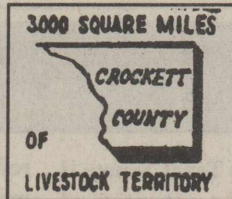

For passage into Chandlerdale West

Commissioners vote to build bridge

County commissioners voted Monday to build a bridge across Johnson Draw on War Admiral Street. Paul Chevalier, area engineer for TXDot in Sonora, met with commissioners last week to discuss options for a passage into Chandlerdale West when it rains. The option chosen will be a 25-year-flood bridge. The interstate bridges are designed for 50-year floods.

The bridge design suggested by district engineer Juan Flores of San Angelo will cost around \$300,000.00 if the work is contracted. Materials alone would be around \$144,000.00, he said. State money is not available for the new project. State help is more likely when a bridge is damaged or in need of replacement, the court learned.

Commissioners voted Monday to seek local bank financing for the project and/or grants to help with funding.

Court members also voted to allow Judge Jeffrey Sutton to attempt to acquire easements to clean Johnson Draw below Ozona south of War Admiral Street and for an emergency entrance from Chandlerdale West to I-10.

At last week's May 6 meeting, Hector DeHoyos, local TXDot head, said he would have an emergency gate installed in the state's right-of-way fence along the interstate west of Ozona right by the green exit sign. The emphasis is on the emergency use

Computer science team places 3rd at state

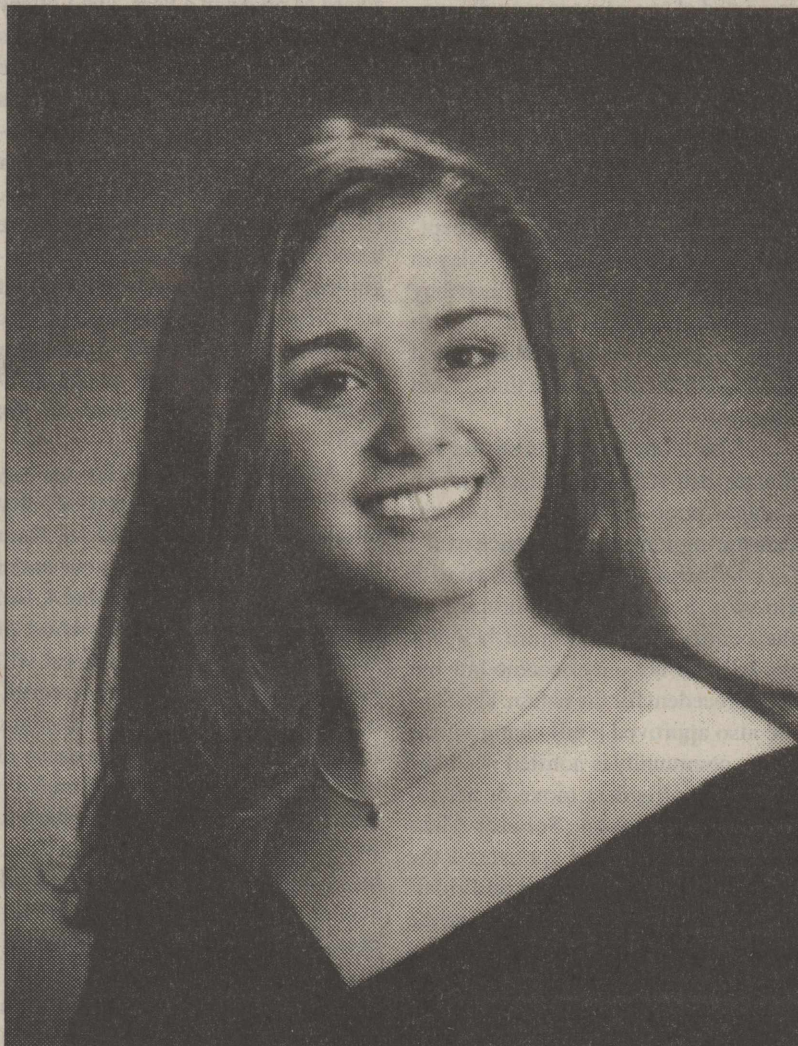

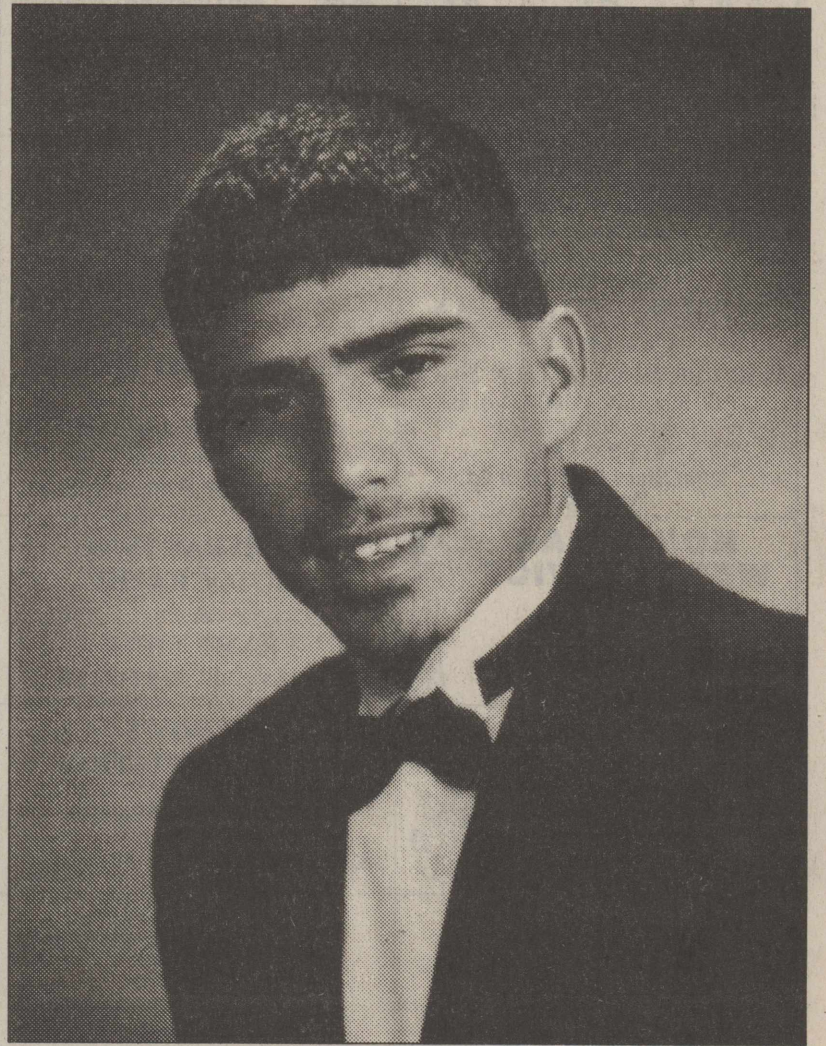
The computer science team competed in two different areas of testing. The first part was a written multiple choice test on programming language in which all three team members took

