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





Texas Senate Review

March 12, 1999

AUSTIN--Legislation offering through the Children's Health Insurance Program, or CHIP, passed unanimously out of the Senate Thursday, March 11. The Committee Substitute for Senate Bill (CSSB) 445, as amended on the Senate Floor, covers children of Texas who make too much money to qualify for medicaid but cannot afford health insurance. It focuses on a health plan for certain low income children. In Texas, 1.4 million children, or one in four, do not have health insurance.

Bill sponsor Senator Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth said, "It's seldom you're able to do something in this legislative process that's going to affect so many lives. And it's a tremendous responsibility to make sure that you do it right." The federal government will also help the state pay for the program, providing three federal dollars for each state dollar. Members of the Senate Demo-

cratic Caucus celebrated the passage of children's health insurance legislation in a press conference Thursday, but said it is not enough. They say the Legislature should focus their attention--and money--on issues like higher education, child care and teacher pay not tax cuts. They expect tax cut legislation to appear sometime next

Lt. Governor Rick Perry declared that Texas should be tougher on drunk drivers at a press conference on Wednesday, March 10. Members of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee agreed, passing legislation later in the day strengthening the laws against driving drunk. The committee passed Senator Mario Gallegos Jr., lowering the blood alcohol content from .10 to .08 percent. Other bills voted out of committee increase civil and criminal consequences for driving drunk. Perry says the threat of losing federal highway funding and the safety of Texans are two reasons to support the changes.

Victims of domestic violence would have greater protections under legislation passed in the Senate Tuesday, March 9. Flower Mound Senator Jane Nelson sponsored the bills which are part of her plan to increase protection for victims and penalties for abusers. SB 23 extends an emergency protection order, giving victims more time to get a permanent order. SB 50 extends a protective order to five years and makes it easier for victims to re-

ceive an extension. CSSB 461, allows health insurance for younger Texans a judge to require a person convicted of family violence to help fund women's shelters as a condition of

Other legislation passed this

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

CSSB 306, by Lucio, makes it more difficult for people convicted of a felony to get out on bail while waiting to appeal their case; SB 262, as amended, by Brown, requires that a municipality reimburse landowners or developers prior to the effective date of annexation for existing public improvements. In cases of dispute, the money would be kept in escrow until the amount is verified; SB 152, by West, makes the escape of a high-risk inmate from a juvenile correctional facility a third degree felony. Currently, it is only a misdemeanor; and CSSB 107, by Truan, designating March 31 an optional state holiday in honor of farm worker leader Cesar Chavez

legislation requiring parental consent and notification when minors want an abortion passed out of the Human Services Committee. Nelson sponsored CSSB 27 requiring parental consent. Senator Florence Shapiro of Plano sponsored CSSB 30 requiring parental notification. Legislation opening the electric utility market to competition, CSSB 7, passed out of the Senate Special Committee on Electric Utility Restructuring Monday, March 8. Legislators are trying to work out a proposal designated to benefit consumers with more options and lower prices, while protecting electric companies from losing their investments. Senate Bill (SB) 114, by Galena Park A bill placing a cap on public assistance to people, who continue to have children while on welfare, SB 64 by Nelson, passed out of the Health Services Committee by a narrow vote. Legislation banning the use and possession of eight-liner machines in Texas, SB 970, by Waco Senator David Sibley, was left pending in the Economic Development Committee.

Teachers could be getting a bonus under legislation Amarillo Senator Teel Bivins filed Thursday, March 11 creating a Master Reader Teacher program. SB 3 which has strong support from Perry, rewards specially trained reading teachers with a statefunded bonus of up to \$7000 a year. March 12 is the last day for legislators to file bills with statewide impact without permission from their fellow

#### Spring brings severe weather storms, many could be deadly

Each spring, Texas experiences numerous outbreaks of severe weather. Many of these outbreaks are deadly. Over the past few years, the National Weather Service's capability to warn people of impending hazardous weather has improved dramatically through the use of state of the art Doppler weather radar. But early warnings are useless unless people know how to react to impending severe weather.

A booklet published by the National Weather Service Office in San Angelo contains the following statistics for Crockett County during the period 1959-1998: 6 tornado events, 40 severe thunderstorm events, 26 severe hail events and 14 severe wind

Crockett County's weather warning system could possibley be here by April 1 according to Judge Jeffrey Sutton.

The typical thunderstorm is 15 miles in diameter and lasts an average of 30 minutes. Despite their small size, all thunderstorms are dangerous.

Every thunderstorm produces lighting, which kills more people each year than tornadoes. Heavy rain from thunderstorms can lead to flash flooding. Strong winds, hail, and tornadoes are also dangers associated with some thunderstorms. Thunderstorm winds can exceed 100 miles per hour and can cause damage equivalent to a strong tornado.

The National Weather Service considers a thunderstorm severe if it produces hail at least 3/4" in diameter (about the size of dimes), wind gusts to 58 miles per hour or higher

or tornadoes. In West Central Texas, the most active months for severe weather are April, May and June. Typically, the peak of this severe weather season occurs in the second half of May. Though severe weather tends to peak

during the spring months, thunderstorms and their accompanying severe weather can occur at any time

In order for thunderstorms to develop, three ingredients must be present: moisture, unstable air, and lift. Active cold fronts from the north and west collide with warm, moist air from the Gulf of Mexico during the spring, bringing these three ingredients together over West Central

If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to the storm to be struck by lightning. Go to safe shelter im-

Move to a sturdy building or car. Do not take shelter in small sheds,

If lightning is occurring and a sturdy shelter is not available, get inside a hard-top automobile and keep the windows up.

