MEDC considers another 'conduit' project

By Larry Thornton Managing Editor

The Muleshoe Economic **Development Corporation** approved an inducement resolution during Thursday's regular meeting, calling for the MEDC to act as the "conduit issuer" of up to \$2.5 million in industrial revenue bonds for a Deaf Smith County dairy.

During MEDC Director Claborn's Janet presentation to the board members, she explained that PPP Dairy would be using the revenue bonds to expand the existing facility.

She also noted that she had accompanied Muleshoe City Manager to Hereford, where they discussed the issue with the County Deaf Smith commissioners, who approved the MEDC acting as the conduit issuer.

Thursday's resolution is the first step in the bonding process and marks the beginning of the 60-day period state law sets for the issuance of the bonds.

"This does not say we are going to be the issuers of the bonds," Claborn reminded

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

One of God's Best Gifts Is the Talent for Happiness

n C. S. Lewis' account of his early life, Surprised by Joy, Lewis begins by writing about the two family strains that had come together to give him life. On his father's side .

By the way, Dr. J. D. Grey, for many years pastor of New Orleans' First Baptist Church, used to tell the story of a little lad who lived a long way from his paternal grandmother. When he went with his father to the railway station to pick her up, she hugged him and said, "Young man, I'm your grandmother on your father's side." To which the lad replied, "That

may be, but you won't be in the house ten minutes before you figure out that you're on the wrong side!'

On his father's side, Lewis descended from Welshmen: "sentimental, passionate, and rhetorical, easily moved both to anger and to tenderness; men who laughed and cried a great deal and who had not much of the talent for happiness."

Lewis' mother, however, like her family, was a woman of "cheerful and tranquil affection." Her people "had the talent for happiness in a high degree" and "went straight for it as experienced travelers go for the best seat in a train.'

You've probably noticed long ago that not only is not everyone happy, a good many folks seem to possess little or no "talent" for happiness at all. I don't mean to be cynical, and I don't think I'm telling you

something you don't already know, but you probably can't make unhappy folks happy no matter what you do, and I suspect it's unwise and unproductive to waste too much time trying.

Some folks are unhappy at work. They're unhappy at school. They're unhappy at the Little League park. They're unhappy at the grocery store, at the church, at the bank, and at the barber shop. See a pattern?

The sad fact is that unhappy people tend to spread their unhappiness like chicken pox in a kindergarten class and it seems to be a law that unhappy people never seem closer to a twisted sort of happiness than when they're busy making other people unhappy. Misery does indeed love company.

Until unhappy folks make a decision to be happy, they won't be. Not only can you not make them happy, if you spend a good bit of your time trying, you will only succeed in becoming the unhappiest of all. I promise you, even if you get a little fleeting smile out of them if you stand on your head and stack a dozen or so BBs on your nose, they'll suddenly remember that they knew somebody back in Kansas who was able to do the same thing except he stacked two dozen sideways while singing "Climb Every Mountain."

People who want to be unhappy almost certainly will be. So what to do?

Be sure you're not one of them. (Focusing on Christ and on others and on your blessings and not on your own navel will go a long way toward producing happiness under your own hat.) Love them by behaving in Christlike ways toward them. Pray for them. Model thankful and joyful living as you thank God with every breath that he put within you a "talent for happiness." Use it and give thanks!