individually. The second part consisted of the team as a whole using only one computer. They must write as many programs that they can during a two hour time period.

Coach-teacher Rod Miller said, "I am very proud of the kids. We have a young team this year with this being Joseph and Kyle's first year in competition. They had never competed at the state level before. They all worked well together in the second part of the testing. We actually scored higher in the second part of the testing than the second place team did, but they ended up with more overall points than we did."

Additional magna cum laude graduates this year are Rachel Murr, 7.308 and Mark Childress, 7.137.

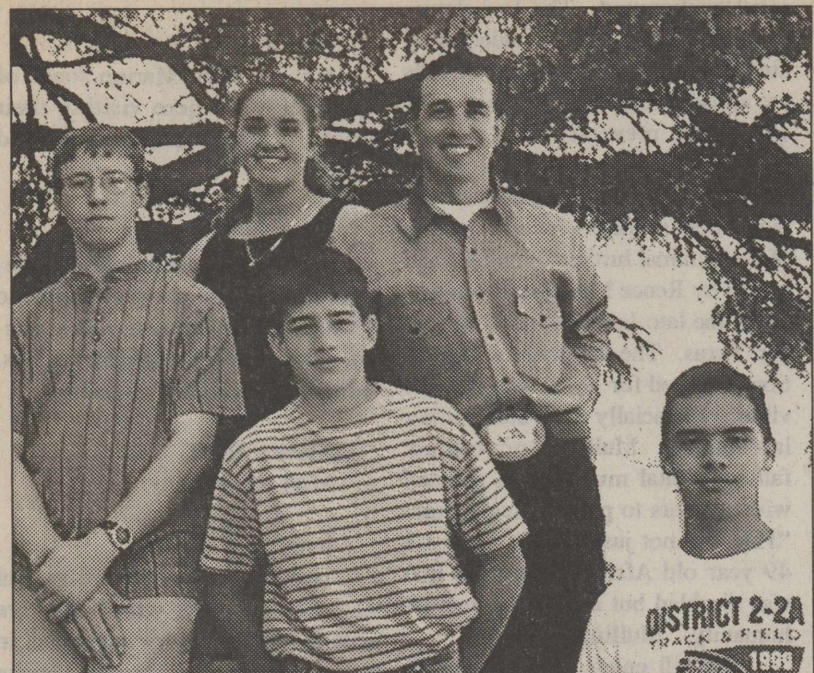

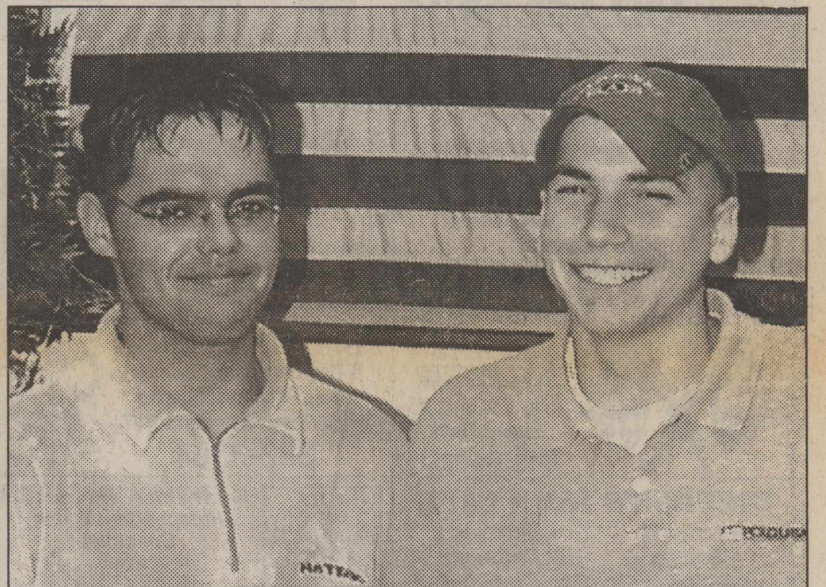

Care center survey deficiency free

A state health survey at Crockett County Care Center April 14-15 found no deficiencies, says Jim Bob Roddie, administrator.

