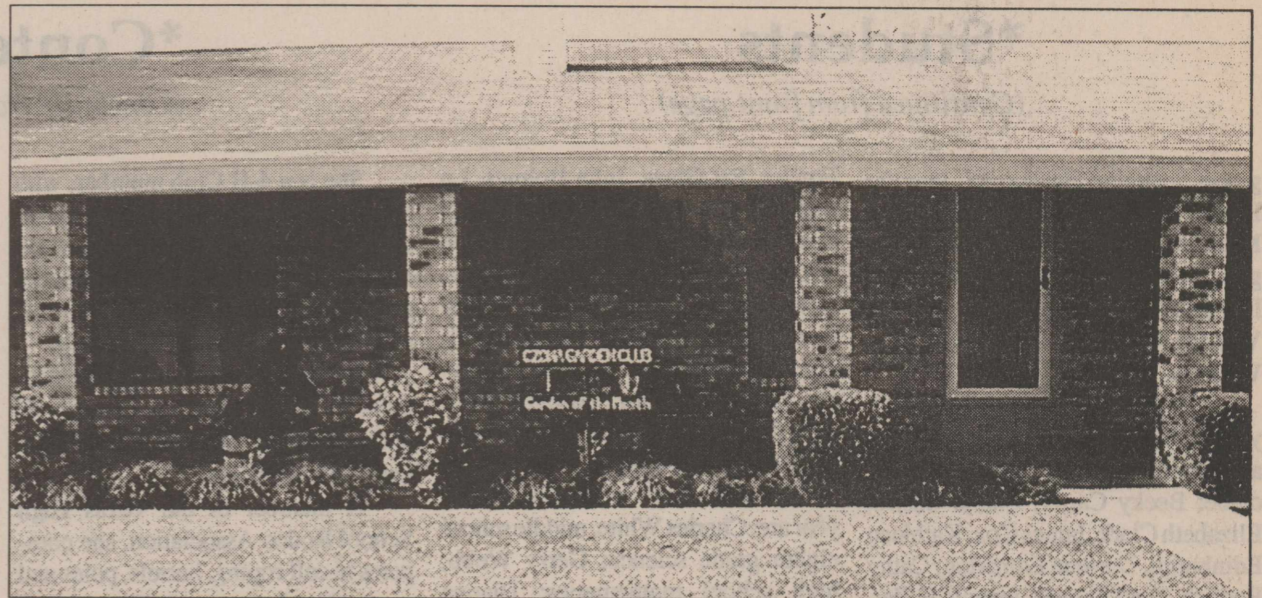

Millie's favorite sport is basketball. She also likes to water ski and is a member of Ozona United Methodist Church and Methodist Youth Fellowship.

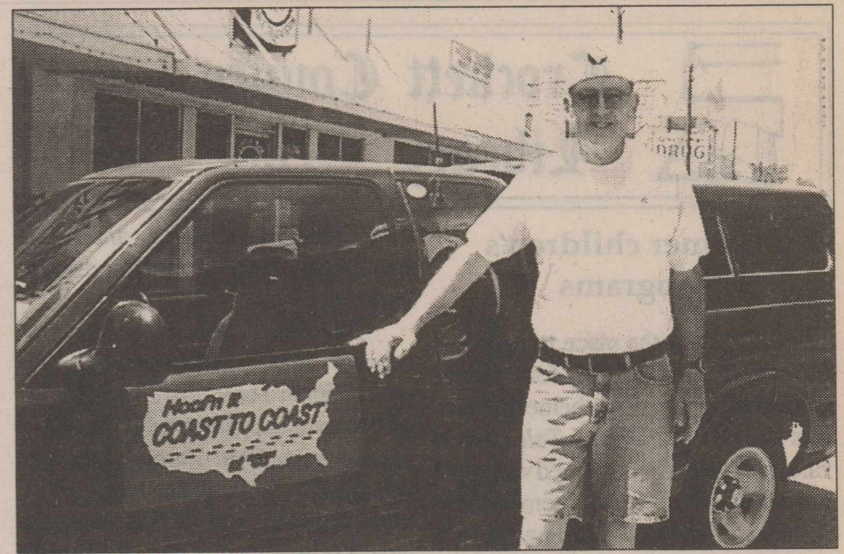
Before moving to Ozona four

**Gordon hoof'n it coast to coast**

Some of you may have seen a vehicle around town with Hoof'n It Coast to Coast at 65 on the side. Behind the wheel is Al Gordon, now 67 and a runner. He started running in 1968 after becoming inspired by Dr. Kenneth Cooper's book, "Aerobics". His first run was 0.4 miles around the block.

"When I finished I thought I might not live to see another day," said Gordon, "but when I awoke the next morning, very much alive, I went running again. This time my route took me around the same block. Twice! I knew I was hooked."

The routine developed to include 4-6 miles a day, six days a week and produced rewards, including a drop in resting heart rate from the high 80s to the low 60s, and the mental satisfaction of achieving daily goals.

"Hoof'n It Coast to Coast at 65" has been a longtime dream of Gordon. "I am doing this for myself, but I hope the project will serve as an inspiration for others. I want people to feel they can follow their dreams while being a positive witness for God and the Adventist lifestyle (including a vegetarian diet)," said Gordon. "I also invite sponsors' donations, which I will turn over to various homeless shelters along my route."

His starting and finishing points were chosen because he took Navy basic training in San Diego and spent several months of his Navy career at Jacksonville Naval Air Station in Florida. Gordon doesn't run 6 miles/hour all day every day until he finishes his goal. He runs 10 miles/day five or

six days a week. He and his wife, Wynona, and their mascot, Zak, the cat, live in a 1996 34' Bounder motor home. They park in a central location and then drive to the running site each day in their pickup.

After 10 or so days in an area, they move to another town. The Gordons will leave Ozona for Junction where they will stay for another segment of the coast to coast run.

Wynona is his support crew. She is public relations coordinator, the chaplain (they begin each morning's run with prayer for protection), record keeper, photographer and "Hoof'er Pusher".

"As Hoof'er Pusher, she meets me at each mile so I can have water, or Gatorade, nourishment and encouragement. I listen to cassette tapes as I run - a tape lasts about three miles - and Wynona also rewinds my tapes. In addition, she is expected to keep eyes and ears open for dogs along the way and be alert for any problems I may be having."

"On the last day of our run in 1996 we had a fun experience. We had just entered New Mexico and as I was jogging along I happened to notice a herd of cattle on the nearby ranch, jogging along with me. When I stopped for my drink the cows stopped, too. At least the leaders did - the rest were busy catching up. When I started up, so did the cows, when I stopped, they stopped, too. This lasted for four or five miles. I am sure the rancher wouldn't have appreciated seeing his cows jogging off their fat, but there they were."

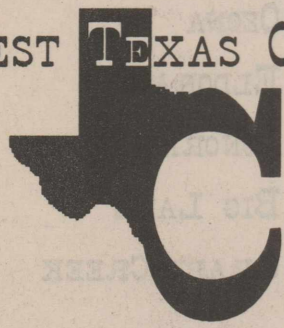

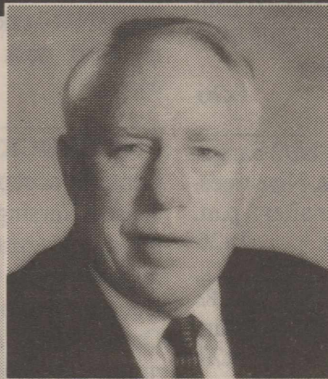
