The GI Bill of Health would open up under-used VA facilities to veterans and their families. Those new patients would rely upon their own health insurance or upon benefits offered by Medicare or the military's retirement system.

"Military retirees and their dependents and veterans receiving Medicare should be afforded the opportunity to access VA health facilities," the Legion commander said.

'Counting patients in VA facilities says nothing about the medical needs of veterans or their desire to receive VA treatment." Miller said. "Veterans and their families want greater access to VA facilities. The case hasn't been made for closing anything"



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
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