"This is very rare to receive a deficiency free survey. A lot of thanks and praise goes out to all of the employees at the care center."

The life safety code survey on April 15 resulted in two deficiencies.

The first was for not having an annual test for leaks on the gas line. A second deficiency was a vacuum breaker not installed on a shower hose. These deficiencies have been corrected and put on the preventative maintenance log to be checked periodically.

Chipped paint in some of the rooms caused these areas of the facility to appear "not home like" to the inspectors, Roddie said.

Texas Senate in Review

AUSTIN -- The Texas Senate is concerned about the activities of sexual predators after they are released from prison. Senate members voted in favor of a compromise proposal that would keep track of sexual predators with electronic monitoring devices, rather than confining them to a special facility. These felons have been convicted of two or more sexually violent offenses and still suffer from mental problems which make them likely to become repeat offenders. The bill's sponsor, Senator Florence Shapiro of Plano, says it is a unique kind of criminal that needs a unique brand of attention. "The status quo is unacceptable. The status quo we have today in Texas says very clearly that once they are released we never have an opportunity to see, hear or do anything about it. This bill would change that," said Shapiro.

The Committee Substitute for Senate Bill (CSSB) 29 has a much cheaper price tag and more support than the original proposal which called for confinement. Shapiro worked with Houston Senator John Whitmire on the compromise. Whitmire believes the bill will not only become law but set a precedent for the nation. The Senate also approved a bill changing the way a community is notified when the worst sex offenders move or are released from prison. Senator Mike Jackson of La Porte sponsored the CSSB 1650, which passed on Friday. Juveniles caught committing a crime that involves a firearm will be kept in custody up to 48 hours under the Committee Substitute for House Bill (CSHB) 1269. Under current law, juveniles are released to their parents or guardians until a detention hearing is set. Senate sponsor Senator Florence Shapiro of Plano says this will not necessarily prevent violent action like the shooting at Columbine High School but could alert officials to a problem. "I'm not sure anything we could ever do in the Legislature could change Littleton, Colorado," said Shapiro. "And I don't ever mean to

reference it as though, here is the magic bullet. It is not the magic bullet. The bill is now awaiting the Governor's approval."

The state lottery may have a bigger payoff if legislation passed Monday, May 3, becomes law. The Senate voted to remove the limit on the amount of money the lottery can award as prizes in a year. The Lottery Commission will have to decrease its advertising budget as the average prize payout increases. The prize cap was put on during the last legislative session. Victoria Senator Ken Armbrister is the Senate sponsor for CSHB 844. He says that the idea of making more money out of a smaller pool was misguided, Lottery doesn't operate that way, Vegas doesn't make their money that way. Bingo doesn't make their money out of enhancement of the pool.

More tax incentives are on way for Texas business. Businesses that provide day care services for their employees would get a tax cut under CSSB 58 passed Tuesday, May 4. Bill sponsor Senator Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls says this proposal will help Texas stay competitive in recruiting companies. He says the demand for child care is booming because of welfare reform and this will make it easier for some Texans to get back to work. Texans receiving public assistance will have to get back to work sooner even if they have young children. Single parents with children under the age of four are currently exempt from the work requirement but that provision does not match federal law. Legislation passed this week will phase out the exemption by September 1, 2001. After that date, a single parent will only be exempt from that requirement until their child's first birthday. This change would bring Texas into compliance with federal law. Laredo Senator Judith Zaffirini sponsored CSSB 666. Voters will have another bond issue to consider in November if a constitutional amendment

passed in the Senate makes it out of the Capitol. Senate Joint Resolution (SJR) 34, also called the Bootstrap Self-Help Housing Program, would provide loans to colonia families who would build their own homes with their own labor. The lack of funding and the need for affordable housing in the colonias prompted this legislation.

The Senate also passed CSSB 1323, would give cities and counties the power to reject plans for new subdivisions unless a source of groundwater is assured. Bill sponsor Senator Jeff Wentworth of San Antonio says they should make sure they have the water resources available to fit the demands before developing, especially in rural areas. Misuse of the so-called date rape drug, Rohipnol, to commit a sexual assault will have greater penalties under legislation passed Wednesday, May 5. Dallas Senator David Cain sponsored Senate Bill (SB)1100. He says the pill, which is illegal in the United States, is as dangerous as any weapon. It's the drug's ability to steal memory that makes it so dangerous, and I believe, makes its use every bit as violent as holding a gun or a knife to a throat during a rape. Having no memory of a brutal and cowardly assault adds a whole new level of danger to a despicable crime, said Cain.

The Senate also passed CSSB 266, which allows certain private schools to participate in University Interscholastic League activities. Schools must be single sex and follow the same rules as public schools to participate. Currently, only seven schools, which are located in Dallas, Houston, El Paso and San Antonio, qualify. Armbrister sponsored CSSB 266. Promoting diversity in graduate and professional schools in Texas is the goal of CSSB 1356, passed Thursday, May 6. Austin Senator Gonzalo Barrientos sponsored the bill, which sets guidelines to assist schools in their efforts to diversify their student bodies. Supporters argue that schools need to consider factors other than just test scores in deciding who is admitted. They urged the schools to consider factors like financial need and personal background. The Legislature passed a similar bill for undergraduate admissions last session. The bills are a response to the Hopwood decision which prevents Texas schools from using race as a criteria for admission. CSHB 938, the hate crimes legislation, sparked a special meeting of the Criminal Justice Committee and a visit by Renee Mullins, the daughter of the late James Byrd Jr. of Jasper, Texas. The hate crimes legislation is named for Byrd, who was the victim of a racially motivated murder last summer. Mullins described her father's brutal murder then pleaded with senators to pass the legislation. "This was not just a crime against a 49 year old African-American that was disabled but a crime against all humanity," Mullins testified.

