#### \$150,000 ROAD BOND ISSUE TO BE VOTED ON TUESDAY

By way of expressing favor for the proposed \$150,000 bond issue to be voted on Tuesday, Baird business concerns and individuals are running a page ad in this week's Star, and the Baird Junior Chamber of Commerce is running a half-page space to bring the facts to voters of Baird, Putnam, Clyde and Eula and throughout the Shoestring District. Every voter, who usually votes at any of these boxes, is urged to go to the polls Tuesday, January 28th, and cast a vote for the bonds. In the face of the large number of those who have come forth to state their intentions of supporting the issue, the proposition promises to pass with better than the required twothirds majority.

The \$150,000 bond issue is being voted to authorize the county commissioners to provide right-of-way for the new Super Highway U. S. 80 across Callahan County. In return for voting this small amount, the county will receive approximately two million dollars worth of highway construction that will make U. S. 80 the No. 1 super highway across the nation.

When voters of District No. 1 are deciding to vote for or against the bond issue, they must understand that it is an investment that cannot very well be passed up. To prove this statement, let us go back into the history of our bond issues and see how the proposed issue can be handled from what happened to the others. Just what is our bonded indebtedness,

Road District No. 1 of Callahan County was created November 14, 1917, by order of the Commissioner's Court. A map of this district is available in the Commissioners' Court room at the courthouse.

\$100,000 bonds at 51/2 per cent, running for 30 years were issued against this district on August 14, 1918. \$200,000 bonds at 51/2 per cent, running for 30 years were issued on December 1st, 1923.

Nearly all of the money from these bonds was spent on the State Highway, which is now known as U. S. 80. In 1932 the State Highway Department took over the entire State Highway System and at that time, the legislature set aside a one cent gasoline tax to pay that part of the bonds which had been spent for highway construction by counties and road

Consequently, 100 per cent of the 1918 bonds, and 88.49 per cent of the 1923 bonds have, since 1932, been paid from this one cent tax. This has resulted in quite a saving to the property tax payers of Callahan County Road District No. 1.

Since 1932 the States Legislature every two years re-enacted a law pledging the one cent gasoline tax to the payment of the old highway bonds, but the Constitutional amendment in November, 1946, this tax was made permanent. This is proof that no additional taxes will be needed to pay the 1918 and 1923

Because many of the old issues of highway bonds, throughout the state are being paid off and because the amount of money from the one cent gasoline tax is rapidly increasing, a surplus of funds will be available each year. According to the constitutional amendment, one half of this surplus will go to the State Highway Department and one half to the counties.

The Legislature, every two years, will pass a law setting out how the counties' one half of the fund is to be spent. According to the present law, and it is expected in future laws, the one half has to apply on other county and road districts debts incurred prior to January 2, 1939.

Callahan County Road District No. 3, is the same as Commissioners Precinct 3, part of which is crossed by Road District No. 1. The bonds of Road District 3 are dated December 1, 1938, and are to receive a part of the gasoline tax surplus which will be allocated to Callahan County each year.

This revenue, together with the present cash on hand, will be sufficient to pay the balance of Road District 3 bonds; making it unnecessary to levy the present 25 cent tax for the payment of the bonds.

The bonds of Road District No. 1 can now be issued and sold at 2 3-4 per cent or less, and with only 40 cent tax (\$4.00 per \$1,000 valuation), the \$150,000 new bonds and the \$50,000 previously voted can be paid off in twenty-one years. This is a great difference from the 1918 and 1923 bonds which ran for 30 years and were issued to bear 51/2 per cent interest.

The important point is the fact that the State and Federal Government will soon spend an estimated \$2,000,000 on U. S. 80 across Callahan County. The right-of-way for this project is to be paid for by this \$150,000 bond issue. By cooperating to this small extent, the work on this project will begin much

U. S. 80 crosses Texas from El Paso to Texarkana and many tourists and traveling men say: "that section of it through Callahan County is the worst of it all." Should we not hasten to improve this situation by voting for the bonds on January 28th?

#### STIFLING BUSINESS

"If we do not have tax relief, we are going to stifle business," declares Representative John Taber, of New York, Republican chairman of the powerful Appropriations Committee in the House of Repre-

This allegation will hardly bear analysis, The truth of the matter is that business is going at new speed today and making profits at a record rate. It is doing so de-

spite the present taxes.

With business at the highest level in history and profits of corporations reaching new records, one finds it difficult to understand the complaint that business is being shackeled. If what is happening in the country, insofar as profits are concerned, is the stifling of business, there are thousands of business men ready for an enlarged dose of "stifling."

#### TAKING NOTICE

The American people should take interest in the fact that business and industrial leaders, as well as many labor leaders, express opposition to the principle of compulsory arbitration of labor disputes.

The proposal for prompting industrial peace by compulsory arbitration seems to be gaining in public opinion and there is a strong sentiment in Congress for compulsory arbitration of certain labor dis-

The people of the United States must take note of the tendency of both business men and labor leaders to oppose the principle of compulsory arbitration. It might mean that the leaders of labor and management prefer to fight it out on their own grounds for the spoils to be gained and that they prefer such a system to any plan which recognizes the prime right of the public.

