Deer Appreciation Day gathers large crowd

Fifty-six producers and manage from a 6 -county area participated the first-ever Deer Appreciation Day was host for the first-ever Predato Appreciation Day back in 1995 and will be part of a Quail Appreciation Day, which will be held Sept. 30 in Eldorado.

changed in the last 10 years and how landowners are now more dependent on wildlife enterprises.
Dr. Bill Eikenhorst gave a demonstration of a deer necropsy and dis cussed the anatomy of a deer and dis
cases and parasites that affect deer. D eases and parasites that affect deer. Dr Brenham. Dr. Jason Johnson, Extension economist, talked abut the economic impact on the local economy and said that wildlife brings $\$ 4$ bil lion into Extension districts 6, 7, 10 and 12 , which covers an area from San
Antonio to El Paso and Abilene to Del Rio. He explained that every dollar spent turns over in the local economy seven times.
Dittmar, veterinarin and Dr. Bo spoke about some wildlife enterprise success stories and marketing tech niques that they use today. They also

## Lions fall short in overtime to the Winters Blizzards 31-34

Coach Steve Taylor's Ozona Lions fell short in overtime play Friday night to the Winters Blizzards, and returned to their home ground with a 31 34 first season defeat under their belts.

Exactly one year ago Winters was ranked number 5 in the state and the Lions appeared no way close to the top in the ranking. But Winters will not forget the impact that the Lions made this year, and it was apparent that they
could not believe the power and the determination the Lions presented at Friday night's contest.

In the first quarter with 2:21 remaining on the clock Winters scored thei first touchdown, but in the second quarter Lion Tim Maldonado ( \#33) scooped up a Winters fumble at the 15 yard line and raced into the end zone to scor for the Lions. Lion Miguel Rios's kick was good leveling the score board 7 all.

Winters found pay dirt once again in the first quarter, but failed to convert the extra point. With the Lions down by six they turned up the heat
score their second touchdown of the night from Lion Tim Maldonado who carried for six points on a three-yard run. Miguel Rios' kick was good mov ing the Lions into the lead for the rest of the half $14-13$.
In the third quarter with $10: 55$ remaining on the clock, Lion Ross Crawford handed off to Miguel Rios who shot straight up the middle of the Winters defense on a beautiful seventy-one yard run to score another touchdown for the Lions, and "Sure Foot" Rios" kick was once again right on the mone

Offensively, the Lions rolled up 331 yards total offense. On the ground they were led by Miguel Rios who finished the night with nine carries and 104 yards. The receiving core for the Lions was Dustin Faught and Bobby Cervantez who had ten receptions for 202 yards. Ross Crawford finished the night passing with 16 of 26 for 244 yards.