The bill enhances the penalties for crimes motivated by race, ethnicity, gender, disability, religion or sexual preference. Supporters say the legislation is necessary because the current statute is so vague its not even being used in the prosecution of Byrd's murder. Opponents argue that what is needed is vigorous prosecution under current law. The bill was left pending in committee. The Senate will reconvene Monday, May 10, at 1:30 p.m.

Cool water is only first aid for minor burns
 No matter what folklore you've heard about putting a pat of butter or an ice pack on a burn - cool water is the best treatment.
 Minor burns can often be treated at home. For a small injury that does not break the skin, immediately hold the burned area under cool running tap water for one to two minutes or until the pain ceases. If the skin is broken, apply a mild ointment or cream.
 "Never use ice on a burn. It can cause more damage," says Dr. Gary Purdue, professor of surgery and a burn specialist at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.
 If the injury is larger than the size of your palm, seek medical help.

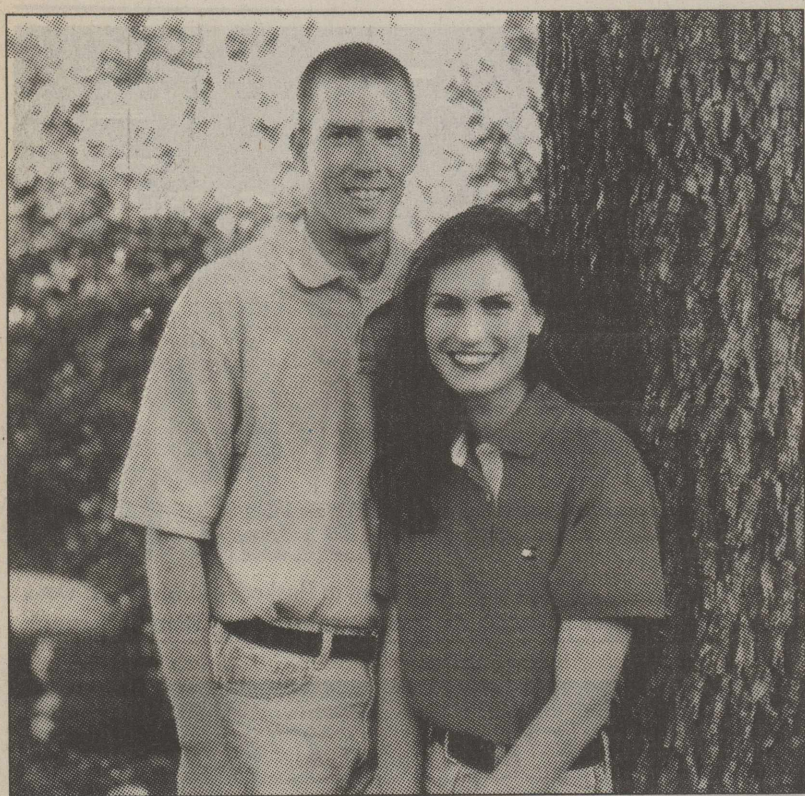

Donations needed for community center operation

The Ozona Community Center learned this week that the Ozona Women's Forum voted Saturday to donate \$100.00 a month to the center beginning in September in response to a recent letter from the center requesting financial support.

Currently, donors have pledged \$7,800.00 to the annual budget of the community center. "Another \$10,800.00 is needed to meet our budget of \$83,000.00," said board member E. A. Wadsworth.

The Ozona Community Center has been a local institution since 1938 when it was established by the Methodist Church. Since then its nature and mission have evolved. Today it is a full-time day care facility, providing care for about 30 children at a very reasonable cost. The mission of the center is to provide low-cost, high quality day care to working families in Ozona.

The children who are enrolled at the Ozona Community Center receive far more than day care. The center uses the High Reach curriculum, which provides an enriching experience. Children remaining all day receive a hot lunch. Children at the center improve their learning and social skills to better prepare themselves for kindergarten and their future.

In addition to requesting donations, the board of the community center actively raises money through fund raisers. This week the center's "Burgers and Basketball" was hoped to raise about \$750.00 for the center. Other projects include the fall fashion show, greeting card sales, softball tournament, football season pregame dinner and cookbook sales. All members of the board are enthusiastic and actively participating in the life of the center.

The board greatly appreciates the many generous contributions from local businesses, organizations and in-

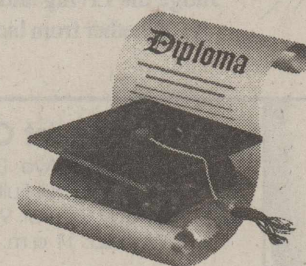

The Descent Into Hell

The Apostles' Creed is a brief statement, drawn from the Bible, of the Christian Church's teaching concerning the Triune God - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Second Article speaks about Jesus Christ, His Person and work of salvation. He is both True God and True Man, necessary for Him to accomplish His work as Redeemer of mankind. As such, this Article speaks of Christ's State of Humiliation and State of Exaltation. His Humiliation means that as Man He did not always or fully use His Divine powers, described by these words in the Second Article: "Conceived by the Holy Spirit, Born of the Virgin Mary, Suffered under Pontius Pilate, was Crucified, Dead and Buried". His Exaltation means that as a Man He now fully and always uses His Divine powers, also described in these words: "He Descended into Hell. The Third Day He Rose Again from the Dead. He Ascended into Heaven and sits at the Right Hand of God the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to Judge the Living and the Dead."

