



Three killed in motor vehicle accident

Driver of the 1998 Dodge Caravan, Ellen Walls, was westbound on I-10 approximately 28 miles west of Ozona when the vehicle left the highway on the left side. She overcorrected to the right and lost control of

the vehicle, which went into a broadside skid and struck the guardrail. The vehicle overturned one-quarter time onto the driver's side and spun across the interstate, hitting the opposite guardrail. The vehicle slid backward into the westbound lane and burst into flame before coming to a stop.

An attempt to airlift Ms. Walls, 51, to the Lubbock Burn Center ended when paramedics decided to stop at Midland Memorial Hospital because of her declining condition.

Dying at the scene were her 18month-old grandson, Joshua Granger, and Flora Triggs, 19. Walls and Granger were from Patterson, LA, and

Groups Call for Electronic Filing

State law requires candidates for public office to file campaign finance reports with the Texas Ethics Commission, but the reports need only be furnished on paper.

Last week, two government watchdog groups called on candidates to make it easier for Texans wanting to find out who is giving money to political campaigns, simply by filing campaign finance reports electronically.

Craig McDonald of Texans for Public Justice and Tom Smith of Public Citizen asked candidates to voluntarily file electronically so information seekers can find what they're looking for via the Internet on the Ethics Commission web site, www.ethics.state.tx.us/.

Tony Fabelo, executive director of the Texas Criminal Justice Policy Council, last week recommended the creation of a single entity to coordinate the efforts of 18 state agencies operating pro-Advocates for access oppose grams aimed at curbing youth

Laser Hair Removal Scrutinized

The Texas Department of Health last week said it is investigating reports of unauthorized use of lasers for hair removal by spas, salons and fitness clubs.

Two reports were from people claiming injuries as a result of laser treatments.

State regulations require that hair removal lasers be operated only under the supervision of licensed practitioners with medical training.

Injury to patients may result from unauthorized use of these devices for cosmetic purposes. **Denied Claims to Be Reviewed**

State insurance regulators said last week they will review homeowner claims for cracked foundations that have been denied by insurers since 1993.

New Dearen book has local touch

The last of the Old-Time Cowboys, a new book about long-ago ranch life in the Ozona region and elsewhere, has just been released.

Author Patrick Dearen of Midland based the nonfiction book on his interviews with 76 men who punched cattle before 1932. Crockett County cowboys include Bud Mayes, Tom Parisher, Slim Armentrout, Ted Powers and Gaston Boykin.

"Up until the mid-1930s," said Dearen, "cowboys plied their trade no differently than in the 1800s. They used horses, not pickups or helicopters. They still drove cattle and faced stampedes and horse wrecks, and often stayed in the saddle through fierce storms. They were every bit the equal of their counterparts of the nineteenth century."

Dearen's book includes tales of weather folklore, range survival, stampedes and cowboy humor.

"I've tried to capture the essence of these last-of-a-breed men through their stories, which they first spun 70 or 80 years ago around some longforgotten campfire," noted Dearen.

Dearen, a Spur Award finalist in 1995, is the author of eight other books, including "Crossing Rio Pecos", "A Cowboy of the Pecos" and "The Illegal Man", a novel about the illegal alien situation.
