Texans would be able to carry a concealed handgun without anyone's knowledge except law enforcement agencies under a bill that gained tentative approval in the Texas House last week.

The measure, which is an amendment to a larger bill that authorizes the continued operation of the Texas Department of Public Safety, passed on a 76-68 vote. If approved by another House vote, the bill then would head to the Senate, which already has stamped its approval on the DPS bill.

"This is nobody's business except you and law-enforcement agencies," the sponsor Rep. Suzanna Gratia Hupp, R-Lampasas, told The Dallas Morning News.

Under current law residents can submit a person's name and ZIP code along with a \$5 fee and find out whether the person has a permit to carry a concealed handgun. Hupp said that public access allows stalkers and criminals to prey on victims who are not armed.

Another gun-related bill that bans most local government lawsuits against gun makers and sellers passed the House and was sent to Gov. George W. Bush for final

Sponsored by Rep. Rick Green, D-Dripping Springs, the bill allows governmental suits against gun makers to be filed only by the attorney general or with the Legislature's approval.

Workshop targets diabetes in kids Participants in an international one-day workshop last week in Austin called for the development of a statewide strategy to address what health officials believe may be an epidemic of type 2 diabetes in children.

The May 14 workshop, prompted by Gov. Bush, was cosponsored by the Texas Department of Health and Juvenile Diabetes Foundation (JDF) International to find ways to combat a rising incidence of type 2 diabetes in youth in Texas.

'No one knows what causes diabetes," said Dr. William R. Archer. Texas Commissioner of Health, "but we know there is a link between increased obesity in kids and increased type 2 diabetes in kids."

Dr. Robert Goldstein, research vice president for JDF, said Texas' approach to dealing with the increased incidence of type 2 diabetes in children could become a model for the rest of the country.

Type 2 diabetes is marked by an inability to properly use insulin to control blood sugar levels.

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

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR PIPELINE PERMIT

J. Cleo Thompson and James Cleo Thompson, Jr., a partnership, 325 N. St. Paul, Suite 4500, Dallas, Texas 75201, has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to construct a 8.0 miles buried pipeline in Crockett County, Texas to gather natural gas containing Hydrogen Sulfide (sour gas). In the event of a leak the radius of exposure of Hydrogen Sulfide for 100 parts per million (ppm) could extend 292.8 feet on either side of the pipeline based on methods outlined in the 16 Texas Administration Code 3.36(2). The radius of exposure includes parts of U.S. Hwy. 137. The applicant proposes to construct pipeline beginning at a point 643 feet from the North Line and 2403 feet from the East Line of G.C.&S.F.RR. Co. Svy. 83, Block OP, Crockett County, Texas and extending 42,240 feet in a South-Southeasterly direction ending at a point that is 11,088 feet Northwest at a bearing of 294 degrees from the North end of Avenue H in the town of Ozona, Crockett County, Texas. The pipeline will cross Texas Hwy. 137 at a point that is 5.7 miles Northwest from the intersection of Texas Hwy. 163 and Texas Hwy. 137. The Southeast end of the pipeline will connect with Crockett Gas Processing Plant, a facility owned and operated by the applicant. The pipeline will be constructed and operated in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Railroad Commission of Texas specifying construction material and methods for the safe operation of sour gas pipelines.

The proposed pipeline facility will transport sour gas that containes more than 100 ppm of Hydrogen Sulfide. A copy of this application is available for public inspection at the offices of Crockett County Clerk, located at 907 Ave. D, Ozona, Texas.

Any owner or occupant of land located within 100 ppm radius of exposure of the proposed sour gaspipeline facility desiring to protest this application can do so by mailing or otherwise delivering a letter referring to gas utilities docket (gud) No. 8924 and starting their desire to protest to

Texas Open Meetings Act

The Open Meetings Act passed by the Legislature of the State of Texas defines circumstances under which governmental bodies may hold meetings which are closed to the public.

Except when provided in the Open Meetings Act or specifically child. permitted in the constitution, every regular, special, or called meeting or session of every governmental body shall be open to the public.

Governmental bodies are not required to hold meetings open to the public in cases involving the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges against such officer or employee, unless such officer or employee requests a public hearing.

Nothing in this act requires school boards to hold meetings open to the public in cases involving discipline of public school children unless an open hearing is requested in writing by a parent or guardian of the

There are other specific areas in which a portion of a meeting may be closed, but these two are the ones which seem to be most often in the public eye.