Whether from lack of understanding or because it might seem like added suffering, many churches today have removed the words: "He Descended Into Hell" from the Apostles' Creed. But what do those words mean? Scripture teaches that sometime between His burial on Good Friday and His Resurrection of Easter Sunday, Jesus Christ was made alive in His tomb - and Descended Into Hell to proclaim His Victory over His enemies there. St. Peter writes: "He (Christ) was put to death in the body but made alive by the Spirit, through whom also He went and preached to the spirits in prison" (1 Peter 3:18-19). Then 40 days after His glorious Resurrection as Victor over our real enemies - Sin, Death and the Evil One, Jesus Christ, in the presence of His disciples, ascended bodily into the Glory of His Father - to prepare a place for Believers in Heaven. St. Paul writes in Ephesians 4: "He who Descended is the very One who Ascended higher than all the heavens".

In fact, the Eternal and Only-begotten Son had already experienced the sufferings of Hell, as our Substitute on the Cross during the three hours of Darkness, as expressed by His cry: "My God, My God, why did You forsake Me"? And when St. John

was given the Vision of our glorified Lord on the Isle of Patmos, as recorded in Revelation 1, he was so overwhelmed that he writes: "When I saw Him, I fell down at His feet like a dead man. Then He laid His right hand on me and said: 'I am the First and the Last, and the One who is living. I died, but now you see I am living forever and have the keys of death and hell.'" In other words, Jesus Christ not only Descended Into Hell to proclaim His Victory but also to take the keys from Satan! He has shut the gates of Hell and opened the gates of Heaven for all Believers. For when Jesus asked His disciples in Matthew 16: "Who do you say I am"? Peter answered: "You are the promised Christ, the Son of the living God!" Then Jesus says that upon that Solid Rock confession He would build His Church, and that the Forces of Hell would not overpower it. Furthermore He declares: "I will give you the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven!"

Therefore, understanding what the words of the Creed mean, I will gladly profess that "He Descended Into Hell" - and Rejoice in His triumphant Victory over our real enemies. Praise the Lord!

But the Scripture has confined all under sin, that the promise by faith in Jesus Christ might be given to those who believe.
Galation 3:22



of this gate. It will be for temporary use until a bridge can be built.

The gate is for emergency vehicles only. This means ambulances, fire trucks and law enforcement vehicles. The gate is not for use to go to work or take children to school. Keys will be in the possession of the DPS and TXDOT only.

"I want everybody to be real clear on what is an emergency," said Chevalier. "School buses are not an emergency."

Cost of a bridge adjacent to I-10 and local opposition are limiting factors in placing an entrance into the area west of Ozona. A 325' bridge there with a 50-year flood design would cost \$1.2 million.

A few of the approximately 400 hundred residents who live in Chandlerdale West were present to talk about their difficulties when it rains. Many residents of the area and others in the community have signed a petition asking relief from the situation.

Eddie Moore, road and park superintendent, and Commissioner Frank Tambunga, stressed that they would like to eventually see a bridge built off the interstate.

Moore reported that he has ordered folding signs for both sides of the draw. These signs will be placed at draw crossings in Ozona, and flashing lights will be attached when the barriers are in use.

No action was taken on an agenda item regarding an easement for water diversion on a property in Chandlerdale.

Commissioners suggested that residents of Country Estates get together and talk with Eddie Moore to formulate a plan to alleviate water problems there.

Judge Sutton was authorized by the court to make a written offer to the University of Texas for land north

of Ozona for a solid waste landfill site. Sutton spoke positively about the prospects of obtaining use of 100 acres and was told to ask for an option for 100 additional acres.

The judge was also authorized by the court to offer Union Petroleum \$1,056.00 an acre for a 50' stretch of property which would give the county access to the rifle range. The area sought along the UP south border would connect recently purchased Montgomery Estate land with other county property adjacent to the cemetery.

Continuing leaks and other deficiencies in the courthouse annex need to be fixed before the building's warranty ends in June, commissioners agreed. They authorized County Attorney Bill Mason to send letters to the contractor, SunWest, and architect Jack Meek placing them on notice that there are items needing repair.

Commissioners awarded the fuel bid to Shelton Oil and Gas. Frank's Fuel was also a bidder. Ozona National Bank was awarded the bid for the depository contract. Crockett National Bank also bid.

Commissioners approved allowing private swimming lessons to be given at county-owned pools by Red Cross certified instructors.

Jim Roddie gave the monthly report for the care center and health services board, Louise Ledoux was present to give the library report, Janet McDaniel reported for Helping Hands and the Senior Citizens' Building, Nancy Moore spoke for the historical society, and Bruce Clark of Texas Wind Energy was present to report of the status of the wind farm project.

Written reports were presented for the sheriff's department, Fair Park Convention Center, chamber of commerce, civic and youth center and fire department.

