Donations needed for community center operation

The Ozona Community Center learned this week that the Ozona Women's Forum voted Saturday to donate \$100.00 a month to the center beginning in September in response to a recent letter from the center requesting financial support.

The board of Ozona Community Center recently mailed letters requesting financial support to many residents, organizations and businesses of Ozona. The financial support from the community is necessary because the tuition paid by families whose children attend the community center does not cover the cost of the program. Because the tuition is kept at a minimum to enable all citizens of Ozona to avail themselves of the services provided at the center, the annual budget of \$83,000.00 must be supplemented by outside sources.

Other supporters of the community center include the Massie Foundation, Ozona United Methodist Church, Ozona Lions Club and several individuals who have pledged between \$25.00 and \$50.00 a month to the center. Currently, donors have pledged \$7,800.00 to the annual budget of the community center. "Another \$10,800.00 is needed to meet our budget of \$83,000.00," said board member E. A. Wadsworth.

The Ozona Community Center has been a local institution since 1938 when it was established by the Methodist Church. Since then its nature and mission have evolved. Today it is a full-time day care facility, providing care for about 30 children at a very reasonable cost. The mission of the center is to provide low-cost, high quality day care to working families in Ozona.

The children who are enrolled at the Ozona Community Center receive far more than day care. The center uses the High Reach curriculum, which provides an enriching experience. Children remaining all day receive a hot lunch. Children at the center improve their learning and social skills to better prepare themselves for kindergarten and their future.