#### TO DIVERT YELLOW RIVER

During the war with the Japanese, the Chinese Government broke the dike of the Yellow River in order to divert the waters across the path of the Japanese armies.

One of the biggest conservation tasks now contemplated is the sealing of the break in the dikes so as to turn the muddy waters from the plains of Honan into the pre-war channel which ran northeastward through Shantung Province into the

The purpose is to reclaim hundreds of thousands of acres of fertile farm lands but the Communists, who hold the area of the old bed, say that 350,000 peasants have settled in the area and that they will suffer severely if the dikes are closed and the river diverted into its normal channel.

Inasmuch as the breaks in the dikes are located in an area controlled by the Chinese Government, it is probable that the repair job will be carried out. This is made more evident by the fact that the lands to be restored to farmers are areas under Government control. The old channel runs

#### 21 DEATHS IN FOOTBALL

While announcing twenty-one deaths in 1946 attributable directly to football, Dr. Floyd Eastwood, of Purdue University, maintains that participation in football is a less hazardous pasttime than hunting, driving an automobile or taking a walk.

The professor says that thirteen fatalities occurred among high school players, five on athletic club teams, two in college play and one a sandlot team. Four other deaths, indirectly resulting from football, were reported for sandlot players.

The doctor who has been making an annual football death survey urges an improvement in football headgear, saying that forty per cent of the fatalities result from brain injuries. He also recommends promotion of safety measures to safeguard high school atheletes and suggests better supervision of practice scrimmages and the development of new blocking and tackling dummies.

While there may be something in the doctor's corclusion that football is less hazardous than hunting or driving an automobile, the death list, as reported. does not reveal the full toll of football. There are many injuries to players, some of which constitute a physical handicap for life. While there is little that can be done about the sport, there are many Americans who wonder if it is worth the cost.

We call to attention to this conflict between Church and State because it is so different from what we are accustomed to in the United States. Naturally, if any church takes a political position in any country, it places itself alongside the political party or politicians that it favors. Obviously, if its oppenents win, they will undertake reprisals to curb the power of the church in political affairs.

#### MILLIONS TO WALK AGAIN

Predicting that millions of bedridden patients will eventually get on their feet, doctors in New York recently demonstrated the results obtained on civilian patients through the use of physiological and psychological methods originally introduced in Army Air Force hospitals by Dr. Howard A. Rusk.

Dr. George G. Deaver, who started the Institute of Rehabilitation two years ago, explains methods by which a patient is brought from bed to use of limbs. The drill includes bed activity, wheelchair activity, mat activity, use of parallel bars, learning crutch balance, crutch walking, elevation

activity and hand activity. While the physical activity of various patients probably varies, the doctor explains that most human beings fail to use more than ten per cent of their muscular facilities and that there is a reserve to be tapped in many cases and, referring to a bedridden patient who should walk, he said, "If he has one good muscle in his leg, that's all we need.'

The medical men hold out relief to many suffering from polio, some of advanced age who have suffered strokes and other middle age folk who have rusted in bed for years. The patient, we presume, must be persuaded psychologically to attemtp physiological effort, which in time, develops amazing capacity to move, work and live.

Apparently, despite the high-sounding words used to describe the process, it involves a series of drills designed to persuade the afflicted individual to take advantage of all muscular powers remaining. The result is that the patient gradually improves and becomes able to do the exceptional and near-miraculous.

#### HOW TO AVOID FIRES

One of the best ways to avoid destructive fires is to understand the cause of fire. According to the statisticians, the use of matches and smoking are responsible for more than one-fourth of the fires that destroy property.

About one-third of the fires arise from lack of care and inattention in the use of cooking and heating stoves, kerosene lamps, lights of all kinds and the misuse of gasoline and other inflammable liquids for cleaning and other purposes.

About one fire out of ten is due to the misuse of electricity, the great servant of mankind, and defective wiring and electrical appliances, All other causes account for the remaining one-fourth of the fires.

It is interesting to observe that carelessness is considered responsible for nearly two-thirds of the fires that annually take a toll of close to half a billion dollars' worth of property. The loss can be visualized, says the National Board of Fire Underwriters, if we imagine that every productive acre of farm land and every farm building in the states of Florida and New Jersey, with their orchards, fields and gardens, were wiped out. The 1940 census gave the value of these farms at about \$515,000,-

Farmers should be interested in the appalling fact that 200,000 forest fires every year burn over 31,000,000 acres, an area as large as the State of New York. More than ever, we should realize the value of timber and timber products and those who own land should make every effort to safeguard themselves from fire loss. The destructive process of burning over land which they occasionally start intentionally, should be entirely eliminated.

The property loss from fires is bad enough, but we should be spalled at the loss of lives, which total approximately 10,000 a year. If some mysterious disease swept through the United States, causing 200 deaths a week, the population would be in near panic. The loss of an equal number of lives, in fires, many of them the result of carelessness, is taken as a matter

It is high time for the people of Callahan County to wake up to the enormous loss of property and life caused by fire. In view of the great number caused by carelessness, it may be in order to require the investigation of every fire, with appropriate punishment for those who are guilty off negligence.