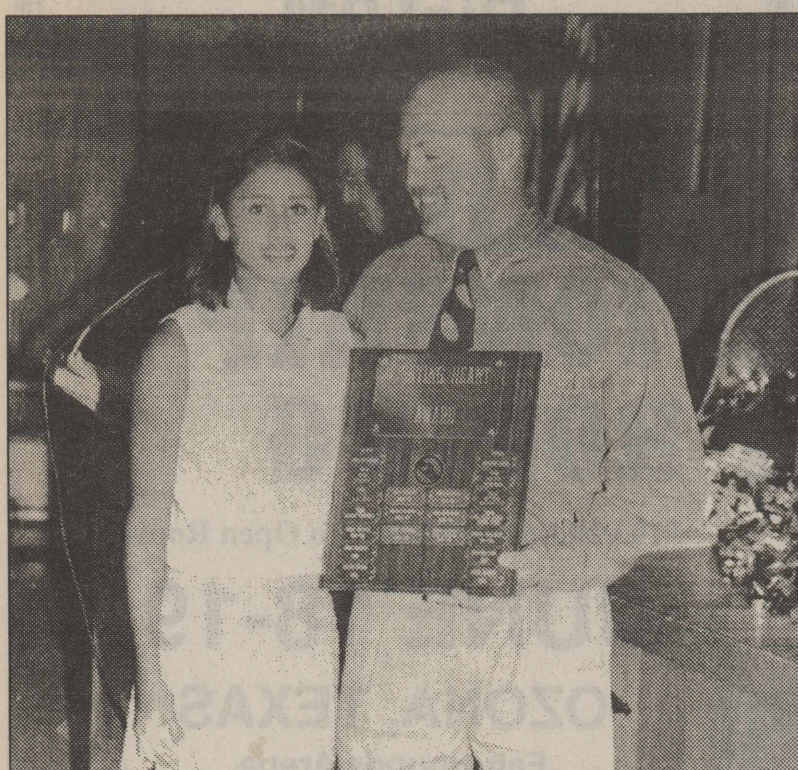

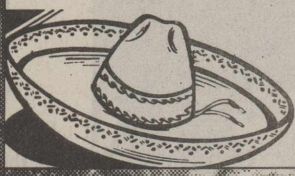

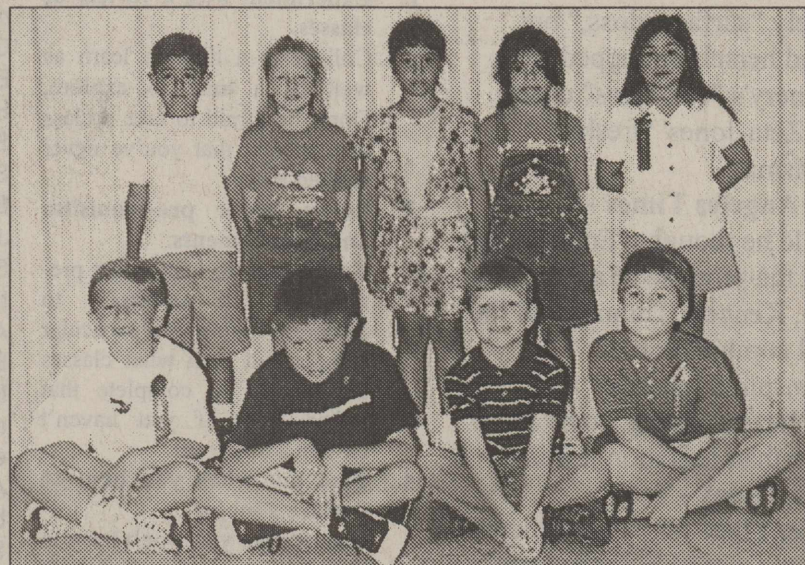

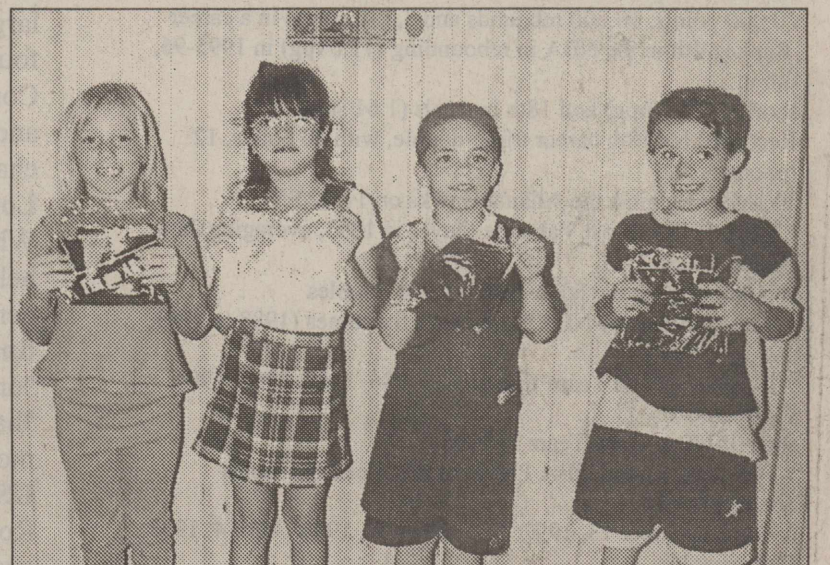

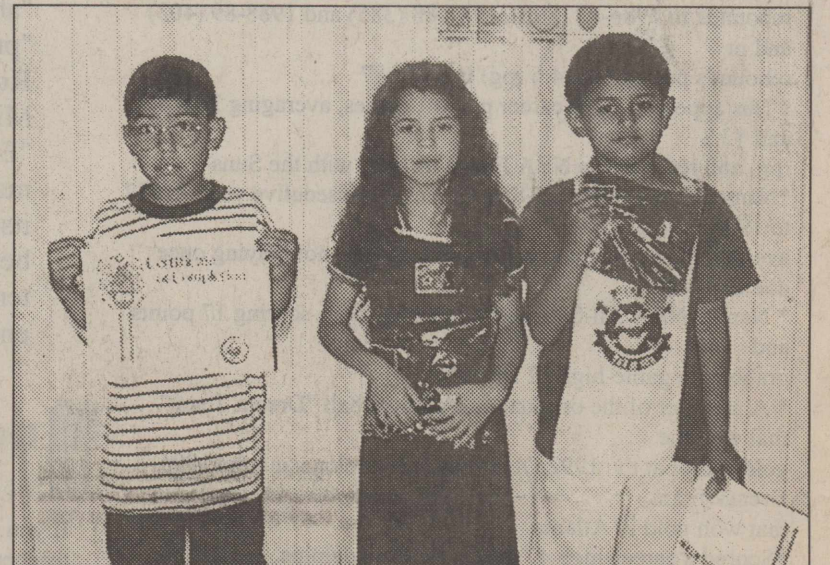

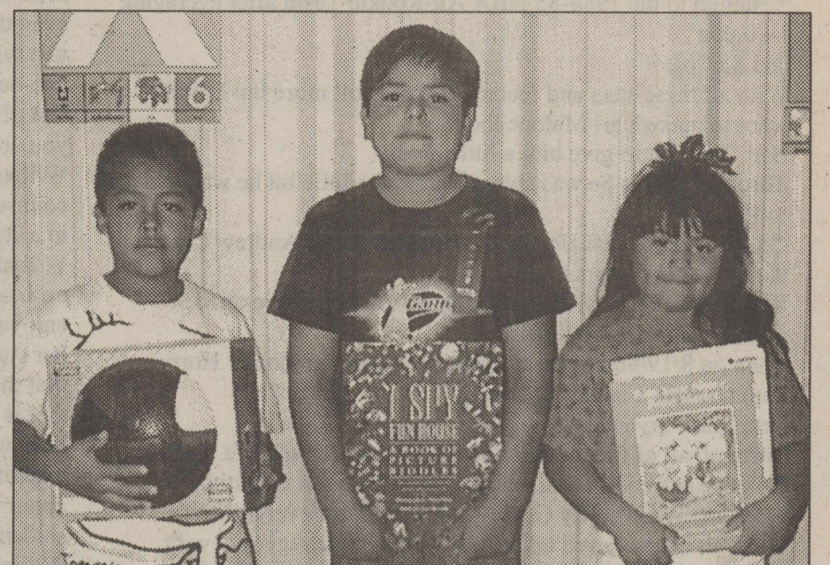

Charles Barkley was born in Leeds, Alabama on February 20, 1963. Many years went by and he got old enough to pick a Basketball. He got real good at it so he went to the University of Auburn to play ball. He had an excellent college career, but he had a cocky attitude and a mouth. So people turned away from him. He came into the league in 1984 as the 5th player selected. You think he cared nope he still went out there every night. And gave 110% effort every night weather you liked him or hated him. Those of you that like him good Choice those that don't let me tell you what he has done over the last 14 years talk the talk and walk the walk.

Selected in 1996 as one of the 50 Greatest Players in NBA History

Ended the 1995-96 season 5 assists short of becoming only the fourth player in NBA history (with Abdul-Jabbar, Chamberlain and Baylor) to top 20,000 points, 10,000 rebounds and 3,500 assists in a career

Ranked 4th in the NBA in rebounding (11.6 rpg) in 1995-96, 6th in scoring (23.2 ppg) and 18th in steals (1.61 spg)

Recorded his 18th career triple-double, with 20 points, 12 rebounds and 11 assists, against the Atlanta Hawks on 11/22/95

*Named NBA Most Valuable Player in 1993, averaging 25.6 ppg and 12.2 rpg and leading the NBA with 6 triple-doubles

*Named to the All-NBA First Team five times (1988 to 1991, 1993), to the All-NBA Second Team five times (1986, 1987, 1992, 1994, 1995) and to the All-NBA Third Team in 1996

* Has been named NBA Player of the Week five times (November 25, 1990, December 13, 1992, November 21, 1993, April 4, 1993, February 19, 1995)