Whenever any deliberations or any portion of a meeting are closed to the public as permitted by this act, no final action, decision, or vote with regard to any matter considered in the closed meeting shall be made except in a meeting which is open to the public and in compliance with the requirements of the Open Meetings Act.

"No steps backward." As I as walking around the Heritage Building while on morning duty last week, I read the cornerstone of the situation in the Ozona schools today. Donnie and I are retiring and leaving Ozona because we have been made to feel that we are not

After seventeen years of dedicating ourselves to improving the libraries of the Crockett County schools, we are leaving. Why? Last year Donnie and I decided to sell our house here. After being homeowners, tax payers, and contributors to the local economy for a number of years, we found ourselves a few years away from retirement (we thought). We were lucky enough to have a cabin in New Mexico and a home on Lake Nasworthy but keeping up three places was getting to be a burden physically and financially so we decided to put our house in Ozona on the market. When we made that decision, Donnie talked to both Mr. Taylor and Mr. Cotton about what we were doing because, if the house sold, we would need to move into school housing. Their reaction was basically, "Fine, that is probably the wise thing to do." Then about a week later, Mr. Cotton told Donnie, "If you sell your house, there will not be school housing for you." He did not say, "There may not be," but "There will not be."

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Since we, and they, knew that several people were moving out of school housing, we (naturally, I think) took that to mean that we were no longer wanted in this school system. Many people have told us, "You should fight them. You should get a lawyer. You should go to the school board." Yes, we know. We could have done all those things, but why stay in a place where you are not wanted?

We have worked in this district since 1982. I don't normally feel the need to pat myself on the back for doing my job, but after being told indirectly that I should leave, I started thinking about how well we have or haven't done our jobs. We have always gotten good recommendations from our principals. For seventeen years I have gone early and stayed late at the high school library. Just for fun I added up how much extra time I've put in over the course of seventeen years. At thirty minutes a day for 170 days a school year, I've worked more than an extra year! During my time here, I have been a class sponsor, worked concession stand, started and sponsored a school literary magazine (Illusions) for a number of years, donated 178 review copies of new books to the library, started the Hispanic Heritage collection, brought in microfiche magazines, set up a career room, automated the high school library, and conducted numerous staff development sessions on libraries (and technology). In 1982 the only public library was the adult reading room upstairs in the high school library. I like to believe that Donnie and I played a part in getting a real public library established in

At one time this high school had the best technologically equipped library in west Texas as verified by a survey by a school librarian in Pecos. The O.H.S. library had more up-to-date technology than school libraries in Odessa, Wall, Ballinger or Eldorado. We had twenty computers networked with a CD-ROM tower when that was cutting-edge technology. Does anyone remember the open house we had to "show off" the library technology? I remember with pride how high school students acted as wing parents and community members all the great computer technology that was available in the library. Does anyone remember the teacher in-service in which I encouraged the teachers to take advantage of e-mail and TENET? I remember how exciting it was to teach students to use the automated card catalog, to print out information from a multimedia encyclopedia, to search for, find and print magazine articles without the Reader's Guide. Certainly I didn't accomplish this all by myself, but I think it is only fair to say that I am at least partially responsible.

At the intermediate school Donnie opens the library at 7:30 in the mornings so students can use the library. He does bus duty after school. Over the years he has been a teacher and as student council sponsor as well as a librarian. He has sponsored dances, held fundraisers to purchase landscaping and outdoor tables and benches for the school yard, arranged reward trips for students, administered TAAS tests, read library books and made computer tests for Accelerated Reader, barcoded thousands of library books, done MARC cataloging for library books, etc. etc.

We did all those things for the school and for the students. We put in hundreds of extra hours of our own time because we had a vision of what the libraries should provide for Ozona students. We didn't get paid extra for any of it, and we certainly didn't get thanked or even acknowledged by the administration or the school

"No steps backward," the cornerstone says. Research shows that students from schools which expend more for their school libraries do better on standardized tests. Don't take my word for it; check it out on the Internet or read the book, The Impact of School Library Media Centers on Academic Achievement. In my opinion, the present administration and school board are taking several steps backward in regard to school libraries. Ask them about the plans for your school libraries. Ask how many certified librarians there will be in the district. Ask how the "district" librarian obtained certification. Ask yourselves whether or not politics and the desire for "good public relations" is playing a part in the decisions that have been made. Ask how much input the campus or district-wide site-based committees have had into decisions about libraries and technology, or anything else,

Yes, the newer technology is exciting, but I hope that the assumption hasn't been made

that the Internet will replace libraries. That will happen, I believe, about the same time distance learning replaces schools. When that happens (if it ever does), there will be no need for lithat building that was erected in 1910. I was braries, for teachers, or for administrators and struck by how appropriate those words are to school boards. In the meantime, students still need teachers and librarians to guide them in the learning process.