Get out of boats and away from

Get to higher ground if flash flooding or flooding is possible. Once flooding begins, abandon cars and climb to higher ground. Do not attempt to drive to safety.

If Caught Outdoors and No Shelter is Nearby...

Find a low spot away from trees, fences and poles. Make sure the place you pick is not subject to flooding.

If you are in the woods, take shelter under the shorter trees.

If you feel your skin tingle or your hair stand on end, squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Make yourself the smallest target

#### During a Flood...

Avoid areas subject to sudden

If you come upon a flowing stream where water is above your ankles, stop. Turn around and go another way. One cubic foot of water weighs about 62 pounds and when fast moving water impacts any surface, it strikes with incredible force.

Do not attempt to drive over a flooded road. The depth of water is not always obvious. The road bed may be washed out under the water, and you could be stranded or trapped.

Children should never play around high water, storm drains, viaducts or arroyos.

If a Tornado Warning is issued or if threatening weather ap-

In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a base-

If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture.

> Stay away from windows. Get out of automobiles.

If caught outside or in a vehicle, lie flat in a nearby ditch.

Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes and should be abandoned.

#### Social adequacy vs. individual equity

A major objective of the Social Security program over the years has been to maintain a balance between individual equity and social adequacy in providing benefits to the American

Individual equity refers to the rate of return each individual gets on his/her Social Security investment. Social adequacy refers to the concern that individuals receive a minimum level of income so that poverty is alleviated in society as a whole.

To meet individual equity objectives, benefits are pegged to the level claims to have hit a telephone pole on 1000 of a person's earnings. The higher your earnings, the higher your benefit amount. Social adequacy objectives are met by replacing a higher proportion of the low-income worker's earnings. Thus, the benefit formula replaces about 56 percent of the low-income worker's pre-retirement earnings, about 42 percent of the earnings of the person with average wages, and about 25 percent of the earnings of the person with high wages

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By assuring an income to individuals and to families at the death, disability or retirement of the worker, Social Security reduces poverty in society at large. Older workers are able to live independently and relieve their families of the financial burden for their retirement years. Workers have disability protection that many could not afford otherwise. The families of deceased workers find survivors benefits a stabilizing influence on their lives. The statistics tell the

\*Ninety-five percent of the people age 65 and over at the beginning of 1998 were receiving benefits or would be able to receive benefits when they or their spouses retire.

\*About 98 percent of the children under 18 and their mothers or fathers (with children under age 16) can count on monthly cash benefits if a working parent dies.

\*About four out of five men and women aged 21-64 can count on monthly cash benefits in the event the wage earner suffers a severe and prolonged disability.

Moreover, the benefits are paid as a matter of right; a claimant does not have to prove need to get benefits.

Some observers feel that the desire to increase the rate of return for future retirees may come at the expense of the social adequacy aspects of the program. Any reform should be evaluated with this thought in

# 20th century retrospective 1934-1941

For the last full administrative sengers. term of this century, Woman's Forum president Jane Black selected "Assaying the 20th Century" as her theme. The time period 1900 through 1929 was assayed by Shirley Kirby and presented to the Forum. In a continuation of the retrospective, Jimmie Jacoby compiled and presented the following information to the group. Her sources included A History of Crockett County, National Geographic's Eyewitness to the 20th Century and personal memo-sale.

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National Geographic's Eyewitness to the 20th Century published this December 1998 is a vivid and living record of the 20th Century that explores both the monumental events of history and the more subtle happenings and trends that have affected our daily lives and the forces that have touched us all and helped formulate the lives we now lead.

1930's usually evokes images of collapse. But it also was a decade of building. It soars upward with a grace that defies its size and strength: more than three million cubic yards of concrete, sculpted into a deeply concave curtain, 700 feet tall, holding back one of the continent's mightiest rivers. Hoover Dam on the Colorado River stands today as a marvel of engineering and a worthy monument to America's 1930s. Built between 1931 and 1935 at a cost of 48.9 million doland women during much of that time, the dam was part of America's answer to the Great Depression, one of thousands of public works projects that debuts. transformed the face of the nation. ## House AG committee approves Turner's trespass bill

Austin, TX--March 12, 1999--Legislation by State Representative Bob Turner, D-Voss, to give rural property owners swifter enforcement against trespassers got unanimous approval by the House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock this week. The legislation is aimed at preventing nuisance trespass where people sightseeing, hunting, or camping enter someone else's property without per-

"With the growing interest of urbanites to drive through the country or float down the river has come an influx of people who don't seem to respect private property rights," Turner continued, "While we appreciate their patronage of our small towns, some need to learn that crossing a fence to pick wild flowers, take pictures or gather firewood is trespass. I hope H.B. 436 will provide us with the means of getting that point across."

Under current law, trespass without a firearm is a Class B Misdemeanor which requires the case to be tried in the county court and the defendant must be present. The county must often invest much time and money into such cases, sometimes bringing the accused trespassers, often a tourist or traveler, from a distant location and assigning him or her a