* Led the NBA in free throws attempted (951) in 1987-88, in offensive rebounds in 1986-87 (390), 1987-88 (385) and 1988-89 (403) and in rebounds per game (14.6 rpg) in 1986-87

* Has appeared in 99 career playoff games, averaging 24.4 ppg and 13.3 rpg, and reached the NBA Finals in 1993 with the Suns

*Named to the NBA All-Star Game 10 consecutive years (1987 to 1996), averaging 12.6 ppg and 6.7 rpg in 9 games, not playing once due to injury

* Named NBA All-Star Game MVP in 1991, scoring 17 points and grabbing a game-high 22 rebounds

* A member of the original men's basketball "Dream Team" that won the gold medal at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona and the 1996 Dream Team that won gold in Atlanta

*Scored a career-high 47 points for Philadelphia, against the Atlanta Hawks on 2/9/88, and averaged a career-best 28.3 ppg in 1987-88

* Named to the 1984-85 NBA All-Rookie Team after averaging 14.0 ppg and 8.6 rpg

With all these stats and records there is still more but I didn't want to make Karl Malone look to Bad. You got to give him a little credit.

Through all this he was shipped around a little bit he was traded to Phoenix

On 6/17/92 for Jeff Homacek, Tim Perry, and Andrew Lang. He has 4 solid years there

Winning MVP awards making the NBA Finals averaged 35 points a game in the finals.

Then on 8/19/96 he was traded to Houston for Robert Horry, Sam Cassell, Chucky Brown and Mark Bryant.

Through all of this he still had time for a personal life. He got married to Maureen and had a little girl Christina. Plays in the Celebrity Golf Association Tour every year. He even Co-authored his autobiography "Outrageous" with Roy Johnson Jr. and "Wit and Wisdom of Charles Barkley" with Rick Reilly.

If Charles Barkley can do all of this play ball every night and still has time to run his mouth I guess he can be called Sir Charles.