My assessment of the current educational situation is based on 28 years of work as a teacher, supervisor, and librarian in four school districts. It seems to me that (1) certain members of the school board are making arbitrary decisions based on personal concerns and biases (2) current administrators are catering to those members to protect their jobs, (3) there is little communication with teachers, (4) there has been a systematic plan in effect to get rid of teachers who have been in the district for a while, and (5) the only things that seem to matter are TAAS scores and sports. I don't believe this is a healthy situation. In a system where sycophants triumph and decent teachers (and librarians) are treated poorly, our students are learning some mighty sad lessons.

There was a time when the Ozona schools were a pretty good place to work. The faculty was like a family that shared a common goal. As time went by members of the faculty got married, had babies and grandbabies, got divorced, suffered from illnesses and diseases, and experienced the pain of loss of family members. We worked together, we argued, we disagreed at times, we grieved together. We had some fun; we worked hard for a common purpose - education. Then things began to change. Some truly good and decent people were no longer with us, and the way they were compelled to leave was ugly and hurtful. What do these teachers all have in common? They are were good people who cared about your kids. How many names will be added to this list this year? They deserved better treatment, Ozona.

When Donnie and I came here, we had worked in several other school districts so we were surprised to find that many people seemed to believe that (1) new teachers who come to Ozona must be desperate for jobs, (2) that all teachers are here only because of the money, (3) the best way to get something done is to hrow a fit" and (4) teachers are "outsiders" so it doesn't matter how they're treated. It has been mentioned that we (teachers and librarians) should be thankful for the salary and benefits we receive here. I believe the converse is also true. The administration and school board should be thankful for the hard-working, dedicated professionals who are/were working here! It has been made clear to teachers and librarians that we can all be easily replaced. I do not doubt that we can all be replaced. However, I do wonder about the quality of people who will replace us. The Ozona Public Schools have gained a reputation for not treating their pernnel very well. When you treat good people poorly, word gets around. I believe it is likely that many of the teachers and coaches who come here in the future will come for the money and will do an adequate job and nothing more. "Is adequate good enough?"

When I came to Ozona, I had a sign that said, "It's nice to be important, but it's more important to be nice." I believed that then, and I still do. It's too badethe administration and school board don't believe that. As a professional and a person. I have never been inclined to "throw fits". I believe in working cooperatively and reaching consensus. It seems to me that some members of the administration pride themselves on being good fighters. A good fighter and a good leader are two different things. During the past several years a fog of antagonism has gradually pervaded the atmosphere of our schools. Camaraderie and cooperation have given way to meanness, suspicion deceit and treachery. Working in the Crockett County schools is no longer a pleasant experience. Although the school goals say that we are working for all students, that seems to be rhetoric, not reality. There is no shared vision of what we all should be working toward, and I regret

My deepest regret is that we were never able to adequately impress on the school board and the present administration the importance of school libraries in the overall "scheme of things" in Ozona. I'm sure everyone has heard the sarcastic saying, "Don't go away mad, Just go away." I am going, but I am going away sad. I am sad because our years of library work have apparently been for nothing. I am sad because a district with so much potential seems more concerned about public relations and personal power than about students and teachers. I am sad because the community seems to be complacent and unconcerned about what is happening in the schools.

I have worked hard to keep a Christian attitude about the last few years and to remember the good times we've had here. To the many great people in Ozona who have befriended us during the past seventeen years, thank you for your friendship and your help in our times of need. To all our students and ex-students, it has been fun! To the teachers and staff that we've worked with, you have a special place in our hearts. As a teacher (and librarians are teachers first, last, and always), I know that we have learned as we have taught. As we move forward on another of life's paths, we will carry our happy memories with us.

I wish we were leaving in more pleasant circumstances, but sadly that is not the case. I would not be writing this if I weren't deeply concerned about the future of education here Every citizen of Ozona should be equally concerned. I believe educational leaders should have a vision and should be persons of integrity and honor. I believe school board meetings should be places where there is an open discussion of ideas. "Which is worse, ignorance or apathy?" The answer goes, "I don't know, and I don't care." Which is it, Ozona? You don't know