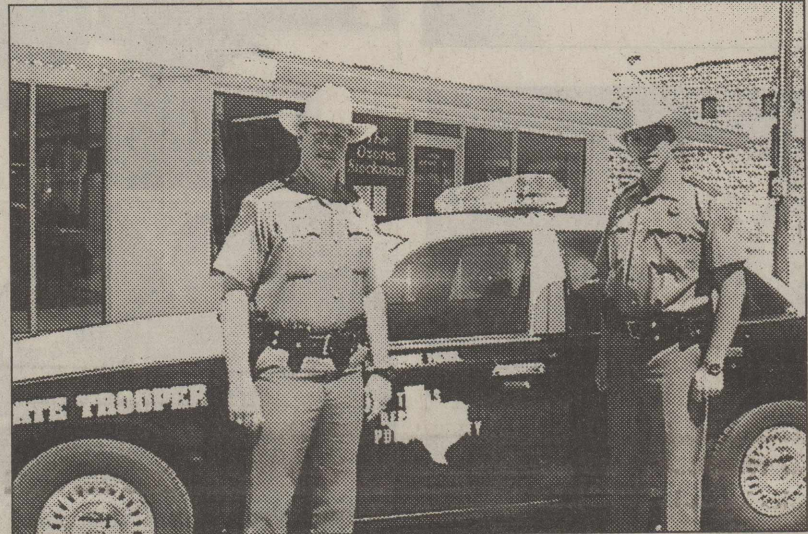
New DPS Troopers assigned to Ozona

Rated at 700,000 CF gas per day on absolute open flow, the No. 5 Friend "C" has been completed in the Northeast Ozona Field, Crockett County, about 1.5 miles south-east of the Ozona townsite.
The well was drilled by Union Pacific Resources.
It showed ability to yield 372,000 CF gas daily when tested on a 1.25-in. choke.
The venture went to total depth of 8,500 feet, was plugged back to 6,708 and will produce from the Canyon Sand. The production interval is at 6,458 to 6,548 feet into the wellbore.

Also in the Northeast Ozona Field, a Tyler-based operator, Cross Timbers Operating, has posted first production figures for the No. 12 Henderson.
Bottomed at 7,180 feet, the Canyon Sand gasser was plugged back to 6,980 and will produce from perforations ranging from 6,492 to 6,646 feet into the hole.
When gauged on a 1-in. choke, the well flowed at the rate of 256,000 CF per day. It received a 270,000-CFD evaluation on open flow.
Drill site was in a lease about 14 miles southwest of Ozona.

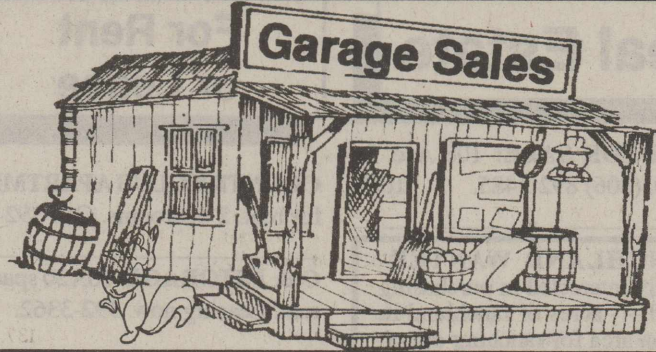

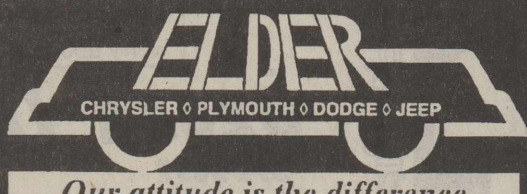

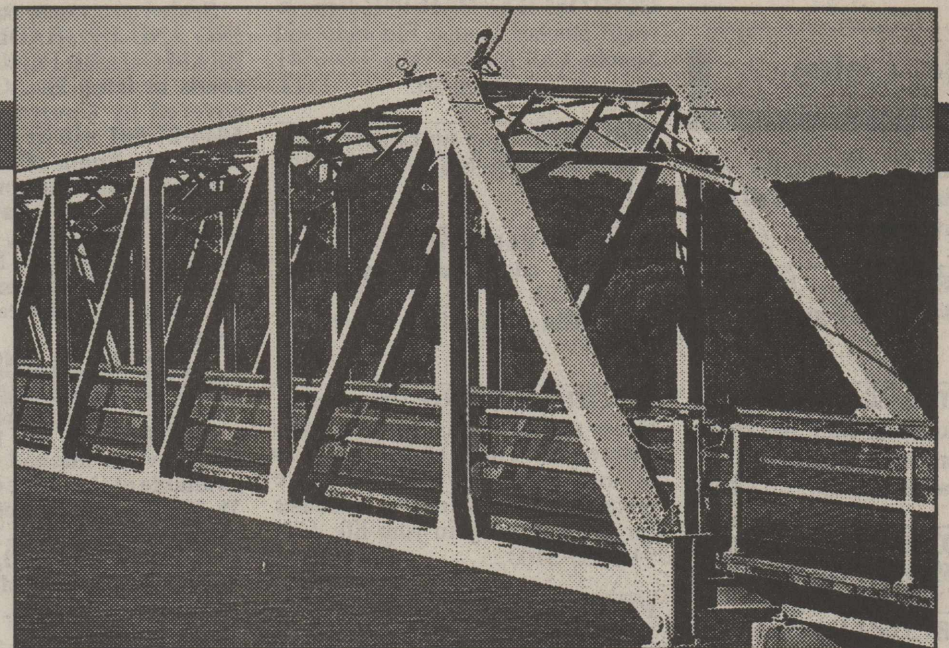
